## Bronte Postoffice Now Operating As Second Class

Bronte's post office was advanced to second class rating July 1. The advance came as a result of the post office's receipts exceeding \$8,000 for the past fiscal year. Postmaster Mrs. Carrie G. Williams said that she has known for several months that the receipts would exceed the limit for third class. During the first part of May she was officially notified that the change would be made.

Mrs. Williams is expecting new equipment to arrive any day, but it had not arrived Tuesday afternoon. Main items of new equipment will be an automatic cancelling machine and new larger safe, besides some smaller items.

Another change brought about by the new rating will be post office hours. The office will be open from 7 a. m. until 5 p. m. Mrs. Williams also announced that general delivery is being discontinued on Sunday. Hereafter, the person who put up the Sunday mail has opened the window for a short time in order for general delivery patrons to get their mail.

Several persons from here took a Civil Service examination for relief clerk at the postoffice last week. Results have not been announced. At the present time the post office force consists of Mrs. Williams, Mrs. Pearl Boynton and Mrs. C. C. Glenn. Rural carriers are B. A. Bell and J. A. Stephenson.

## Trustees Call Bond Election; Supt. J. L. Carroll Resigns Post

### Carroll Resigns After 6 Years As Head of School

Supt. J. L. Carroll resigned his position as head of the Bronte Schools at a meeting of the board of trustees Monday night. Carroll has accepted a position as superintendent of the schools at Meadow, on the South Plains. His resignation becomes effective on July 10.

Carroll came to Bronte in 1948, succeeding County Judge Jeff Dean as superintendent of local schools. During his tenure of office, the school district has made much progress, increasing the number of teachers and adding to the number of courses offered. The school's physical plant has also been expanded, and tax valuations have increased tremendously, due to the oil development in the district.

Mrs. Carroll, who has served as a teacher in the local schools, has also accepted a position in the elementary school at Meadow.

Supt. Carroll has been active in civic and church work here. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, Lions Club and First Baptist church, where he is a deacon. Mr. and Mrs. Carroll and their son, Woody, will move to Meadow within the next few weeks.

## CROP Drive Set At Blackwell On July 10

Blackwell Lions are sponsoring a CROP drive for next weekend. The club is working with the Christian Rural Overseas Program in collecting cattle and sheep for canning and to be shipped to starving people abroad. The animals which are collected in this particular drive will go to a Youth Refugee Camp in Greece.

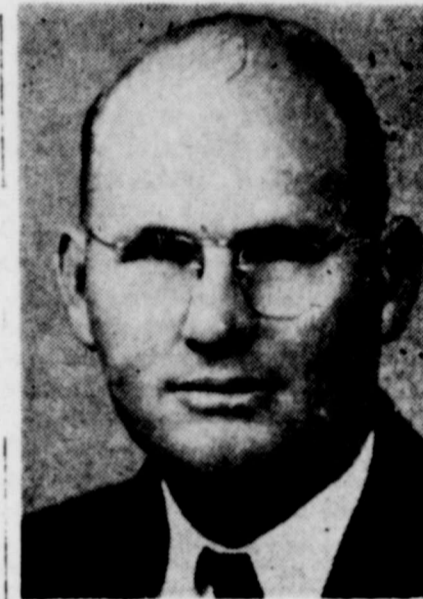
Everyone who will be asked to bring an animal to Elmer Jordan's feeding pens at Blackwell Saturday, July 10. The animals do not need to be fat, a spokesman for the group said. "All of this meat will be canned and older animals which are not worth much on the market will be fine," he added.

The meat will be processed free of charge by the City Packing Co. of Fort Worth. The Lions have set a goal of 20 head of cattle and 150 head of sheep.

Stock will be kept in the pen at Blackwell until Sunday, July 11, when a dedication service will be held and the animals will be loaded out for Fort Worth.

Farmers and ranchers in the Bronte area as well as around Blackwell are invited and urged to contribute some of their lower grade animals to the drive. Cash donations are also welcome.

CROP has a record of being able to distribute more food with less expense than any of the many agencies which have tried in the last several years to help the starving millions of the world.

## BRONTE TO CLOSE MONDAY

Most all the stores in Bronte will close next Monday, July 5, in observance of the July 4 holiday. The fourth comes on Sunday this year; consequently, the holiday is being taken on Monday.

It is expected that cafes and service stations will remain open to take advantage of the holiday trade, but most other firms will be closed, a survey made by The Enterprise showed.

L. T. Youngblood announced that the First National Bank will be closed, and Postmaster Mrs. Carrie G. Williams said the post office would observe the holiday. The city hall will be closed, as will county offices in Robert Lee.

All the merchants and others concerned are asking that their customers and patrons bear this announcement in mind and take care of their purchases and other business on Saturday.

## July 10 Is Date Set for \$250,000 Bond Election

Bronte's school trustees called a \$250,000 bond election at a Monday night meeting.

The election, which is set for Saturday, July 10, is for the construction of a new elementary school near the present school building. The election was called after a petition was presented to the board with 103 signatures on it, asking for the bond vote.

A study has been going on in the school district for months to determine the need for added facilities. The study which has been made by various citizen committees which were under the general chairmanship of H. O. Whitt. Chairmen of the various committees included D. K. Glenn, J. A. Stephenson, C. E. Bruton, L. T. Youngblood, Rev. J. E. Fuller and H. A. Springer.

After much study by the several groups, the conclusion was reached that a new elementary building is needed and that the \$250,000 bond issue will finance the project, both construction and equipping.

Voting will take place at the city hall in Bronte. D. K. Glenn will be presiding judge; Mrs. W. H. Thomas, judge and clerks are to be R. C. Lasswell and Clifford Clark.

The proposed building will contain 12 classrooms, in addition to an auditorium, cafeteria, offices, rest rooms, etc. The trustees accepted an offer of Columbian Securities Corp. of San Antonio to handle the bonds at slightly less than 2 1/4 per cent interest.

## HEAR AUDIT REPORT

Board members also heard a report of Harlow & Sons, San Angelo auditors, who recently completed an audit of the school finances. The audit included the school years, 1951-52, 1952-53 and 1953-54. They reported that all money of the district had been properly accounted for and expended.

Auditors also went through the school bills and checked teacher contracts with the pay ledgers and checks and found that all teachers and employees had been paid according to contract. The auditors told board members that the school bookkeeping system was in good order and that it is a standard system used throughout the state.

The audit has been placed on file in the superintendents' office and another is on file at the First National Bank. It is available at either place to anyone who wishes to inspect it.

Plans were to select two building custodians at the Monday night meeting. However, this matter was deferred until a later date.

A legal notice announcing the bond election appears on another page in this paper.

### Health Dept. Sounds Warning Against Polio

AUSTIN, Texas June 24 — This is the season of the year when an increase in poliomyelitis can be expected and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, is urging the public to cooperate in helping to prevent the spread of this crippling disease.

"Children should not visit homes where poliomyelitis or symptoms of this disease are present. Promptness in diagnosing poliomyelitis is one of the most important factors in its control," Dr. Holle declared.

"Direct contact between persons is the chief factor in the spread of infantile paralysis and since carriers are difficult to determine, it is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts during any outbreaks of this disease."

Dr. Holle stressed the fact that a rigid program of sanitation is

advisable since it has been suspected that flies and other seasonal insects may convey the virus or germ of poliomyelitis. He added that insect transmission has not been scientifically demonstrated but pointed out that sanitation is always advisable in controlling disease and that filth is likely to prove dangerous.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, unusual drowsiness, and irritability, followed by a stiffness in the neck and back. Children under five years are most susceptible and all children under twelve should be watched for suspicious symptoms. Dr. Holle urged that a physician be called immediately if infantile paralysis is suspected. If the disease is definitely diagnosed, local health authorities should be contacted immediately, and patients isolated for at least 21 days

Fort Benning, Ga. — Cadet Billy Wayne Hipp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wornock Hipp of Bronte and a student at Texas Tech in Lubbock, is now attending the 1954 General Military Science Reserve Officers' Training Corps Summer Camp at Fort Benning, Ga.

The six-week summer camp at Fort Benning is designed to give practical application to theories taught by ROTC instructors at college-level educational institutions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the development of leadership and the cadet's capa-

bility to function effectively in the role of an infantry leader in small unit combat operations, as may be required of any officer regardless of his branch of the US Army.

The more than 1400 cadets represent 37 colleges and universities of the Third and Fourth Army areas. Each cadet is striving for a commission in the US Army. Those cadets who have satisfactorily completed four years of college may be commissioned at the end of camp, the remainder when they have completed their four years of college.

Now comes the season of the year when the Red, White and Blue is glorified in oratory throughout the land. Platitudes flow. Washington, Lincoln, Franklin, Patrick Henry, and Jefferson are quoted. For speakers bold enough to break with this tradition, we suggest the examination of a speech written by Merle Thorpe, editor of SERVICE Magazine, for the July issue. Theme—"The Eagle or the Oyster?"

For a people . . .  
 who elect opportunism rather than opportunity, who dream of security rather than success;  
 who believe political charity is a virtue;  
 who mock the frugal and plunder the thrifty;  
 who adopt the rule that if I don't succeed you are to blame, that what you have is as much mine as yours;  
 who contend that property is a shameful sign of success;  
 who whimper that failure is the nobler cause; well-being is wicked; prudence, out-of-date; sacrifice silly—for such a people a fitting emblem is  
 the Oyster.  
 For a people . . .  
 who faced nature in the raw, with privation the rule and hardihood a virtue;

who endured defeat, disease and disaster for a hundred years in order to get a foothold on the Eastern Seaboard, the while with one eye on the interior, a no-man's land, a cockpit for settling international rivalries and private grudges, disputed by wild animals and wilder redmen;  
 who sacrificed thus for a belief in the worth and dignity of the individual;  
 who believed that economic freedom was as important as political freedom;  
 who substituted "In God We Trust," for the Old World motto "In Government We Trust";  
 for a nation built by men who dedicated their lives to achieve the realization of these beliefs,

Grain Storage A Big Problem

Recent rains in Texas have made a tremendous change in our crop outlook. We are all grateful for this; however, we are now confronted by another very serious problem. With average or better yields a strong possibility, we can expect a shortage of storage space for grain sorghums. In fact, the latest report we have from commodity credit says there is no longer any commercial storage available.

I am sure all of you realize the seriousness of this situation. Your grain sorghum will be eligible for the government loan only if it is in approved storage. Coke County has not as yet been approved for on the farm storage; however, your county committee has requested approval and we have no reason to suspect that it will not be granted.

At this time it appears that you will have the choice of selling your grain sorghum at going prices, or storing it on the farm. We heard here in the office that milo was selling for \$1.15 per hundred below support price in South Texas and the prediction is that the only demand we will have in another month will be the local demand. This makes farm storage almost a must. It might be wise to get in touch

with your local P. M. A. office or the County Agent's office and see what structures will be approved for on farm storage. Specifications are not too severe, but they are a little too detailed or list in his article. This should be gone right away. You might need to put a new handle in the hammer and sharpen the old saw.

Facility loans are available for construction of grain storage structures through your local P. M. A. Office. Loans for 80% of the cost of approved structures can be obtained. Loans are made for five years at 4% interest. If conditions at harvest time are as bad as it looks like they may be you might pay for a good barn in one year.

Mrs. Bentley died at 12:03 Sunday morning in Shannon Hospital as a result of injuries suffered when she was struck Saturday night by a pickup.

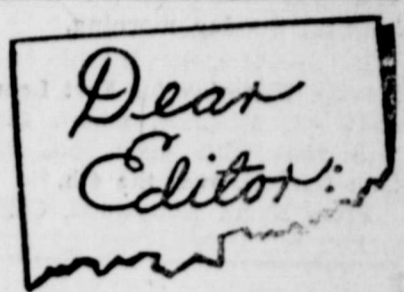

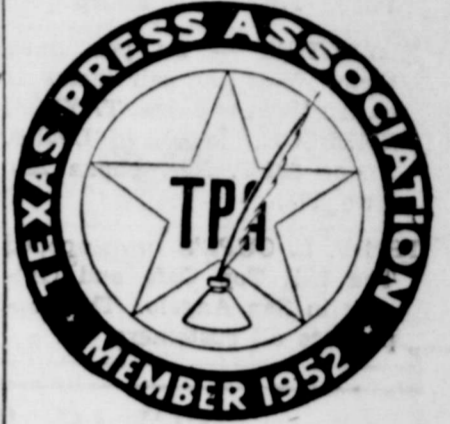

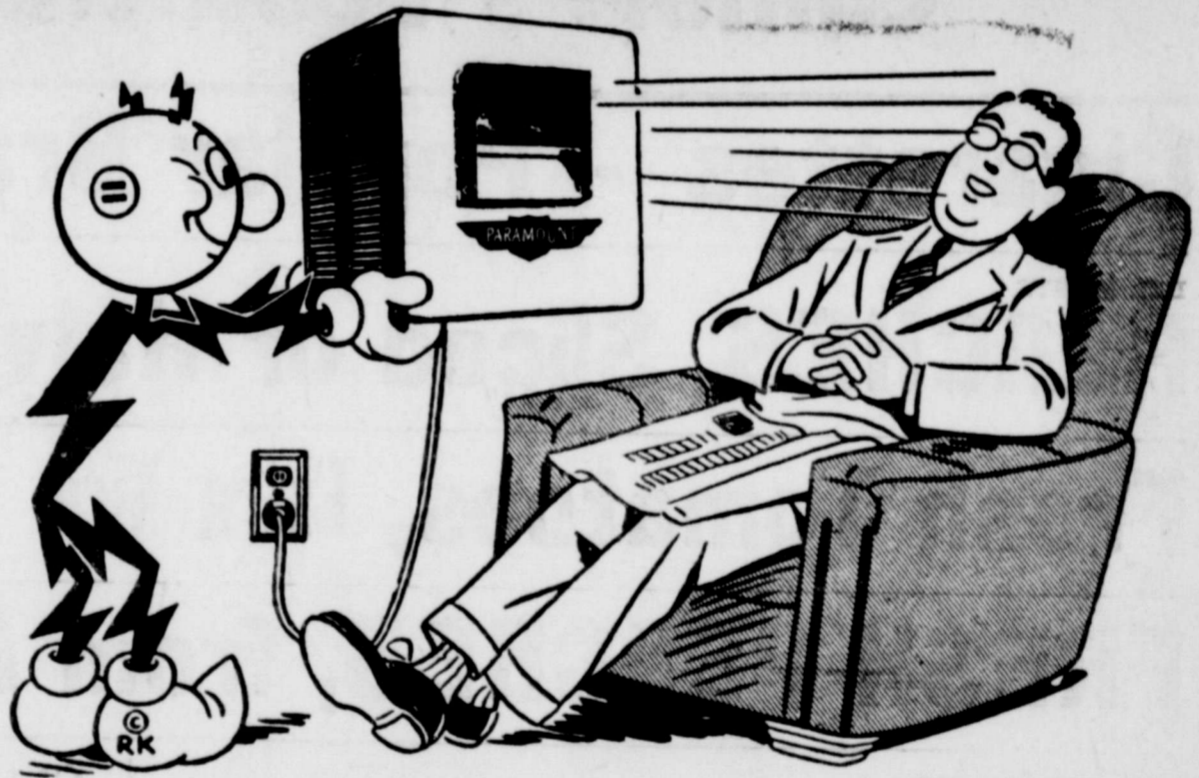
