## Shivers Wins In County And State

Governor Allan Shivers carried Coke County in the Second Democratic primary held last Saturday. The county reversed its choice for governor, having voted a majority for Yarborough in the First Primary, held July 24. The count was 582 for Shivers and 424 for Yarborough.

The Bronte box switched from Yarborough to Shivers, but Robert Lee stayed with Yarborough. One small box, Walnut, went solid for Shivers.

In the other contested race for Place No. 1 on the Supreme Court, Few Brewster bested Alfred M. Scott with a vote of 513 to 299.

Bronte had a larger turnout than in the First Primary. Total vote in the gubernatorial race on July 24 was 267, while 290 ballots were counted in the race last Saturday. At the same time, Robert Lee total number of ballots went down with 383 in the first election and 287 in the second.

The race was one of the most heated battles Texans have seen in a long time for the chief executive's job. Last count learned gave Shivers some 91,000 lead in the entire state.

Bronte's first bale of cotton was ginned Wednesday, August 25, at the Bronte Gin by Pat Johnson. The first bale weighed 532 pounds and brought a premium of \$47.50, contributed by Bronte merchants. The first bale was ginned free of charge, as is always the custom.

The Bronte gin has been completely overhauled this year and a new natural gas power unit has been installed to take the place of the old steam unit. The steam unit has served in the gin since 1931, according to J. D. Luttrell, owner of the plant. A second bale was also ginned last week by Tom Williams.

First bale for Coke county was ginned in Robert Lee on Monday of last week by O. E. Kresta. Mr. Kresta brought in another bale to the Robert Lee gin on Tuesday and Pete McDonald also ginned a bale on that date.

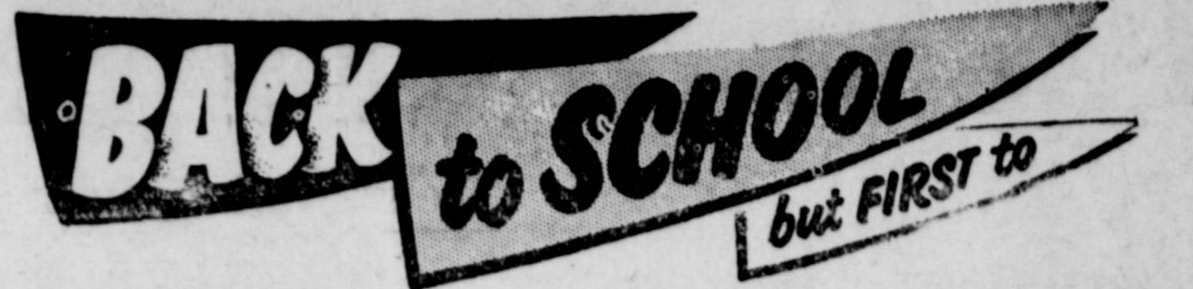

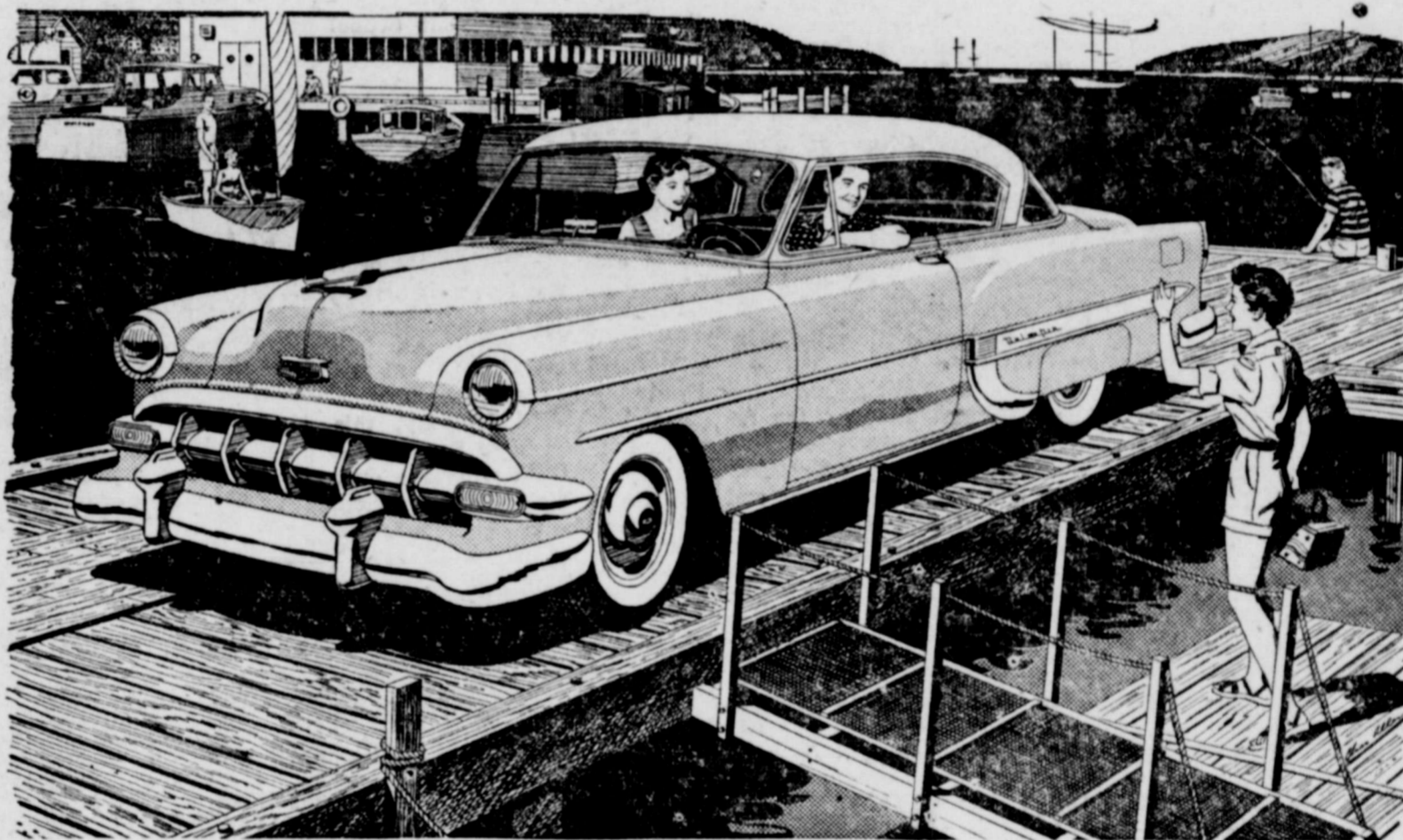

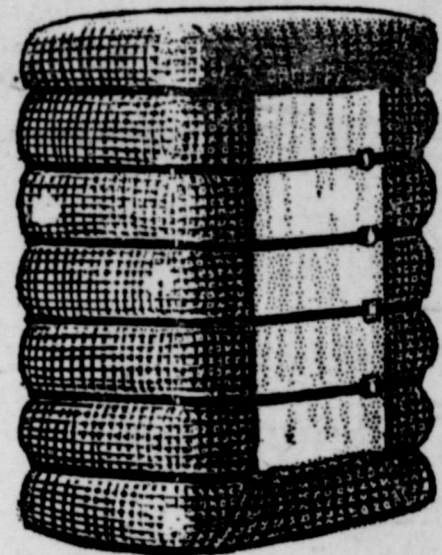
