The new business has been operating a little more than a month and has been moved twice during this time to make room for expansion. It is now located in the Ray Building on Main street, the move being made last weekend from the Woodmen building on Highway 277.

## Nine Names on Ballot for Trustee

Deadline for filing as a school trustee passed this week with nine men filed as candidates for the three vacancies on the local board of trustees.

They are Marvin Corley, Osmo Black, Robert N. Wilson, J. B. Mackey, Joe Rawlings, Carroll Robbins, Vernon Glenn, James Allen and Matthew Caperton.

The election will be held a week from Saturday, April 3, with D. K. Glenn as election judge.

Voting boxes will be set up at Fennyson, Brookshire, Oak Creek and at the city hall in Bronte.

Eight employees, besides Mr. and Mrs. Smith are working in the business. They are turning out 80 blouses each day. Smith said he hopes to have crew increases to 13 in the next week or so and that the number of finished blouses will increase accordingly.

He said that orders are coming in just as fast as they can handle them. Some 20 or 30 towns in Central Texas are now handling the merchandise.

The factory is making broad-cloth blouses of various colors. Smith says the aim of the business is to supply small dry goods stores with assorted color and sizes without requiring them to buy large quantities of any one item.

## Cub Program Getting Started

First meeting to organize the Cub Scouts was held March 8. Cub Scouts are for boys between the ages of 8 and 11. A large amount of interest was shown by the 18 parents and 17 boys present for the meeting.

## Over 1,000 Car Tags Sold in Coke; Deadline Nears

Sheriff Paul Good reported on Wednesday that his office has sold 1,013 license plates to date. Deadline for having the 1954 plates on all vehicles is April 1.

The sheriff said that 684 passenger car tags have been sold and that 124 commercial licenses and 205 farm licenses have been sold.

As usual the sheriff's office is looking for a last minute rush in this department.

A state law also requires that all vehicles be inspected before April 15.

## Enterprise to Run Stories on Findings Of Committees

Several months ago an interested group of citizens met at the school to discuss the Texas Education Agency's recommendations concerning the programming of all public schools in the state.

A representative from the Department met with the group and unanimously agreed that the Bronte school system should undertake such a program which consisted of a thorough study of such important studies as scholastic enrollment, past, present and future; the curriculum now offered and whether or not it is adequate; additional subjects if needed; study of building facilities including physical conditions, adequacy and future needs and financial conditions, past, present and potential and if additional facilities are required, the type needed and possible cost involved.

The group organized with H. O. Whitt as general chairman. Other chairmen are H. A. Springer, scholastic census data of the past; D. K. Glenn, scholastic census enumerations in the future, developing potential enrollment to 1960; J. E. Fuller, curriculum; J. A. Stephenson, facilities and examining present facilities; C. E. Bruton, finance committee for a thorough study of all phases of school finances and L. T. Youngblood, building committee, to recommend any improvements found necessary by other committees.

Each of the chairmen appointer their assistants and much work has been done by the various committees.

Starting next week, a brief breakdown will be given concerning the findings of these committees and the recommendations they will submit to the school board. Everyone is invited to follow these findings to be fully acquainted with the situation as it exists.

## Red Cross Still Short Of Goal, Need Help

With the Red Cross campaign in its final weeks, Charlie Boecking, drive chairman, today called for a "Membership Mobilization which will draw into the ranks of the Red Cross all men and women of good will."

"There are still some in Bronte Boecking said, "who have not renewed their membership in the Red Cross this year. We are eager to reach these people so that our goal of signing-up every

adult as a Red Cross member may be obtained.

"To that end may I call upon every person who has already joined the Red Cross, and on every Red Cross volunteer, to make it his personal business to see that his neighbor and friends join up."

Boecking said that to date \$701.80 has been turned in to him. Of this amount, \$229.60 has come in from the west side of the county, leaving \$472.20 from the east side. It was unofficially reported Thursday that about \$25 more has been raised in Robert Lee which has not been reported yet.

The drive will end March 31 and Boecking urged that everyone get their contributions in before that time. The quota for the county is \$895.

## Oil News

Harlan Ray and R. D. Harris of Abilene have filed application to drill a 7,000-foot Cambrian wildcat in northeastern Coke County, 1 1/8 miles southwest of Penrose, Inc. et al 1 Mrs. S. K. Kirk, recently completed unidentified discovery, one mile east of Blackwell in Nolan County. It will be drilled as the No. 1 R. H. Reeves.

Rotary drilling, on the 248-acre lease, was to have begun March 24.

Location is 2,000 feet from the north and 417 feet from the west lines of 2-T&P, 467 feet south of Blackwell townsite.

The prospector is also 1 5/8 miles east-northeast of Humble 1 Lackey, wildcat failure abandoned May 21, 1951, at 6,560 feet. The following tops were reported on elevation of 2,087 feet: Capps, 5,290 feet; and Ellenburger, 6,295 feet.

Penrose et al 1 Kirk was finished March 12 for a daily flowing potential of 479.36 barrels of 47 gravity oil. The formation was not definitely identified, but it is known to be the Ellenburger or the Wilberns. Production was from between 6,286-73 feet. Top of pay was picked at 6,250 feet.

### WINDKIRK EXTENDER

The Wendkirk field was extended one location south with the completion of Shamrock Oil & Gas Corp. 7 H. G. Wendland for a daily flowing potential of 112-65 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 230-1.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke from open hole between 3,726 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 3,732 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 3,724 feet on ground elevation of 1,869 feet. Completion was natural.

Tubing pressure was 100 pounds; casing pressure, 230 pounds. Location is in 1-Thos. Hennessy survey six miles southwest of Bronte.

### STEP-OUT STAKED

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corp. of Amarillo has filed application to drill its No 9 H. G. Wendland one location north and slightly east of production in the Wendkirk field.

Rotary drilling to 3,800 feet will begin immediately.

Location, on a 4,340.08-acre lease, is 1,507 feet from the southwest and 330 feet from the northwest lines of 454-F. Merkel survey.

Kewanee Oil Co. spotted its No. 1-D Wendland six miles southwest of Bronte in the Wend Kirk (Cisco) Field.

**What Can I Do About Soil Conservation**

Each year, much of our topsoil is lost by water and wind erosion. Erosion lessens the soil's ability to absorb and hold water. The water carries the soil away leaving the land barren. Erosion also lessens the soil's growing ability. The original seven inches of topsoil has been reduced to about three inches. Therefore, we can see the importance and the need for soil conservation.

I need to inform myself and others on the value of preservation of natural resources. The water and the soil are our main natural resources. By erosion, we lose both everyday. Without them, the people of the world can not exist. Therefore, we must work to save them.

I can inform myself and others on the importance of the soil. The soil furnishes us food, fiber, and shelter. When we lose our topsoil, we also lose food, fiber and shelter. Everything we have comes directly or indirectly from the soil.

I can tell others to practice soil conservation. The range lands should never be over grazed. They should always have a protective grass cover. This cover helps hold the soil. Cover crops, which are adapted to the soil and climate, should be planted. These cover crops held the soil and keep it from washing and blowing away. Better farming methods should be practiced. Sloping croplands should be terraced. Fertilizer and lime, when recommended, should be used to develop more rapidly a better protective cover to clothe the soil. Trees can be planted. Contour tillage and strip cropping should be practiced.

The cure for erosion is protect the soil. I can do my part by helping other people see the importance of soil conservation. I can encourage them to save the soil.

This test is one of the guidance services for high school graduates of the area which San Angelo College has given the past six years.

As a follow-up to this test, SAC sent a team of its expert counsellors, Mrs. Frances Carter and Joe Gabriel to the local high school to explain the results of the test with specific interpretation to each boy or girl and at the same time point out use the student can make of the information whether he goes on to college or enters business.

The San Angelo College Counsellors were here Tuesday, Mar. 16. The Kudner test is not an intelligence or an aptitude test. It simply indicates the students' preferences in nine different types of vocations. This information is of vital importance to each boy and girl in planning future studies or activities.

**Cotton Acreage Not to Be Planted Should Be Released by April 16**

Coke County cotton farmers who do not intend to plant their full allotment should release their unplanted acreage to the county ASC Committee, according to Coke Co. Farm Bureau President O. T. Colvin of Blackwell.

"Releasing the unplanted acreage to the committee won't hurt the farmer's individual allotment

history," Colvin said. "Acreage released will be considered as planted on the farm from which it was released, provided that any cotton was planted on the farm in 1952, 1953 or 1954. Thus, the farmer who releases unplanted acreage gets credit for them in future allotments."

The latter is one of the provisions of the 1954 Law which the Farm Bureau promoted.

Colvin stated that the released acreage that is planted elsewhere not only will help other farmers who want to plant cotton this year, but will also help to preserve the historical acreage base of the county and state.

Acreage must be released by April 16 in this county. Official premeasurement of all marketing quota crops will be offered. Farmers will have to pay the cost of this. However, it will save the expense of plowing up overplanted acreage or the loss from underplanting.

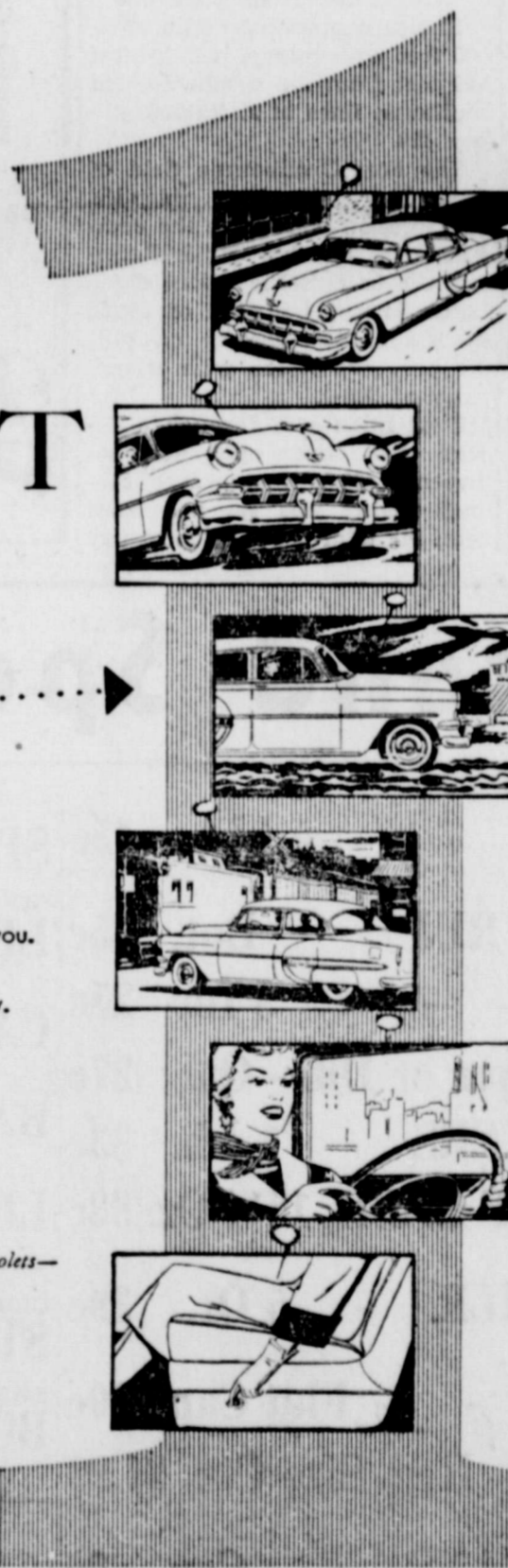

was picked at 5,478 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,013 feet. Pay section was acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 300 pounds, with packer on casing.
