## AD-LIB-BEN

We certainly had an enjoyable time last weekend at the convention of the West Texas Press Association in Midland. Officials of the City, Chamber of Commerce officials, Jim Allison and Bill Collyns, publisher and editor of the Midland Reporter-Telegram and just everybody did their best to see that the conventioners had a good time.

Heard some interesting speakers including Paul (Big D) Crume of the Dallas News, Delbert Downing, manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, Bill Bernard, manager of the Associated Press in Texas and an AP correspondent in Korea during that fracas, and lots of newspaper people.

Had a long chat with Jim Kelly, a young man of 81, who has published the Stanton Reporter for a long time. Mr. Kelly was telling us about the "Little Duval" deal in Martin County. He said that he had never been able to get the commissioners court to publish a financial statement, even though they are required by law, and that closed meetings (also excluding the press) were not unusual. Mr. Kelley is of the opinion that if he had been allowed to present quarterly reports to the people, as is done in Coke County, this mess never would, nor could, have happened. At this point, may we compliment our own county officials for their cooperation in letting the people know how their money is spent.

We just have to mention this little matter also: The Bronte Enterprise won third place in the contest for best all around weekly paper in towns under 2,000 population. They gave us a nice certificate, no money.

## BUDGET HEARING

The city council of Bronte has called a public budget hearing for Monday, Aug. 23, at 3 p. m.

Purpose of the hearing is to review the tentative budget which has been set up, hear any complaints or suggestions which citizens of Bronte may have to make in regard to the way city money is being spent. The proposed budget covers the fiscal year 1954-55.

The public is invited and urged to attend this meeting.

## TODAY LAST DAY TO RETURN ASC BALLOTS TO OFFICE

Today, Friday, is the last date that ballots in the ASC elections may be returned to the County ASC office. Ballots, for the purpose of electing Community Committeemen and Alternate community committeemen for 1955, have been mailed to all eligible voters in the county.

Ballots may be returned either by mail or in person to the County ASC office, but must be either in the office by 5 p. m. today or postmarked today.

Those elected as Chairmen and vice-chairman of the Community Committee shall be declared elected as delegate and alternate delegate, respectively, to the County Convention.

## MORE SAFETY BOXES INSTALLED AT BANK

The First National Bank has installed two more sections of safety deposit boxes, and according to Assistant Cashier E. F. Glenn, most of them have already been sold. The bank now has a total of 230 boxes in its old vault, which is used exclusively for this purpose, following remodeling and installation of a new vault to hold the bank's books, money, etc.

Glenn said that employees of the firm have been trying to get all the old papers and other valuables which were stored at the bank before remodeling returned to their owners. In the course of the cleaning up they have come across a number of abstracts and other papers, the owners of which they do not know. He said that if anyone has a missing abstract, they are welcome to come in and look over the ones which cannot be placed. "These abstracts belong to somebody and we'd like to find the owners," Glenn added.

## Last Rites Held Here Saturday for Mrs. A. S. Eubanks

Funeral services for Mrs. A. S. Eubanks, pioneer of the Bronte area, were conducted Saturday. She was 87 years old.

Mrs. Eubanks had been ill at the Bronte Hospital about a week.

She was born in Missouri, May 15, 1867, and was married Feb. 1, 1884. The family moved to Texas in 1886, settling in Comanche County. They came to Coke County in 1889, when it was still part of Tom Green county. Her husband died in 1930.

Last rites were held at 3 p. m. Saturday at the Church of Christ with Bill Pugh, minister, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of the Clift Funeral Home of Bronte.

Mrs. Eubanks' grandsons were pallbearers. They were Isaac Eubanks, Alec Eubanks, James Coleman, Ivey Eubanks, W. O. Eubanks, Jr. and Jim Eubanks.

Survivors include a son, W. O. Eubanks, Sr. of Bronte; a brother, J. M. Hicks of Arkansas; a half brother, C. A. Eubanks of Bronte, 11 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

## THURSDAY WAS ANNIVERSARY OF BIG FLOOD

Coke Countians, anxiously scanning the skies for moisture laden clouds, are reminded that it can happen here. As a matter of fact, it was just a year ago yesterday, August 19, when the entire city of Bronte was several feet deep under water. It rained 11 inches north of town on the headwaters of the East and West Kickapoo Creeks. Both went out of banks to the extent that the streams met in one big river right through the middle of town.

About 8 inches of rain in town added to the discomfort. Some local residents were forced to evacuate their homes, heavy damage was reported in business places; highways, railroads and county roads were washed out.

Oak Creek Lake, however, received its biggest boost and was one-fourth full when the rains were over.

## High School Students Register Sept. 2 & 3

High School students of Bronte Schools will enroll Thursday and Friday, Sept. 2 and 3, Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger announced Wednesday. Mr. Wolfenbarger said that grade school students will not be enrolled until the regular opening day of school, Monday, Sept. 6.

He has called a general faculty meeting for Saturday, Sept. 4, at 9 a. m., at which time plans will be made for the beginning of classes on the following Monday.

High School students may enroll between the hours of 9 a. m.

and 3 p. m. on the two days. Books will be issued on Sept. 6 and a short schedule will be run, in order for school to dismiss in a half day. Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 7, the regular schedule is to begin.

## Two Teachers Elected

School trustees, in a meeting Monday night, elected two new teachers. Oscar Dorsey of Sterling City was elected assistant football coach and will also serve as head basketball coach for boys and high school science teacher.

Mrs. Grady Baker was elected as a teacher but her exact position has not been decided, the Superintendent said. He also said that one more teacher is needed to make the faculty complete; preferable a person with a major in mathematics.

New courses which have not been offered here before are: general mathematics, general science, Spanish, second year typing, speech and high school chorus.

Coach Garland Black has announced that football practice will start Monday, Aug. 23. The new coach is expecting a good turnout of Bronte High School boys for the initial practice period. He has called the meeting for 6:30 p. m. in the high school gym. All boys who are coming out for the 1954 Longhorn squad should be present at that time.

Bronte has a nine-game schedule lined up and a tenth game may possibly be added to it. The schedule was published in last week's paper, and includes games with Richland Springs, Robert Lee, Abilene Sophs, Ira, Trent, Hobbs, Loraine, Hermleigh and a second game with Robert Lee.

## West Side to Vote On Road Bonds

Two important road bond elections are coming up Saturday, August 21, on the west side of the county, in precincts 1 and 3.

Included in the two elections are 5.21 miles of paving on the west side of the loop at Silver, a high water bridge across the Colorado River and 11.91 miles of paved highway extending from the new bridge south to Highway 158 west of Edith. Also included in the project would be a few blocks of paving in Robert Lee, one to the high school and another around a loop to Coke County Memorial Hospital.

Proportionate share of the proposed roads, total of which is \$295,000, is \$49,500 for Precinct 3 and a bond issue of \$245,000 for Precinct 1.

If the bonds are approved, the new projects will be built to state specifications, and it is thought that the state would probably take them over later and furnish maintenance.

Demand for the new roads and bridges was created by continued expansion of the oilfields in that section of the county and the lack of roads into these fields. A group of oil operators met several months ago with the Commissioners Court to discuss the matter.

The new roads would be built at an estimated cost of \$12,000 per mile. Other costs would be \$35,000 for the river bridge, \$7,500 for a smaller bridge on the new road, \$34,000 for right of way and fencing, \$8,000 for engineering fees and \$4,300 for the paving in Robert Lee.

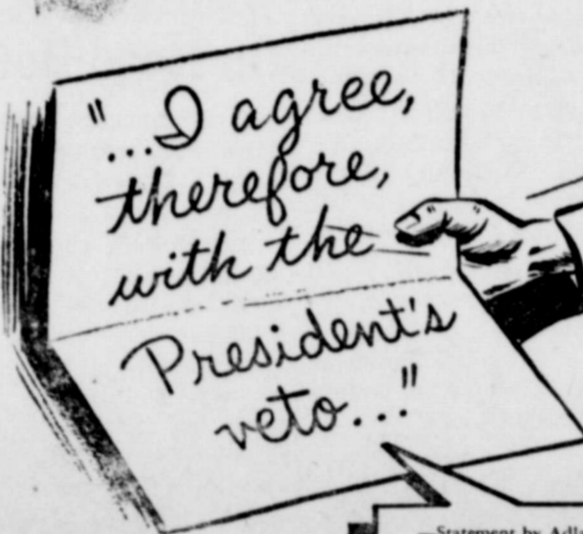
The group plans an individual

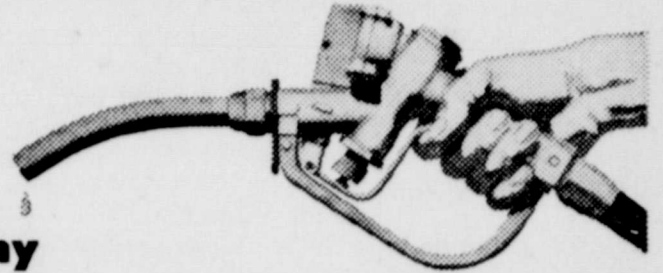

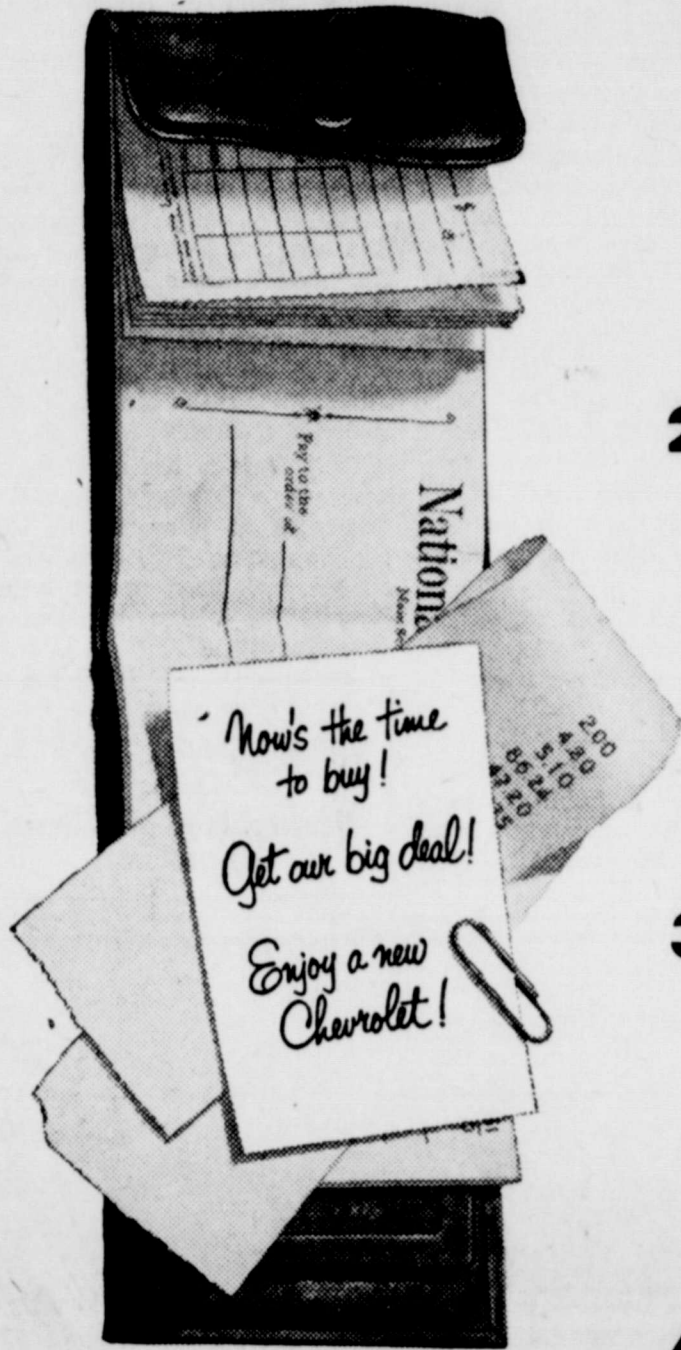

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows: "Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power by General Law to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; and provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government

of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, blind, and needy children, and the government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000) Dollars per year.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 5. That Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 21. A County Attorney, for counties in which there is not a resident Criminal District Attorney, shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, who shall be commissioned by the State and hold his office for the term of four years. In case of vacancy the Commissioners Court of the county shall have the power to appoint a County Attorney until the next general election. The County Attorney shall represent the State in all cases in the District and inferior courts in their respective counties; but if any county shall be included in a district in which there shall be a District Attorney, the respective duties of District Attorneys and County Attorneys shall in such cases be regulated by the Legislature. The Legislature may provide for the election of District Attorneys in such districts, as may be deemed necessary, and make provision for the compensation of District Attorneys and County Attorneys. District Attorneys shall hold office for a term of four years, and until their successors have qualified."

Section 6. That Section 23 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 23. There shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county a Sheriff, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, whose duties and perquisites, and fees of office, shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and vacancies in whose office shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next general election."

Section 7. That Section 14 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 14. Except as provided in Section 16 of this Article, there shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor is elected and qualified, and such Assessor and Collector of taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes, as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Section 8. That Section 16 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 16. The Sheriff of each county, in addition to his other duties, shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having 10,000 or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected as provided in Section 14 of this Article, and shall hold office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 9. That Section 44 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 44. The Legislature shall prescribe the duties and provide for the election by the qualified voters of each county in this State, of a County Treasurer and a County Surveyor, who shall have an office at the county seat, and hold their office for four years, and until their successors are qualified; and shall have such compensation as may be provided by law."

Section 10. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 30, which shall read as follows:

"Section 30. The Judges of all Courts of county-wide jurisdiction heretofore or hereafter created by the Legislature of this State, and all Criminal District Attorneys now or hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, shall be elected for a term of four years, and shall serve until their successors have qualified."

Section 11. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 64, which shall read as follows:

"Section 64. The office of Inspector of Hides and Animals, the elective district, county and precinct offices which have heretofore had terms of two years, shall hereafter have terms of four years, and the holders of such offices shall serve until their successors are qualified."

Section 12. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section 65, which shall read as follows:

"Section 65. The following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts-at-Law; (e) County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (f) County Treasurers; (g) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace."

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. "Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. Section 14. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive a compensation for his services as an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Section 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; to receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office; and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section, or in his official capacity, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service

of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows: "Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Section 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature. "In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called with the adjournment of the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Section 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the State Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only. And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the State Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution."

Section 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof; creating the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature, providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon, the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b and reading as follows:

"Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such State official he shall be confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed."

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modernize, remodel, build and equipte and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.

(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereafter provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modernize, remodel, build and equipte and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.

"The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be known as the Confederate States Memorial to the Supreme Court and such other courts and State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law."

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law,

the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955."

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence. Said memorials may be erected upon battlefields, in cemeteries, or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955."

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created."

(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States."

Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

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## Oil News

C. L. McMahon, Inc. et al No. 1 A. S. Hendry, Coke County indicated Cambrian discovery in 305-J. Holleman survey, three miles southeast of Blackwell, was swabbing oil at the rate of 32 barrels per day through perforations between 5,710-20 feet.

Operator was preparing to fracture through perforations and continue testing.

The wildcat flowed oil from the Gardner lime on a drillstem test from 5,343-388 feet, made oil and water on a test of the Odom lime from 5,529-554 feet and yielded oil on test of the Cambrian from 5,710-722 feet.

Total depth is 5,823 feet. McMahon No. 1-A Hendry was drilling early this week at 2,805 feet in lime and shale.

### Farmout From Currey, Shield

Leon Hays, Kilgore oil operator, has taken a farmout from Currey, Shield & Currey, Dallas, on a 125-acre tract in Runnels County 2½ miles west of Norton.

The deal calls for Hays to drill a 4,500-foot Cross Cut sand test by October of this year. It will be on the Curtis Barrett 125-acre tract in the northwest quarter of block 4 Burnett csl., Abst. 19. The site would be approximately 3,000 feet northeast of Currey, Shield & Currey 1 Mackey, opener of the Norton West (Cross Cut) Field. It was finaled in May for a daily flowing potential of 111.36 barrels of oil. Production was from between 4,239-244 feet.

Hays also has taken four other tracts in the area comprising 316 acres with obligation to drive a 4,500-foot test on each tract. No cash consideration was reported in the transaction.

Bert Fields of Dallas has completed his No. 2 J. W. Smith as a new producer in the West Norton

Lower Fry field. Location is three miles northeast of Norton in Thomas Fowler Survey 440.

No. 2 Smith gauged 108 barrels of 50 gravity oil through a 16-64-inch choke with packer on casing and 320 pounds on tubing. Flow was from 120 perforations at 4,331-3,351 feet. Casing was set at 4,335 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 660-1.

### Wildcat Staked

Location for a new wildcat has been staked four and one-half miles northeast of Norton.

It will be C. T. Robertson, et al, No. 1 W. S. Proctor, slated for a depth of 5,300 feet with rotary. Drillsite spots 2,632 feet from the south and 496 feet from the west lines of H&GN Survey 3.

Garrett M. Smith and others No. 1 O. Faries, wildcat a half mile east of production in the McCutchen field, plugged and abandoned at 4,100 feet with no shows reported.

### Eubanks Wildcat

Harper & Huffman, Midland, have filed application to drill a Cambrian wildcat four miles west of Bronte and 3¼ miles northwest of Cambrian production in the Bronte field. It will be the No. 1 Mrs. A. S. Eubanks.

Location was staked Tuesday and rotary drilling operations to 7,000 feet will begin immediately.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 60 feet from the north and east lines of 447-1A-H&TC.
