J. L. ALLISON FUNERAL RITES HELD SUNDAY

Funeral services for James Lee Allison, 87, were held Sunday from the First Baptist Church here with the Rev. Maynard Rogers, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Clyde Coleman, pastor of the Kickapoo Baptist Church.

Interment followed in the Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

His death occurred in the Bronte Hospital on Saturday, June 18 after a short illness.

James Lee Allison was born May 5, 1868, in Carutherville, Missouri, a town in the southeast corner of Missouri, just across the Mississippi River from the State of Tennessee.

He was married to the former Callie Bell Brumbelow on December 27, 1895. They had eight children, seven of whom survive. The one child, Clara Lee Allison, died in infancy. Mrs. Allison passed away March 4th, 1941.

The Lee Allisons, as he was commonly known, came to West Texas from Milam County, Texas, in 1902.

The seven children who survive his death, are Mrs. Villa Ellis of McMahon, Texas; Mrs. Henry (Ola) Rogers, Bronte; Mrs. Tranline Best, Kerrville; Olin Allison, Bronte; Felix Allison, Muleshoe; Alfred Allison, Clovis, New Mexico and Boone Allison, Muleshoe.

He is also survived by one brother, H. W. Allison of Mexia, Texas; 19 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

He had been a member for many years in the First Baptist Church of Bronte.

Wheat Vote Set For Saturday

Outcome of the wheat marketing quota referendum on June 25 will affect price-support level and determine whether marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1956 wheat crop.

According to Oscar E. Kresta, chairman, Coke County ASC committee, if two-thirds vote in favor, the support for the 1956 crop will probably be between 75 and 82 percent of parity; the exact level will be announced before the referendum. If more than one-third vote "no" support will be 50 percent of parity. In any case, support will be available in the commercial wheat area only to farmers who stay within the wheat acreage allotment.

Another point to be considered by wheat growers is that if the vote is favorable, marketing quotas will be in effect and those exceeding their allotment will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45% of parity on their excess wheat. If the vote is unfavorable, marketing quotas will not be in effect and there will be no penalty for excess wheat.

Acreage allotments will be in effect for price support purposes even if marketing quotas are disapproved.

Chairman Kresta emphasized that the marketing quota program applies only to wheat growers in the commercial wheat states who will have more than 15 acres of wheat on any one form in 1956.

All wheat growers in Coke County will vote at the ASC office in Robert Lee.

Paving Company Completes Contract; 125 Blocks Paved

C & C Paving Co. of Colorado City has completed its contract with Precinct 2 of Coke County in paving 125 blocks in the city of Bronte. The original 111 blocks which were included in the contract were added onto to make the

total of 125 blocks. In addition to the paving, C & C poured several thousand feet of curbing while working in Bronte. Individual property owners paid for the curbing.

Mayor Ernest Ivey and Commissioner Howard Brock both said

Thursday morning that they were well pleased with the job, saying that they believed the city and county received their money's worth.

Commissioner Brock said that the paving will require careful watching during the next months while it is "curing." Plans have already been put into effect by the city council and Brock to spread additional gravel on the streets

Seats Being Built at Ball Field

Seats for approximately 250 persons are being constructed on the south side of the football field here. The work is being done by the softball organization and the Bronte School is furnishing the materials.

The seats will be used this summer for spectators at the softball games. When football season starts next fall, the seats will be turned

toward the football field, for spectators from visiting towns.

Two sections of seats are being constructed. Each section is 21 feet long and will have eight rows of seats. With the few old bleacher seats which are already on the grounds, 350-400 spectators can be accommodated.

It is expected that the first section of the new seats will be completed next week.

Members of the Bronte City Council asked The Enterprise to issue a plea and a warning against fast stopping and starting as well as turning corners too fast on the new paving.

Street Commissioner Joe Geo. Wilkins said that such antics will eat holes out in the new pavement and ruin it. He stated further that he would enlist the cooperation of law enforcement officers to see that these practices are stopped.

Quite a lot of speeding and reckless driving has been noticed already on the new paving. Danger of turning over or killing or injuring somebody, as well as damaging the pavement, was a prime consideration of the council in issuing the warning.
