Young Midland Man Dies from Injuries Received in Accident

Oil News

Horace C. Hargrave has filed application to drill a 5,700-foot cable tool wildcat in Coke County, 3/4 miles southeast of the Bronte field and two miles south of Bronte. The prospector will be drilled as the No. 1 J. B. McCutchen.

Location, on a 454-acre lease, is 7,400 feet from the northeast and 330 feet from the southeast lines of 329-N. Eastland, Abstract 135.

No. 1 J. B. McCutchen is one mile south of Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Georgia McCutchen, wildcat plugged and abandoned in 1953 at 5,907 feet.

The Hanley Co. of Midland will drill a 6,800-foot Cambrian wildcat in southeast Coke County, 5 1/2 miles south of Bronte. It will be drilled as the No. 1 Taylor et al. Ground elevation is 1,848 feet.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 from the west lines of 2-B. A. Taylor survey.

The prospector is seven miles northeast of the same operators No. 1 Greene, active Cambrian test now drilling below 6,390 feet. Previously the No. 1 Greene indicated production from the Pennsylvanian lime with recovery of oil and gas, no water, on a drill-stem test between 4,825-50 feet.

The nearest Cambrian production is six miles to the north in the Bronte multipay field. Cambrian production is from between 5,313-333 feet.

Warren Petroleum Corp. and Humble Oil Co. No. 2 Charles Copeland, wildcat in 306-Joel Holliman, three miles southeast of Blackwell was plugged and abandoned at 6,056 feet.

A check with County Judge Jeff Dean's office Wednesday revealed that no candidates have actually filed for the offices but it is presumed that the two names proposed by the local school board will be filed before the deadline. The names proposed were T. F. Sims, Jr. and Jacob Bruce Morrow.

The terms of Dr. John R. Harris and board president Jesse Parker are expiring and neither is seeking re-election.

Everyone is reminded that anyone may run for trustee by seeing the county judge at least ten days before the election, or a name may be placed on the ballot with a written request signed by five qualified voters.

Motor vehicle owners are advised that the deadline for buying 1955 license plates is April 1.

Up to Wednesday only 433 passenger car tags had been issued from the office of Sheriff Paul Good. It is estimated there are between 1,200 and 1,300 cars owned in Coke County.

Polio Shots For All Coke Pupils In Grades 1 and 2

Full cooperation with health officials in planning for possible polio vaccinations in Coke County elementary schools was pledged last week by Jeff Dean, county superintendent of schools, following a meeting with doctors and school officials.

"If the Salk polio vaccine is found effective and is licensed, we will be prepared immediately to start vaccinating all children in the first and second grades of every public school in Coke County," said Judge Dean.

The vaccine will be furnished to Health Departments by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis without cost for the product. It will be part of a \$9,000,000 supply purchased with March of Dimes funds.

Judge Dean said meetings will be held shortly with principals and teachers concerned, to discuss with them details of the program. All plans must be finished in advance of the possible starting date for vaccinations.

Meetings for parents in elementary schools also will be held to explain the program. No eligible children will receive the vaccine unless their parents first sign a form requesting it. These forms will be distributed through the schools on a date to be announced later.

It is necessary to get the program lined up as soon as possible. There will be three vaccinations and the first should be given early in April. With two week intervals it will be possible to complete the series by mid-May.

Dr. J. D. McDaniel of Robert Lee will be in charge of vaccinations for Robert Lee and Silver children, and Dr. John R. Harris will direct the vaccinations at Bronte.

More information on these vaccinations will follow in this newspaper.

Beat the egg whites and add 8 tablespoons of sugar to them. Fold about half of them into the cooked mixture. Pour in baked pie shell and place remaining egg whites on top. Brown in a moderate oven.

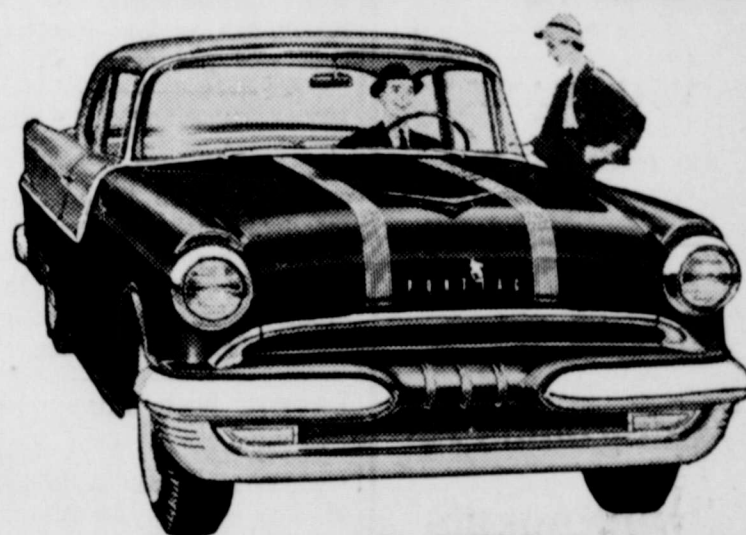
