FEED PROGRAM ENDING

Farmers and ranchers in this county have through next Monday to sign for corn and wheat under the emergency feed program which has been operating. Orders placed before that time will be filled, a spokesman said, but that Monday is the deadline and the feed program is ending in this county. For several months farmers and ranchers have been able to purchase the feed for less than market price.

SIREN FOR FIRE DRILL

One long blast of the fire siren at 6:55 p. m. each Thursday will be the signal for firemen to assemble for fire drill. The fire meetings are held each Thursday night at 7 and the whistle will serve as a reminder.

H. A. Springer, chairman of the Coke County Chapter of the American Red Cross, said Wednesday that a total of \$590.14 had been collected in the current campaign for funds.

The county quota for this year is \$895, but it is hoped that \$1000 can be raised, \$500 from each side of the county. A Red Cross benefit at Tennyson last week brought in about \$25.

Of the \$590.14 total, Robert Lee, under chairman Mrs. Leslie Copeland, had turned in \$184.95, and the east side, with Charlie Boecking as fund chairman, had turned in \$405.19.

Officials are urging everyone to join the 1954 Red Cross and be a part of the tremendous program which is carried out each year by the organization.

Deadline Near on Filing for Trustee

Deadline for filing as a candidate for Bronte School trustee is nearing. The last date a name may be filed for a place on the ballot is next Wednesday, March 24, ten days before the election.

The names of Bob Wilson, Osmo Black and Marvin Corley are on file in the office of Jeff Dean. They were the only names officially filed Thursday. However the local trustees voted to place the names of Carroll Robbins, James W. Allen and Matthew Caperton on the ballot and it is presumed they will be filed before the deadline.

A petition of five voters may place any name on the ballot if filed within the required length of time in the office of the county School Superintendent.

D. K. Glenn is election judge and voting will take place on April 3 with voting boxes at Bronte, Brookshire, Tennyson and in the Oak Creek community.

Present trustees whose terms expire are Caperton, Sid Evans and Aubrey Denman.

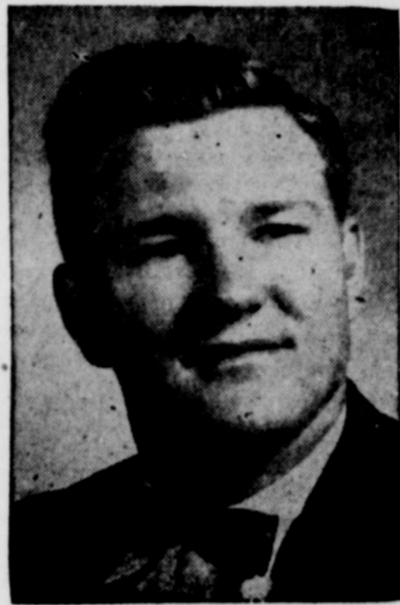
BLACKWELL TO VOTE ON TRUSTEES APR. 3

Group Oil Co. of Houston has filed application to drill a 6,000 foot Cambrian wildcat one location northeast of production in the Bronte multipay field of Coke County, one mile south of Bronte. It will be No. 1 G. W. Gideon.

Location, on a 92.9 acre lease, is 1,650 feet from the northwest lines of 2,204.8 feet from the northeast lines of 331-N. Eastland survey.

Survivors include a son, Harvey Rouse of San Angelo; two daughters, Mrs. Buena Gibson and Mrs. Belva Meek, both of McCamey; one brother, Charlie Eubanks of Bronte; and one half sister, Jocie Eubanks of Bronte. She had five grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

She had been a member of the church of Christ for about 60 years. She was well known for her handwork which included sewing, crochet, piecing quilts and quilting.

To The Editor:

On April 2, less than three weeks from now, the patron of the Bronte School District will be called upon to select three trustees. Without criticizing anyone presently connected with the school, I would like to point out the importance of this election.

Any body who is at all acquainted with what is going on in our school and in this community knows there is considerable room for improvement so far as harmony is concerned. Not only is this lack of harmony present in the community among the school patrons, but it exists within the school itself, among the teachers, students and administrators.

This situation is extremely bad for our school and I would like to urge all voters to give this matter some thought when they decide for whom they are going to vote. I don't feel like I am qualified to say who can remedy this situation, but if each voter will decide for himself who can do the job, our school will be greatly improved. In other words, trustees should be elected on their qualifications, not just because their platform is to fire Mr. So and So or Mrs. This and That.

Another thing to think about is the fact that Bronte needs a new school building. If the voters of this district see fit to vote a bond for a building, the board which

is elected April 2 will more than likely be the one which will be called upon to decide how this money (maybe \$150,000 to \$200,000) will be spent. It will be a big responsibility and we should have good men and qualified men on the school board to make these important decisions.

What this whole letter boils down to is that we should put aside petty grievances when we vote for school board members. We should elect good men, men who have proven they are qualified to assume the responsibility which they are taking.

Years ago when our country was founded, there seemed to be little need for conserving our natural resources. There was plenty of land and few people. When the resources were used from the land, the people had only to move westward to new land. Now the last frontier has been reached, and our natural resources are no longer plentiful.

With these changes, the great need of conserving our soil has arisen. In order to do this we

must also conserve our water, grassland, forests and animals.

Rain is a great blessing. Yet uncontrolled rain is a threat to our civilization. Falling on our pastures and farms, the rain begins its long journey to the rivers leaving miniature gorges and gullies. Our precious topsoil goes with it. Thousands and thousands of tons of this soil are carried into the oceans every year. This must be stopped, or the nation will find itself without enough food for its people.

Much has been done for conservation, but there is much more that we need to do. Fertilizing can return many vital elements to the soil. Plant material can be plowed under. Hillsides can be used for pastures rather than for crops. Dry land can be made useful by irrigation. The organic matter of soils can be increased by cover crops. Contour farming, crop rotation, strip cropping and terracing are also helpful.

Individually, I can help in soil conservation by keeping myself informed on new methods of conservation. When I meet someone who is indifferent, I can try to make him realize its importance. As a member of various organizations, I can encourage the study of conservation. It is important to let the Congressmen know about the interest in the program and of the willingness to support it.
