Mr. Youngblood said that cost of the remodeling would cost somewhere between \$40 and \$50 housand. Plans call for making the local banking building one of the most modern in this section.

The old building formerly occupied by the Bronte Pharmacy, will be incorporated into the bank building, giving adequate space for every banking facility supplied by the local bank.

A vestibule entrance will be placed at the southwest corner of the building. It will open into a large lobby. Five tellers windows will replace the three now in use by the bank.

The tax firm estimated the val-

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
uation as follows: Producing minerals, \$6,301,380; non-producing minerals, \$110,000; pipelines, pump stations and related properties, \$184,200; railroads, \$168,680; oil field personal, \$134,130; and public utilities, \$52,000. The figures total to \$6,950,390.

This estimate doesn't include nearly 300 square miles of land in the district, nor the livestock, personal and city properties. Supt. Carroll said it is estimated that such properties will be valued at approximately \$2,000,-000.

These estimates on the valuations for 1954 are almost \$2,000,-000 more than the \$7,183,000 at which properties were valued this year.
