Flood Control Topic Of Meeting Tuesday

An important meeting has been | called for Tuesday, July 19, by C. N. Webb, chairman of the board to pay their pro-rata share of such of supervisors of the Coke County a program. Eoil Conservation District. H. N. Smith of Temple, state conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service will be present to discuss the proposed flood control project on the Kickapoo watershed. The meeting will be at 2 p. m. at the Methodist Church.

Mr. Smith will make a survey of the watershed Tuesday morning before the meeting with citizens of this area, who are interested. He will be accompanied by members of the State Conservation Board.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss with local sponsoring agencies provisions of Public Law 566 which is known as the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1954. This law gives authority to the Department of Agriculture to render assistance to local groups in planning and making application for federal aid on such a project. The Department of Agriculture works through the Soil Conservation Service in rendering this assistance.

Local groups signing the application and sponsoring the project include the Coke County Soil Conservation District, the Upper Colorado River Authority, city officials for the City of Bronte, members of the school board for the Bronte Independent School District, Judge Jeff Dean for Coke

The Kickapoo project was approved several months ago, along with several others in the State. Mr. Smith is charged with the responsibility of making recommendations to the Washington office watersheds over the nation, and he 52. is presently attending meetings with eight groups in order to gather material for making his reccomendations.

Some of the points considered in making his recommendations are: 1. The need of watershed protection and flood prevention on the Kickapoo watershed.
