Stock Show Here Next Wednesday

Coke County's annual Livestock Show will get underway next Wednesday, Jan. 26, at the FFA barn in Bronte. This is the first time the show has been held here in several years. It promises to be one of the best shows in recent years, members of the Coke County Livestock Association say. The association sponsors the annual show. A total of 142 entries have been received.

Judging of the various classes will start at 10 a. m. with breeding hogs, fat hogs and fat lambs being judged before lunch. After lunch, breeding sheep and steers will be judged.

Marion Badger, former county agent of Tom Green County, will judge all classes except breeding sheep. They will be judged by R. O. Sheffield of San Angelo.

"We hope to have one of the finest county breeding sheep shows in the state this year," County Agent Jack Waide said. "Entries have increased from eight last year to 28 this year. Quality of the entries will be excellent," he added.

Lunch will be served at noon by members of the Women's Home Demonstration Clubs of Coke County.

Members of the livestock association are asking for donations this week to take care of expenses of putting on the show, Waide said, and your help will be appreciated.

Trophies which will be awarded are on display in the window at The Enterprise office.

COKE WILL USE WOMEN JURORS

The campaign treasurer takes care of income and disbursements during the campaign, turning all records over to the Chapter treasurer.

Permanent officers of the Coke County Foundation for Infantile Paralysis include Dr. John R. Harris, County chairman, and Mrs. W. W. Millikin, County Chapter treasurer.

Events are also being planned on the west side of the county, under chairmanship of Fred McDonald, Jr. A dance and entertainment will take place at Silver on Feb. 5 and other programs will be announced.

Jan. 31 Deadline For Paying Taxes

Property owners have only about ten more days to pay their taxes without having a penalty attached. All state, county, school and city taxes become delinquent after Jan. 31.

It should also be remembered that Poll Taxes must be paid by the same date. If you want to vote in any elections this year, you must have a poll tax receipt and they can't be issued after Feb. 1.

Bronte Basketball Boys and Girls Going Toward Championship

Bronte's Longhorn eagers won consolation at the Eden Tournament last Friday and Saturday. Junction was the winner of the tourney by defeating Melvin in the finals.

The Longhorns opened the meet, losing to Eldorado by a score of 55-41. Kenneth Scott was high scorer for Bronte, hitting 14. Holcombe of Eldorado was the high scorer of the game by making 23 points. The Longhorns trailed 14-11 at the end of the first quarter, 22-15 at half time and 33-25 at the end of the third period.

Bronte then met Menard in the next round of play with the fans witnessing one of the most exciting games of the tournament. The Longhorns, led by K. Scott and B. James, led 19-13 at the end of the first period, and increased it to 11 points at the end of the half by a score of 32-21. By the end of the

third period, Menard had forced ahead 43-32. When the final whistle blew the score was knotted up at 56-56. The game then went into three minutes overtime. At the end of the overtime period, Bronte was on top 60-56. High scorers for Bronte were K. Scott with 20 and James with 12. Perry hit 17 for Menard.

Bronte then played Rochelle in the consolation semi-finals and came out on top by a large score of 73-41, with the Longhorns clearing the bench in the final period. Their lead was never threatened at anytime. High scores in this game were made by N. Scott, 16; K. Scott, 15; and A. Phillips with 14. Fowler hit 30 for Rochelle.

In the consolation finals, Bronte romped over Talpa by an overwhelming score of 73-55. The Longhorns only led 17-11 at the end of the first period, increasing it to

37-23 at the end of the half. The Longhorns came back in the second half to make their lead 56-31 at the end of the third quarter and at the final whistle, Bronte led 73-55, with the reserves finishing the game. K. Scott was high point man for Bronte with 17 points, followed by N. Scott with 16, and B. James with 14. High for Talpa was Summers with 28.

Bronte was also well represented on the All-Tournament Team. Making this team were Kenneth Scott and Noel Scott.

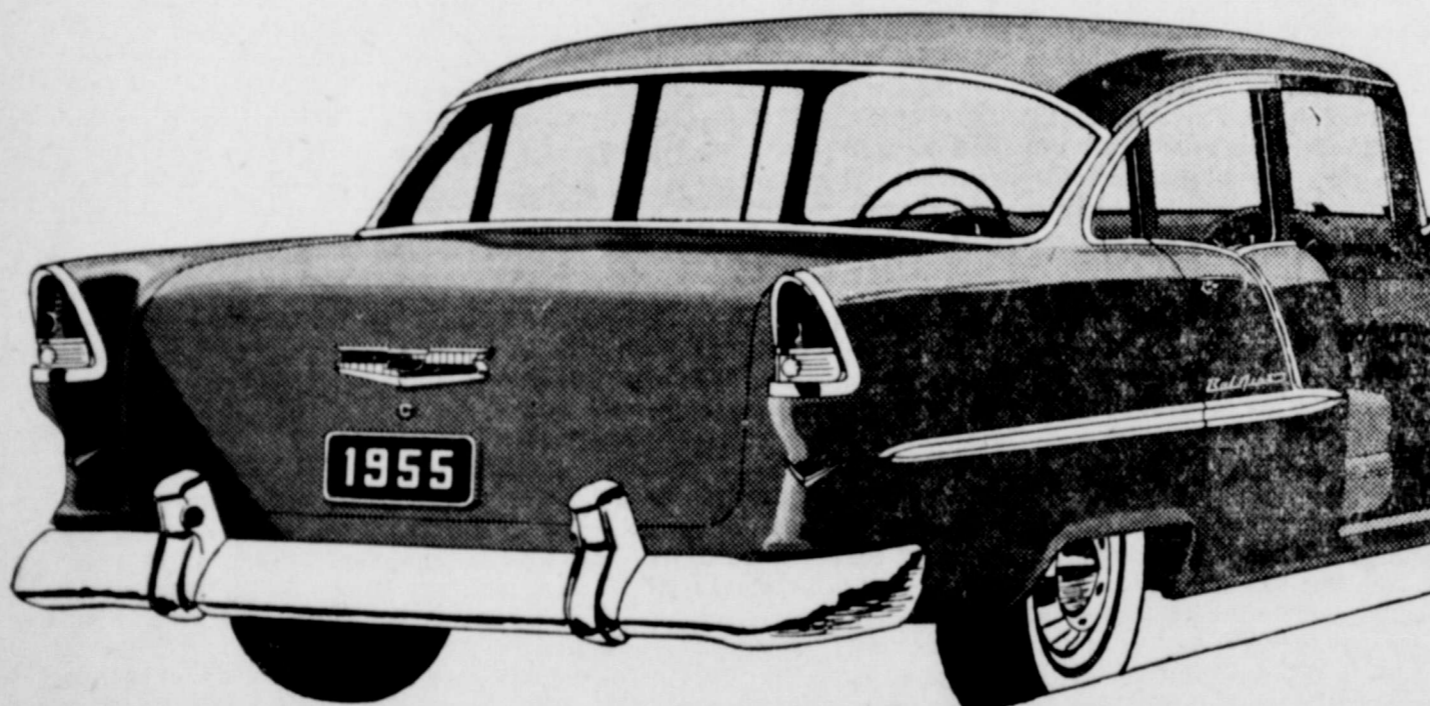

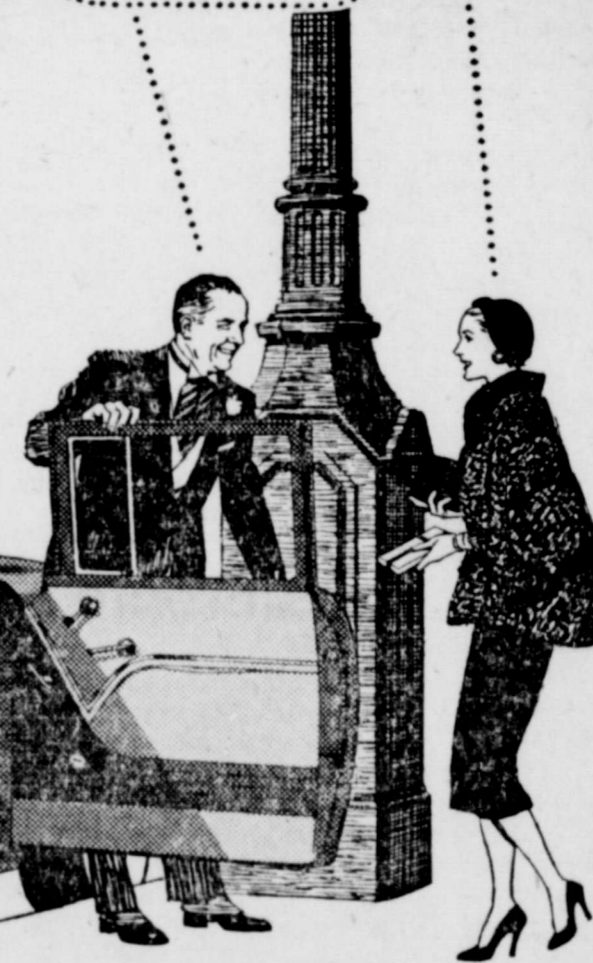

Labor Costs Up on Building School Houses in Bronte

Times have changed since 1922 when the present high school building was constructed.

R. E. Cumbie was cleaning out some old papers the other day and came across some pay roll records on the construction job on the old building. Most of the laborers were paid 25 cents per hour, carpenters drew 50 cents per hour and two men made the staggering sum of \$1.00 per hour for their work.

Mr. Cumbie said he thought the figures would be of particular interest since a new school building is now under construction.

J. F. Martin was in charge of the job in 1922 and he was one of the two who made \$1.00 an hour. The other highly paid man was T. Copeland. Mr. Cumbie said that Martin furnished all the necessary tools and was overseer as well as being a bricklayer.

Carpenters who made 50 cents per hour were O. J. Martin, Ray Martin, W. C. Hayley, Windsor Walton, Ed Walton, J. W. Davis John Hearne and W. C. Walton.

A couple of men, W. J. Gideon and E. H. Mosely, made 40 cents per hour.

The list of those who made 25 cents per hour included: George Thomas, Filey Adams, Bill Johnson, Alfred Bennett, A. T. Ott, J. W. Nelson, O. S. Kiker, Lois Taylor, Paul Cates, Roe Williams, Andrew Nelson, Leland Hayley Davis Hayley, Loyd McCleskey, Homer Walton, W. A. Schane, Theo-

Davis, Bill Thomas and Thad Lowry.

Mr. Cumbie was president of the school board when the building was constructed in 1922 and Dr. J. D. Leonard was secretary.

He reported that quite a few difficulties had to be overcome before the job could be done. In the first place, he said, the school district was able to vote only \$21,500 in bonds to finance the project. The lowest bid they were able to get for the construction was slightly above \$30,000, so they were out of luck on that score.

After some discussion, it was decided to go ahead with the building without a contractor — and to buy the materials and hire the labor. Mr. Cumbie said that when the building was finished they didn't have enough money left to buy screens nor to insure the new structure. Kind hearted citizens of the school district made up enough money to take care of these two expenses, Mr. Cumbie added.

An order from the Bronte PTA was also among the papers which Mr. Cumbie found. It was for \$195.17 worth of equipment for the school. The order was signed by Mrs. C. R. Gollihar as president of the PTA and by Mrs. R. E. Cumbie as secretary.

Mr. Cumbie said that the PTA used to furnish practically all material for extra-curricular activities as well as some of the materials used in classroom study.

Caramel Nut Pie

For Two Pies: brown 1 cup of sugar in a heavy skillet. When the sugar has melted and browned, add 1 cup of water and cook to a thick syrup.

Mix one cup of sugar, 2 tablespoons of flour, 4 egg yolks and 2 cups of milk together. Add to the syrup this mixture and cook until thick. Add 1 teaspoon of vanilla and 1 cup of chopped pecans.

Divide this mixture in two baked pie crusts and cover with meringue and brown.

Funeral services have been set for 2 p. m. Friday from Emmanuel Episcopal Church in San Angelo.

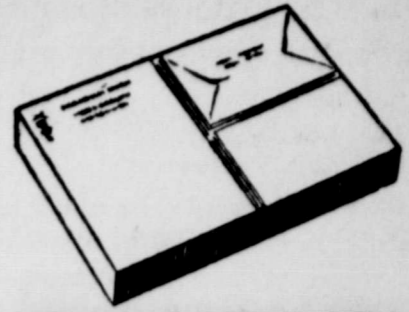
Mrs. Weaver, always referred to as "Helen" by her friends, was a daughter of the late Ralph Harris.

The family were early ranchers in West Texas and owned a big spread south of Robert Lee. Fifteen years ago they acquired the former Saul Ranch above Robert Lee. One suspect in particular is being pointed to.

Helen ran cattle for many years and took a personal hand in looking after them.

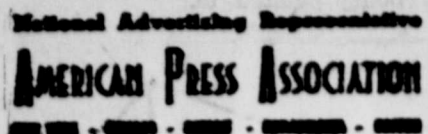

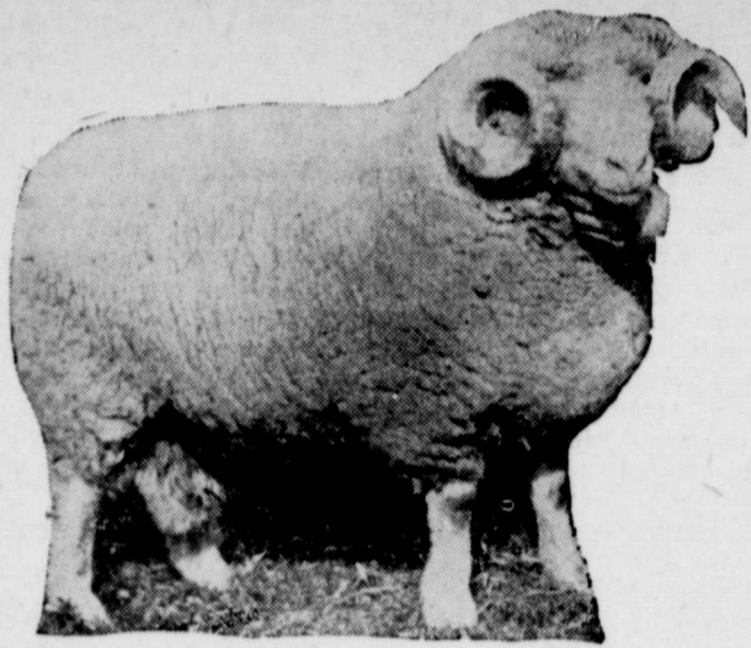
