Will Build Fertilizer Plant

Announcement was made here Wednesday by officials of The Western Ammonia Corporation of Midland that their company plans to construct a \$3,500,000 Anhydrous Ammonia manufacturing plant near Dimmitt. The plant will have a 60 ton per day capacity.

Construction of the plant will start in the near future, and the facility is scheduled to be in operation in May, 1964. It is estimated that a crew of 150 men will

be required to construct the plant, and that a full-time crew of thirty employees will be required in its operation.

This plant will use Permian Basin Natural Gas as a feed stock for the ammonia fertilizer which will be marketed in the Texas Panhandle. Gas for the operation will be obtained from the Pioneer Natural Gas Company trunk pipeline adjacent to the plant site. Anhydrous Ammonia is the most concentrat-

ed nitrogen fertilizer.

Officers of the recently formed corporation are: George H. Landreth, President; Roy E. Campbell, Executive Vice President; Robert M. Leibrock, Vice President and Secretary and F. H. Callaway, Treasurer and Assistant Secretary. All are of Midland and the corporation headquarters will be in Midland.

The plant manager and the plant headquarters will be in Dimmitt.

Pickle Companies to Contract Acreage Here

ATTENTION! Castro County farmers or anyone interested in growing pickles. There will be a meeting Friday, 8 a.m. in the Community Room of the First State Bank with representatives from Mrs. Dalton's Best Maid Products, Inc.

According to a letter received by Edd McElroy, vice-president and agricultural representative of the First State Bank, the Best Maid Co. is interested in signing contracts for eight-thirty acre pickle fields. This means approximately 240 acres are needed by this particular company.

The company will explain their contracts which include a guaranteed price for various grades of pickles. Other points to be covered will be production practices, amount of labor required and expected income.

According to McElroy, some farmers in the Hale Center and

Olton area have been netting approximately \$200 an acre on pickles.

If enough interest is generated in production of cucumbers or pickles, Western Canning Company of La Junta, Colorado has indicated an interest in contracting approximately 400 acres of cucumbers in the Dimmitt-Hereford area.

National FFA Week Observed By Dimmitt FFA

Future Farmers of America chose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. The Dimmitt FFA chapter is recognizing this week.

In the Dimmitt chapter, 53 members take an active part in FFA. Jim Dowty, vocational agriculture instructor in Dimmitt High School, serves as advisor of the FFA chapter.

Officers are Kent Gabel, president; Glenn Boozer, Vice-President; Jimmie Dieuffa, secretary; Dennis Cleaver, treasurer; Jerry Morris, reporter; and Wayne McClenney, sentinel.

This year 65 boys in Dimmitt High School completed 106 projects with a labor income of \$15,100.94. A large number of these boys were in FFA.

Products include 43,436 lb. of cotton lint, 265,630 lb. of grain sorghum, 5,444 bushels of wheat, 660 lb. of mutton, 30,415 lbs of pork, and 46-655 lbs of beef.

The boys also completed 75 improvement projects on home farms. These improvements concerned constructing machinery, buildings, terraces and planting pastures.

Also, the boys concluded 479 supplementary farm jobs which include such items as repair jobs. Membership in the FFA is made up of farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed primarily to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishments in farming or other agriculture occupations.

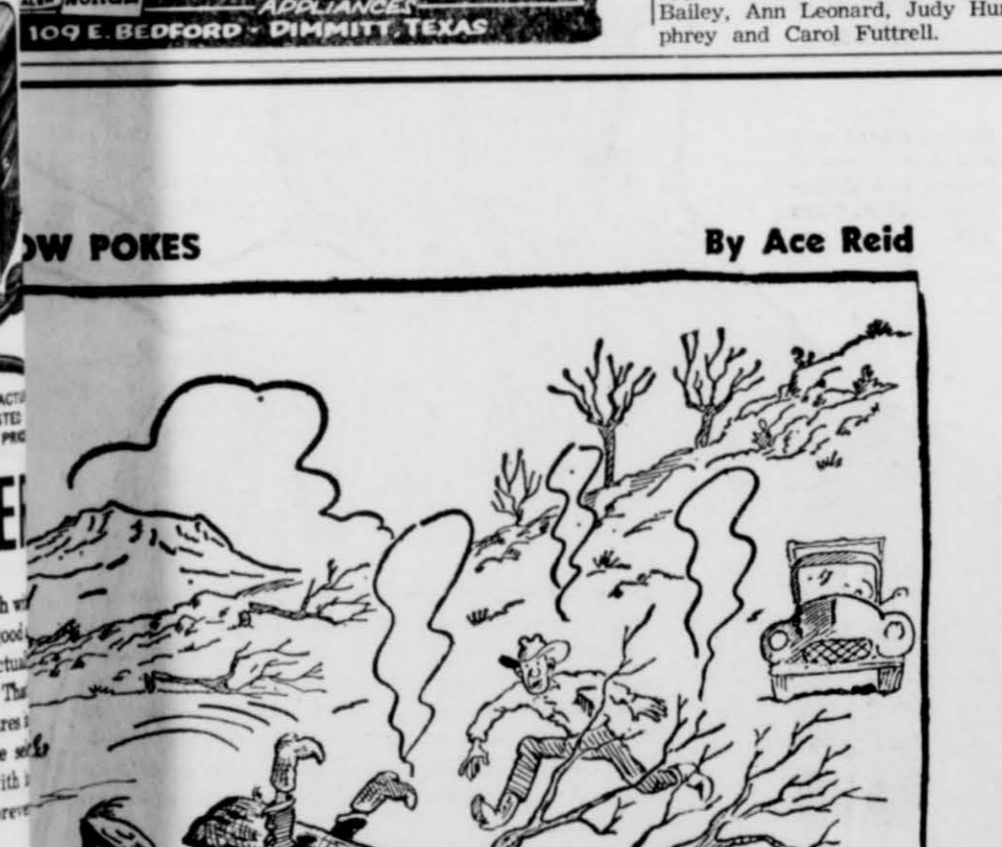

Foreign Exchange Students Visit Dimmitt

Dimmitt High School was privileged to have five exchange students visit last Friday, February 9th. The group was assembled together in a panel discussion. The students came from various parts of the world. They were: Nasim Rahman from Pakistan, Tullia, Mela Hernandez of the Philippines, Canoy, Evelyn Burrowsweber from Switzerland, Priona; Heather Gordon from Johannesburg, South Africa, Hereford; Frank Hargret from Germany, Hereford.

Journalism in Radio and Television

A new kind of journalist, the radio news commentator, or news-caster, appeared during the 1930's. These are men and women whose job it is to sift the day's news or the most important items, and broadcast them in interesting fashion. The news commentator may be employed by a local station, or he may broadcast to the nation over one of the radio or television channels. The large networks have radio news rooms in which editors prepare the wire from the various press associations. Some radio networks also send correspondents to foreign countries, from which they broadcast by shortwave.

The television news-caster has the advantage of showing newsreel films, as well as photographs, maps and charts as he reports the news. Live men are on the spot, telecasts of news often require a minimum of interpretation by an announcer or commentator.

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The Gridiron

Many people speak of the football field as the "gridiron" and do not actually know why they are calling it that.

A gridiron is a grated utensil used in the cooking system of the five yard lines.

To put a person on the gridiron is to put him into an uncomfortable position, figuratively, to place him over a fire.

The "Gridiron Club," composed of football players and newspaper correspondents, adopted the name because at its dinners it caricatures and satirizes prominent public persons who are present.

"Grid" is merely a shortened form of gridiron, which etymologically (analysis of the word) has nothing to do with iron, being a corruption of a Greek variant of "grid," the source of gridle.

Nazareth Students Awarded Essays

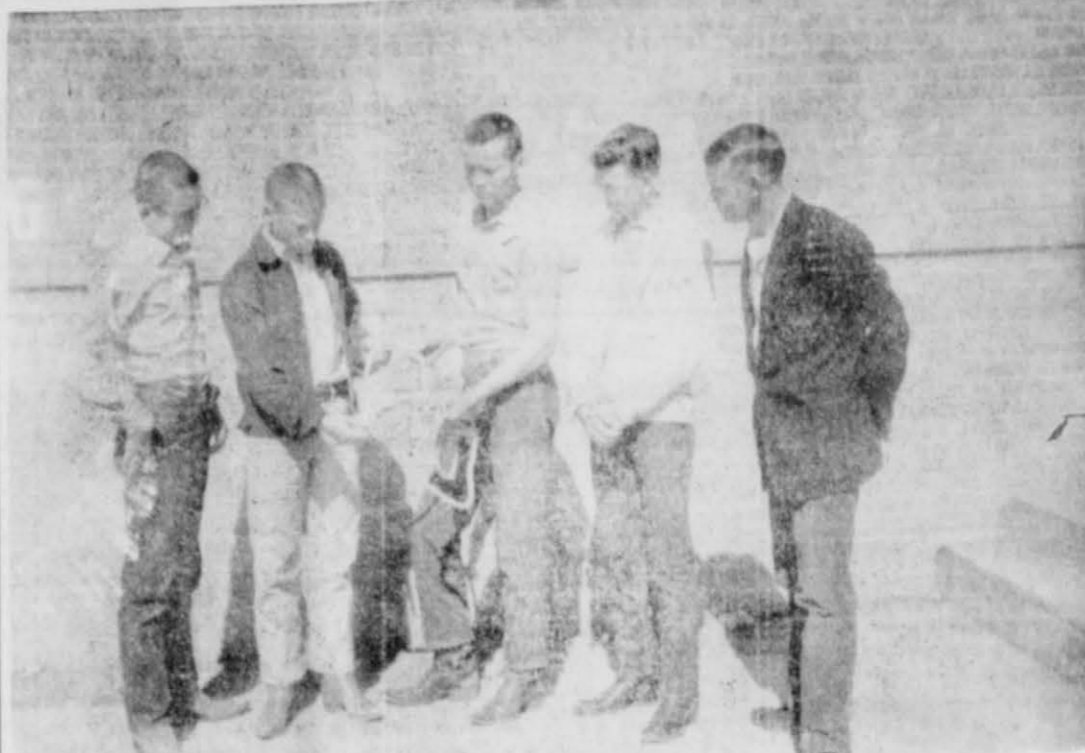

County Farmers May Obtain FCIC

Castro county farmers who haven't already done so are eligible now to apply for insurance-protection on their 1963 cotton and grain sorghums, according to Joe L. Matthews, district director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., an agency of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. Matthews said FCIC representatives are visiting farms in the county now and will continue for several weeks, and that information also is available from the district office in Room 110, 1219 13th street, Lubbock. "Cotton coverages are higher, and the program generally is improved over any before," Matthews said. "Already more than 200 farmers in this county carry FCIC protection on either their cotton or grain sorghums or both, and recently they have been paid or are being paid more than \$5,000 in loss-payments for 1962 crop-damage. "Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance is a non-profit government program to help farmers protect the approximate amount of their crop-production cost against disastrous loss from any cause such as wind, hail, excessive moisture, insects, heat, freeze and many others," Matthews explained. "No such insurance is available elsewhere. It protects all during the growing period. "With today's normal profits down to about 20 per cent, a farmer's high investment (the other 80 per cent) is vitally important, and more and more farmers are turning to Federal Crop Insurance to protect this big investment dollar. "Crop insurance offers the farmer peace of mind in knowing it will return his approximate investment if the crop doesn't."
