Bronte Public Schools faculty is now completed, according to new Superintendent Garland Black. In a recent meeting of Bronte School Trustees, three additional teachers were hired, which is all the local school is permitted, according to State Law.

The new teachers are Joe Simpson of Lockhart, high school principal; Mrs. Delores Darrow of Eden, band director and McAfee Daniel of Frost, to be placed later.

Simpson has been employed the past three years in the Brady Junior High School as a math teacher and assistant principal. He is working on his Master's degree at San Marcos Teachers College this summer and he and his wife will move to Bronte around the first of August.

## ROBERT TUBB IS VICTIM OF DROWNING

Robert Tubb, 73, retired stock farmer of Blackwell, drowned Wednesday in Oak Creek Lake near Blackwell.

Justice of the Peace C. E. Bruton of Bronte, presiding over a coroner's inquest, returned a verdict of suicide by drowning.

According to relatives Mr. Tubb left his home in Blackwell around 8 o'clock Wednesday morning to get his mail and purchase some washing powder. When he did not return for some time, his wife became alarmed and asked friends and neighbors to search for him.

Later it was learned that he was seen walking south along the railroad track, and the search continued to his favorite fishing spot on an inlet of the lake where his hat, a daily newspaper and the package of washing powder were discovered on the bank.

The searching party began diving and dragging that portion of the lake. The body was recovered about 1:30 p. m. in water ten feet deep.

Sheriff Paul Good assisted in conducting the inquest and witnesses were of the opinion that Mr. Tubb had voluntarily walked off into the deep water. There had been no persons seen in that area during the day. It is believed that he was despondent over ill health. He had been in poor health for some time.

The body was removed to a funeral home in Roscoe in a Clift ambulance.

Moon told his listeners that local people must contribute the following on such a project:

1. Furnish easements for rights of way for structures. (Usually there are no cash easements, and they must be in the name of the local sponsor.)
2. Must obtain state water rights from the State Board of Water Engineers.
3. Operate and maintain the structures after they are built.
4. Bear all costs for storage capacity for other than flood prevention.
5. Complete conservation treatment on the land.
6. Let and administer contracts.

## LAST RITES HELD HERE FOR JAMES R. SMITH

Funeral services for James Russell Smith, 92, retired farmer-rancher, were held from the First Baptist Church here at 3 p. m. Saturday. Rev. J. C. Shipman, pastor of the Robert Lee Baptist Church, and the Rev. George R. Wilson, pastor of the Sweetwater First Baptist church, officiated.

Interment followed in the Fairview cemetery here with Clift Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Smith died at 10:35 p. m. Thursday, July 14, in a Sweetwater Hospital.

Born August 16, 1862, in Macon, Miss., he came to Texas in 1880, and to Sweetwater in 1881. He helped to build the first rock court house for Nolan County and helped build the first school in Sweetwater.

In 1889, he returned to his hometown and married Fannie Sue Eiland on Feb. 19. They returned to Texas and settled in Coke County near Bronte. Mrs. Smith died in 1937.

In 1946 he married Mrs. Nell Sanders. She died in 1952.

He is survived by two sons, Lake of Bronte and J. J. S. Smith of Sweetwater; six daughters, Mrs. L. L. Thomas of Dallas, Mrs. J. W. Davis of San Antonio, Mrs. C. E. Sherrell of San Angelo, Mrs. Howard E. Golden of Lubbock, Mrs. Lee L. Johnson of Canyon, Mrs. L. G. Campbell of Happy; 22 grandchildren, 33 great grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Euverne McCockadale of Birmingham, Ala., and Mrs. Neva Shomaker of Laura, Miss.

7. Bear a share of the cost of construction. The law says bear a fair share of the cost, but it does not specify how much.

Moon explained that it is estimated that cost of a flood project of this kind runs about \$8 per acre. That would make the Kickapoo project run at least \$320,000, since there are approximately 40,700 acres in the watershed. Of this amount he estimated local money would have to be raised for half of it. He said, however that the exact amount could not be determined until a detailed plan was worked out. The amount of local expenditure, he said, is based on the ratio of local benefits to total benefits. He did say at one point that he thought the local project would justify more than average federal aid.

In a question and answer session after he had finished his talk, Moon was asked about methods of financing such a project. He said that it could be done by voting bonds, through contributions, etc. One such project, he said, is being financed largely by an oil company.

Moon urged that farmers and ranchment of the area continue their soil conservation practices, and even increase them, regardless of whether or not the project goes through. He emphasized throughout his talk that a project of this kind will not hold water where it falls; this has to be taken care of by each landowner, he said.

L. T. Youngblood, UCRA chairman and Bronte banker, opened the meeting. Rev. W. C. Craig, Methodist pastor, gave the invocation. Other Soil Conservation officials present were C. A. Tidwell, assistant state conservationist of Temple; Cy Richmond, area soil conservationist of San Angelo; Bryan Yarbrough and Robert Walker, members of the Coke County Soil Conservation Board of Supervisors A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist of Robert Lee and Nathan Geer, SCS engineer of Robert Lee.

Parents who wish their children to receive the shots should bring them to the local clinic next Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. Dr. John R. Harris and his staff will administer the inoculations.

Dr. J. D. McDaniel of Robert Lee will give the shots next Tuesday to Robert Lee and Silver first and second grade students.

The delay and widespread publicity accompanying the delay has caused some misgivings on the part of parents. It is pointed out that vaccine now being released has undergone rigid governmental standard tests.

For your recipe file, this week I am bringing you a superb chocolate pie. The filling recipe belongs to Mrs. Curtis Rambin of Fort Worth and Mrs. Vetal Flores had the meringue recipe. The meringue is so different and very easy to make and may be used on any type of meringue pie. I believe you will say this is one of the best.

### Chocolate Pie

(Ingredients for 2 pies)  
2 cups sugar  
6 tablespoons flour  
2/3 cup cocoa.  
3 cups milk.  
1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix sugar, cocoa and flour together. Add 1 cup of milk to the dry ingredients. After this is well blended add the 6 unbeaten egg yolks. Beat this mixture until all is well mixed. Last add the 2 remaining cups of milk.

Cook in double boiler until thick. Remove from the fire and add a large lump of butter and the vanilla and set aside to cool. Pour in

baked pie shells.

### Meringue

Cook 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup water until it spins a thread or reaches 232 degrees if you use a candy thermometer. Beat the egg whites very stiff, having added a 1/4 tsp salt and 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar. Pour the cooked syrup slowly over the egg whites and beat vigorously until it holds in peaks. Pour over pies and set in the refrigerator.

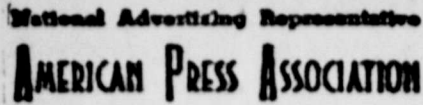

Air Force Needs Observer Posts In Coke County

Organization of three ground observer posts in Coke county during the very near future was announced today by County Judge Jeff Dean following a conference with Air Force representatives.

Describing the establishment of the posts as "A vital step forward toward building an effective air defense," M/Sgt. Charles A. Richey said that posts will be located in the following towns within the county, Robert Lee, Silver and Bronte.

He indicated that these observer posts will go into operation immediately as full-fledged Ground Observer Corps units as soon as volunteers are available.

M/Sgt. Richey went on to say that workers should come from the local area in order to be reasonably close to one of the posts, and urged that citizens wishing to volunteer get in touch immediately with Judge Jeff Dean at phone 81, Robert Lee.

In making the plea, Richey pointed out that no previous special training is required. "A Ground Observer Corpsman must be able to see, hear and speak distinctly," he stated.

Observers report their observa-

**D. K. Glenn Named To FHA Committee**

D. K. Glenn of Bronte is a new member of the Coke County Committee for the Farmers Home Administration. His appointment became effective July 1, 1955.

Glenn succeeds George Thomas whose term on the 3-member committee expired this year. Glenn has a livestock operation at Bronte.

Other members are W. Delmar Sheppard, Robert Lee and W. W. Ivey, Bronte.

There is a Farmers Home Administration committee in each agricultural county. The committee determines eligibility of applicants and helps the county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies and services to local conditions. Each member is named for a 3-year term, one appointment expiring each year, and may not succeed himself. At least two members must be farmers.

The FHA makes loans to farmers to buy, improve, enlarge or operate efficient family-type farms. It also lends money to farmers or their nonprofit associations to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices. Purposes include establishing and improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion practices, and many other conservation measures, as well as irrigation and farmstead water improvements. Most of the soil and water conservation loans and loans to buy, improve or enlarge farms are made from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Before the agency can make any loans, the applicant must have the approval of the county committee.

The agency does not make a loan of any type to an applicant whose credit needs can be handled by other credit sources.
