Revival Begins Sunday at First Baptist Church

Revival services at the First Baptist Church, Bronte, begin next Sunday, having been preceded by a week of cottage prayer meetings throughout town and at Humble Camp. The pastor, Rev. Maynard R. Rogers, reports that interest is high and prospects are good for a genuine revival.

March of Dimes Contributions Over \$1,400

The east side of Coke County has reached the \$1,400 mark in its drive for the March of Dimes. Ernest Ivey, chairman of the drive, said Monday that he has deposited \$1,446.53.

The drive, which officially ended last week, had raised \$1,361.50. Additional gifts of \$85.03 have been turned in since that time.

Total to date for the entire county is \$2,135.13, the west side of Coke County reporting \$688.60 on deposit. This represents the total for Robert Lee only, with a large amount unofficially reported to have been raised at Silver. More events have been scheduled there.

Gifts are still welcome, Ivey said, and anyone who wishes to contribute to the March of Dimes may do so by seeing him.

Heart Campaign Now Underway

The campaign of the American Heart Association to raise money is now underway. Dr. John R. Harris is in charge of the drive in Coke County.

He said that he expects to receive coin collectors within the next few days and they will be distributed in business houses in the county.

The money raised by the Heart Drive is used to carry on research to find ways of treating various heart diseases. Heart disease is responsible for more deaths in this country than any other ailment. Much progress has been made in recent years in both medical and surgical treatment, prolonging lives of many victims and making it possible for them to lead normal lives.

Dr. Harris urged everyone to help in filling Coke County's quota in the Heart Drive.

Caperton Chevrolet Purchases Building

Caperton Chevrolet Co. has purchased the building occupied by Butane Service Co., it was announced recently. Included in the purchase was the vacant lot between the Chevrolet building and the one which they bought. Otis Smith owned the property.

Matthew Caperton, partner in the local Chevrolet agency, said that the additional building will be used eventually to house parts and for other storage. No immediate change is contemplated, however.

City and School to Collect Back Taxes

Members of the Bronte School board of trustees voted Monday night to join Coke County and the City of Bronte in collecting delinquent taxes in the school district.

They approved a contract with Clyde Boose, Sweetwater attorney, to collect the taxes. Boose will receive a 15 per cent commission for doing the job.

Supt. J. L. Carroll reported on the financial and general condition of the school to board members.

Other matters discussed included current bills and other routine matters.

Bronte Firemen Rate Well At Convention

Bronte Volunteer Firemen did themselves proud at a convention of the Hill Country Firemen's Association at Brady Tuesday. The local fire-fighters, who had only practiced the drills three times, placed seventh out of 10 teams in the six-man hose race; eighth in 13 teams in the three-man hose race; and seventh in 13 in the one-man hose race.

In the six-man race, two of the men had never practiced and one of the members of the three-man team had his first experience.

Attending the meeting from here were Howard Brock, commissioner of this precinct, who represented Coke County; and the following members of the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department: H. A. Springer, E. J. Smith, Steve Badley, Mack Eubanks, Clarence Doggett, Charles Timmons and George Eubanks.

Purpose of the competition is to develop speed in getting the equipment lined up ready to carry water to a fire. The local men carried out their drill in the time indicated: six-man drill, 40 seconds; three-man drill, 26.8 seconds; and one-man drill, 21.5 seconds. Several larger towns with more experienced firemen failed to make the time of the local boys.

Fire Chief Steve Badley said that members are working hard to acquaint themselves with the fire fighting equipment. The firemen meet each Thursday at 7 p. m. The public is welcome to

A unanimous vote by the city council Friday night gave the go-ahead sign to hiring an attorney to collect delinquent taxes due the city. A contract drawn up by Attorney Clyde Boose of Sweetwater to employ him to collect the taxes was approved and will become effective March 1. The contract is to be in effect two years.

The council agreed to set the effective date of the agreement at March 1 in order to give property owners owing delinquent taxes plenty of time to pay them. All taxes which are not paid by that date will have a 15 percent penalty added onto the taxes as well as the penalties and interest due the city. This 15 per cent is the attorney's fee for collecting the taxes. It was also agreed that all penalties and interest on 1953 taxes now due the city will be waived up to the March 1 date.

Other business taken up at the meeting Friday night included:

D. K. Glenn was named to preside over the city election which will be held April 6. He is to appoint his assistants.

Current bills owed by the city were read and approved. The group also discussed the sale of the water line going from town to the river. Simpson Iron Pipe & Metal Co. of Iraan has bought the pipe for 15 cents per foot. The firm is to bear the expense of digging up the pipe and moving it. The city received a check for \$1200 for the pipeline. Sale of surplus pumps and motors formerly used before the city began getting water from Oak Creek Lake was discussed. Councilman J. P. McGuire estimated that this material should bring in about \$975.

Mayor H. O. Whitt reported that practically all 1953 tax money is in and that various funds have been set up with sufficient revenue to operate until next October, when 1954 tax money will start coming in. He said the funds have been set up with the following amounts in them:

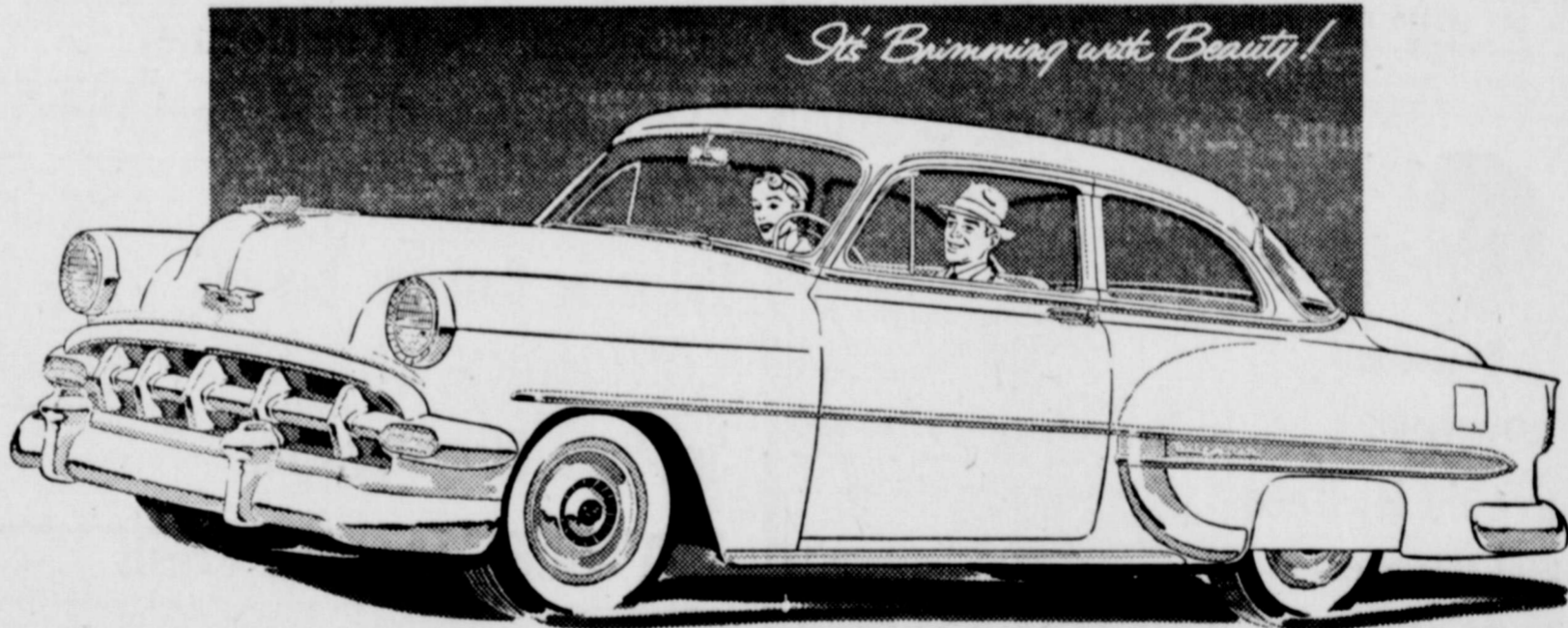

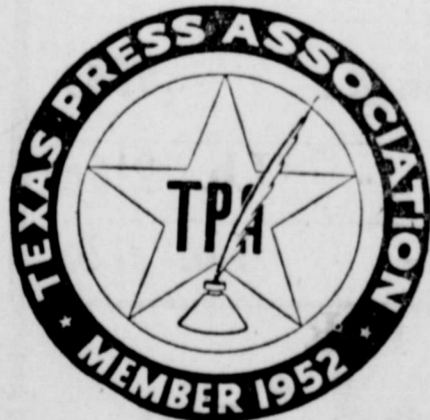

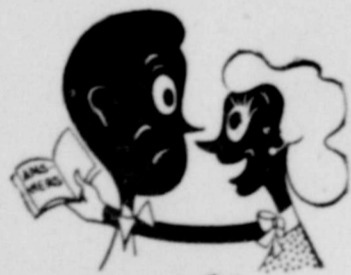

COST OF LIVING; Do price supports for farm products add substantially to the cost of living as some people have been saying?

Farm value of the cotton in a white shirt is less than nine per cent of what you pay for the shirt. A one-pound loaf of bread sells for nearly six times what the farmer gets for the wheat in the bread. Even for so simple an item as corn meal, the farmer sells the corn for less than one-third the retail cost of the meal.

Cotton, wheat and corn are all under the farm price support program. If the price paid the farmer were cut in half, the retail cost of these products would be affected very slightly. But the farmer would be ruined.

FARM INCOME: Anybody familiar with the situation knows that farmers are not profiteering.

That is true in Texas. It is true in the Nation.

In 1947, American farmers had a realized gross income of \$34,000,000,000. Their total net income in that year was \$11,600,000,000.

In 1953, gross income from agriculture was \$35,100,000,000. But the farmers' NET income had dropped to \$7,400,000,000.

Net income is what counts. With the total net farm income over four billion dollars less in 1953 than in 1947, certainly neither farmers nor the price support program can be blamed for the high cost to consumers of farm products.

TEXAS PROJECTS: Included in the President's budget message was a request for the following appropriations for flood control projects in Texas: Belton Reservoir, \$1,850,000; Dallas Floodway, \$1,300,000; Fort Worth Floodway, \$240,000; Texarkana Reservoir, \$4,000,000. Also requested was an appropriation of \$500,000 for the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi Waterway Project.

HOME LOAN BANKS: Texas building and loan association managers are protesting a proposal that the Federal Home Loan Bank System be put under the charge of the Housing and Home Finance Administrator.

They say such a move—which would require congressional action — would jeopardize the efficient management of the Federal Home Loan Bank System under the direction of its board. They make the further point that ownership of the Federal Home Loan Banks by some 6,000 associations throughout the United States is in line with the American system of private enterprise.

Experiments for the joint nuclear physics program of the office of Naval Research and the Atomic Energy Commission will be conducted at Goodfellow AF Base, San Angelo, during February.

The Fat Stock Show and Rodeo expects to be the biggest in San Angelo history. All activities begin with a downtown parade in San Angelo at 11 a.m. Feb. 25. A trade show will be held in conjunction with the Fat Stock Show.

The rodeo, which is always a major event in West Texas, begins at 2 p.m. daily during the stock show. All events will be held at the newly-remodeled fair grounds in north San Angelo.

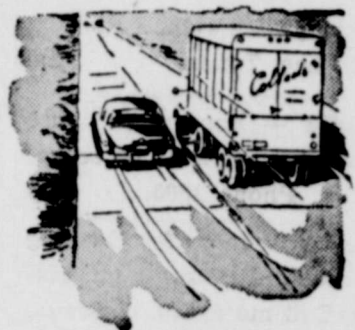
