Residents of this county have been presented with another opportunity to do something to make the area more progressive and something we believe would pay off in dollars and cents in the long run. Of course, we mean the flood prevention project on the Kickapoo Creek.

True, it will take some money and it will also take a lot of talking back and forth to work out details of the project. There will be many objections raised, some of them will be valid and reasonable because there are very definite pros and cons on this issue.

When we take into consideration the tremendous conservation of soil and water that can be effected; when we consider that danger of flood to the city of Bronte can be erased; and when we consider that acres of dry farmland may be irrigated from the project, we believe that it would be worthwhile.

Probably some of the landowners who might have a major portion of their farms under water cannot see it that way, but like so many public improvements, the cost is high for a few in order to benefit many.

We believe that the project would be highly beneficial and worth the money and we believe it is possible to have it if persons involved can get together and if everybody is willing to compromise. It will take a little from most of us and quite a bit from others.

After the family had moved to Hayrick, Stevens bought a place there. They were married at the Baldwin home at Fort Chadbourne July 5, 1900, and moved into the one-room house on his farm. The couple lived on the same place until they retired and moved into Bronte in May, 1951.

Borger Firm Gets Contract for Coke Highway Construction

A contract for 2.7 miles of construction on State Highway 208 in Coke County has been awarded to a Borger firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

West-Tex Construction Co., Inc. submitted the low bid of \$281,076.42 on the project. Construction of a Colorado River bridge, bridges and approaches from one mile south of Robert Lee to the Mitchell County line (sections) is expected to take 200 working days, according to J. A. Snell, District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

H. L. Bailey, Resident Engineer at Sterling City, will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

40 GIVEN POLIO SHOTS

Approximately 40 first and second graders received the second round inoculations of the Salk polio vaccine given recently at the Harris Clinic. About 70 of the eligible group took the first shots which were given April 25.

Children who missed the shots by reason of being ill or on vacation may make arrangements to take the shots at a later date.

Lions to Convert Legion Hut Into Community Center

The local Lions Club will convert the American Legion Hall into a Community Center in the near future. They have entered a contract with Bronte Legionnaires to use the building for that purpose. Details are not yet complete, however.

Local Lions hope to equip the building with kitchen facilities and make it otherwise usable for community affairs.

In the Tuesday meeting of the Lions group, it was brought out that the Center would be kept locked at all times and anyone tampering with them would be prosecuted.

Bronte, for many years, has needed a community center for meetings, gatherings, parties, etc. Rules for the use of the building have not yet been made.

The Merchants of San Angelo came in second in the meet and

also qualified for the state meet. Big Springs won third place.

Other teams included Robert Lee, and Sterling City. Trophies donated by Bronte merchants were awarded the winners.

Bronte's first place came after they defeated the San Angelo Merchants 6-1, in the finals Saturday night. The Merchants had gained the finals with a 4-1 victory over Piggly Wiggly from Big Spring in the semifinals.

First tournament game Thursday night was a 1-0 victory for Smith's Drive-In of San Angelo over El Patio Motel, another San Angelo entry.

Bronte All-Stars followed in the second game with a 13-3 win from Salvato Drug of San Angelo.

San Angelo Merchants made their first win 14-3 over Sterling City.

On Friday night Bronte whipped Smith's Drive In of San Angelo 4-0, and Big Spring downed San Angelo Merchants 4-2, handing the Merchants their first defeat.

Bronte handed Piggly Wiggly of Big Spring a 2-1 defeat Saturday night for its third win of the tourney and gained the finals.

GRAND JURY RETURNS 4 INDICTMENTS

Grand jury indictments were returned here Monday against three men for felony thefts, and a fourth on a worthless check charge.

R. E. Simpson, 25, of San Angelo, E. D. Holland, 22, of Paris and L. W. Qualls, 28, of Levelland were charged with theft of oil field equipment. It is alleged they stole a 4½ inch drillpipe elevator, valued at \$100, and a 3,000 lb. pressure gauge, a similar value, from John H. Henley.

The theft occurred last Feb. 6 when Henley's drilling rig was stacked on the S. E. Adams lease northeast of Robert Lee. The men are at liberty under bonds of \$1,000 each.

Buster Hobbs, formerly of Robert Lee, was indicted for passing a \$65 worthless check at the W. W. Millikin store in Bronte last April 14. He is now in jail in Abilene.

Grand jurors were in session again Tuesday to consider a charge against Ervin Halfman, who had been accused of taking a quantity of sheep wire from the John Burroughs farm on the Divide. No indictment was returned in the matter.

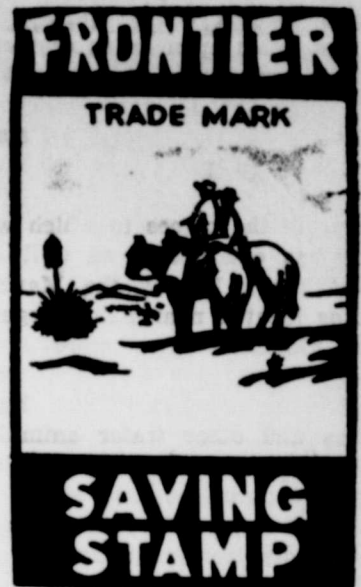

The L. L. Wilkins family returned July 27 from a vacation in sunny Florida. They went to visit Mr. and Mrs. Leslie L. Wilkins, Jr. at Patrick Air Force Base near Cocoa. Wilkins is an IBM accountant in the Air Force and is stationed there. He and his wife are looking forward to April 6, 1956, because that is the date he will receive his discharge from the Air Force and they can return to Texas.

Telling about their vacation the Wilkins said:

"We left on July 16 and after seeing some very pretty country and various other sights in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama, (including lots of rain), we arrived at Patrick on July 19. The air base is situated on the very edge of the Atlantic Ocean and, of course, we all wanted to go swimming and wading in it before we did anything else.

"One of the most fascinating things in the world is to sit in the white sand with a cool breeze blowing and watch the waves come rolling in and look out over the great expanse of water to the horizon where ocean and sky merge into one. We wanted to see the sunrise on the ocean, but somehow, we never could get up early enough. Of course the family came back with a nice sunburn, not a tan, but it was lots of fun. On the coast of Florida it really isn't as sunny as you might expect because it rains almost every day. This seems rather unusual to a West Texan, but it's true. In fact, we saw so much rain on the whole trip that we were rather glad to get back to dry West Texas.

As everyone knows, Florida is famous for its citrus fruit, and we saw miles upon miles of fruit orchards, consisting of orange, lemon, grapefruit, banana, and other kinds of fruit trees. We also saw beautiful palm and coconut trees.

"One of the places to which we went was educational as well as entertaining. It was the Marine Studios located near Saint Augustine, Florida. There were hundreds of fish, any kind that you could imagine, along with high turtles and other water animals.

"Most numerous among the fish were the porpoises, two of which were well trained. First, we watched the porpoises jump high out of the water to get the food the trainer held in his hand. Then we watched a diver go under the water and feed them. And, last but not least, the two most educated porpoises in the world put on a performance. They jumped out of the water to ring bells, retrieve balls, catch footballs in their

mouth and jump through a hoop for a grand finale. After each of these stunts, they received a piece of fish. We had no idea fish could be trained to do such things. We really enjoyed the whole show.

"All good things must come to an end and eventually time came for us to leave. We left on July 25 and came back by way of Georgia. We saw some beautiful places along the road home where pretty fat cattle grazed in luscious green meadows and pastures. In some places the tall, stately trees hung over the road, blotting out the sunlight. It was all very interesting, but we must admit we were glad to see the Texas mesquites and the wide open spaces again."

Boll Worms In County Doing Heavy Damage

Boll worm infestation in the county varies from light to heavy. Field inspections the last two weeks indicate a heavy bollworm hatch north of Bronte the latter part of the week. Four farms in this area were checked Tuesday and Wednesday and showed pretty heavy damage. The worms have a good start and will be hard to kill by the end of the week. Cotton on sandy land where growing conditions are still good shows a heavy infestation of eggs which will hatch out in from 3 to 5 days.

Other parts of the county have had a light infestation for the last two weeks. There are few eggs present and if dry weather continues chances for only light bollworm damage are good. A good rain this week would almost certainly result in a heavy bollworm infestation over the entire county within a week after the rain.

The situation at Silver is not known at this time but several farms there will be checked by noon Thursday. It seems that we are in a critical period at this time. The situation is likely to get either better or worse depending on weather conditions in the next 7 days. Bollworms hatch at a very rapid rate when cotton is making good growth. This is not a time to poison without first checking your fields. Look at the top 4 inches of the plant if the bollworm is on the plant you can find punctured squares and buds. In many cases you can find the worm by looking carefully. As the worm grows he works on down the stalk and into the bolls. Poison is very effective if used when the worm is small and in the top part of the plant. This is the reason we need to find the worms on the plant before the squares fall to the ground.

Since the picture on something like this can change so rapidly, this office will try to make checks of fields over the entire county as often as is necessary to tell about what is happening in each area. The office secretary will be kept up to date and The Enterprise Office at Bronte will have word of any change in the situation. If you need help in determining whether or not insects are causing damage in your cotton, notify the county agent's office and we will help you check your fields at an early date. We feel that this is an extremely important part of our work and if the situation really gets bad we will drop all other work in an effort to see that you get all of the help we can give you.

There are a number of poisons

on the market which are effective against bollworms. DDT is the principal killing agent for bollworms, but it should be used in combination with a variety of other poisons such as toxaphene, BHC, Dieldrin, Aldrin, or Endrin in order to prevent a build up of other insects. Generally the application of dusts should be at the rate of 10-15 lbs. per acre. Sprays should be applied at the rate of 1 1/3 to 2 qts. per acre.

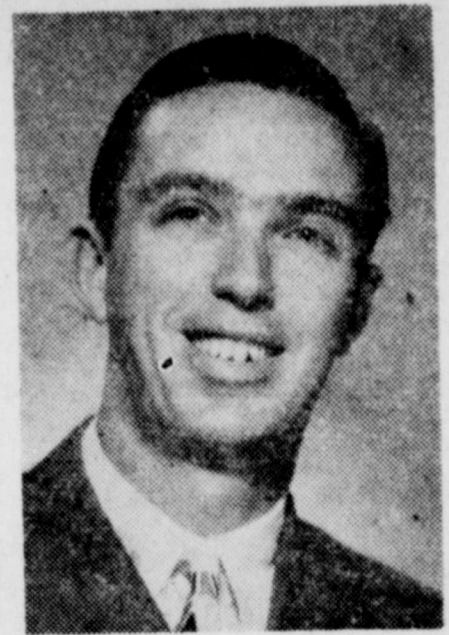

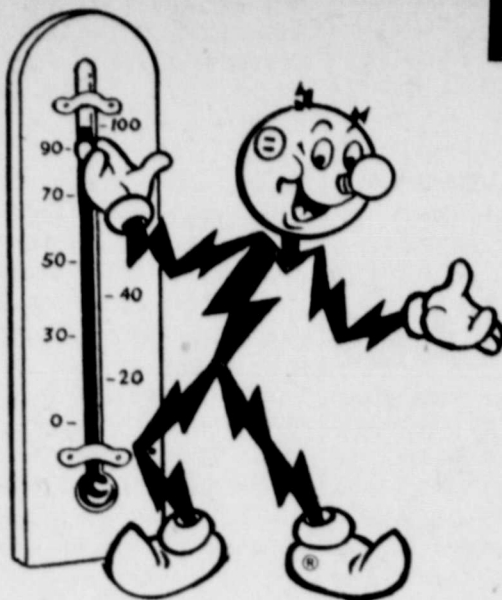

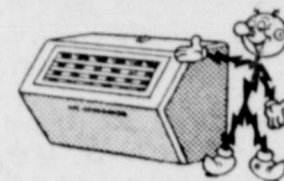
