County Agent Jack Waide has an article in The Enterprise and Robert Lee Observer this week, which says in effect that Coke County needs another cash crop. We'd like to give Mr. Waide our endorsement on this matter. Seems to us that with drouth conditions as they are and have been, something needs to be done to bolster county economy.

Over in the Brookshire community quite a number of farmers have turned to dairying, and they tell us that they can make some money at it even though they have to buy all the feed which the cows consume. One farmer here in Bronte is also in the dairy business.

A fellow we know works for one of the larger dairies in Midland and he said that a large portion of the milk they sell is shipped into this section from Wisconsin and Minnesota in large refrigerator tank trucks. It would seem that an opportunity exists here.

Also read an article awhile back in the Dallas News which said that about 40 per cent of the broilers and fryers sold in the Dallas market are shipped in from as far away as western New York and Pennsylvania. If Texas producers could make the regular profit on this produce plus the transportation, they should do all right.

One West Texas ranchman we heard about was doing so well that he outgrew his local bank and took his roll with him and walked into a big bank in Dallas one hot August afternoon. He was waiting around to see one of the vice presidents and noticed that it sure was nice and cool in the Big D bank.

Bronte School Enrollment Increases Over Last Year

A total of 319 students had enrolled in the Bronte Schools early Thursday and the enrollment is expected to increase with more students expected to come in today and next week. 230 of the number registered in grammar school with 89 in High School.

Enrollment the first week of school last year was 306.

The 1954-55 term opened officially yesterday, September 1, with the buses making their runs and the lunchroom open. Students were dismissed at 2:30 yesterday but will stay until 3:30 today. There will be no school Monday, Labor Day, but will take up at the usual time on Tuesday.

First Parent Teachers Association meeting will be held Tuesday night, September 13. Vetal Flores is president of the group again this year.

Bronte's Longhorns open the 1955 football season here next Friday night in a non-conference affair with Richland Springs. The Richland Springs eleven defeated the locals 7 to 0 last year at Richland Springs. The Longhorns then play one game at Sweetwater, followed by three home games on successive weekends.

Holidays for Bronte Schools during this year are as follows:

Friday, Nov. 11, Armistice holiday.

Thursday and Friday, Nov. 24 and 25, Thanksgiving holidays.

December 21 — School will dismiss for Christmas holidays and will convene again on Jan. 2.

School will also be dismissed for the Coke County Livestock show in January, the San Angelo Stock Show in February; the Mid-Texas Teachers Association meeting in March.

March 29 and 30 — Thursday and Friday, Easter holidays.

If the schedule is followed, the school term will be over May 23.

Property Owners Meet and Discuss Flood Control Project

A group of interested property owners met at The Enterprise office Tuesday afternoon to discuss the possibilities of putting over the dam project on the Kickapoo Creeks.

The men present were of the opinion that the project can be put over at a fraction of the cost which was originally discussed at a meeting several weeks ago.

They were of the opinion that if the people of this area (the Kickapoo watershed) will get behind the project and let it be known that they want it, a way can be worked out to finance it without costing anybody too much.

Since The Enterprise has been working for this project since it first came up, we are running be-

low a ballot which we request you to fill out. You may either bring it by The Enterprise office where a ballot box will be provided or drop it in the mail to us.

There is a place on the ballot for persons to sign their names, but anyone who does not wish to sign may leave that space blank.

Purpose of this ballot is to try to determine if the property owners here are for or against the project.

As was pointed out at the meeting at the Methodist Church July 19, there are no set rules for determining the amount of cost to be borne locally. So many factors enter into the cost determination that it is virtually impossible to say that residents here will have to pay a specific amount of money to get the dams built.

The men in the meeting Tuesday afternoon, however, were of the opinion, considering the tremendous damage which was done to public property in the flood two years ago, that the federal government would bear a great deal more than fifty percent of the cost. The fifty percent figure was mentioned at the meeting in July as being an average cost that has to be borne locally on projects of this nature.

RED CROSS RAISES \$153 FOR FLOOD RELIEF

H. A. Springer and W. H. (Bud) Maxwell collected \$153.50 here this week for Red Cross flood relief in the eastern states.

The money was collected after the Red Cross sent out a plea for additional funds to use in repairing damage done and helping the victims.

Thousands were left homeless and a great number of persons lost their lives in the flood, which was termed worst in the nation's history.

I believe the proposed flood control project on the Kickapoo Creeks is practical and worthwhile and further study should be made of the cost.

**New Cash Crop
Is Great Need
In Coke County**

Shortly after I moved to Coke County as your County Agent, I asked a group of men representing all parts of the county to set up some committees for me to work with. The committees were to be used to plan a program which would be beneficial to the entire county. Several of these committees have met a number of times.

The field day held in the spring on wool preparation was the direct work of one of these committees. A survey on egg production earlier in the year was the result of work by still another committee. It is hoped that this approach to Extension work will assure first that your county agent spends his time on things which the majority of the people in the county feel is worth while, and also that by using the ideas of local farmers and ranchers that a solution to your problems can be found much faster.

This committee work will be intensified during the coming year. It is hoped that by November 1, we can present a well planned Extension program for Coke County which will represent the knowledge and experience of at least a majority of the ninety men who have been asked to serve on the various committees as well as the large number of women who participate through the work of the Home Demonstration Council.

One of the first things mentioned in recent meetings is a need for more liberal use of the local newspapers. You can expect to see articles in the local papers pretty regularly in the future. It is hard to evaluate the benefit of newspaper publicity to work of this kind. Please keep in mind that it is impossible to write a story which will be of interest to all of you each week. The subject of these stories will always be something timely and if you will check each story I will try to have something of interest to most of you most of the time.

One of the big things on my mind at this time is the need for a good cash crop for this county. Most people seem to feel that cotton fills the bill, but present forecasts a larger carry over than last year. This means that present acreage restrictions are not likely to be relaxed next year.

Milo has been used as a cash crop by many but reduced price support coupled with an increase in acreage and unusually high yields in other parts of the state will undoubtedly bring about milo prices which will be mighty close to our average cost of production. In addition to this the experiment stations have recently developed some hybrid grain sorghum varieties which are expected to increase yields by 30 to 40%.

Seed will be available in very limited quantities next year, but ample seed for everyone should be available by 1957. This would seem to help but actually our yields will be increased by less than 200 pounds per acre average and the increase may run as high as 1600 pounds on the plains. That should just about put us out.

Now I am not offering this as the solution to the problem, but only as a thought which might be worthy of your consideration. Atlas Sargo, red top cane and hegarl make fair yields in this county in average years. They also make excellent roughage in the form of silage or burl. Why not try roughage and buy the concentrates?

This wouldn't be a bad year to start in a small way just to see how you like it. Just a few head

which would not require a big investment in equipment could answer a lot of questions for you. It seems to me that there is a need in the county for this type of operation. Clarence Arrott of Bronte has been feeding lambs for number of years and will be more than happy to talk with anyone who is interested in lamb feeding. We at the office will be glad to help any way we can.

Actually, a lot of research is being done in an effort to develop new cash crops for Texas. We have every reason to expect new crops to eventually help, but not in the next 3 or 4 years.

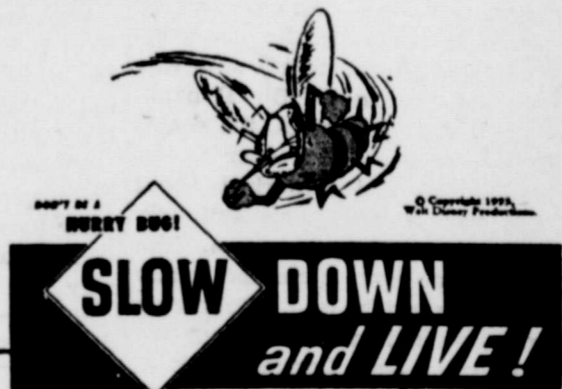

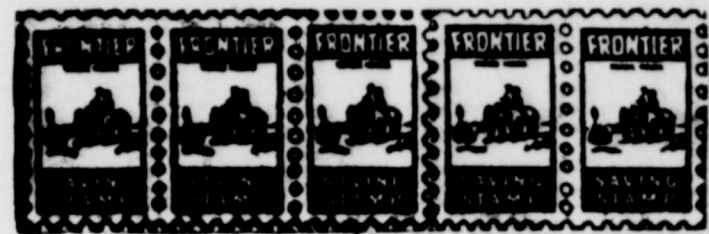

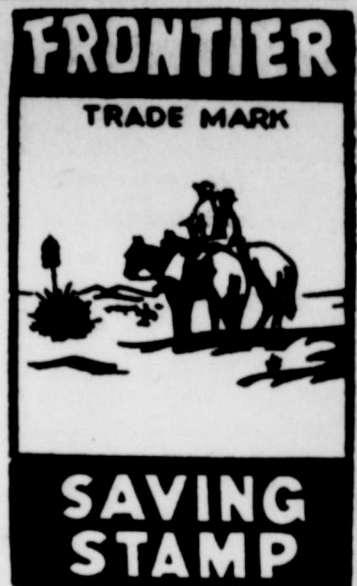

1 tsp. salt
1 cup finely chopped dried apricots
3/4 cup chopped nuts, if desired
Grease a loaf pan, 9x5x2 1/2. Mix thoroughly sugar, shortening, egg. Stir in milk, orange juice and rind. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and stir in. Blend in apricots and nuts. Pour into prepared pan. Let stand 20 minutes. Heat oven to 350 degrees (moderate). Bake about 70 minutes until toothpick thrust into center comes out clean.
