## AD-LIB-BEN

Dust storms during recent weeks brings to mind the need for more and better soil conservation throughout this drouth stricken area. Was talking with L. L. Wilkins the other day. He works with the Coke County Soil Conservation district and he said he had come to the conclusion that "pitting" was one of the most effective for range use in this area. After the shower Friday night he and D. K. Glenn went out to the Glenn place where this practice had been put into use. He said that they dug down under some of the pits and the soil was wet from 8 to 16 inches deep, where on the level ground there was very little penetration. He said the pits are cut several inches deep and about four feet apart. In comparison the soil in between the pits was wet only a half to an inch deep.

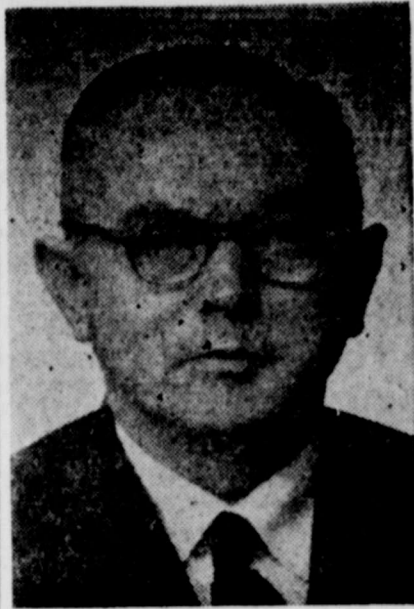

## Wool Preparation Stressed at Field Day

Approximately 80 ranchers and members of local shearing crews attended the wool preparation field day held at Robert Lee Thursday, April 21.

The field day was planned by a committee of local ranchers who have been working with the county agent in an effort to plan a program which will enable Coke County ranchers to make more money out of their sheep.

The field day held Thursday stressed the importance of preparation of wool for marketing and as such represents only one phase of the program now in the planning stages. The planning committee consists of the following men:

Jim Gray, sheep and goat specialist with the Texas Extension Service, was the main speaker. He stressed the importance of keeping the wool clean which can be done by wetting down the shearing pen, keeping the shearing boards swept clean and protecting the bags from the dirt after they have been packed. The flat packed bag was re-

commended over the round backed bag because when the seam on the bag is opened, much more of the wool in the bag is immediately visible to the buyer and it has a more desirable appearance. The flat bag can be obtained by tromping only the seams and by placing two fleeces in the bag at a time on the seams.

Proper shearing was discussed at length. No one can do much with a fleece that was not sheared properly. The fleece should come off of the sheep in one piece and as free from double cuts as possible. Le Drew Arrott gave a shearing demonstration and numbers of local shearing crews sheared several sheep.

Gerald Allen of Robert Lee and C. E. Arrott of Bronte furnished 38 head of sheep for the demonstration. The sheep were divided into 4 groups before shearing and ranchers were asked to guess the total fleece weight of each group. David Key furnished prizes for the winners. The object was not especially to how accurate the estimates would be, but only if ranchers could determine the highest shearing groups accurately.

James Arrott had closest estimates on two groups and St. George Tucker and Floyd Fancher won on the other two groups. Prizes for those who did not pick them up at the field day are available at Key Feed Store.

### Weather Remains Hot, Dry & Dusty

Little change in weather conditions has occurred here the past week. In general, the air has stayed dry and dusty. Thunder-showers last Friday night brought as much as 1/2-inch precipitation here in town with more reported in the Marie and Maverick vicinities. Little good resulted from the moisture since high winds and dust blew all weekend and part of the week.

A cool front Thursday morning brought some relief from the unseasonable heat, which combined with the dust, made everyone uncomfortable.

The need for rain grows more urgent everyday and ranchmen say that pastures are in much worse condition than a month ago.

Seventy-one first and second graders from Bronte were given the first injection of the new polio vaccine last Monday afternoon. Second shots will be given to the group on Monday, May 9, at the same hour.

Third and final shots of the vaccine will be administered in several months.

Dr. John R. Harris said this week that vaccine for the general public will not be available here before May 15 and that there is no certainty it will be available on that date.

Thirty-seven first and second graders from Silver and seventy from Robert Lee were inoculated there last week.

## General Changes Blackwell Phones To Dial System

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Wednesday morning, April 20, converted its exchange at Blackwell from magneto to "unattended" dial operation.

As an "unattended" dial exchange, there are no operators at all in Blackwell any more. Sweetwater operators now answer Blackwell subscribers' telephones when subscribers dial "01" and the Sweetwater operators handle long distance, information and repair service calls, Ted Maxwell, district manager for the Company explained.

The Bronte business office has become the business office for Blackwell as a result of the cut-over. For business matters, Blackwell subscribers now dial "01" and ask for Enterprise 1047, which connects them, without a toll charge, to the Bronte business office, Merwell continued.

Cost of the conversion of Blackwell to dial has been estimated at \$23,000. There are 128 telephones in Blackwell.

Retiring, concurrent with the conversion, after 40 years of saying "Number please" was Mrs. Velma O. Evans, chief operator-cashier at Blackwell. Miss Bertha Smith, an operator in Blackwell with 28 years continuous service, also retired at the same time Blackwell switched to dial.

# Ornery Sandstorms Given Moniker by Midland Paper

Midland's sandstorms of 1955 are going to have a personality. No more will they sneak into the city, pester the life out of its good people and then drift away.

And without even a proper introduction.

The Reporter-Telegram announced plans early this year for giving each honest-to-goodness, dyed-in-the-wool sandstorm a bona fide name.

Just like they do the hurricanes which roar out of the Atlantic Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico.

"A sandstorm has just as much personality as a hurricane any day," said Editor Bill Collins "and I think it is high time we recognized it."

"Some ornery sandstorms sneak into town before you know it.

"Others boastfully announce their arrival and come sweeping into town right on schedule.

"Others build themselves up on the horizon, glare down menacingly on our citizens and then playfully dance away in another direction about the time you get all your windows closed down tight.

"Anybody out here knows a sand storm has personality and this year we're going to do something about it."

Collins announced the appointment of a three-member Sandstorm Advisory Board, which will be the final authority on anything pertaining to the familiar old weather caper.

First appointed was Mrs. Barbara Culver, Midland attorney and a member of the state board of the American Association of University Women. Mrs. Culver accepted saying "And I'm going to insist, right at the beginning, that all the sandstorms be given men's names."

"I think the Weather Bureau did us a pretty dirty trick by giving womens' names to all their nasty old hurricanes. Maybe this will even things up."

Second member is W. M. Perry, chief meteorologist in charge of the U. S. Weather Bureau station at Midland Air Terminal and a gentleman of the old school.

"I think it will be a fine idea to give men's names to sandstorms. Maybe it will help get the women off our necks about this hurricane thing."

The third member of the board will be Delbert Downing, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

"I am happy to see some recognition given to our sandstorms," he said, "because we have the finest sandstorms in the world."

Members of the Sandstorm Advisory Board asked the help of Midland citizens in selecting names for the various sandstorms. Persons were asked to mail their suggestion to the Reporter-Telegram along with reasons for the suggestion.

"Such suggestions will help us greatly in making up our list and in giving the proper personality to our sandstorms."

Late in January Sandstorm Adam christened the '55 season, the first sandstorm in history to bear it's own pet name.

And late in March sandstorm Benson rolled into the Midland area. "The government probably will get the blame for it anyway," said a board spokesman, "so we might as well name it after the Secretary of Agriculture, Ezra T. Benson."

In order to be a bona fide Texas sandstorm and receive a name, the dust must cut visibility to less than three miles.

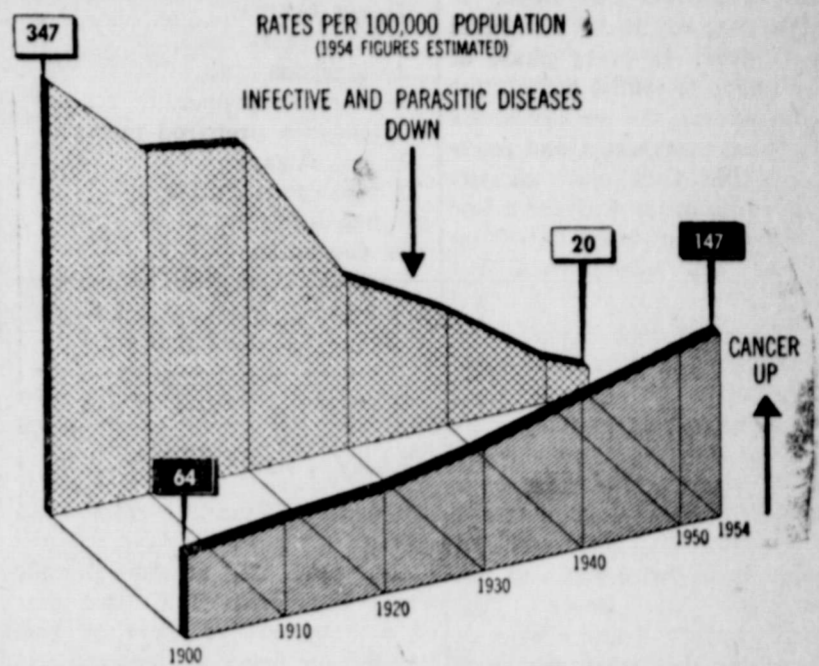

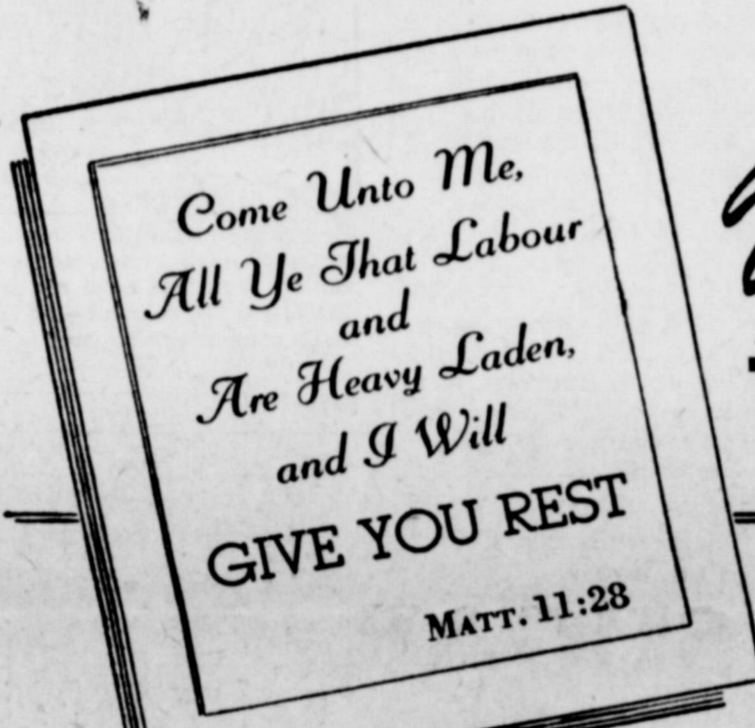

I could write a book this week on our weather. But I know that all the ugly things we say and think does nothing to remedy the situation. I was downright envious the other day when I got a letter from my mother and she told of this 2 inch rain that they had, said all the stock tanks were full and the creeks bank full. Doesn't that sound wonderful? I guess we can dream of the day when we have something like that.

We here at the Enterprise got a letter from McAfee Daniels the other and he sailed for the US last Saturday. He told how much he enjoyed the paper during his stay in Germany. He has really let my recipes cover a lot of territory as he said he cut them all out and sent them to his mother in Frost, Texas. I thought that was so very nice of him.

I am going to run an old recipe of mine that I have in a church cookbook that was put out in 1937. I was asked to run it and hope you will enjoy it. It is very simple but makes an appetizing as well as healthy salad. It is called Hot Cabbage Slaw.

This is for one head of cabbage but for my family, I half the re-

cipe for the sauce.

### Hot Cabbage Slaw

1 head of cabbage shredded with 1 medium onion. The onion may be omitted.

Sauce:

1 egg beaten  
1 tablespoon flour,  
1 teaspoon salt,  
1 teaspoon pepper,  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
½ cup sugar  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 cup vinegar  
½ cup water

Cook this until thick and just before serving, pour the hot mixture over the shredded cabbage.

#### INGREDIENTS:

1 cup uncooked white rice  
2 cups water  
1 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
½ cup chopped onion  
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon poultry seasoning  
1 cup chopped celery  
Dash of black pepper  
¼ cup water or turkey broth

**METHOD:** Spread rice in a shallow pan and place in a 400° F. oven. When the grains turn slightly yellow, stir well. Continue to toast, stirring occasionally, until rice grains are a light

golden color. This takes 15 to 20 minutes. Put the toasted rice in a saucepan. Add the water and salt. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove from heat, but leave lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate. This stuffing, however, may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquids are not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan or made into balls. The recipe makes about 6 cups of stuffing.

Allow ¾ cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound ready-to-cook weight.

Frosted grapes are a lovely inexpensive and eatable garnish for turkey. Just dip grapes in slightly beaten egg whites and then into beet or cane sugar.

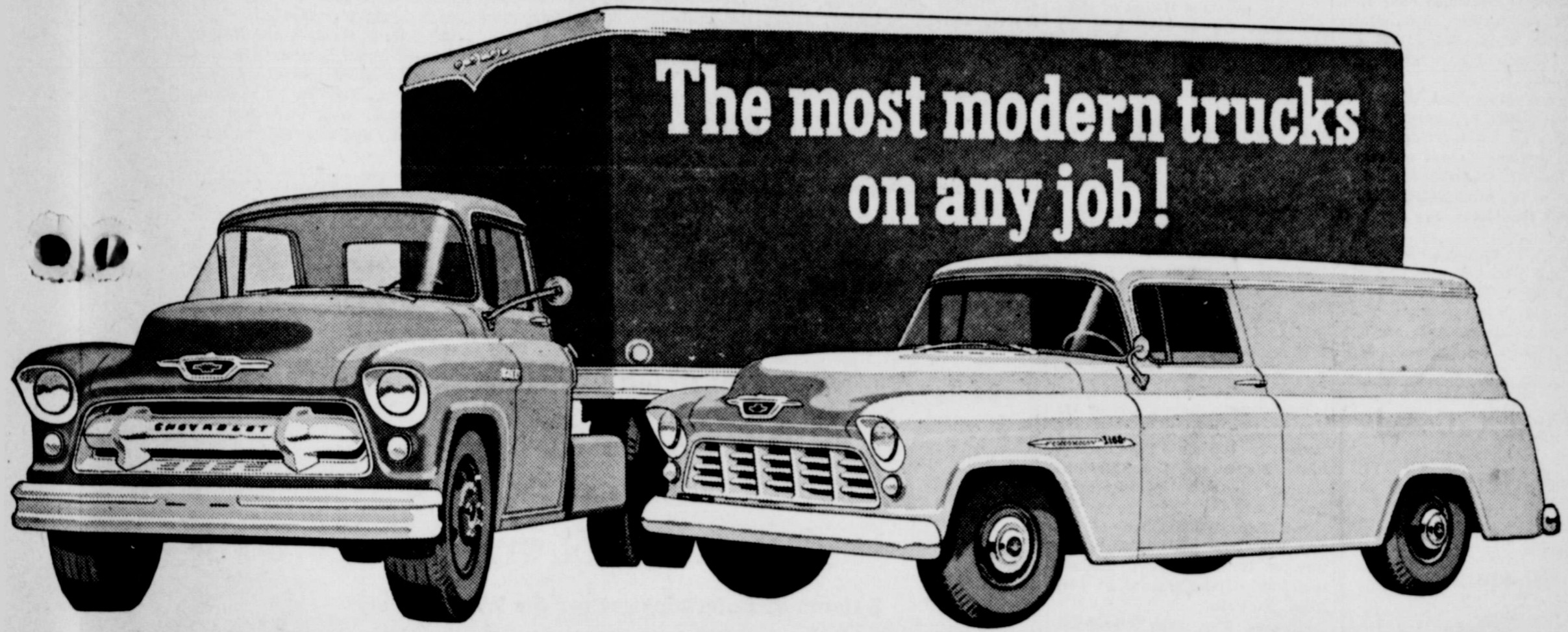

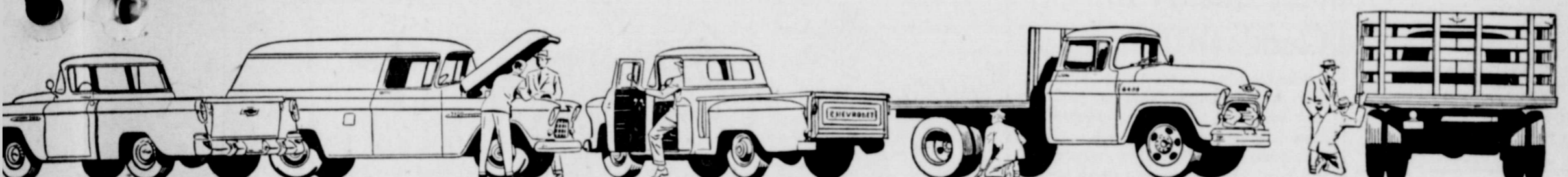

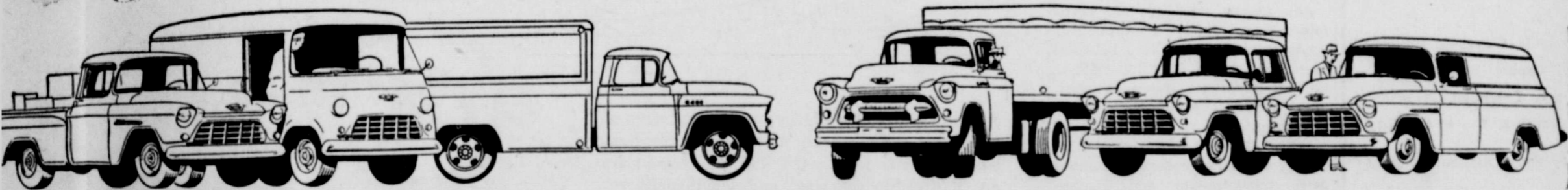

Notary Publics May Qualify In Clerk's Office

Secretary of State A. M. Muldrow has announced that all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1955 and June 10, 1955. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Muldrow said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

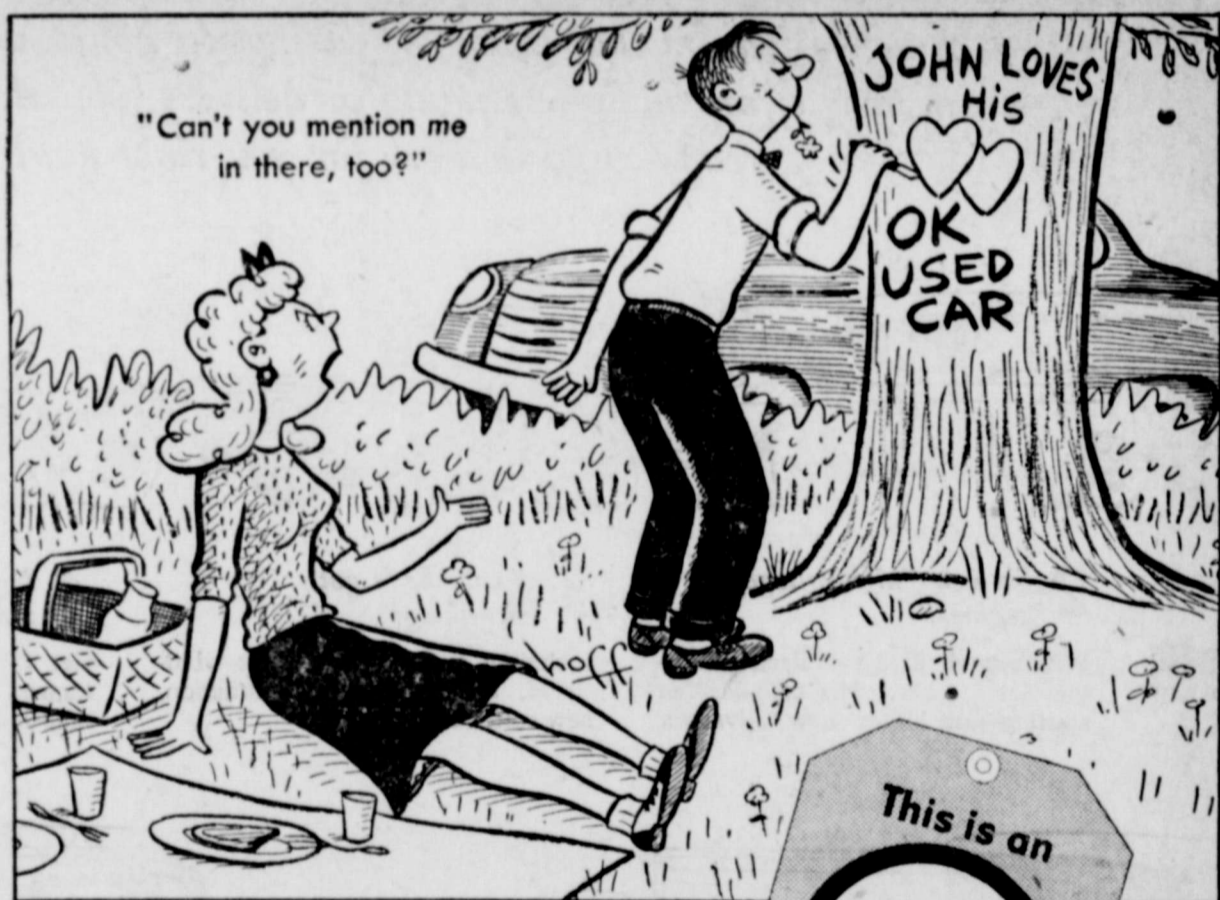

## USDA Extension Drouth Aid

Last January 26 the United States Department of Agriculture announced that County FHA Committees no longer would accept feed grain applications after February 15, 1955. Due to continued severe drouth conditions in Texas according to announcement made by Walter T. McKay, State Director, the Department on April 12, announced a continuation and reopening of the Emergency Feed Program for 82 Texas counties for drouth emergency feed aid.

Applications to participate in the Emergency Feed program will be taken in Coke County at ASC office in Robert Lee and the eligibility determined by the local

County FHA Committee. Mr. Shillingburg states that his Committee will continue to receive applications until the close of business April 29, 1955 for feed supplies sufficient to last through May 15, 1955. These designation announcements are in line with the United States Department of Agriculture's policy of continuing drouth measures where necessary.

In addition to the feed grain program, Walter T. McKay, State Director announces that the over all drouth emergency plan includes special FHA loans and cost sharing assistance through the facilities of the USDA's Agricultural Conservation Programs. This assistance continues to be available wherever needed in essentially all the drouth designated areas.
