COMMISSIONERS COURT

Coke County Commissioners Court held a regular session Monday with all members and Judge Jeff Dean in attendance. A bond filed by Hunter Strain was approved and he will be given an immediate order to start work on the 7-mile stretch of new road in the west end of Precinct No. 1. The County tax rate for 1955 was continued at 85 cents, and road bond levies of 13 cents in Precinct 1 and 19 cents in Precinct 2 were voted. Valuations of livestock and personal property will be the same as last year. Approval was given the appointment of Gerald Hooten as Coke County's new assistant agricultural agent.

Garland Black Named School Head; Dorsey New Coach

Garland Black was named superintendent of the Bronte Schools at a meeting of the Board of Trustees last Thursday. Black has been head coach and high school principal for the past year. He will replace O. K. Wolfenbarger, who has resigned to accept a position at Tucson, Ariz.

At the same meeting of the trustees, Oscar Dorsey was elevated to the head coach position, succeeding Black. The only vacancies existing in the school now are the high school principal and band director positions. Henry Lotspeich, of Albany, who was elected recently as band director, has received a better offer and declined the job offered him here.

Black, who came here from Brady last year, has been teaching in Texas schools for the past 17 years. Nine years of that period have been spent in administrative positions. He has served as superintendent at Crawford and Royston schools. He has coached at Goldthwaite, Brady, Midland, Pleanton and Bronte.

The new school head is a graduate of Roby High School and Texas Military Junior College at Terrell. He has a B. A. degree from Oklahoma City University and a Master of Education degree from Howard Payne at Brownwood.

Dorsey, who was head basketball coach and assistant football coach here last year, is a graduate of San Angelo high school and San Angelo College. He has a B. A. degree from Abilene Christian College and will work on his Master's degree this summer at ACC. Prior to moving to Bronte he was coach at Sterling City and Blackwell.

Black said that he hates to quit coaching and that he will serve as Dorsey's assistant when the Longhorns meet their opponents on the gridiron.

Coach Black's Record

Coach Black has had a most successful coaching career since he began duties with high school football players in 1938. His teams have played a total of 169 games. Of this number, 114 have been won, 53 lost and two tied. The record by years follows:

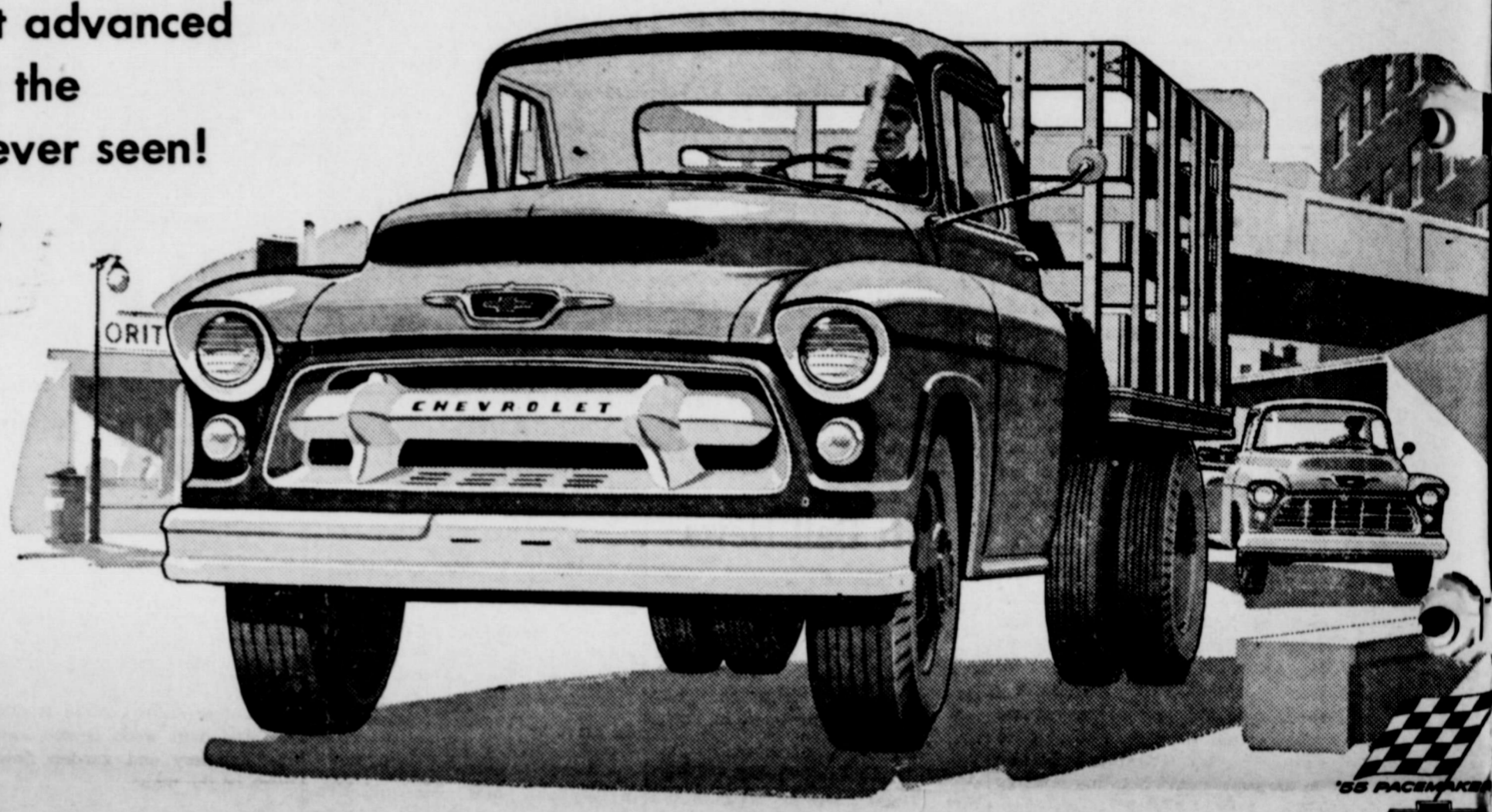

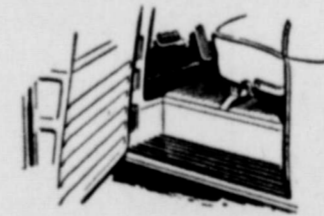

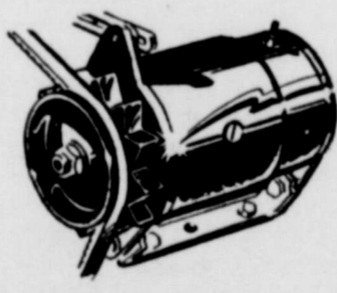

Advertising Expert Says That Newspapers Tell the Story of Their Advertisers

GALVESTON —Advertisers look to the Texas newspapers to tell their story, E. A. Schirmer, senior vice president Campbell-Ewald Company, Detroit, told members of the Texas Press Assn. meeting in Galveston Friday at its 76th annual meeting.

Schirmer, who spoke on the "High Cost of Silence," paid tribute to the press association on the celebration of its diamond jubilee and said "we in the advertising business look to your newspapers to tell the story for our clients in this large, important and fast-growing market. Newspapers are a particularly important medium in a territory, such as this, covering hundreds of thousands of square miles."

Campbell-Ewald Co., of which Schirmer represents, is one of the oldest and largest advertising companies in the country, having been founded 44 years ago.

The Company handles all advertising for Chevrolet automobiles and over a long period of years they have found the medium of daily and weekly newspapers gives them the best results for their advertising dollar.

Role Of Advertising

"There are still, today, too many people occupying management positions in all kinds of business who do not realize that their incomes, to a large degree, depend on advertising. They are too quick to censor the high cost of advertising — but fail to analyze the long-range effect of product silence," Schirmer told the newspaper representatives. Many people at the management level forget that the production problem in any business is only over when the goods are in the hands of the ultimate consumer. "It may be said generally that top management is not aware of advertising or how it should be used, and what it can do."

In illustrating his subject, "The High Cost of Silence," Schirmer referred to company after company which at one time or another through the last century were heavy advertisers but which, for one reason or another, no longer advertised. Most of the companies are out of business.

'Perishable'

"The companies forget that good will and brand acceptance are highup perishable assets. Good

will cannot be wrapped up and stored away for future use. Brands in America have been built in long periods of uninterrupted selling. Markets seldom, if ever, spring back after protracted neglect. Markets are no common property, nor has any company or brand any claim upon them except such as has been established in the minds of men and women by the power of persuasion. People become markets through the unifying power of advertising," he said.

"These same people absorb slowly, forget quickly, and are cautious in making changes in their living and buying habits. As advertising is dropped or thinned out it loses its cementing quality. Markets disintegrate, people become individuals again, and the whole slow, expensive process of cementing them together must be repeated. The basic economic fact is that it is always cheaper to hold a market than re-acquire one," he advised.

"Advertising dollars, properly put to work do not increase cost to the consumer, but actually the reverse is true," he said. Advertising while usually referred to as a cost, is really an investment in our business growth."

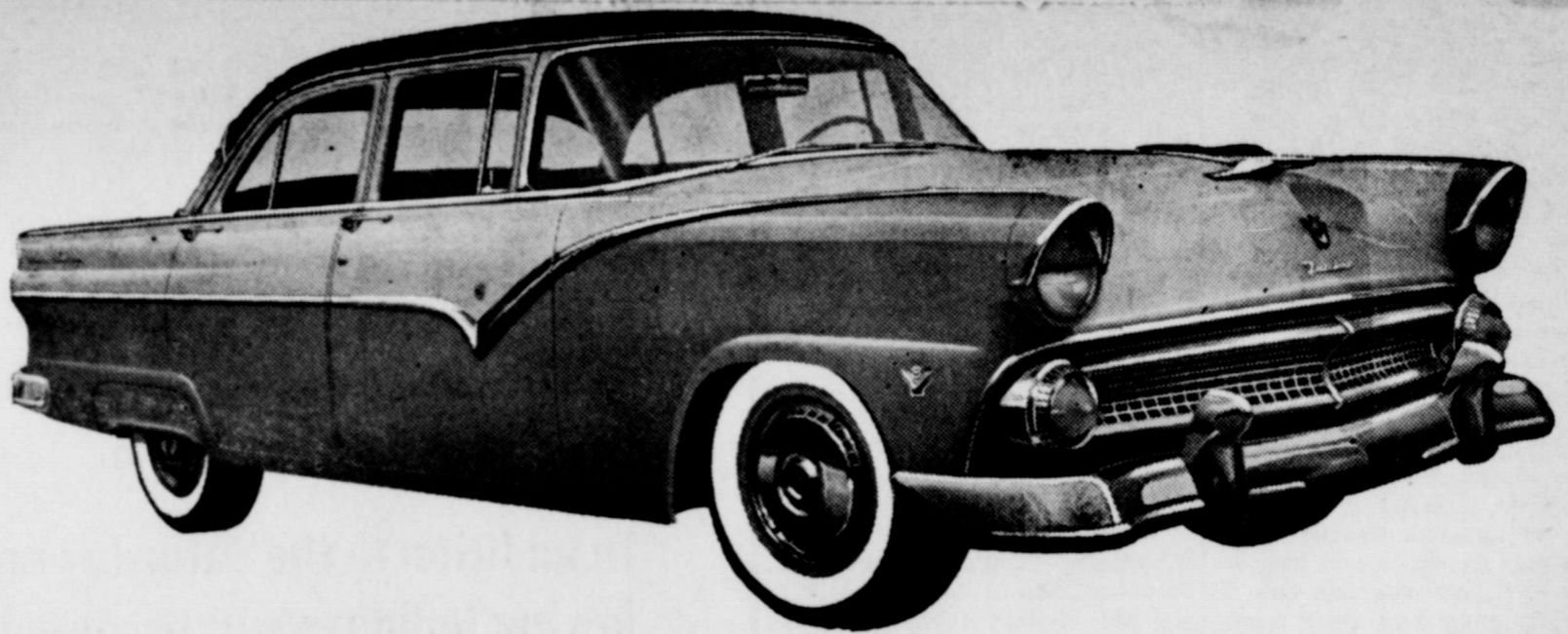

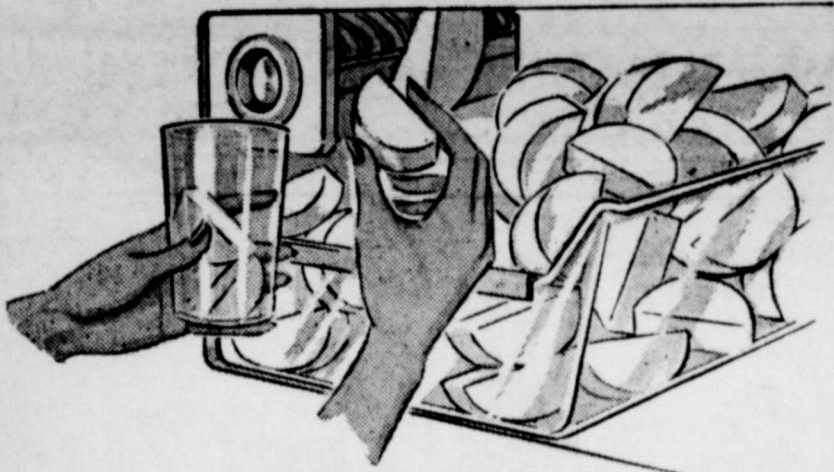
