First Lieut. Charles M. Kerr of Lima, Ohio, nephew of Mrs. Otto Finck, recently visited in the Fincks' home. Kerr was a prisoner of war in Korea for 16 months, ten months of this time being spent in solitary confinement.

When his plane was shot down he bailed out and in 15 minutes was captured by the Reds. He was among the last group of prisoners to be released following the end of the shooting war.

Kerr's condition was fair after being a prisoner for 16 months. Rice was his only food most of the time.

Lt. Kerr came through here on his way to Las Vegas, Nev., where he will report for further duty.

Blackwell To Get Oak Creek Water

Officers and directors of the UCRA met Thursday of last week in Robert Lee and ratified a contract by which Blackwell will get 150,000 gallons of water daily from the Oak Creek Lake.

Under the agreement, Blackwell will pay Bronte for the water it uses. Then, Bronte will forward the sum plus its own to pay the UCRA, which is in charge of Oak Creek Lake.

The 150,000 gallons will be taken from Bronte's daily allotment of 600,000 gallons, directors said.

Blackwell incorporated last year primarily to be in a position to bargain for water.

UCRA directors will meet in Sterling City Jan. 19 at which time they will discuss permanent repairs on the Mountain Creek spillway at Robert Lee. The spillway was damaged by floods this summer.

The directors remained after the meeting as guests of the Robert Lee BCD for their annual banquet last Thursday night.

James M. Jackson Dies Suddenly

Mail Packages Early To Insure Delivery. By Xmas

Bronte Postmaster, Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, issued her annual appeal this week for correct addressing and early mailing of Christmas greetings and gifts.

Time for mailing Christmas gifts overseas has already passed, Mrs. Williams said, and packages destined for distant points in the United States should already have been mailed. Christmas gifts going by parcel post to nearby points should be in the mail as soon as possible.

Christmas cards for out of the state should be deposited in the post office by Dec. 15. Mrs. Williams said that in order for cards to be delivered promptly they should have a 3-cent stamp, so they will go first class. Also, she added that a return address may be placed on first class mail, so that they will be returned if not delivered to the receiver.

However, Christmas cards may be sent for 2 cents but are classed as third-class mail and will not be handled as promptly as first class.

Mrs. Williams said that she already can see an increase in the number of pieces of mail being handled by the local office. She expects it to get heavier all the time till Dec. 25.

Cotton Control Vote Coming Up Tuesday, Dec. 15

The Cotton Referendum will be held Tuesday, December 15, 1953. It is very important that every eligible voter vote in this referendum. The polls will open at 8:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P. M.

Farmers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those farmers who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1953 as Owner-Operator, Cost Tenant, Standing-rent or fixed rent tenant or landlord (other than a landlord of a standing-rent, cash-rent or fixed-rent tenant) or a share tenant or as share enant or sharecropper.

No cotton farmer shall be entitled to more than one vote in the referendum, even though he may have been engaged in 1953 in production of cotton on two or more farms in two or more communities, County or state.

In Texas the wives of eligible husbands or husbands of eligible wives will be entitled to a vote. No person shall be eligible to vote in any community other than the Community in which he now resides.

All producers in A and C communities will vote at the Agricultural building in Robert Lee. B community will vote at the City Hall in Bronte.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH, Dec. 7—Monday was the 12th anniversary of "Pearl Harbor Day." Americans recalled this tragic day when the infamous Jap attack took place in various ways.

A group of us at the Fort Worth Stockyards got to talking about it and the question came up, "How do livestock prices today, compare with those the week before the Pearl Harbor attack?"

We looked it up and got a surprise. We think the comparison of pre-World War II prices with those paid at Fort Worth Monday will be interesting to you, too!

One thing sure is that you'll agree that "a lot of water has run under the bridge" since Dec. 7, 1941!

At Fort Worth Monday fat steers and yearlings and slaughter cows were about steady in a slow trade. Some top fat calves were strong to 50c higher. Bulls and stocker and feeder cattle and calves were fully steady.

Comparing prices with Dec. 7, 1941: Good and choice fed steers and yearlings today sold for \$16 to \$22.50—the same grades 12 years ago sold for \$9 to \$11.75 at Fort Worth!

Common and medium slaughter steers and heifers at \$10 to \$15 Monday, sold from \$6.50 to \$9.

Fat cows at Fort Worth Monday brought \$9.50 to \$12.50. And 12 years ago they drew \$6.25 to \$7.75. Canner and cutters sold then for \$3 to \$6.25, and this week sold from \$6 to \$10.

Bulls at \$5.75 to \$7.60 then, sold at \$7 to \$12.50 this week.

On Monday good and choice slaughter calves sold at \$14 to \$20, a load at the latter figure from Graham. Twelve years ago on the first Pearl Harbor day their value was \$9.50 to \$11.75. Cull and medium slaughter calves this week drew \$8 to \$13.50, and then they sold from \$6 to \$9.50.

Good and choice stocker and feeder steers and yearlings a dozen years ago sold at \$8.50 to \$10.75, and tippy steer calves reached \$12.

On Monday at Fort Worth similar steers and yearlings drew \$14 to \$18, and calves reached \$19. Stocker cows the first week of December 1941 sold from \$5.25 to \$7.50, this week from \$8 to \$13.

Heifers and stocker heifer calves presently sell around \$2 under steers, and at that time averaged \$1 or \$1.25 less.

Hogs had the best market in weeks at Fort Worth Monday and topped at \$24.50, or 50c higher. During the original Pearl Harbor Week top hogs ranged from \$8.50 to \$9.35.

Sows sold Monday at Fort Worth at \$20 to \$22.

Sheep and lambs sold at steady prices at Fort Worth Monday and good and choice fat woolled lambs sold at \$18 to \$19, and good and choice shorn lambs sold from \$17 to \$17.50. A dozen years ago comparable lambs sold here at \$9 to \$10.50.

Slaughter yearlings sold here Monday at \$10 to \$14, compared with yearlings at \$8 to \$9.50 12 years ago.

On Monday slaughter ewes drew \$6 to \$7, and breeder ewes sold for \$7 to \$10. Old wethers cashed at \$7 to \$10, and old bucks drew \$3 to \$4.

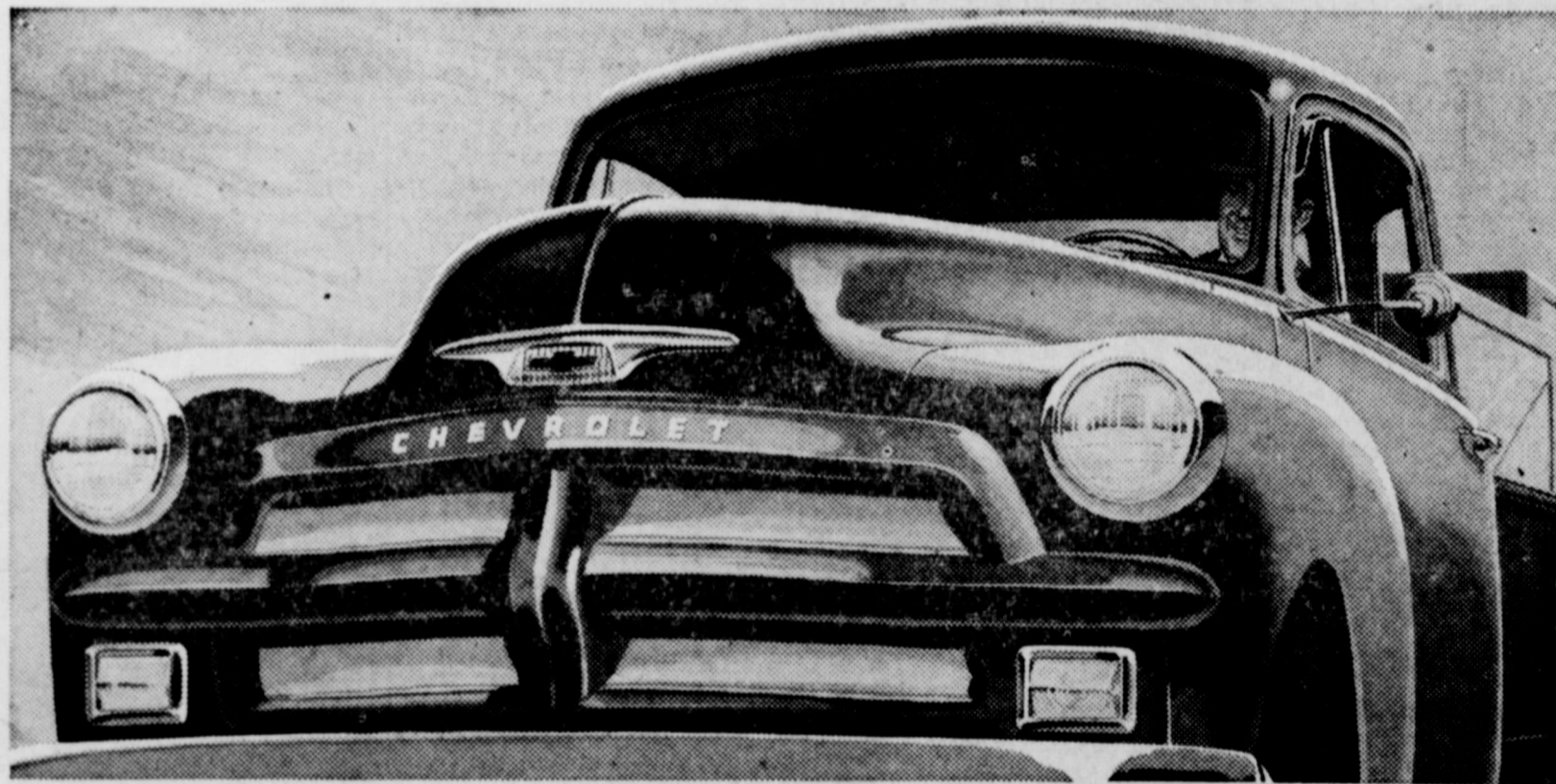

Mr. M. A. Cox, Coke County

rancher, has found a way to combat the drought. Last summer Mr. Cox installed a broiler plant capable of handling 3000 chicks. On his second lot of chicks received September 2, he started 2500 Arbor Acre White Rocks. He sold these chicks at nine

weeks averaging 3.132 lbs. straight across. For each 100 pounds of feed Mr. Cox got 41.89 lbs. chicken, or a feed conversion rate of 2.387. At 28 cents per pound Mr. Cox showed an average profit per chick of 23.27 cents or a labor profit per 1000 birds of \$232.71. It required 9 weeks to grow and market the chicks; then, three weeks to clean out and get ready for the next lot of chicks. In broiler production normally four lots are raised per year.

This is just one more point in favor of a balanced farm program. Farmers need to think more about making a "living" than making a "killing" on some project that may be a long time paying off.



Dr. White to Head Heart Campaign



Appointment of Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University, to head the annual Heart Fund campaign in Texas during the month of February was announced today by Dr. Joseph F. McVeigh of Fort Worth, President of the Texas Heart Association.

"These diseases take a greater toll of human lives than all others combined, a fact which underscores the importance of a concerted effort to combat them through medical research, professional and public education and community programs. I am confident that the people of Texas will again respond generously to the 'Help Your Heart Fund—Help Your Heart' appeal."

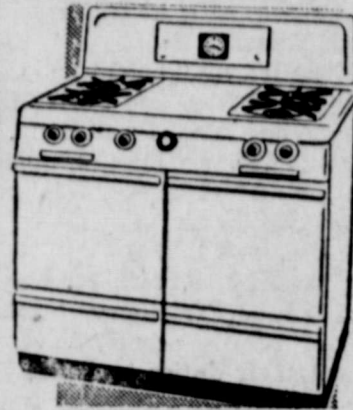
