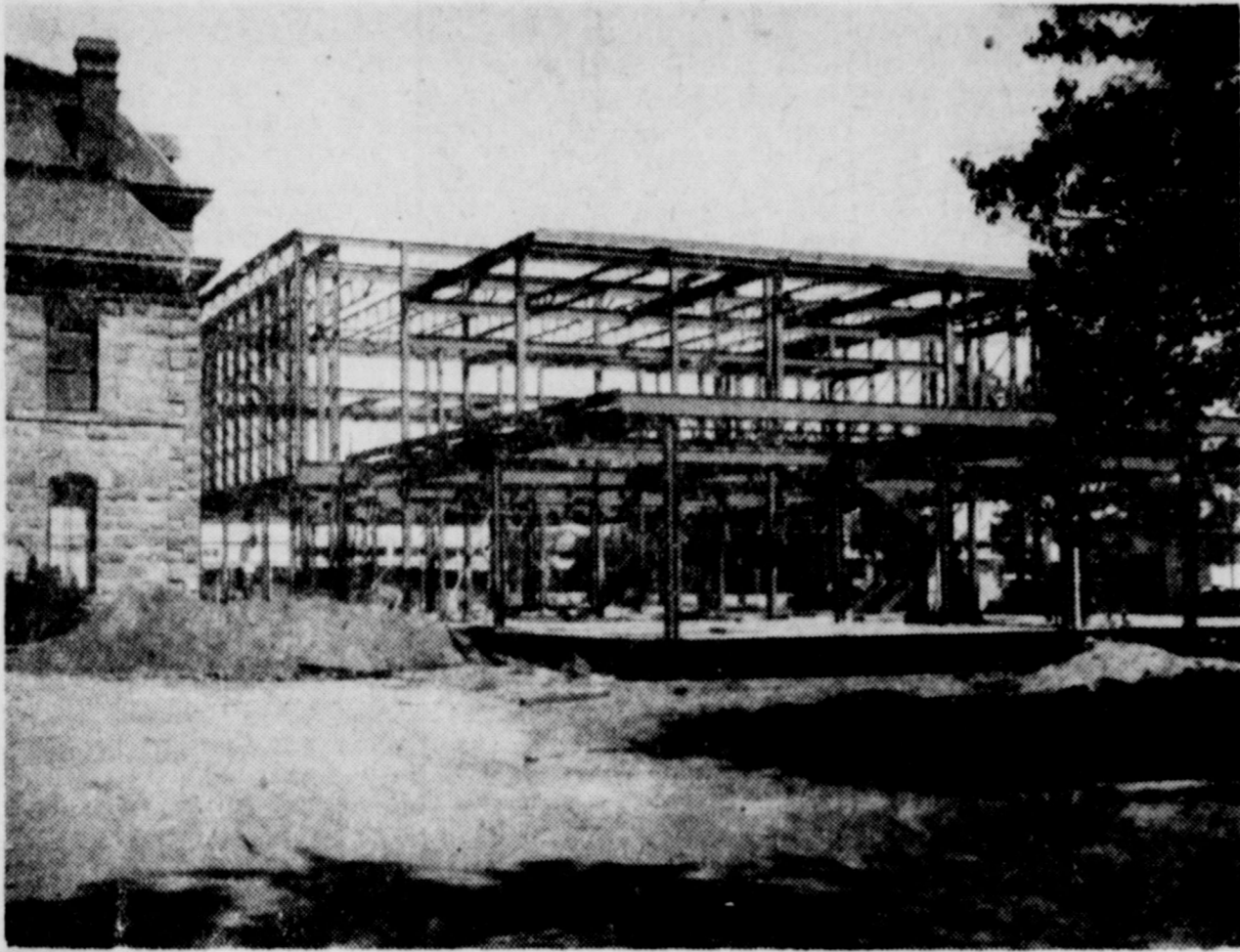

Bronte Ice Co. Installs New Refrigeration Units

Bronte Ice Co. has installed two large refrigerated display cases and got them in operation this week. One of the boxes will be used to hold dairy products, while the other will contain frozen foods.

The new units are 8 feet long by 2½ feet wide. Approximately 1 foot of depth is available for holding foods. The open top boxes have large storage spaces underneath the display racks.

W. W. Millikin, owner of the local foods firm, said that he believes the addition will greatly help shoppers who visit our store. "We will be able to display our merchandise to much better advantage," he said, "and I believe our customers will like the ease with which they can look over our frozen and dairy foods."

Burns Take Lives of J. B. Clark And Harold Sargent of Ranger

Ranger Man Dies After Auto Wreck Former Bronte Man Severely Burned Friday

Harold Sargent of Ranger died at midnight Wednesday from burns received in an auto wreck 4 miles south of Bronte. The accident occurred about 5:30 Wednesday afternoon.

Sargent was brought to the Bronte Hospital by a Clift ambulance after having been pulled from the burning wreckage by Tex Ward of Bronte and an Abilene man, who happened by the scene of the crash shortly after it happened.

Sargent had third degree burns over five-sixths of his body and also received a head injury.

Frank Keese, deputy sheriff, and Patrolman T. P. Jones investigated the wreck. They reported that Sargent must have gone to sleep and run off the road. His pickup knocked down several posts on the approach to a bridge, then hit the bridge abutment and plunged into the creek bed, where it burst into flames.

Sargent was still conscious when brought to the local hospital. He told attendants that he was part owner of the Pioneer Cementing Service Co. of Abilene. He had been to San Angelo to get a motor for a pickup.

Sargent's wife and one child reached his bedside Wednesday night about nine o'clock.

The body was taken to Moran early Thursday morning where funeral services will be conducted.

Word was received Wednesday evening that young Clark died from his injuries at 3:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Funeral services will be at the Tennyson Baptist Church today (Friday), with his pastor, the Rev. O. D. Odom of Gilmer, in charge. He will be assisted by the Rev. W. E. Chandler, pastor at Tennyson. Burial will be in Bronte cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Clark, who was 25 years old, was married, but had no children.

third degree burns over two-thirds of his body.

The crew had been cutting steel in the morning and the cooling process had begun and the men changed clothes to eat their lunch, when the explosion occurred. The hot steel sprayed J. B. and another worker. Clark was knocked out but not down and the other man, whose clothes were burned off, saw that Clark was on fire and saved him by cutting his clothes off. Goggles protected their eyes and the eyes suffered only minor damage.

Doctors said it will be months before he will be able to work.

It is planned that when he is released from the hospital, he and his wife, the former Martha McClure, will move either to Bronte or San Angelo until he is able to work again.

The family was called from Tennyson last Friday and all are still at his bedside. Reports said that he is conscious.

Tuna Fish Pie

- 1/2 cup sliced green peppers
- 2 slices of onion
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 6 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cheese Roll Crust

1/2 sup milk made into regular biscuit dough. Make this dough very short, almost as short as pie crust. Turn out on floured board and roll 1/2 inch thick. Sprinkle with grated cheese and chopped pimento. Roll like a jelly roll and cut into eight slices and place on top of the creamed mixture. Bake in oven about 30 minutes or until brown.

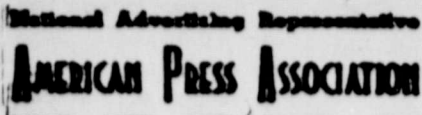

Press Group Passes Resolution Regarding Public Officials

(Editor's Note: The following resolution was passed at Colorado City last weekend by the West Texas Press/Texas Press Association after many editors complained that they were having difficulty in obtaining complete news coverage from their commissioners courts, city councils and school boards. Fortunately, here in Coke County, we have never been refused access to information regarding public funds and other matter by any of these bodies and hope we never will. Also, we are happy to report that Coke County's Commissioners publish a quarterly statement of county finances and the annual audit of the county's finances, as provided for by the laws of this state.)

Whereas, a number of West Texas newspapers have been experiencing difficulty in obtaining factual information concerning actions taken by some West Texas County Commissioners Courts, and many discrepancies of which the public should be completely informed have been brought to light at both this annual meeting here in Colorado City and at the Mid-Winter editorial clinic held in Big Spring.

And, whereas, now since the new four-year term amendment which was passed in the state by a small majority but was not popular in West Texas, seems to be influencing the decisions of public officials in some counties.

And, since proof that poor judgment and disregard for public opinion and the wishes of the people is being shown by some County Commissioners Courts in West Texas.

Now, therefore the West Texas Press Association in annual session at Colorado City urges all West Texas Press Association newspapers to put forth every effort possible to give complete coverage of all such matters and

WTPA encourages them to get any assistance necessary to accomplish this task.

And, we commend the Levelland Daily Sun News and the Andrews County News and other West Texas newspapers for their news papers for their news coverage and potent editorial comment which is arousing public interest in government at the county level.

The West Texas Press Association believes that Freedom of the Press is the Torch that lights the way, and if the press is to accomplish this, all newspapers must be diligent in covering the news and outspoken in their editorial columns.

Whereas the Texas Constitution does not now provide any method whereby the people of a county in Texas can force a commissioners court to re-district county precincts to provide more equal representation on said commissioners courts.

And, whereas, development of West Texas in recent decades has brought about many situations where the bulk of a county's population is within a single precinct.

And, whereas, there have been results in a majority of the people having minority representation in their county government.

And, whereas, there have been repeated cases where the commissioners representing a minority of the population have been able to defeat the will of the majority;

Therefore, we, the West Texas Press Association, believing that the democratic principles should be put into practice at all levels of government, go on record as favoring an amendment to the state constitution whereby the residents within a county could force commissioners to call an election on the proposition of re-drafting precinct lines to provide more equitable representation; and we call on all members of

WTPA to work for such legislation.

Whereas, the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association and the West Texas Association likewise lobbied vigorously to defeat a precinct redistricting bill in the last legislature; and

Whereas, these associations on other occasions have successfully brought pressure to bear in legislative matters to thwart the will of the people; and

Whereas, the county judges and commissioners themselves are elective servants of the people; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the West Texas Press Association go on record as opposing and questioning the propriety of the Texas and West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Associations functioning as a high pressure lobby in the legislature solely to serve their own selfish, individual aims; and that the secretary of this association be directed to reproduce copies of these resolutions to distribute to all counties commissioners courts in the 132 counties of the West Texas Press Association; to the other regional press associations of Texas; to the Texas Press Association, the Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association, and Texas Daily Newspaper Publishers Association.

Whereas public officials entrusted with collection and disbursement of public funds owe it to the taxpayers to make a full and complete accounting of such monies;

Whereas honesty in government is encouraged by such an "open book" policy.

BE IT RESOLVED that the people of Texas be encouraged to insist that all such public officials, including county, school and city officials, be required to publish an annual financial report, clearly revealing the financial activities of their departments; and that Texas legislators pledge themselves to pass legislation to this end.

Whereas the West Texas Press Association is aware of the efforts of State Representative Elbert Reeves in the enactment of adequate publication laws for the state of Texas, the organization tenders its appreciation and its unqualified support in this project to protect the interest of the public.
