Council and Phone Company Reach Agreement on Rates; Dial to Be Installed in 2 Years

An agreement was finally reached Monday night between the Bronte city council and the General Telephone Co. Both the city and the phone company made some concessions in arriving at the compromise rate.

General agreed to install a dial telephone system in Bronte and have it in operation within two years, by March 31, 1957.

The new rates are approximately half of what the phone company asked for when negotiations started several months ago.

The new rates will go into effect on the next billing date of the phone company.

PAVING WORK LOOKING GOOD

Bronte residents are getting an idea this week of what the town is going to look like with paved streets.

Sealcoating began being poured on some streets last Friday. Nearly all have had some preliminary work done and many are piled high with caliche. Some curbing has been done, adding very much to the attractiveness of the work.

No form of grumbling has been heard from the residents as everyone is eager for the time when all loose dirt will be fastened under the paving.

Blowing dust has always annoyed Bronte housewives.

There will be at least 111 block paved and possibly as many as 125 before the project is completed. Almost every house in town will have paving on one side at least.

New Subjects To Be Given At School

Several new courses will be added to the high school curriculum next year. Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger announced this week. They will be Physics, Chemistry, HE IV, Agriculture IV and Driver Education. Wolfenbarger also said that a spring registration will be taken within the next two or three weeks in order to determine how many students will enroll in each class. He urged parents to look over the list of subjects which will be offered next year and advise their children concerning the subjects they will take. He also said that some subjects will be dropped if they don't have enough students.

Courses which will be offered next year, according to classes are:

Freshman — English I, Gen. Math, Gen. Science, Typing I, HE Business, Agriculture I.

Sophomore — English II, Algebra I, Biology, Typing I, HE II, Agriculture II, World History, Driver Education.

Junior — English III, American History, HE III, Agriculture III, Physics, Chemistry, Shorthand, Algebra II, Plane Geometry, Typing I.

Senior — English IV, Civics, HE IV, Agriculture IV, Physics, Chemistry, Shorthand, Typing II, Algebra II.

CIRCUS TO BE HERE SUNDAY

The Tex Carson Circus will show in Bronte next Sunday, April 24, with only one appearance at 2 p. m.

The pasture near town owned by Dr. J. D. Leonard will be the site for the show.

Children of all ages will be looking forward to the different acts which include a Mother Goose section with appropriate music to give it the proper setting. There will be nursery characters such as Bo Peep, Jack Horner, Mary Quite Contrary, Jack and Jill and many others.

There will also be troupes of riders, trapeze performers, aerialists, clowns, wire walkers, horses in addition to the other animals.

Among the circus animals are trained dogs and ponies, Baby Jumbo, the comical performing elephant and others.

Polio Shots to Be Given Here Monday

Bronte school children in the first and second grades will receive the first shots of the Salk polio vaccine next Monday, if requested by their parents. The children received blanks Tuesday which parents must sign before their child will receive the shots.

Revival Beginning At First Baptist

Sunday will mark the opening revival service at First Baptist Church, though the Revival preacher, Dr. W. Myrddin Lewis, will not arrive until Monday by plane from Galveston. The youth of the church, led by Johnny Smith as Youth Week pastor, will conduct services Sunday.

The emphasis by the young people will be "Evangelism." They will occupy all offices of the Sunday School beginning at 10 a. m. and the morning service at 11 o'clock, with the exception of the morning message which Maynard R. Rogers, Pastor, will deliver.

The youth will also occupy all offices of the Training Union at 7 p. m. and the evening evangelistic service at 8:00 p. m. This is the third year for the "Youth Week" emphasis in the local church organization.

Revival service on Monday, April 25th, 8:00 p. m. will be the first in a 12 day campaign. Pastor Rogers said this week, "Dr. Lewis is one of the outstanding preachers of our generation. It is a privilege to welcome him to this section of Texas and to First Baptist Church. Services will be conducted daily at 10 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. with prayer services at 7:30 p. m. Song leader will be Otis Allen, from Norton, a layman who is the Rannels Baptist Association Brotherhood song leader, active in various services of his church and denomination. The public is cordially invited to attend our Revival and to bring friends."

According to information received this week, Dr. Lewis of Birmingham, England has resigned a pastorate at Ward End Baptist church of Birmingham in order to answer growing demands for evangelistic and Bible conference ministries. He pastored the church 14 years.

Dr. Lewis has appeared at the Winona Lake Bible Conference, the American Keswick Conference, and the Conference in Ocean Park, New Jersey. His ministry has also extended to churches of the British Isles, Canada and the United States. This year he will return to England in time for the Baptist World Alliance in London.

MEETING AT ROBERT LEE

A public school meeting will be held at Robert Lee high school Thursday night, April 28, to which all school patrons of this county are invited.

Local citizens will meet with the representatives of the Texas Research League in Austin and Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger has asked that all school officials, board members and school patrons attend.

The group will study the findings of the League and will discuss the future of Coke County schools including consolidations.

They will be taken to the Harris clinic at 2:30 to receive the vaccine. These shots will be free, as a part of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis program.

Second shots to this group will follow in two weeks. Dr. John Harris said Wednesday that there is still some question about when the third shot will be given, but it will be approximately five months from now.

Dr. Harris also said that there should be a small amount of the vaccine here by Monday for use by the general public. Since there will not be enough for everyone preference will be given to children between the ages of 3 and 10 and to expectant mothers.

Price for the shots for anyone, other than first and second grade students, will be \$2.00 per shot of \$6.00 for the series of three.

Persons who are unable to pay for the shots may receive them free and the expense will be borne locally by Dr. Harris.

WHEREAS, the General Telephone Company of the Southwest has presented information indicating that present revenues at Bronte are not adequate, and information indicating that present revenues at Bronte are not adequate, and

WHEREAS, application has been made for relief from this condition by an adjustment of its rates for local service, and

WHEREAS, under the conditions, said proposed schedule of rates appears to the City Council as reasonable and just, and necessary to insure continued expansion and improvement of telephone service to the citizens of Bronte, and

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the right of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest to earn a fair return on the fair value of its property devoted to the rendition of telephone service within the city of Bronte, and

WHEREAS, General Telephone Company of the Southwest has undertaken to establish dial telephone service in the Bronte, Texas, exchange on or before March 31, 1957.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

Section 1: That the General Telephone Company of the Southwest is hereby authorized to place into effect on its first billing date following the passage of this Ordinance, the following schedule of rates for the present service and such other charges and rates for Miscellaneous Services as are included in its Texas General Exchange Tariff, a summary of which is attached:

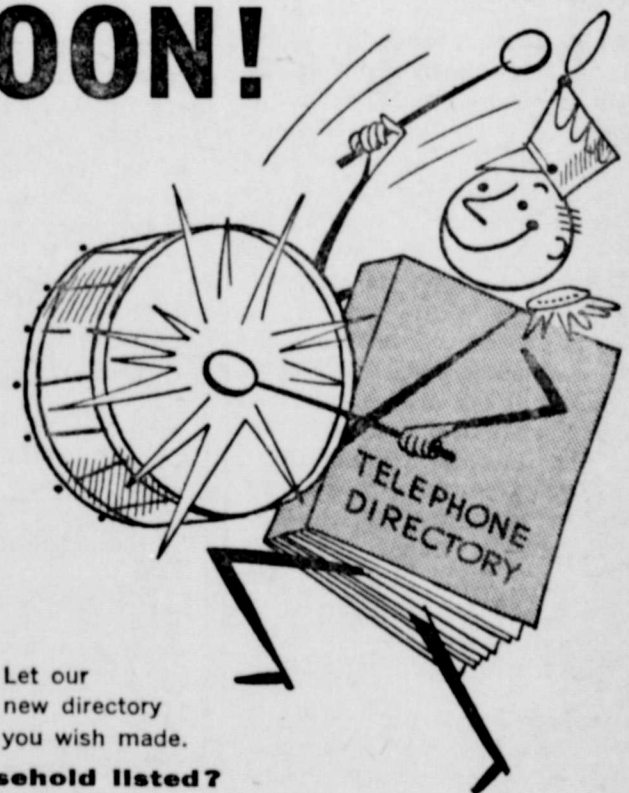

ONE MAY BE YOUR OWN

The ACS is underwriting a three point, nation-wide program to present cancer facts to physicians and public; to give needed service to patients; and to give financial support to cancer research — the long range solution for this menace.

To make certain that that life-saving program will continue without interruption, you owe it to yourself to contribute generously to the cancer-control fund-raising campaign here which runs through cut April. It will pay dividends in lives saved, and one of them may be your own.
