UCRA to Study Dam Site On Yellow Wolf

(The following news article is reprinted from Wednesday's issue of the San Angelo Standard-Times.)

Approval to seek engineering advice about building a small irrigation dam on Yellow Wolf Creek about six miles north of Robert Lee was voted at San Angelo Tuesday by the board of directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority.

The UCRA authorized W. I. (Bill) Marshall, its field representative, to make inquiries about the feasibility of construction a reservoir on the small stream which would hold 2,500 acre feet of water.

Marshall mentioned B. W. Chaunch of Ballinger, Runnels County surveyor, as a possibility. Chaunch also is an engineer, and Marshall said he had indicated interest in small dam projects considered for development in the past by the UCRA.

LIPAN FLAT SURVEY

Porter Henderson, a director, suggested the study of the Yellow Creek area be followed by a survey of Lipan Flat and other areas where the UCRA might finance still additional small holding dams.

Henderson said the UCRA should build such dams primarily for the purpose of recharging sub-surface streams, a procedure generally credited with helping boost the power of water wells and with helping conserve underground water resources.

Marshall said the UCRA might investigate the possibility of constructing dams also near the old Dove Creek Farm near Knickerbocker near the old 17-Mile Crossing south of Miles on the Main Concho and Willow Creek, and at what he called the "natural site" at the old Mullins Crossing near the east boundary of Tom Green County.

SHOULD KEEP LOOKING

In other discussion about water, Henderson said that although San Angelo now can draw from both Lake Nasworthy and North Concho Lake he believes "any forward-looking city administration should begin right now looking elsewhere for water—perhaps the Colorado River."

The directors yesterday also approved a rewritten version of the UCRA's contract with the city of Robert Lee, under which Robert Lee pays the UCRA \$359 a month to use water from the Mountain Creek Reservoir, and to amortize its cost.

The new version merely clarifies the earlier document through other language, but makes no change in the original provisions.

Oil News

F. Kirk Johnson has filed application to drill its No. 2 State of Texas 1/4-mile north-northeast of production in the Wendkirk field of Coke County, 5 1/4 miles southwest of Bronte.

The project will be drilled directionally below the Colorado River to a depth of 4,000 feet with rotary. Elevation is 1,764 feet at ground level.

Location is 3,072.3 feet north, 34 degrees, 50 minutes east of the northwest corner of 456-E. Girke Survey.

Sweetwater Okeys Release of Water From Oak Creek

About 120,000 gallons of water per day will be released to Coke and Runnels County farmers from Oak Creek Lake following action Monday by the Sweetwater City Council.

The action, in line with an earlier court judgement when Oak Creek Lake was built, was recommended because of the present high level of the lake.

JOHN B. CLARK RETURNS FROM INTERESTING NORTHWEST TRIP

Dear Editor:

Complying with your request for vacation trips, I recently visited by brother in Tacoma, Washington. I left here by train June 4 and after 72 1/2 hours, I arrived on time in spite of the fact that some of my trains were as much as three hours late.

At Bakersfield, Calif., they loaded 560 cars of spuds on the Santa Fe and I am sure the Southern Pacific had a like amount. The next 320 miles to Oakland, I think should be known as the Garden Spot of the World as there were numbers of kinds of vegetables that were in the process of being gathered and shipped.

At Oakland, I saw a mothball fleet, about 50 or 60 ships that are not needed now and are anchored close together in the bay. Saw another like-size fleet at Tacoma. The train I was on from Oakland had several cars of strawberries destined for points in Canada.

We went on through the Sacramento Valley which is about as pretty as the San Joaquin valley, but I do not believe it produces as wide a variety of produce.

Leaving the valley, we entered the mountains and saw beautiful scen-

Fred Graham, Wreck Victim, Out of Coma

Fred Allen Graham, 26, of Andrews, in a coma 197 days beginning Nov. 30, is reported conscious and definitely improved by Permian General Hospital officials at Andrews.

Graham was injured in a car accident south of Bronte Nov. 30. He remained in the Bronte Hospital for many weeks and he and his family got to be well known here, and many local persons are highly interested in his condition.

He was taken from here to Dallas for treatment and then removed to Andrews. In March he underwent brain surgery at Medical Center Hospital in Odessa.

Nurses reported that his memory has been left surprisingly intact. His father, J. A. Graham, said that his first words on coming out of the coma were to ask for his mother.

The injured man remembered little about the wreck but told his family that he fell asleep at the wheel of his automobile. He was employed by the Security Engineering Company.

cry. The railroad does a few horse shoes, loop the loops or what ever you want to call them.

I did not get to see the dam or power works from the train but did see quite a lot of Lake Shasta. One of the trainmen told me that there are 27 tunnels between Oakland and Portland. I think maybe he could have missed some of them.

On up to Klamath Falls and another beautiful lake. Lake Klamath is about 4200 feet above sea-level. Then we had to have a booster set of diesels and went on up to Crescent Lake, about 4800 feet high and here we saw snow 6 feet deep beside the train. This is one of the snow trouble spots of the Railroads. There were snow plows and snow moving machines on the sidings ready to go.

I am forgetting Mt. Shasta, which can be seen from the train for 100 miles or more. It is over 14,000 feet elevation. Now on up the line. At Portland saw mills and water power stations are a common sight and I saw one home-made electric generating outfit water powered. Beyond Portland, mountains and rivers do not leave room for many railroads or highways.

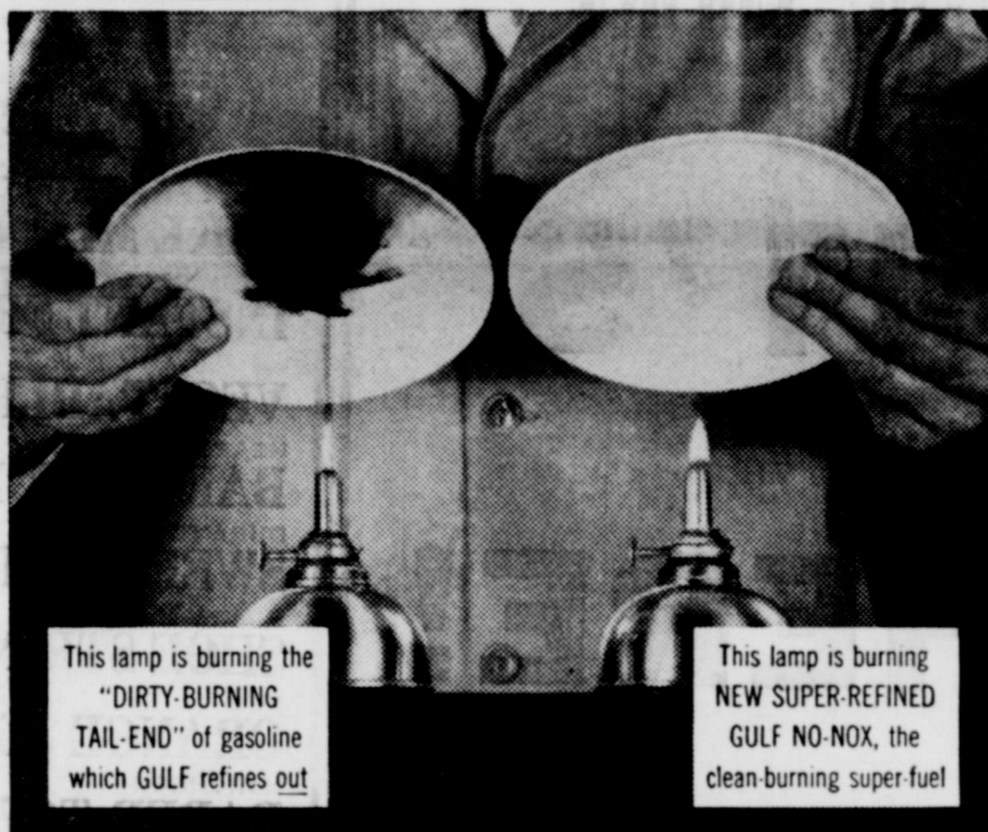

ways so we had three railroads using the same tracks. I do believe that the state of Washington has more wild flowers than I have ever seen in these parts that is cultivated.

I don't guess any account would be complete without a fish story. I only wished that I had time to try catching one but I did get to see a fishing fleet come in at Westport, Wash. and believe it or not, those fish were 40 lbs. and larger with some that 3 men carried them. I saw a log jam with loggers working to get them started on down riges. Also a train with 125 cars of logs, 2 or 3 logs to

the car.

We went up on Mt. Ranier, which is over 14000 feet in elevation, not to the top, but above the timber line. There is a ski lodge on the mountain and the Dept. of Interior maintains a year round road to the lodge. Had such things as trees and boulders block us for awhile so I saw all I wanted to pretty quick, as I was a long way from home. We were not blocked but a few minutes as road crews were on the job, keeping those things clear, but it was exciting to me to see things like that

six times a year and the bill runs \$4 to \$5 per 2 months.

I saw several water power generating stations with one of the longest power line spans in the world. 6244 feet of power line without any support between the towers. Also saw such things as paper mills, and plywood mills.

Now back to Texas where I viewed a steel mill in open with what I will call a bucket of liquid

steel, 510,000 pounds of it. The rolling and processing of the steel is a very interesting sight, but I think I have already used up too much space.

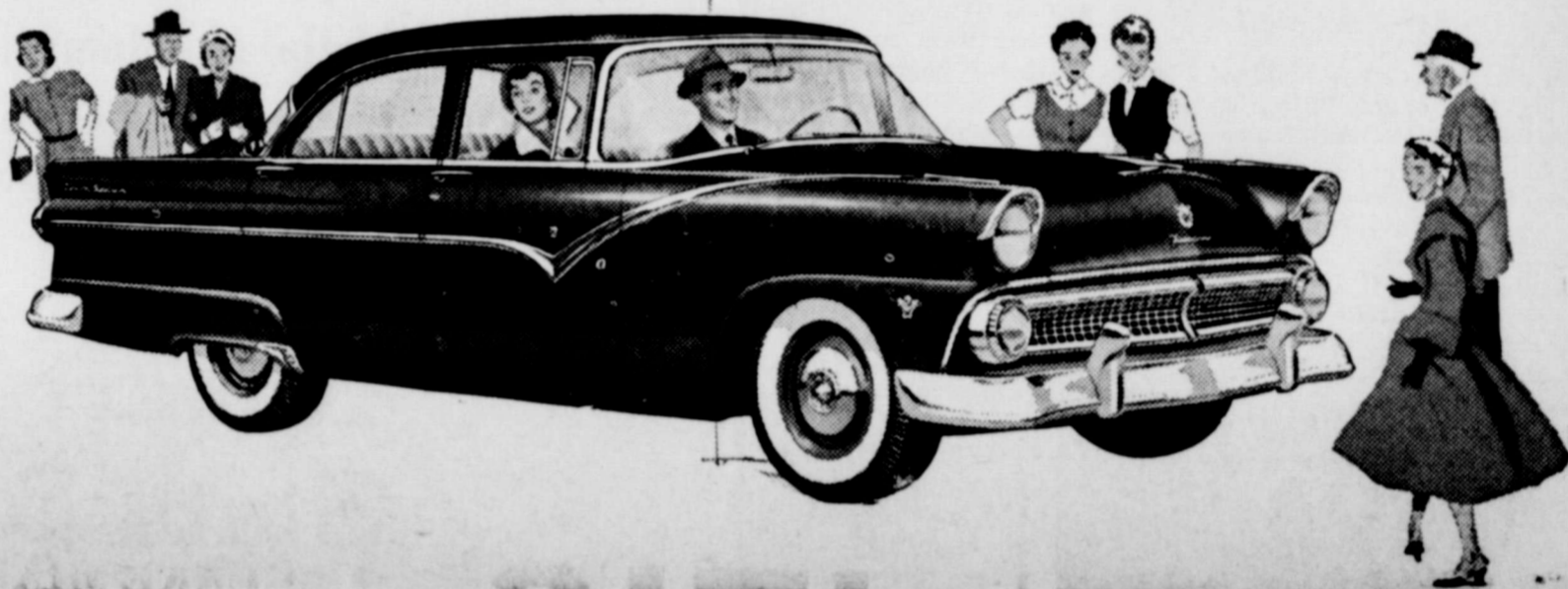

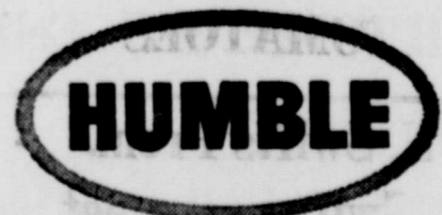
