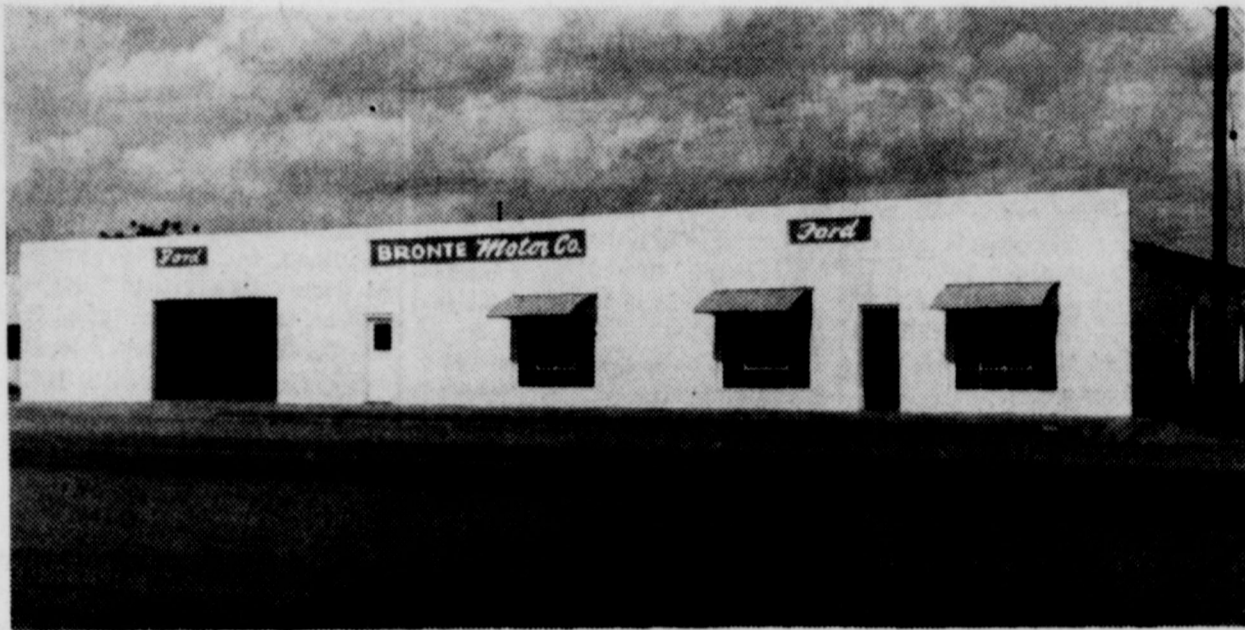

Flood Control Topic Of Meeting Tuesday

An important meeting has been called for Tuesday, July 19, by C. N. Webb, chairman of the board of supervisors of the Coke County Eoil Conservation District. H. N. Smith of Temple, state conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service will be present to discuss the proposed flood control project on the Kickapoo watershed. The meeting will be at 2 p. m. at the Methodist Church.

Mr. Smith will make a survey of the watershed Tuesday morning before the meeting with citizens of this area, who are interested. He will be accompanied by members of the State Conservation Board.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss with local sponsoring agencies provisions of Public Law 566 which is known as the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1954. This law gives authority to the Department of Agriculture to render assistance to local groups in planning and making application for federal aid on such a project. The Department of Agriculture works through the Soil Conservation Service in rendering this assistance.

Local groups signing the application and sponsoring the project include the Coke County Soil Conservation District, the Upper Colorado River Authority, city officials for the City of Bronte, members of the school board for the Bronte Independent School District, Judge Jeff Dean for Coke County, and the Bronte Lions Club.

The Kickapoo project was approved several months ago, along with several others in the State. Mr. Smith is charged with the responsibility of making recommendations to the Washington office which sets up priorities on various watersheds over the nation, and he is presently attending meetings with eight groups in order to gather material for making his recommendations.

Some of the points considered in making his recommendations are:

1. The need of watershed protection and flood prevention on the Kickapoo watershed.

to pay their pro-rata share of such a program.

Webb urged everyone interested in the project to be present at the meeting. He said, "This project could mean a great deal to the people of Bronte and this area if it goes through."

In addition to soil and water conservation and flood prevention, there is a possibility that quite a bit of land north of Bronte could be irrigated with water stored in reservoirs which would be constructed.

But I could fill our paper full of all the cute things the two little grandsons have been doing. We have enjoyed seeing them again after an absence of 2½ months.

The topic of conversation with the El Paso daughter has been "Movie Stars." She informed us that they made a trip to Marfa last week and was privileged to watch them shoot a scene for the movie "Giant." And the thing that thrilled her most was that she had her picture made with Chill Wills. She was very impressed with Rock Hudson, saying he seemed like such an ordinary fellow and someone you would like to know.

However, she was disappointed in Elizabeth Taylor. She was very small in stature and not as pretty as she had expected.

Speaking of conversations, you so often see the name of "mother" in the limelight but poor old fathers get such little recognition. The other day, in reading a paper, I came across this definition of a father and I certainly think it bears reprinting.

It says:

What is A Father?

A father is a thing that is forced to endure childbirth without an anaesthetic. A father is a thing that growls when he feels good, and laughs loud when he is scared half to death.

I don't know where father goes when he dies. But I've an idea that after a good rest, wherever it is, he won't just sit on a cloud and wait for the girl he's loved and the children she bore; he'll be busy there, too — repairing the stairs, oiling the gates, improving the streets — smoothing the way."

I have several recipes on my file to bring you but a cold salad is so in order for these hot days, that I finally decided on this one. This is very simple and has a very unusual flavor. So try it and let me know how you like it. I have been getting a great response from my recipes of late and I like it so try them and tell me about it.

Jello and Melted Cheese Salad
1 pkg. of lime jello
1 small can of pineapple (crushed)

1 cup can milk or cream.
½ cup grated yellow cheese (any kind.)

Dissolve the jello in ½ or 2/3 cup of hot water and place 6 cubes of ice in it to make a quick congeal.

Heat the pineapple and cheese until the cheese is thoroughly melted. Whip the thickened jello until it is very light in color and then whip the cream until thick. If you

use canned milk, you may place it in a freezing tray while you prepare the other ingredients and it is then ready to whip. Be sure to add 1 tablespoon lemon juice if you use canned milk. Add all the ingredients together and place in a refrigerator until set.

Army Designates Some Non-Coms As Specialists

As previously announced by the Department of the Army, the Army's new noncommissioned officer specialist program goes into effect on July 1.

The program provides that non-commissioned officer identification

and status be given only to enlisted personnel holding leadership positions. A separate category of enlisted personnel, called specialists, includes those who have technical and administrative skills.

Designed to increase the prestige of the noncommissioned officer by restoring him to his traditional position as the backbone of the Army, the program will also preserve the respect properly due the specialist.

Separation of the NCO from the specialist is made in the top four

pay grades. On the conversion no one will lose pay.

Effective July 1, titles in the top four enlisted grades are as follows: NONCOMMISSIONED OFFICER Master Sergeant, Sergeant 1st Class, Sergeant, Corporal

SPECIALISTS; Master Specialist (MSP), Specialist 1st class (SP1), Specialist 2nd Class (SP2), Specialist 3rd Class (SP3).

Private and Private First Class ratings remain the same.

New rank insignia will accom-

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pany the change for the specialists. The present noncommissioned officer stripes will remain.



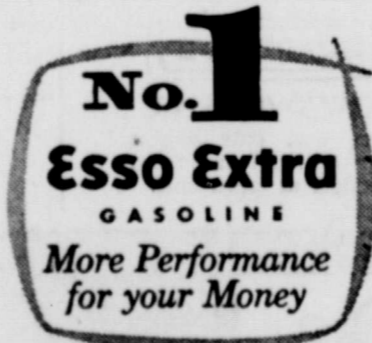

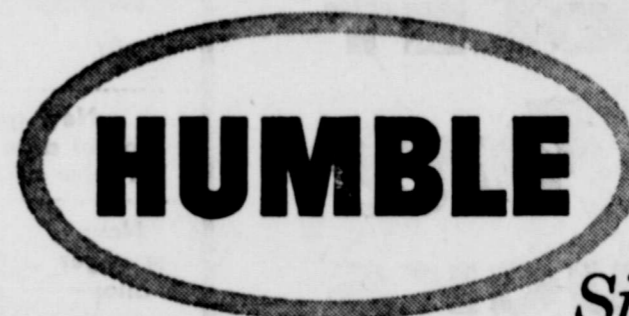
