Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 89-F Sallie Odom, Acct. 1, has been announced as a 5,100-foot rotary project in the West Fort Chadbourne Field.

It will be three and 3/4 miles southeast of Blackwell, 3,020 feet from the north and 4,200 feet from the west lines of Seth Clark Survey A-475.

Operator was trying to regain lost circulation at Ray and Harris of Abilene No. 1 R. H. Reeves, wildcat one mile southeast of Blackwell in Section 2, Block A, T&P Survey. Hole was bottomed at 6,089 feet.

Harlon Ray & D. R. Harris No. 1 R. N. Reeves, Section 2, Block A, T&P Survey, wildcat one mile southeast of Blackwell, was drilling below 6,442 feet. There had been no tests at last report. Proposed depth is 7,000 feet.

Operator was drilling below 3,285 feet in lime at John J. Eisner No. 1 George Humlong Estate, Section 383, Emil Hank survey, wildcat four miles south of Bronte.

Six miles west of Bronte, A. G. Hill, et al, of Abilene No. 1 Lee Ligon, Section 458, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey, was drilling below 3,120 feet in shale. It is a wildcat slated for 4,200 feet.

Bronte's Cowgirls won many events, broke one all-time record and took third place last Saturday at the Bluebonnet Belle Relays in San Angelo.

Lakeview repeated as winner of the Relays with 90½ points, Luaders came in second with 78½ points, followed by Bronte with 63.

Bronte's Jo Ann Rusk was high scorer in the Relays with 20 points to her credit. Mary Ann Gray ran a close second with 19 points.

The 300-yard medley relay team from Bronte, Jo Ann Rusk, Ruby Overstreet, Mary Gray and Rita McCutchen broke the only tournament record last Saturday. The Bronte girls made it in 38.6 seconds. The record was 39 seconds, set by Somerset in 1951.

Two File for Commissioner Of Precinct 4

Deadline for filing for political offices subject to the Democratic primary passed Monday midnight with little excitement. Two new names were filed as candidates for County Commissioner for Precinct No. 4 (Tennyson), shortly before the deadline. They were Chester Derrick and Elbert Carper who will oppose incumbent Claude Ditmore.

Another county race is over in Precinct 1 where Commissioner J. W. Service is opposed by Fern Havins.

Another contested race is for Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace. Monroe McCutchen is seeking the office now held by C. E. Bruton.

Other names which will be on the ballot in July is Jeff Dean, for County Judge; Paul Good for Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector; Weldon Fikes, for County & District Clerk; Gertrude Gray, for County Treasurer; Frank C. Dickey, Jr., for County Attorney; Howard Brock, for Commissioner Precinct 2 and T. F. Sims, Sr. for constable, precinct 2.

17 CASES IN JP COURT

Seventeen cases were filed in the Justice of the Peace Court here during the month of April, according to C. E. Bruton, JP. Most of the complaints were highway and traffic violations.

Sheriff Paul Good said that no charges have been filed, as it has been impossible to determine who fired the gun. Bruton also pointed out that he does not sell permits to fish in the new lake. Present regulations set up by the City of Sweetwater require a permit. However, laws of the State of Texas provide that residents of any county may fish in their home county without a permit or license of any kind. Bruton said he hopes this conflict can be worked out, but that so far as he knows, a fisherman does not have to possess a permit to fish in the lake if he lives in Coke County.

Chester Derrick Announces For Commissioner

Chester Derrick, Tennyson farmer and rancher, announced this week that he is a candidate for commissioner of precinct 4. Derrick said that after carefully considering the requirements of being a good commissioner, he decided to run.

"I am going to make an active campaign for the office of Precinct 4 Commissioner and I want to solicit the vote and support of all the people in our precinct. If you see fit to vote for me and elect me, I will at all times do my very best to do a good job, and I will greatly appreciate your support," Derrick said.

Derrick was born in the Tennyson community and has lived in Precinct 4 all of his life. His candidacy is subject to the action of voters in the Democratic Primary in July.

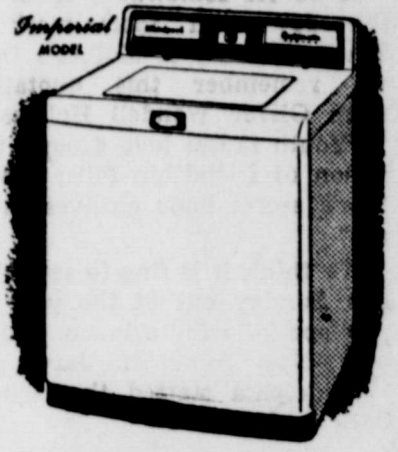

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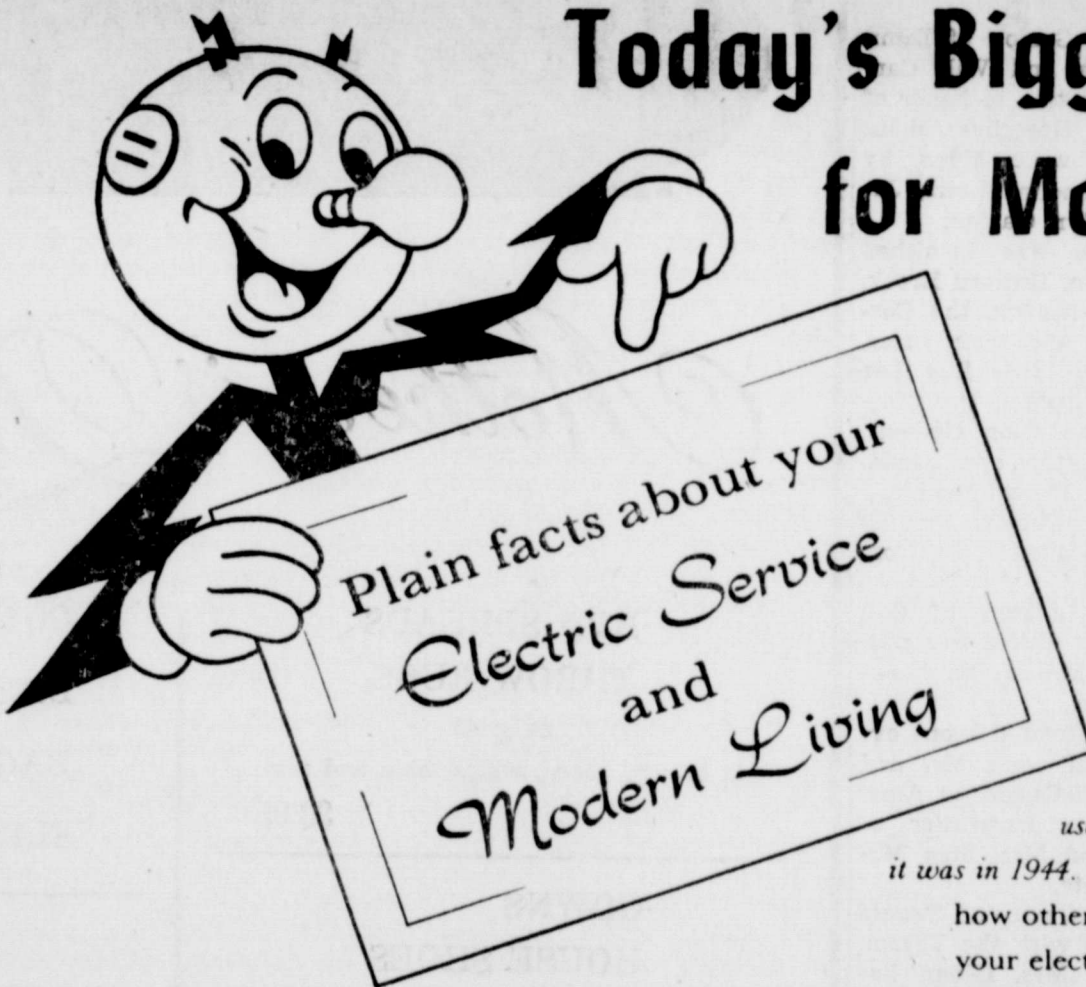

Sheppard Asks Second Term As Att'y General



JOHN BEN SHEPPERD

Texas Attorney General John Ben Shepperd formally filed for re-election to a second term today, subject to the action of the Democratic primary.

In his announcement Shepperd pledged continuing war by his office on "Crime, Communism and Corruption."

"We feel our quick action in checking the drive by the Communist Party to take over key Texas ports and our fight in Duval County to uncover and halt the theft of public funds both have won approval of the people."

Shepperd, who was elected Attorney General in 1952, after serving two years as Secretary of State, is 38 years of age and a native of Gladewater, Texas.

In his race for Attorney General two years ago, Shepperd received 80 percent of the votes. In

his home county, Gregg, and in Travis county where he now lives, he received more votes than ever had been cast for an Attorney General in the history of either county. As yet, he is unopposed for re-election.

During his first year in the Attorney General's office, Shepperd led important actions for the state such as defense of the Tidelands Act, made proposals to ease the Texas drouth areas, and successfully blocked a communist threat to Texas ports and oil and industrial centers.

In February he became the first state official to take definite action against Duval County irregularities when his office began an intensive probe of school district and county records.

During 1953 his office won 97 percent of its cases — 1199 out of 1232 tried or appealed. In the same year his office recovered through judgements, fines and forfeitures, enough money to operate the Attorney General's office for 25 years.

Shepperd serves on 34 boards and commissions of the state government including the State Banking Board, School and Veterans' Land Boards, State Tax Board, and State Elections Board. He is present southern regional chairman of the National Association of Attorneys General.

He is a member of the Lion's Club, the American Legion, and is a lifetime member of the P-TA. He has served on the board of the Christian Churches for the

past ten years.

Shepperd is a graduate of the University of Texas School of Law and holds two honorary Doctor of Laws degrees, from

North Texas State College and Chapman Christian College of California. He served three years in the U. S. Army during World War II.

He is married to the former Mamie Strieber of Yorktown and they have two sons, Skippy and Johnny, and twin daughters, Suzanne and Marianne.

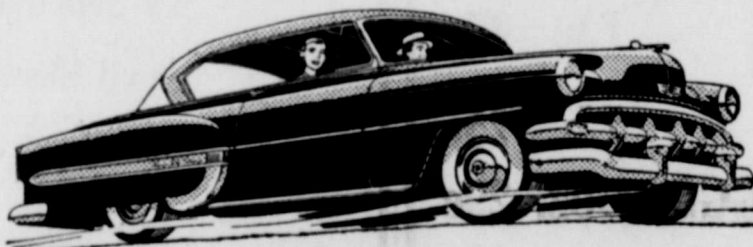
