Thunderbird Y-8 engines in Fairlane models develop 202 horsepower for Fordomatic drive, or 200 hp for overdrive or conventional drive. In the Customline and Mainline, Y-8 engines produce 176 hp for Fordomatic, or 173 hp for overdrive or conventional drive. The 137 hp Ford I-Block six also is available in all models with all transmission types.

Safety features offered for the first time by any automobile company, power equal to the Thunderbird, and lower body silhouettes are available in 1956 Ford cars which 6,800 Ford dealers place on display Friday, Sept. 23.

The new Fords will be built in four series offering 18 body styles—two more than in 1955. They are available in 13 solid exterior colors, or 21 two-tone combinations.

A "Thunderbird Y-8" engine leads the power selections available for 1956. It is installed on Fairlane and Station Wagon models, and develops 202 horsepower for Fordomatic, or 200 hp for overdrive or standard transmission. Customline and Mainline Fords offer a Y-8 engine developing 176 hp for Fordomatic, or 173 hp for overdrive or conventional drive. Also, the economical Ford six, increased to 137 hp, is available on models with all transmission types.

Ford safety research, coupled with studies of medical groups, led to development of a "lifeguard design" in 1956.

New door latches give added protection against the chance that doors may open under impact. They have been proved in full scale crash tests at Dearborn, Mich.

To keep the driver's chest from hitting the steering column in a crash, the new three-spoke Ford steering wheel has its center hub recessed 8 1/8 inches below the wheel rim.

Rear view mirrors have a special backing designed to prevent shattering.

Front and rear seat mountings have been strengthened so they will resist greater impact.

In addition, Ford offers two optional safety devices. Seat belts, designed to withstand pull up to 4,000 pounds, will help to hold occupants inside cars, and to prevent forward motion. Foam plastic padding for instrument panels and sun visors will help to absorb impact if a person is accidentally thrown forward.

Styling advances in the Ford for '56 include a new grille with oblong parking lights at the outer ends, set in frames which wrap around

Eleven persons were picked up by the Texas Highway patrol and local officers during the past weekend for speeding. Highway patrolmen were using radar equipped cars to check on the speeders.

Bruton did say, however, that he was proud of Bronte and Coke residents because none of the eleven persons picked up were from the county.

## Sweetwater Takes Win from Bronte

The Bronte Longhorns met their first defeat of the season last Saturday night as the Sweetwater "B" team swept to a 19-12 victory over the Bronte 11. The Longhorns now have a 1-1 record for the season, having defeated Richland Springs in their opener.

Although the Longhorns drew first blood, they saw a fighting bunch of Mustangs come charging back and put the game on ice in the final period. The Bronte team scored in the second and fourth periods, while Sweetwater scored in the second, third, and fourth quarters.

The first period with no scoring, saw Bronte holding the ball four-fifths of the time. The Longhorns received the opening kickoff, but was forced to punt after six plays. After losing a fumble, Sweetwater held the ball only once during the initial period.

After intercepting a pass on the Mustang 34 yard line, Sweetwater was forced to punt after failing to gain in three plays. The Longhorns took the punt on their own

## City Council Adopts \$32,877.36 Budget

Bronte city council adopted a \$32,877.36 budget at a budget hearing Tuesday night at the city hall. The estimate on receipts and expenditures covers the period from April 1, 1955 to March 31, 1956.

The budget is based on a \$1.00 tax rate with valuations in the city totaling \$1,009,229.00 in all departments except the water department. Budget for the water

department is based on the present water rates of \$4.00 minimum for the first 4,000 gallons and a 25 cent per thousand excess rate.

Total estimated income is \$39,517.10. This sum is to be derived from the following sources:

**General Sinking Fund**  
Cash on hand April 1, 1955, \$8,081.00; Receipts from taxes, \$9,750.00; miscellaneous items, \$500.00.

**Waterworks Fund**  
Cash on hand April 1, 1955, \$1,185.98; receipts from sale of water, \$20,000.00.

Estimated expenditures from the waterworks fund are as follows:

Bonds and notes, \$2,682.36; superintendent's salary, \$4,350.00; electric current, \$1,800.00; extra labor, \$1,500.00; meter boxes, \$250.00; meter repairs and new meters, \$1,000.00; pipes and fittings, \$1,750.00; automatic switch controls equipment, \$125.00; water payments to Sweetwater, \$1,500.00; UCRA pipeline payments, \$8,400.00.

Expenditures from the general and sinking funds are as follows:

Warrant No. 7, Issue of 1949, \$590.00; Warrant No. 3, Issue of 1953, \$1,140.00; Secretary's salary, \$2,200.00; city marshal's salary, \$1,875.00; administration, \$390.00; stationery and printing, \$275.00; maintenance (telephone, gas, electricity and insurance) \$550.00; street and alley work, \$2,000.00; upkeep of fire truck (gas and oil) \$350.00; general supplies

Total expenditures amount to \$32,877.36, leaving an estimated surplus of \$6,887.78.

I have a real good barbecued chicken recipe to bring to you this week. This is one of Mrs. C. E. Bruton's recipes. It can be reduced down to one chicken if preferred.

### Barbecued Chicken

3 chickens, 1½ lbs. each  
½ bottle Worcestershire sauce.  
1½ bottles tomato catsup  
½ lb. fat  
2 tablespoons butter  
3 buds garlic  
¼ cup beefsteak sauce.  
1 large onion, chopped fine.  
¼ cup vinegar  
¼ cup sugar  
dash pepper sauce

Cut chicken in half. Brown in the fat (use no flour). Mix all ingredients except onion and garlic. (Tie them up in a small cloth). Place chickens in roast pan. Pour

sauce over top. Bake in moderate oven until tender, about 1 hour. Baste frequently.

## Frontier Stew Has A New Type Topping

Here's a hearty beef stew — rich in flavor — much as that of the old frontier days when a hot meal was the best part of a long hard day.

Those Davy Crockett fans will go for Frontier Stew in a big way. So how about it? When it's chow-time at your house, why not greet your active family with this savory Frontier Stew and its extra special topping?

### INGREDIENTS:

¾ cup plus 1 tablespoon cooking fat  
Flour  
1 lb. stew beef cut in 1" cubes  
½ cup water  
1 No. 303 can tomatoes  
1 cup onion slices (halve large slices)  
1 cup carrot slices  
2 bay leaves  
2 teaspoons salt  
¼ teaspoon black pepper  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 cup uncooked white rice  
2 teaspoons salt  
2 cups water  
2 eggs  
1½ cups grated American cheese  
¼ teaspoon black pepper  
Dash of Tabasco sauce

METHOD: Melt the fat in a skillet. Thoroughly cover the beef with flour. Brown the beef in the fat. Blend one tablespoon of flour into the fat. Slowly stir in the water. Add the tomatoes, onion, carrots, bay leaves, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Mix well. Cover and cook over a low heat 1 hour or until the meat is tender. Add more water if a thinner mixture is desired. About 20 minutes before the beef is done, put the rice, salt and water in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes. Stir in the eggs, cheese, pepper and Tabasco sauce. Pour the beef-vegetable mixture into a greased shallow baking dish about 12"x7"x2". Arrange the hot rice mixture over the stew, leaving the center uncovered. Place the baking dish under the broiler and broil 15 minutes or until the rice mixture is heated through and slightly browned. Serve immediately.

This recipe makes 6 to 8 servings.

**More Power In '56 Ford Trucks**

Ford's 200 new 1956 truck models with greater engine performance and payload capacity go on display in 6,800 Ford dealers showrooms throughout the country Friday, September 23.

Two new models have been added to the Ford truck line — a T-750-tandem axle model in the heavy truck series, and a new, longer wheelbase pickup.

Gross vehicle weights extend from 5,000 pounds on the pickup to 42,000 pounds on the heavy duty tandem axle models.

For 1956, Ford's cab design introduces increased visibility of wrap around windshields and optional wraparound rear windows.

Introduced for the first time to the trucking industry are two standard safety features — a safety steering wheel and safety door latches. Seat belts are optional.

The safety steering wheel is designed with a rim three inches above the horn button to give the driver's chest added protection from the steering column in case of a crash.

Also a new safety door latch re-

duces the chance that doors will open in an accident, providing occupants added protection from being thrown out of the cab.

Tubeless tires, standard equipment this year, increase Ford truck economy. Larger payloads can be carried because tubeless tires and wheels weigh less, which is important to a trucker with as many as 10 tires on his truck. They reduce tire-change time up to 70 per cent.

Ford's short stroke, low friction engine design has been continued this year in eight engine combinations developed for more power, fuel savings and durability.

Horsepower has been increased in all engines, by 12.7 in the smallest 223 cu. in. six cylinder engine rated at 133 hp to 17.6 in the largest 332 cu. in. heavy duty Y-8 engine rated at 200 hp when equipped with a four barrel carburetor.

Another option is a thermostatic fan which adds power to heavy trucks by disengaging the engine fan at low operating temperatures. This provides up to 18 more usable horsepower at the clutch.

In addition to wraparound windshield design, styling advances include a new one-piece grille with integral head lamp hoods and

housings. The hooded 1956 roof extends ahead of the windshield, and acts as a partial sun visor.

In the customized cab, foam rubber cushioning five inches deep in the seat and three inches deep in the seat back contribute to driver comfort.

All Ford cabs are available in a choice of eight single colors or eight two-tone color combinations.

A standard 12 volt electrical system provides better ignition performance, higher generator output and faster cranking speeds.
