Last rites for Orbin Sparks Kiker, 51, of Rotan were read from the First Methodist Church in Rotan last Saturday at 10:30 a. m.

The Rev. J. Alvis Cooley, pastor of the church, officiated, assisted by the Rev. W. C. Craig, pastor of the Bronte Methodist Church.

Graveside services and interment were in the Fairview cemetery here, under direction of the Weathersbee Funeral Home of Rotan.

Mr. Kiker died suddenly of a heart attack Thursday afternoon at his Rotan home. It is said he collapsed upon arising from an afternoon nap.

He was born in Bronte March 27, 1904 and married the former Miss Lizzie Phillips of Bronte Dec. 24, 1923. The couple moved to Rotan in 1937 where he has owned and operated a bakery.

Barney Carter Opening Up Well in City Limits

Bronte's oil well had gone through the easy part up to Wednesday afternoon, having gone down to 5200 feet in about 50 hours. The well is being drilled by Barney Carter of Tyler. He is opening up the dry hole which was drilled by T. W. Murray and Louis Mabee in June, 1949, on the property of L. T. Youngblood. Up to the time this story is being written, no actual drilling has been done. All the work had been toward opening

going all right, Mr. Carter said Wednesday: "I believe we have the old hole under control." He said further that he was going to "have some pictures made of it" before any further drilling was done. A Schlumberger truck was sitting on the lease when the reporter was there.

Barney Carter No. 1 Youngblood is located 75 feet from the east and 25 feet from the north lines of lot 2, block 43 in the City of Bronte. It is in City Drilling Unit 17. Mr.

Carter has 41 lots leased in this drilling block.

The hole was abandoned by Murray and Mabee at 5,210 feet in 1949. It was originally drilled when the oil boom was going strong in the Bronte Field.

Mr. Carter received his permit to drill the test in July, 1954. It was extended for six months in January, 1955. His permit allows him to drill to 5,600 feet or a lesser depth if commercial production is discovered.

Nearest production to the test is in the Bronte Field west of town.

Progress Being Made on New Texaco Station

Work on the new Texaco station on Highway 277 is progressing nicely this week and the owners expect to have the station completed within 60 days. The new station is owned by Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo. They have leased it to the Texas Company for 15 years with an option for another 10 years.

The Burk Company purchased the land for the property from A. F. Ball of Bronte. It was the former site of the Gulf Service Station operated by Bill Wrinkle and Charles Sims.

The old building was completely torn down and building under construction will be completely new. A representative of the Burk Co. said that the station will be modern in every respect, with tile rest rooms, latest in washing and greasing facilities and large concrete driveway going to pavement on the west and south sides. He said that the estimated cost of the property would run \$20,000.

1½ cups sugar (white gran.)
2 large bananas (mashed)
½ tsp. soda
1 tsp. Baking Powder
4 T. buttermilk
½ cup nuts (chopped)
1 ¾ cup flour (sifted 5 times)
2 eggs beaten separately
1 tsp. Vanilla
tsp. salt (lastly fold etaoin)
¼ tsp. salt
Cream butter and sugar together. All egg yolks, bananas, milk with soda dissolved in milk, alternate milk and flour with baking powder in flour, nuts, vanilla and nuts. Lastly fold in well beaten egg whites.

Grease and flour pans and bake in two layers in quick oven.

Use 7 minute frosting, using a part of frosting between layers, sprinkled with nuts, finely chopped.

Bennie Gilbert Rites at Houston

(Editor's Note: The story below was sent to Bronte and concerns the recent death of Bennie B. Gilbert, Sr. It includes more details about Mr. Gilbert's life.)

Benjamin Brown (Bennie) Gilbert, well-known hotelman in Houston and throughout the state, had the knack of making people like him wherever he went. It was said in hotel circles today that his affable nature, efficiency and sincerity had made him a "million friends and not an enemy anywhere."

His wife is the former Esther Ruth Rosenbaum of Houston, to whom he was married 16 years ago. The couple lived at 5241 Claremont.

Mr. Gilbert had been a long-time member of the Hotel Greeters Assn., and held membership in the Houston chapter.

His only son, Ben Gilbert, Jr., is manager of the Broken Arrow Ranch in Santa Fe, N. M.

Besides his wife and son, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Pearl Boynton of Bronte, and a brother, Virgil Gilbert of Robert Lee.
