He said that they dug down under some of the pits and the soil was wet from 8 to 16 inches deep, where on the level ground there was very little penetration. He said the pits are cut several inches deep and about four feet apart. In comparison the soil in between the pits was wet only a half to an inch deep.

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## FACING UP **TO CANCER**

Let's talk about cancer. That thousands look upon that disease as a kind of disgrace or immediately regard the diagnosis of cancer as a death sentence is evident in everyday life. But the problem of cancer is not hopeless. Many people are being cured. Science is learning more and more about diagnosis and treatment.

Fear, neglect, vanity and ignorance are the worst enemies of cancer control. The fearful person says, "I dont' want to go to a doctor because he might find something wrong with me." The self-assured person says, "Sure cancer strikes one in four - but I know it won't hit me or my family." Both are held back from protecting themselves and their families by appalling misconceptions about the origin and nature of the disease.

It is true that last year approximately 230,000 Americans died of cancer, BUT - it is estimated that one of every three cancer deaths could have been prevented if the case has been detected in time and promptly and properly treated.

This gulf between cures possible And cures accomplished is the heart of the American Cancer Society's educational program. The Society estimates that a thirtyminute examination of six major cancer sites - skin, mouth, lungs, and rectum, would save 40,000 judges. men, women and children each








# **Ornery Sandstorms Given** Moniker by Midland Paper

Midland's sandstorms of 1955 are going to have a personality. No more will they sneak into the city, pester the life out of its good people and then drift away.

And without even a proper introduction.

The Reporter-Telegram announced plans early this year for giving each honest-to-goodness, dved-inthe-wool sandstorm a bona fide name.

Just like they do the hurricanes which roar out of the Atlantic parents, the Charlie Keeneys, and Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico.

"A sandstorm has just as much personality as a hurricane any day," said Editor Bill Collyns "and I think it is high time we recognized it."

"Some ornery sandstorms sneak into town before you know it.

"Others boastfully announce their arrival and come sweeping into town right on schedule.

"Others build themselves up on the horizon, glare down menacingly on our citizens and then playfully dance away in another direction about the time you get all your windows closed down tight.

"Anybody out here knows a sand storm has personality and this year we're going to do something about it."

Collyns announced the appointment of a three-member Sandstorm Advisory Board, which will be the final authority on anything pertaining to the familiar old weather caper.

First appointed was Mrs. Barbara Culver, Midland attorney and a member of the state board of the American Association of University Women. Mrs. Culver accepted saying "And I'm going to insist, right at the beginning, that all the sandstorms be given men's names."

"I think the Weather Bureau did us a pretty dirty trick by giving womens' rames to all their nasty old hurricanes. Maybe this will even things up."

Second member is W. M. Perry, chief meteorologist in charge of the U.S. Weather Bureau station at Midland Air Terminal and a gentleman of the old school.

"I think it will be a fine idea to give men's names to sandstorms. Maybe it will help get the women off our necks about this hurricane thing.'

The third member of the board will be Delbert Downing, manager of the Chamber of Commerce. "I am happy to see some recognition given to our sandstorms,' he said, "because we have the finest sandstorms in the world."







#### INGREDIENTS:

1 cup uncooked white rice cups water teaspoon salt tablespoons butter or margarine cup chopped onion cup fine dry bread crumbs egg teaspoon salt teaspoon poultry seasoning cup chopped celery Dash of black pepper

1/4 cup water or turkey broth

METHOD: Spread rice in a shallow pan and place in a 400° F. oven. When the grains turn slightly yellow, stir well. Con-tinue to toast, stirring occasionally, until rice grains are a light

golden color. This takes 15 to 20 minutes. Put the toasted rice in a saucepan. Add the water and salt. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove from heat, but leave lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg. salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate. This stuffing, however, may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquids are not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan or made into balls. The recipe makes about 6 cups of stuffing.

Allow 3/4 cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound readyto-cook weight.



Secretary of State A. M. Muldrow has announced that all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1. 1955 and June 10, 1955. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon. Any person who has not here-

tofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions. Secretary of State Muldrow said,

'Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

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
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


