City Limit Oil Test Rules Are Explained

The ordinance passed by the city council at a special meeting Monday of last week was prompted by the immediate plans of Barney Carter of Tyler to drill a test in the city limits here. Latest report is that Carter is to open up the hole drilled on the property of L. T. Youngblood several years ago. The test was abandoned.

The ordinance was passed with the idea of making the best arrangement to residents of the city and at the same time give an oil operator a fair deal.

Briefly, the ordinance provides for the following:

The city has been divided up into drilling blocks of approximately ten acres each. A map which is part of the ordinance shows just how Bronte property is divided.

According to the new regulation, an oil operator must have a permit to drill within the city limits, to be issued by the city council. It also provides that a fee of \$200 shall be paid the city before a permit is issued and the city council reserves the right to refuse a permit for any reason it deems proper.

Well location is provided for by the regulation which says that no well may be drilled within

50 feet of any boundary of a drilling block or within 75 feet of any building of a block.

No permit is to be issued to an operator who owns less than 51 per cent of the leases in a drilling block. The ordinance provides a method for land owners who have not leased their property to receive a fair lease price for property. In case a land owner does not wish to lease a way is provided for him to become a partner in a test well on his block.

A method of paying royalty to land owners who have a producing well on their drilling block is provided, each one to receive his pro rata share according to the size of his holdings in the drilling block.

Rights of surface owners are protected in that a written contract with the owner is required before an operator can move in drilling equipment.

A public hearing must be held before a permit is issued to drill any well and a notice of such hearing must be published.

Public health and welfare are taken care of with various safety measures which must be observed by the operator. Such things as filling of slush pits, flaring of gas, removal of drilling equipment from location and method and time to taking drill stem tests are provided.

Penalty for failure to comply with the regulations set up by the ordinance is a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000, each day of violation and each violation of various provisions in the ordinance to constitute a separate offense.

Keesee Home Is Destroyed by Fire

Bronte residents were awakened Saturday morning about four o'clock by a fire alarm. The blaze was at the home of Oren Keesee on Church Street in the south part of town.

The frame house was completely engulfed with flames before it was discovered and firemen could reach the place.

Fortunately, there was practically no wind blowing, or other nearby structures would probably have been severely damaged. D. K. Glenn owns the house to the north and Mr. and Mrs. George Thomas live directly south of the house that burned.

The Keesee house and contents were a complete loss, and some damage was done to the neighboring homes.

Keesee was not at home when the fire broke out. He was in town preparing to catch a bus to San Angelo, when he heard about the fire. Origin of the blaze is not known.

J. L. Scott Killed In Plane Crash

Scott was killed Tuesday when his crop-dusting plane crashed near Honey Grove, Texas. He was dusting cotton, had made a sweep across a field and was circling back when his plane dived abruptly from a low altitude.

A native of Bronte, Scott was a graduate of the Kilgore High School, he served as a pilot during World War II and in the Korean conflict. He later was a copilot for American Airlines.

Funeral services will be held today at Overton.

He was a son of the late Ralph Scott of Bronte. His mother, Mrs. Gertrude Whaley, lives in California.

He is survived by his wife of Irving; a daughter, Kathleen of Conrad, Mont.; his mother; three sisters, Mrs. Jack Poff of Ennis, Mrs. Jack Smith of Lancaster, Calif., and Mrs. Leon Whaley, Jr. of Kilgore, and a brother, Ralph A. Scott of Waco.

He is also survived by a large number of aunts, uncles and cousins who live here.

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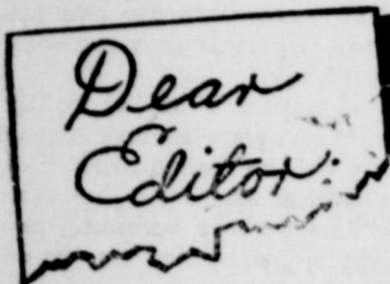

LEGAL NOTICE

An ordinance of the City of Bronte, Texas, regulating the drilling of oil and gas wells within the city limits; Declaring the purposes of such regulation: Declaring it unlawful to drill, complete or operate such a well without a permit, for the drilling of only one (1) such well to each producing horizon to and on each drilling block, designating drilling blocks, providing for the conditions under which applications for drilling permits may be made, for the completion, operation and abandonment of such wells, for the issuance of permits, providing for the deposit of \$200.00 cash fee with each application for permit, prescribing the form of such application; Providing for the publication of notice of the filing of all applications and for a hearing thereon, reserving to the city council power to refuse any

application for permit by reason of location or for reasons affecting sanitation, health, safety, morals or welfare of the city; Providing that no permit shall be granted except on land held by an applicant covering at least 51% of the area in the drilling block; Providing for certain payments to be made to owners of land not under lease; providing the means whereby owners of land not under lease may obtain an interest in the well; Prohibiting the use of a wooden derrick or a steam powered rig; Requiring that within thirty days after the completion of a well the pits shall be filled and if steel pits are used that same shall within thirty days after well completion be moved from the premises; providing for blow out preventors; Prohibiting the taking of drill stem tests except during daylight hours; Providing for the enclosure of a well by a fence; Prohibiting the escape or venting of gas into the air unless same be flared and burned; Providing that this ordinance shall not repeal other ordinances pertaining to fire prevention, health, sanitation and safety; Providing that the invalidity of any particular provision shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining provisions, and for other purposes pertinent to the regulation of drilling for, operating and producing oil and/or gas within the limits of the City of Bronte, Texas, providing that violation shall be deemed a misdemeanor and for fine not exceeding \$100.00 and providing that each day

of the continuance of such violation shall be considered a separate offense; And that the ordinance shall take effect and shall be in force after its publication in The Bronte Enterprise, Bronte, Texas.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons, Ltd. of Dallas No. 1 Mrs. Lola Ash, John Myers Survey, A-384, has been completed in a new Cross Cut Sand area three miles west of Norton.

The confirmation had a daily potential of 132.24 gravity oil. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 220 pounds tubing pressure. Production is from 42 perforations at 2,239-46 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud acid. The casing is set at 4,296

feet, total depth.

Gas-oil ratio was 921-1.

The well is a south offset to Currey, Shield, and Currey No. 1 Mackey, the discovery. It had a daily potential of 111.36 barrels of oil.

Bert Fields of Dallas has filed application to drill his 1 E. F. Bryan, as a 3/8-mile southwest offset to his No. 1 Smith, lower Fry sand discovery, 2 1/2 miles northeast of Norton.

The project will be drilled to 4,900 feet with rotary, operations to begin immediately. Elevation is 1,849.8 feet.

Location, on a 68.34-acre tract, is 5,483.9 feet from the north and

330 feet from the east lines of 599-Wm. H. Smith survey.

The discovery well was finished April 18, for a daily flowing potential of 303.85 barrels of 50 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 294-1. Production was through perforations between 4,330-4,344 feet.
