## I Killed, 3 Hurt in Wrecks Near Here Since Monday

The stretch of Highway 277 south of Bronte claimed another victim this week with the labor day death of William Curtis Bradley, 22, of Abilene.

Bradley, a resident of Abilene since 1953, was fatally injured about 10 a. m. Monday when his car overturned several times one mile south of Bronte on U. S. 277.

Investigating officers said that the accident occurred when Bradley tried to pass another car on a hill. He lost control of the car and was thrown about 30 feet and landed in the middle of the highway.

He was traveling alone. He was employed as a salesman of American National Insurance Co. He was born May 28, 1933, in Kentucky. He was a veteran of military service.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Paula, 3, and Susie, 3 months and his mother, Mrs. Estella Smyers of Circleville, Ohio.

Funeral services were held Wednesday in Abilene.

Two other wrecks happened in the Bronte vicinity Wednesday night. Two miles south of Tennyson Billy Joe Bowden of Hylton

and Harold Wayne Waggoner were injured when the 1953 Plymouth in which they were riding hit a bridge. The wreck occurred about 2 a. m. according to Sheriff Paul Good.

Waggoner is in the Bronte Hospital and Bowden was taken to a San Angelo hospital. Waggoner has a fractured skull and was in fair condition Thursday afternoon. Bowden had a fractured upper leg. His conditions Thursday afternoon was not known here.

Another accident occurred ten miles north of Bronte about midnight. Sheriff Good reported. A 1951 Pontiac turned over and its occupant, a man from Abilene whose name was not obtainable, suffered minor injuries. He was taken to a hospital in Abilene, the sheriff said.

## Blackwell Getting Oak Creek Water

Blackwell residents are now receiving Oak Creek Lake water. First water was received in the town September 1, after several days of testing the new lines.

The new distribution system has been completed and a 60,000 gallon tank was erected a few weeks ago. The tank will be filled from the Oak Creek Lake Sweetwater main reservoir, which is about seven miles south of Blackwell.

There are 120 meters connected to the new distribution system which will replace the Birdie Mote service, in use at Blackwell for several years. The Mote service was purchased and will be combined in the new system.

Blackwell residents have been working for some time on this adequate water supply. The town has been incorporated in order to make the system possible.

I know that every one likes an old fashioned egg custard. The other day Mrs. H. O. Whitt gave me this egg custard recipe all in a new dressed up version, so to speak. It is very quick and simple to make and certainly adds an unusual taste to it. So be sure to try this out.

### Egg Custard

Scald 3 cups of milk and add 1 cup of sugar. Beat 6 eggs lightly with a fork and add to the milk mixture.

1 teaspoon vanilla and a pinch of salt.

Caramelize 3/4 cups of sugar and pour in the bottom of baking dish and pour the uncooked custard on top and cook in a 350 degree oven for 1 hour.

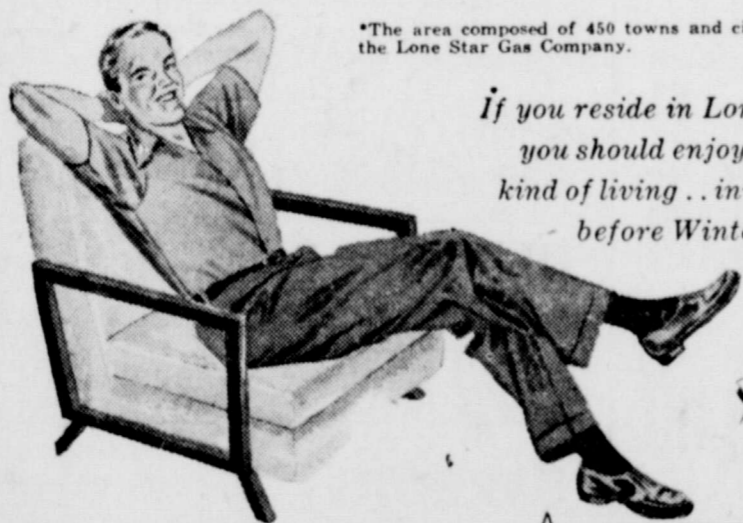

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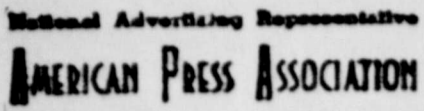

Policy on Under Age 1st Graders Outlined by Black

Supt. Garland Black asked that The Enterprise publish the following statement:

"Since there has been some question by parents relative to the enrollment of under-age children entering school for the first time in the Bronte Schools, it is deemed advisable to print the school law as it reads:

"The school trustees of any city or town or independent or common district shall admit to the benefits of the public schools any person over six and not over twenty-one years old at the beginning of the scholastic year. The scholastic year shall commence on the first day of September of each year and end on the thirty-first day of August thereafter."

"Enrollment in the 1st grade of the Bronte Schools this past week was thirty children. One of these was withdrawn by the parents because the birth certificate showed he was only five years of age on or before August 31.

"As Mr. Willard Goslin, president of George Peabody Teachers College said only recently, "I have never seen a community with a better school system than it wanted. A community can not want what it does not know about. There fore it is the duty of the superintendent to develop such a program of community participation that they will come to know and be willing to meet the needs of a good school system."

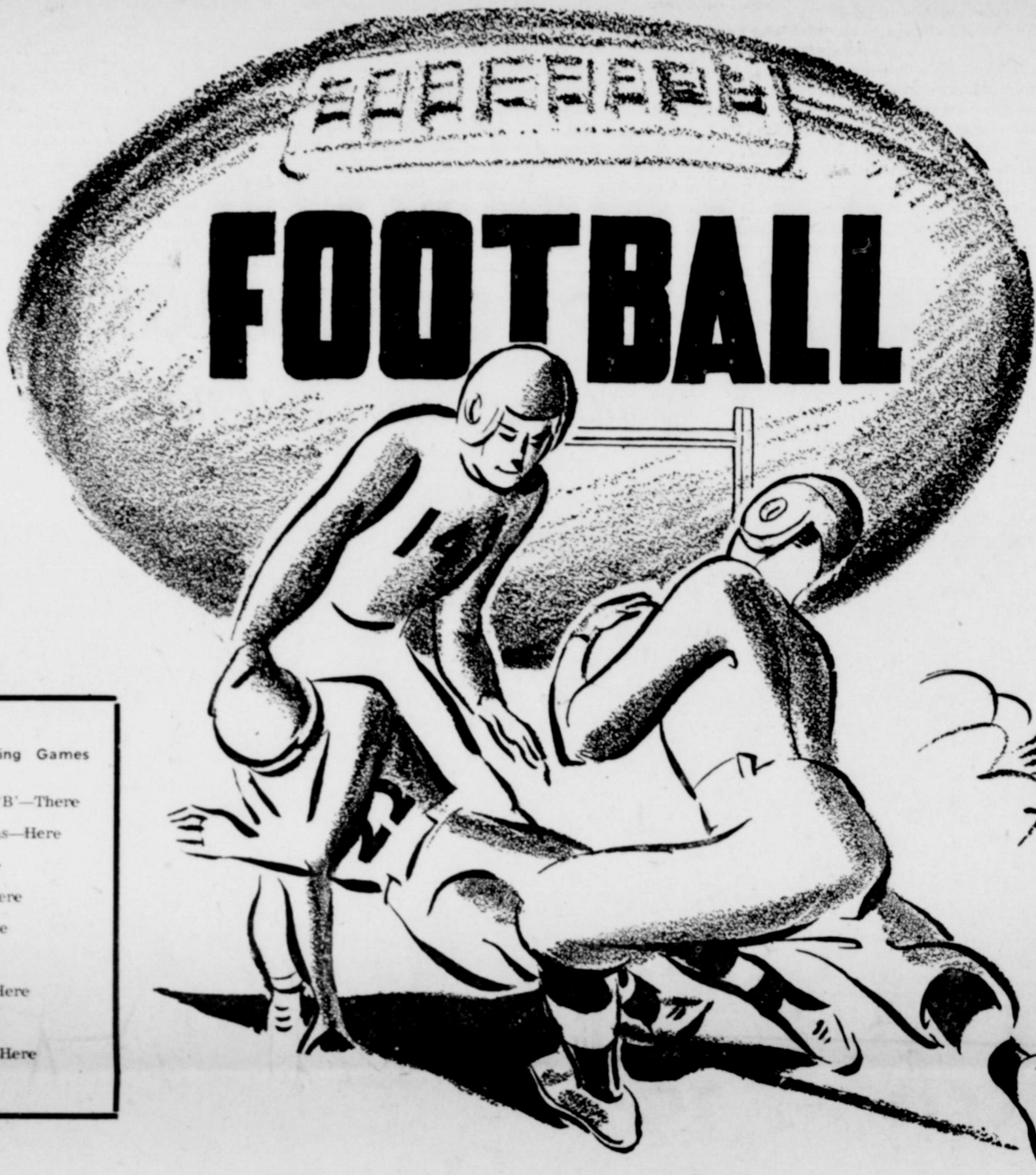

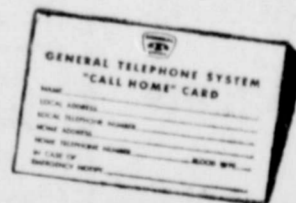
