County Total Reaches \$3241 In March of Dimes Campaign

Total contributions to the Coke County March of Dimes have reached \$3,241.00, with still a few sums to come in. Reports from the west side of the county swelled the total this week. Robert Lee reported \$698.70; Silver \$860.50 and Edith \$231.45.

Victor Wojtek, drive chairman for the west side, reported a total of \$1,795 thus far. Ernest Ivey, east side chairman, had reported \$1,446 for the east side.

Officials continued to be well pleased with the showing Coke County is making in this worthwhile drive. Contributions last year ran something over \$3,000 and the mark has been reached again this year. Complete figures will be published when they are available.

Oil News

Auld & Auld of Kerrville and Woodward of Dallas will drill a Cambrian wildcat in northeastern Coke County, eight miles north of Bronte. It will be the No. 1 F. E. McDonald.

The project is slated for a 6,500 foot bottom.

Location is 330 feet from the most northerly south line and 1,200 feet from the most easterly west line of 8-R. E. Douglas survey.

The prospector is 1 3/8 miles southwest of the Fort Chadbourn field and 7/8-mile northwest of Dan Auld and Murray Petroleum I Moore et al, wildcat failure plugged and abandoned Oct. 5, 1951, at 6,778 feet in the Hickory sand. The Caddo was topped at 6,540 feet on elevation of 1,970 feet. The Ellenburger was barren, 60 feet of mud being recovered on the only drillstem test in that formation from 6,539-92 feet.

The nearest Cambrian production is 4 1/8 miles to the south at Humble 3 R. E. Butner, opener and lone producer in the Rawlings 5500 field. It was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 300.82 barrels of 52 gravity oil plus two-tenths of 1 per cent basic sediment and water. Production was from between 5,541-53 feet in the Cambrian, topped at 5,522 feet. It was the first Cambrian discovery in West Texas in 11 years.

The No. 1 McDonald is being drilled on a farmout from Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. and American Republics Corp. Phillips Petroleum Co. is supplying the dry hole money.

Girls District Game At Water Valley Tonight at 7:15

Bronte's girls basketball team will meet Water Valley girls tonight at 7:15 on the Water Valley court. It will be the first of a best two out of three game series for the district championship. Bronte girls are winner of the north half of District 22-B. and Water Valley girls won the south half. The second game of the series will be played here next Tuesday night.

The game at Water Valley tonight will be followed by a boys game between the Bronte B team and Water Valley.

Bronte's boys cage team, also north half district winners, began play for district Tuesday night in Christoval and were defeated by a score of 44-52.

Bronte took a quick opening lead and held the front at 17-10 at the end of the first period. A score of 26-25 was in Bronte's favor at half time. In the third period Christoval rallied behind Leon Wyatt and gained an eight point lead, which had been cut to 39-34 at the end of the third period. In the fourth quarter they lengthened the lead to 52-44 by the end of the game.

Arbie Phillips scored 13 points for Bronte and Wyatt was high scorer for the Christoval team with 19 points.

The second game with Christoval was to have been played in Bronte last night. Should a third game be played, it will be in San Angelo, probably on Saturday night.

Foy Moore Explains Local School Finance

Foy L. Moore, member of the Bronte School board of trustees, told those present at a PTA meeting Tuesday of last week that the tax rate and valuations here are at depression level and should be raised.

Moore pointed out that the local school is the only one that he knows about which has a 1 per cent tax rate or \$1.00 tax per \$100 valuation. Most of them, he said, pay 1 1/2 per cent.

On the matter of valuations, Moore reported that practically all real estate in this school district is valued at the same price set on it during the period, 1932-39.

It is true, he stated, that the Bronte School has more money to spend than formerly, but the increase has come from the oil and other industries of the district. At the present time, oil companies pay directly 80 per cent of the local tax money which comes in, not counting what they contribute indirectly.

This percentage makes the industries pay \$8 for every \$2 paid by residents of the district. Of course, as Moore pointed out, he

was showing his listeners that the tax rate should be raised now in order for the district to obtain needed facilities. Such a raise in rate at the present time would place most of the burden of paying for these facilities on the industrial firms, and all of the people of the district would receive greater benefits.

GEOLOGISTS STUDY

Geologists who have studied the life of the oil fields in this district, Moore said, believe that they will last at the very minimum, 10 years. More likely, they will not be depleted for 15 years and some estimates state they will last for 20 to 30 years.

At any rate, the speaker said, if the people of this school district will pay a 1 1/2 per cent tax rate instead of 1 per cent, all new facilities needed can be paid out in 10 years. Thus, tax payers will be taking no chance of being left with a heavy tax load when the oil does play out.

Some interesting facts brought out by the speaker are:

Valuations in the Bronte School District have increased 1000 per cent since 1934.

The Humble company pays more school taxes today than everybody in the district paid in 1945.

Examples of other tax increases supported and approved include income tax which is up 18 percent for some taxpayers and the tobacco tax, which is up 400 percent. School taxes are at the same place they were 20 years ago.

COST INCREASING

The cost of instructing pupils is rising, despite the fact that taxes remain at the same level. Cost per pupil for instruction in 1934 was approximately \$100, the cost was \$287 last year. Cost of this increase was the normal increase in living which has affected all purchases. Cost of obtaining qualified teachers, supplies, equipment, etc., has risen proportionately to all other costs in the last 20 years.

Two Sentenced For Robbery Attempt

Five-year suspended sentences Monday were given to Marvin Eugene Whitaker, 19 of Ohio and Robert Leroy Eberhardt, 19, of San Angelo, after they pleaded guilty to charges of assault with intent to rob.

They were accused of attacking H. C. Murtishaw at his filling station here last Oct. 13. Both are also under indictment in Tom Green County charging auto theft.

Their pleas were entered before a jury in Judge Joe L. Mays' 51st district court, meeting at the courthouse at Robert Lee. Aubrey Stokes and Justin A. Keever, assistant district attorney, prosecuted.

Everett Jimerson of Andrews pleaded guilty to a charge of the theft of two oilfield tool bits last July. Jimerson was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. A Coke County jury also found A. A. Griggs Odessa scrap iron dealer, guilty of receiving and concealing stolen goods and recommended a two-year prison term.

Raymond Stoker of Odessa, attorney for Griggs, said a motion for new trial will be filed.

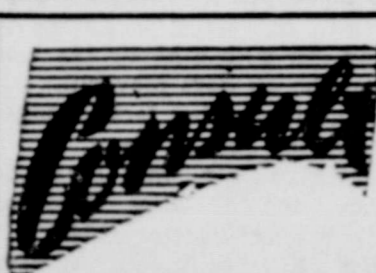

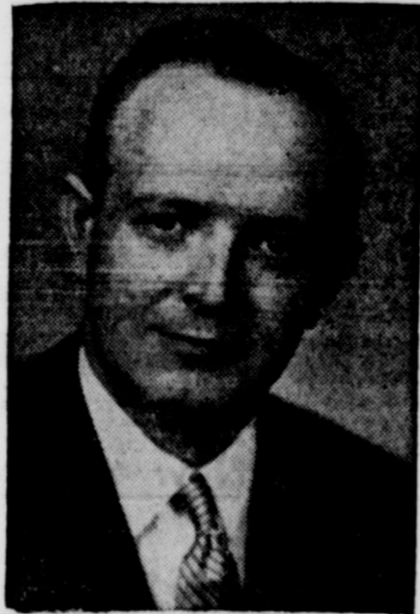

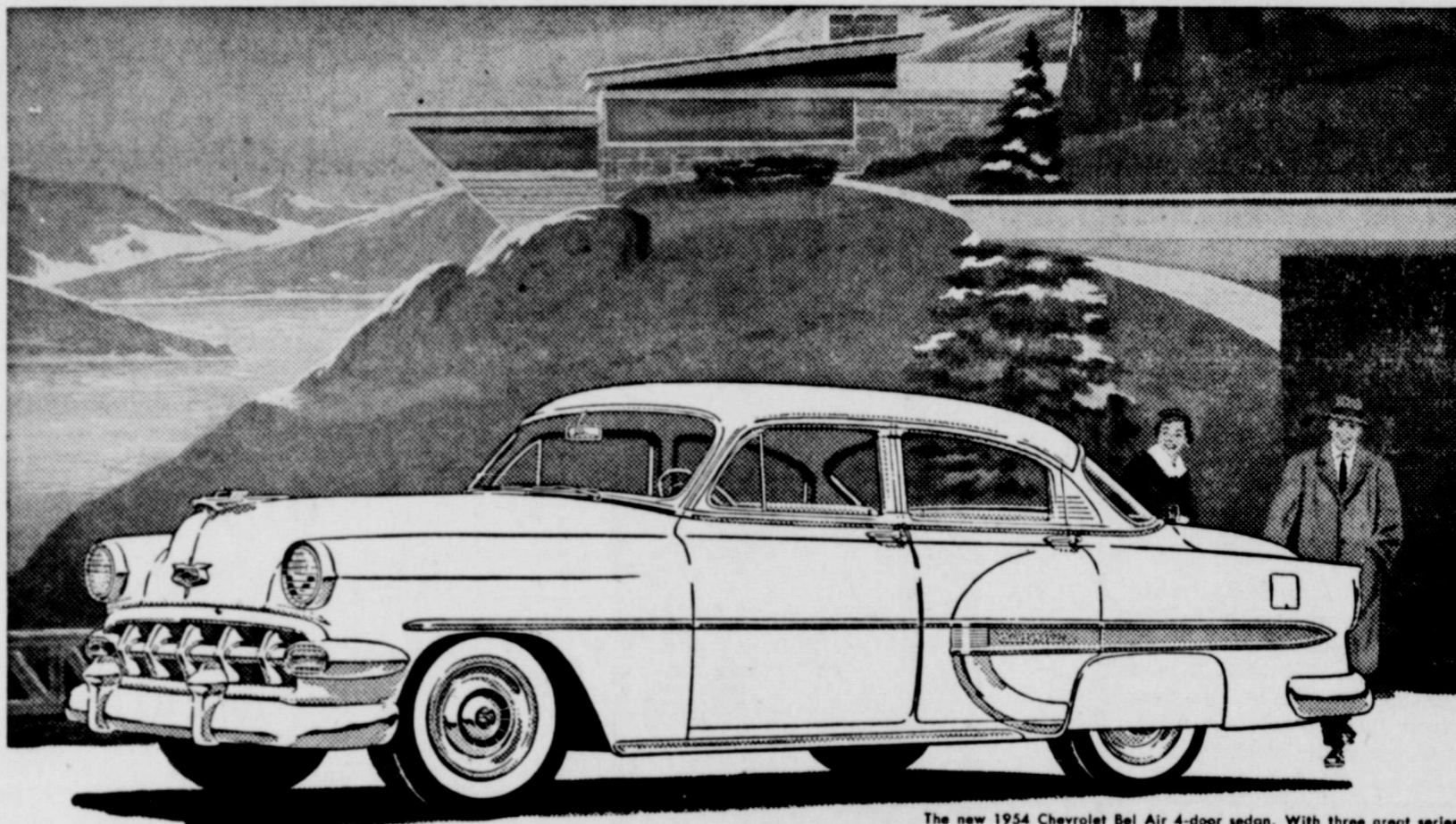

SCHOOL FINANCES—

Valuations are based on values of the 1932-39 era.

Delinquent taxes owed the district amount to \$5,334.81, and an attorney has been hired to collect this amount.

Local tax money amounted to \$67,341.57 last year. This amount came from the following sources: Humble Oil & Refining Co., 30 per cent; Lone Star Gas, 1.5 per cent; Stanolind Co., 7; Ibex Co., 4; Union Oil, 4; Utilities, 2; real estate, 14; personal property, 30; and railroads 1.5 percent.

Total receipts taken in by the school amounted to \$119,295.00. Local taxes accounted for 51 per cent of the amount; federal aid, 3 per cent; and state aid, 46 per cent.

Disbursements were \$115,110.00. They were divided into the following percentages: Administration, 10 per cent; instruction 64; operation, 7; maintenance, 1; auxiliary service, 12; fixed charges, 2; and capital outlay, 4 percent.

Of the 1953 estimated receipts from local taxes, it has been determined that the industrial firms of the district will pay 80 per cent; persons who have lived here since before the oil play will pay 10 per cent; and persons who have moved here since the oil boom began will pay 10 per cent.
