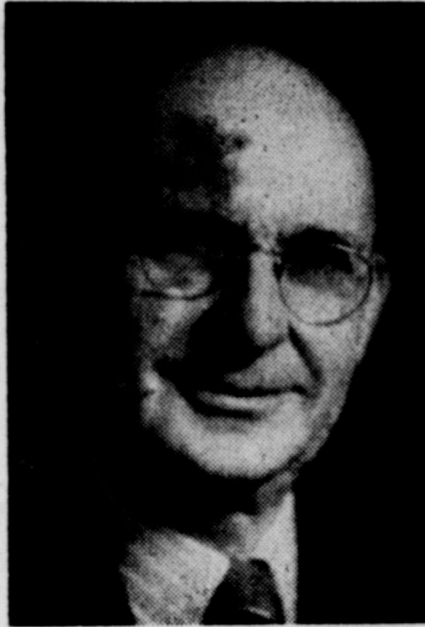

ship with a brother, Charlie Keeney.

Thomas Franklin Keeney was born to Mr. and Mrs. Tom Keeney on June 22, 1877 at Temple, Texas, being one of a family of six. He has a sister, Mrs. Gene Hoherd, of Temple, and four brothers, Leonard, Charlie and John Keeney of Bronte, and Curtis Keeney of Waco.

Mr. Keeney rode horse-back to Coke County, in 1901, taking a week to make the trip. Upon his arrival here, the town of Bronte consisted of a post office, hotel, a blacksmith shop, livery stable, and one grocery store. He settled near Valley-View, and started out to farm, but was not successful at that, so he moved to Bronte and went into the grocery business, where he met Mrs. Keeney, the former Eva Flood of Midland. She was a primary teacher in the Bronte school, and relates she has taught a Sunday School class at the First Baptist Church here, for at least fifty years.

They were united in marriage at the home of her parents, in Midland, on July 9, 1908.

In 1906, Frank and Charlie entered the general mercantile business at the old town of Bronte, some distance southwest of the present site.

When the town was moved to the present location with the coming of the railroad in 1906, the Keeney brothers packed up and moved right along with it. In fact, they sold some merchandise along the way while moving.

"Mr. Frank", as he is familiarly known in Bronte, was the funeral director here for 41 years, selling out to Bruce Clift in 1947.

The Keeney's have rendered fine service in Bronte on city affairs, school business, and have always been active in the work of the Baptist Church.

## Texas Borrows Sooner 'Giant'

(Reprinted from Roy P. Stewart's COUNTRY BOY column in Oklahoma City News.)

The movies giveth and the movies taketh away. Here they go to Arizona to shoot the movie "Oklahoma!" in stead of doing it in the area which furnished the locale of the story, and the natal place of the author of the original play, Lyn Rogers of Claremore.

Now a movie company is on location at Marfa, Texas, down in the Big Bend country, shooting Edna Ferber's novel, "Giant", a story as popular in the Lone Star State as the tune "Marching Through Georgia" is in an Atlanta tap room.

And what d'you know? In all that giant-size state with its giant-size talkers, the movie company couldn't find a giant-size bull to film as part of the "Giant" story. So the movie folk came to Oklahoma to get a bull, which puts a news twist on shooting the bull in Texas.

In the movie you will see Clear View Snuffy 76, a mammoth Bran-

gus bull owned by Raymond Pope of Vinita, he of the Clear View ranch, in the role of Kashmir, the giant Afrikander bull of "Giant." Snuffy only last winter was grand champion at the national Brangus show at San Antonio.

Raymond and Snuffy have been on location recently in the rugged Alpine-Marfa country with its leagues of grass-covered hills and mountains for a backdrop. Neither one has become movie-struck, and they ignore the fact "Giant" has become a bad word in Texas.

One reason for that, constant traveler Larry Wilcox tells us, is that "Giant" is drawn too true to life. Some Texans think the principal characters are clearly identified with some of their prominent people — often to their disadvantage.

It is quite evident to Texans the fabulous King Ranch of South Texas is used in the story. Tied to the narrative is the companion real life story of development by King Ranch of hybrids that resulted in the true breeding strain of Santa Gertrudis cattle, a Brahman Shorthorn, five generations cross.

The bull Kashmir, of Mrs. Ferber's story, could well have been Monkey, the huge Brahman who headed the line which eventually became Santa Gertrudis, and from whom all Gertrudis pedigrees now descend.

But before Monkey, King ranch also experimented with cross breeding from Afrikaans beasts developed to great size by Boers on the South Agrican veldt, and Brahmans from India. There could have been a bar on Monkey's escutcheon. That doesn't matter, so far as King Ranch and the Santa Gertrudis strain are concerned now. But either by design or accidently, it puts perhaps more of a nubbin of truth in "Giant" than most Texans will admit, on that story angle.

The pertinent point at the moment is that to shoot the movie, the masculine bovine start had to be imported from Oklahoma, which may make the Texans mad all over again. They shouldn't be, because the answer is quality, boys, just quality. While you've been shooting the bull we've been raising them.

**Many Reasons Why One Has Indigestion**

AUSTIN, July 21 — Some people react to the pressure of modern life like a stick of soft pine reacts to a wood rasp.

You probably recall days when an unexpected event, an accident of a brush with the boss, tied your stomach in a knot. You were suffering, the State Health Department says, from one of the more common forms of indigestion; nervous tension and excitement.

The stomach, the experts say, is largely controlled by the involuntary nervous system. You get keyed up, your stomach over-secreted and you feel the pain.

Actually, the Department points out, there are many directly traceable causes of indigestion. Lack of sleep and exercise, improper diet, and similar artificial conditions can bring it on.

You've heard the old saw about one man's meat being another man's poison? It's literally true. Even healthful and nutritious foods may rub you wrong. They contain organic acids which could upset the balance of your particular stomach.

Your favorite fruit may contain malic-acid, oxalic-acid, or citric acid. One or more of these may give you trouble, causing ungentlemanly or unlady-like belching.

Or the degree of ripeness of a fruit or vegetable may cause fermentation in the stomach bringing on unpleasant results.

Condiments or strongly flavored foods are other causes of indigestion. They often cause the stomach to secrete too much hydrochloric acid. In normal people the stomach neutralizes what it over-secreted, but people with ulcers suffer painful "indigestion."

Greasy foods are particularly troublesome to people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver diseases.

Tannic-acid can be found in three of the most commonly used hot drinks. And here's the last straw: Even water, if you drink lots of it, may start your stomach churning and pouring out its digestive juices.

In any case of indigestion, frequently taking baking soda to relieve it is a mistake, health men agree. The temporary relief may cause some sufferers to "play down" symptoms of a serious ailment, thereby causing him to prolong medical attention.

W. B. Middleton vs Fred Roe (Suit for Judgment and Damage.)

**MIDDLETON VS. ROE**  
W. B. (Dan) Middleton, well known rancher of the Hayrick

community, brought suit against Fred Roe, Robert Lee rancher and former banker, for alleged loss of cattle which were pastured on the Roe ranch in 1953.

The contract made in June of that year provided that Roe was to pasture 135 head of mixed cattle for Middleton. The contract price was \$3 per month for cows and calves and \$2 for dry cows.

In his petition filed in district court, plaintiff said he paid the pasture rent each month in advance through October and that Roe had agreed to "look after and salt the cattle." Roe cancelled the contract in November, stating he could get more money for his pasture.

When Middleton rounded up his cattle he alleged 30 head were missing. He claims Roe breached his contract by not looking after and taking proper care of the stock. He is seeking damages of \$2,220, the estimated value of the missing animals.

Middleton is represented by Upton, Upton, Baker & Griffis, while Dickey & Dickey of Robert Lee are attorneys for Mr. Roe.
