





December 25, 1953 | Today's Sermon

The most satanly attribute of man is hate; the most human attribute of man is love; and, the most divine attribute of man is that which causes him to give to others. The first is nothing of which to boast, indeed. The second comes by human nature. But, that characteristic in man that causes him to give to others, even though he may not have love for that person, but just a simple cognizance of that person's need, must be divine. Sometimes the vine nature of man is misguided, but when one person, out f the abundance of his heart, and of his goods, gives to the needs of another, he portrays one of the chief characteristics of God himself.

Just as a business man needs top once in a while to check

his business, the Christian individual needs to stop and understand himself; and at this time of year the subject of giving is paramount in cur minds. This is the season of the year when men take time out to exchange gifts of love and to bestow gifts of greater love to those who are less fortunate. There is no greater time of the year, as men determine values of time, than this season. The best in people is brought to the surface, and the worst in people is, at least for the present, over-laid with good. The writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes says in the eleventh chapter and the first verse, "Cast thy bread upon the waters; for thou shalt find it after many days." Jesus reminds of that truth saying, "It is more blessed

to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35). In giving certain instructions to his chosen disciples, Jesus lays for us this principle, "Freely ye have received, freely give." (Matt. 10:8).

A minister called upon a lady who had a beautiful garden. She took him into the garden and began to pluck roses right and left. "You are robbing yourself," said he. "Ah," she answered, "You do not know that the way to make the rose bush bear freely is to pluck them freely."

It is by giving that we grow. It is by giving that we really live and become rich while living. Our lives are made more beautiful, more worthwhile by the things that we do for others. The poorest man in all the world s the one who spends his entire life wholly to himself, absorbing everything possible, but giving nothing in return. He does nothg to bring happiness into the life of someone else. Not only


is he poor here upon earth, but | he is also poor as far as his treasure in heaven is concerned. Jesus said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. 
