The Longhorn coaching staff faces an extensive rebuilding program especially in the backfield. The big problem is who can fill the shoes of Arbie Phillips and Kenneth Scott, two exceptional backfielders who have graduated and earned athletic scholarships at San Angelo College.

fore coming to Bronte last year as assistant coach and head basketball coach. The new head coach was a star of the hardwoods at ACC. He earned a place on the All Texas Conference basketball team in 1951.

Superintendent of schools Garland Black, who was head coach last season, will serve as assistant coach to Dorsey. The Longhorns won 7 of 10 games last season under the tutelage of Black.

Strong Down the Middle

Perhaps the Longhorns will be stronger down the middle this year than in any other category. Billy Charles Wrinkle, 190 lbs., Joe Ramirez 185, Bobby Brock 175; Tommy Latham 185 and Tommy Bell 190 are the big five competing for tackle positions. Of these there are no seniors. Wrinkle, Ramirez and Brock are juniors, Latham is a sophomore and Bell is a freshman.

Bobby Hester 158, and Don Glenn 150, head the guard hopefuls. Doyle Rogers, a 185 lb. sophomore is inexperienced but comes from a long line of good footballers and is considered a gem for the future. Other guard aspirants are Gene Sherrod 145 and James Andrews 125.

Les Caperton 145 lb. senior, appears to be the top candidate for center. Backing him up are James Tidwell 140, Ronny Cole 143, and Ronny Robbins 105.

Problem at End

Prospects for the flanker positions are plentiful but lacking in experience. Bobby Webb, a senior and full of fight, is a top prospect for this position. Dean Black, 145 lb. freshman who is tall and fast, is also a possibility. Other candidates include Jerry Parker 130, S. J. Rose 110, Don Bagwell 145, Albert Grace 118, and Jimmy Brunson 148. The honor of starting the opening game at end is wide open and most of the above named pass grabbers are very much in the running.

Backfield Lacks Speed

The Longhorn secondary will be minus the speed and weight needed for an exceptional backfield this season. Pinky Gentry, 145 lb. senior, and Noel Scott, 165 lb. senior, are the only two regulars back for more ball carrying duty. Parson Johnny Smith 140 lb. senior, and starting end last season will try to convert to the backfield this year. Aubrey Denman, 140 lb. sophomore, Billy Tounget 147 lb. senior, Martin Lee, 145 lb. senior, and Jimmy Lee, 135 lb. junior round out the backfield prospects.

Tough Schedule

The athletic department has a light and ten game schedule that includes no soft touches. Six of the games will be played at home in Elbert Stephenson Memorial stadium. The field this year is in excellent condition and the playing turf is covered with grass.

Last Rites Held Last Friday for J. B. Clark, Jr.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday for J. B. Clark, Jr., 25, of Gilmer, who died Wednesday of last week of injuries received in an explosion Friday in a steel mill near Longview.

The services were held from the Tennyson Baptist church with his pastor the Rev. O. D. Odom of Gilmer officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. W. E. Chandler, pastor of the church, and the Rev. D. F. Pruitt of Santa Anna.

Clark had been cutting steel at the Lone Star Steel Plant near Longview and he and a companion had changed clothes to eat lunch. The cooling process was begun on the steel and it somehow exploded, spraying both men with the hot metal. They were rushed to Gregg Memorial Hospital at Longview, where he died the following Wednesday.

Clark was born Sept. 12, 1929, in Blackwell. He was a graduate of Bronte High School and was married to the former Miss Mrtha Ann McClure June 27, 1953 in San Angelo.

He entered the Army in 1950 and served in Korea with the 23rd Infantry regiment 13 months.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Clark, Sr. of Tennyson, his wife; two brothers, Bobby Clark of Monahans and Kenneth Clark of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Mae Tucker of Gilmer and Mrs. Mary Helen Garrett of San Angelo; and his grandmother, Mrs. Mary Clark of Bronte.

Warning Issued Against Hatch By Leafworms

It looks like at least a part of the county will have a large leafworm hatch by the end of the week. Leafworms have been building at a steady rate for about 3 weeks and in a good many fields they have ragged cotton up until about all of the leaf area left is needed. With a large hatch of eggs coming about Thursday or Friday, it looks like control measures will have to be used.

A farmer asked me the other day just how important the leaf was to the plant and how much he could afford to let the worm eat before attempting to control them. To my knowledge this can't be answered specifically, but all plant food is manufactured in the plant leaf. When you lose too much of the leaf area you can't expect the plant to go on and mature a heavy crop of bolls.

If some of the bolls are opening and no longer draining the plant, you can sometimes spare a lot of the leaf area because demands on the plant are not as heavy as they have been. Right now I would say that you should get ready to poison if you have lost 10% or more of the leaf area and if you have a new hatch just starting.

The life cycle of the leaf worm is very similar to that of the bollworm. A light tan miller lays the eggs usually on the under side of the leaf. They are usually blue green in color and flat, like a pancake, but may be white. They are just a little smaller than a pin head. The bollworm egg is about the same size but is round. The leafworm hatches in from 3 to 5 days under good conditions.

The small worm feeds on the under side of the leaf for several days before it starts eating completely through the leaf. This is a good time to find them and can be done easily by looking for the white or clear places on the leaves. After about two to three weeks the worms web up on the plant where they remain for about one week. They leave the web as a miller and the cycle starts again.

The leafworm can be controlled very readily with toxaphene.-D. D. T., Endrin, or Parathion. D. D. T. alone does not give control.

The spur, to be built by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway, will service the Texas Natu-

ral Gasoline Corp.'s new plant here. When completed the gasoline plant expects to ship 25 carloads a day. The plant draws gas from 200 wells.

The project was opposed by the Texas & Pacific Railway. This railroad has a railhead at Colorado City and said the new spur would cause it a loss of traffic.

At present Silver is serviced by truck at railheads at Colorado City and Bronte, where Santa Fe has a station.

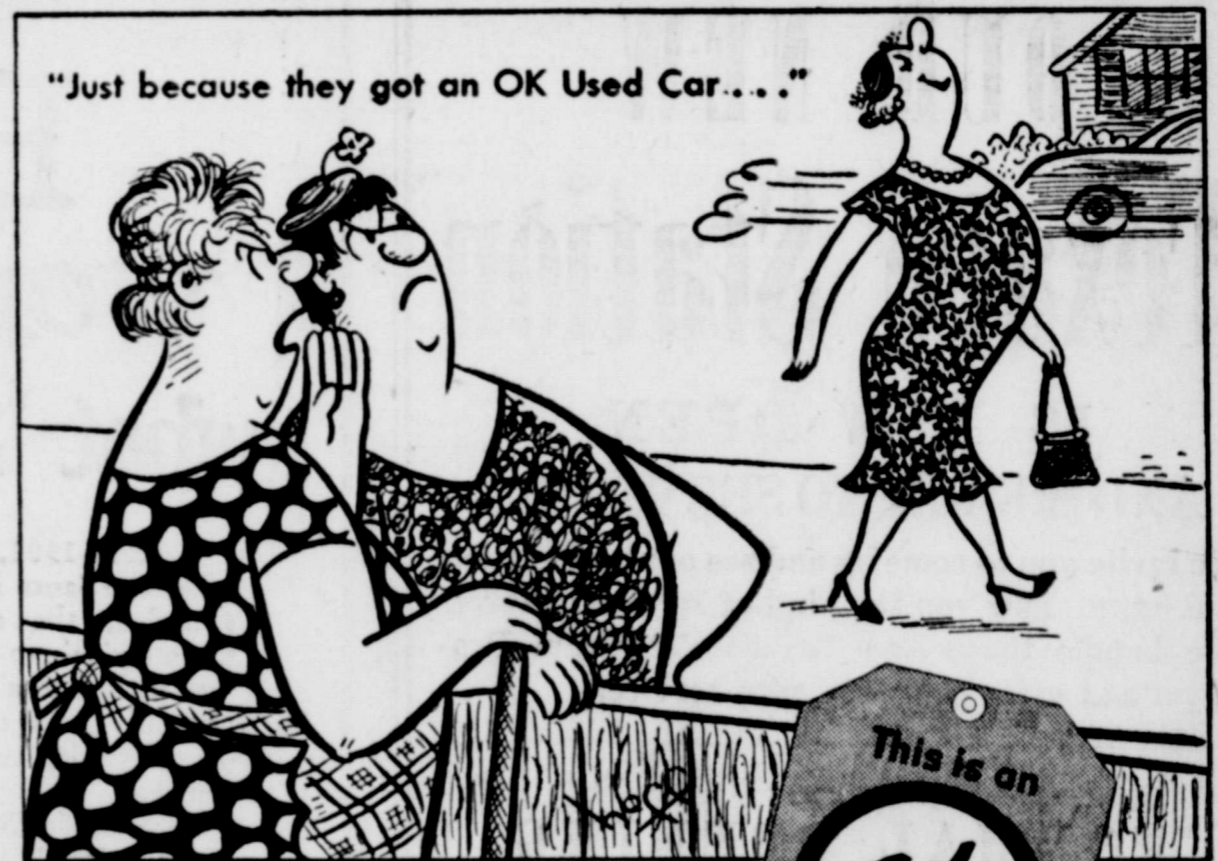
BROWNIE TROOP 2
