Land Owners of Zone 2 To Elect Representative

"The land owners of Zone 2 of the Coke County Soil Conservation District will meet in the Bronte City Hall, Tuesday, October 4, at 8 p. m. to elect a supervisor to represent them the next five years, according to W. C. Shamblin. All landowners, both men and women, should be present to vote, Shamblin said.

Zone 2 of the district includes the same area as covered by the county precinct No. 2.

"Landowners in Zone 2 as well as elsewhere should give some thought as to what will happen in the next five years," Shamblin said. "Many problems facing the landowners will need to be solved soon. Some very important problems facing landowners include water and its related influence upon mankind. Watershed protection and flood prevention on the Kickapoo Creek is another related water problem that will receive a lot of attention within the next year," Shamblin continued.

Marvin Simpson cooperating with the Coke County SCD is now installing about 50 acres of level border irrigation on his ranch 4 miles west of Robert Lee. The system was designed and laid out by the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. Other district cooperators planning to install level borders irrigation systems include Dee Smith, Fred L. Rae, Jr., Clark and Vernon Glenn plan to put additional land under irrigation this winter.

Bernard Petty has completed seeding 32 acres of cover crops. A mixture of oats, vetch and sweet clover was seeded to provide cover, protection and improve soil structure. The seeding of cover crops is a part of Pettys' complete coordinated soil, water and plant conservation plan being applied as a district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Methodists to Observe World Wide Communion

Starting next Sunday, Oct. 2, World-wide Communion Day, the local Methodist Church is beginning a definite emphasis on Prayer. This will run indefinitely and is preparation in part for the revival, December 4-11. The commission on Membership and Evangelism, of which Mrs. H. M. Longhorns Looked Good in Spite of Loss to Abilene "B"

The Bronte Longhorns met their second defeat this year as they went down at the hands of the Abilene "B" team. The local eleven now holds a 1-2 record, having won out over Richland and lost to the Sweetwater "B" team. Although the Longhorns were outclassed in the contest last Thursday night, they held the strong Abilene team to 18 points while they were scoring 12. Although it was rainy weather, a large crowd turned out to witness the game.

Bronte received the opening kickoff on their own 15 yard line and from there marched it to the 47 yard line where they were forced to punt. After taking the punt on their own 29 yard marker, Abilene drove to paydirt in seven plays. After moving the ball to the 47 yard line, Colvin broke loose for thirty-three yards to put the ball on the 13. On the next play, Diaz went through to score the first touchdown of the ball game. The try for extra point was blocked by Noel Scott to leave the score 6-0 at the end of the initial period.

Officials Hope New School Finished by Thanksgiving Day

Bronte's new elementary school building, containing new classrooms, cafeteria, administrative offices and a large auditorium should be completed in the near future. As on any building, the final stages of completion and finish carpenter work is slow, and there has also been some delay in acquiring the finish materials.

When finished this building will give Bronte school children one of the best buildings in this part of the state.

Facilities of this new building are to be many, including lavatories and water fountains in all the classrooms. Classroom coolers will not be electric but electric coolers are being placed in the halls.

Wooden stall lockers are also in classrooms for the students' books and possessions, also cloak lockers for their coats and hats.

Rooms are designed according to modernistic educational standards where each room receives natural light from two sides, enabling the children to have better light for better vision.

Primary grades have rest rooms located between the rooms. Rest rooms for the larger elementary children are centrally located.

LONGHORN T-SHIRTS

In general floors of the entire building are asphalt tile upon solid concrete with the exception of the kitchen which is inlaid hard tile. The kitchen will be modern in every detail.

The building will be heated by natural gas with centrally located units circulating the rooms.

The auditorium is probably the greatest asset to the community that could have been planned. Originally planned to seat 500 persons, it has been enlarged to seat 600 persons, during the work progress upon the building. Also changed in regard to the auditorium was having the building set up so that if needed at a later date it can be air conditioned simply by the addition of air conditioner units. This arrangement was also made in the cafeteria. These changes were made at a very nominal cost.

Supt. Garland Black, when asked when he thought school officials would get possession of the building said, "The contract of completion date is Oct. 2. And we have hopes of moving in during the Thanksgiving holidays. That is, of course, if the contractor is able to secure the remainder of the finish material for the building. In an overall appraisal, when the building is finished, Bronte should have a school plant that it will be proud of for years to come."

Farm Bureau Drive for New Members Oct. 3-8

Farm Bureau directors and officials met Tuesday night in Robert Lee to make plans for their membership campaign which gets underway next Monday, Oct. 3 and continues through Oct. 8. C. H. Devaney, District 6 director of the Texas Farm Bureau met with the group.

Since its inception in 1919, the Farm Bureau has been striving to obtain and maintain a higher standard of living on the farm and ranch. It has had many notable successes on both state and national levels. Altogether, the American Farm Bureau has been responsible for passage of more than 200 pieces of national legislation beneficial to agriculture. It has defeated many bills that would have been harmful to agriculture.

On the state level, the Texas Farm Bureau has also helped Texas agriculture through its legislative program. The state farm organization was responsible for the passage of the present rural road program. It has also been able to obtain and retain the tractor gas refund and many others.

As an individual, a farmer or rancher has no voice in helping run his industry. Joined together with his neighbors in a strong organization, his "voice" is magnified many times. The Farm Bureau offers the farmers and ranchers of Coke County the opportunity to solve the many and complex problems beyond the fence rows.

Hamburger Corn Pone Pie
1 lb. ground beef
1/3 cup chopped onion
1 tablespoon shortening
2 teasp. chilli powder
1 te a spoon worchestershire sauce
3/4 teaspoon salt.

1 cup canned tomatoes.
1 cup drained, cooked pinto beans.
1 cup cornbread batter.

Brown meat and chopped onion in melted shortening. Add seasonings and tomatoes. Cover and simmer over low heat 15 minutes, then add beans.

Pour meat mixture into a greased baking dish. Top with corn bread batter, spreading carefully with wet knife. Bake in hot oven, 425 degrees, for 20 minfites.

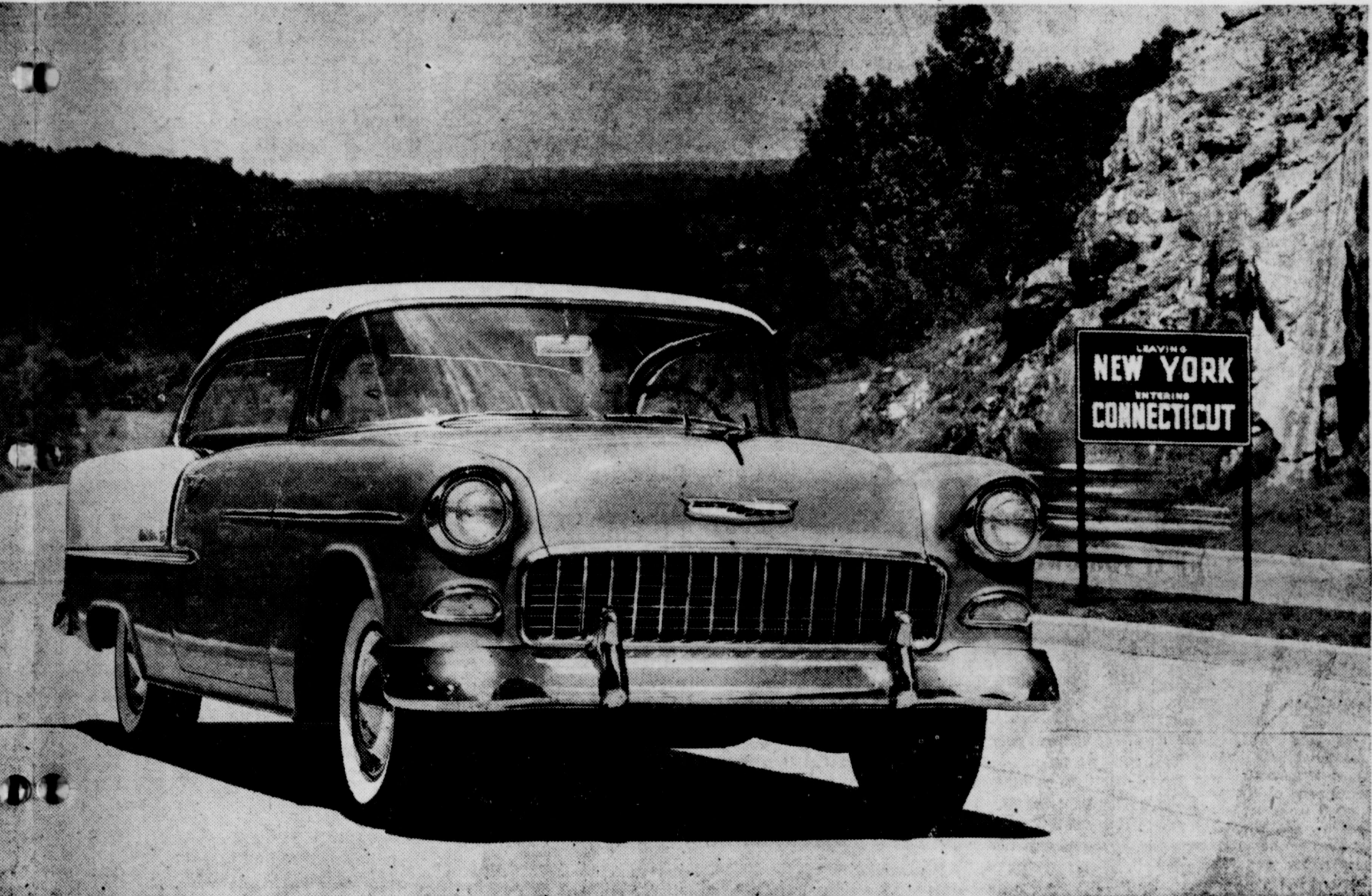

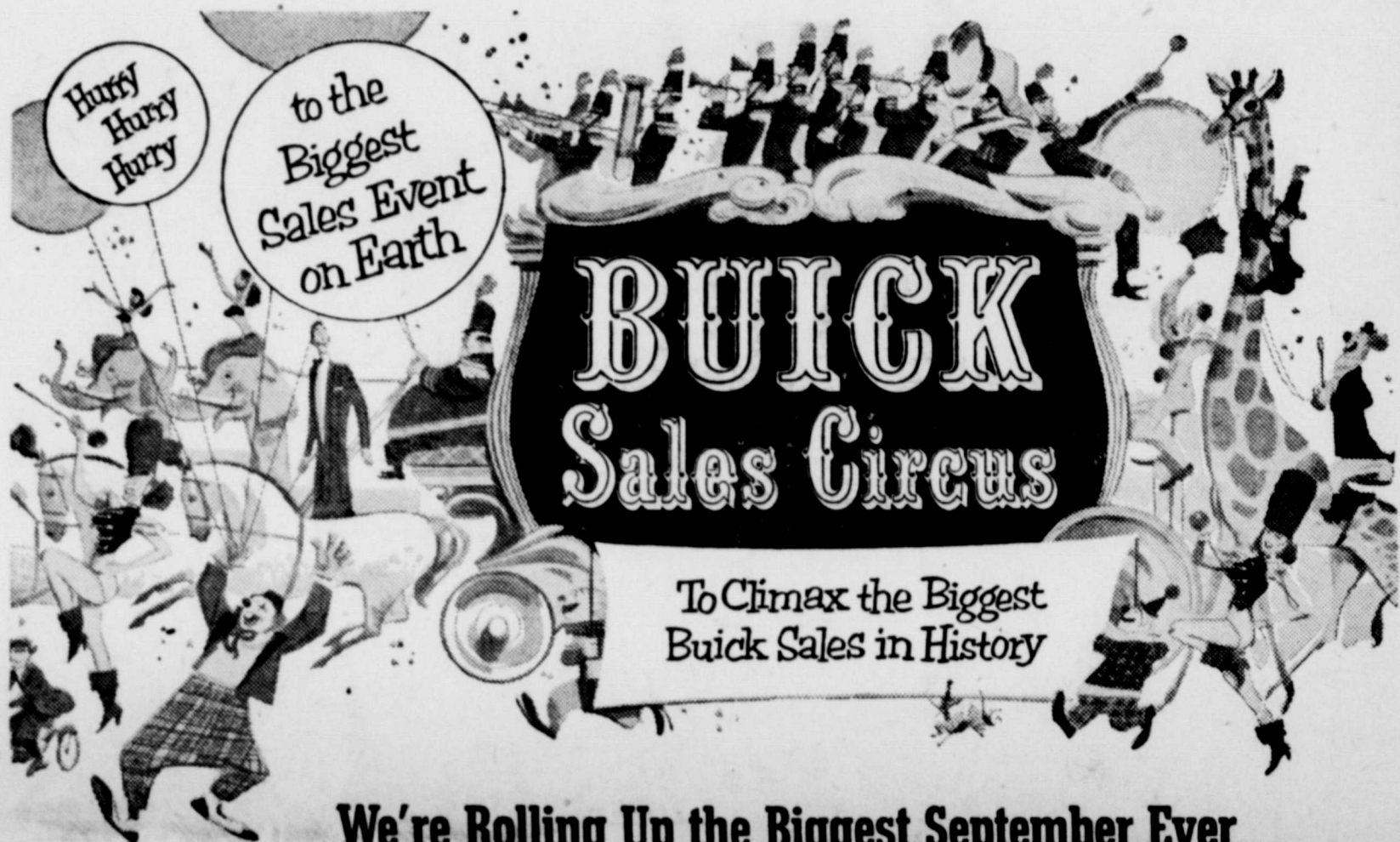

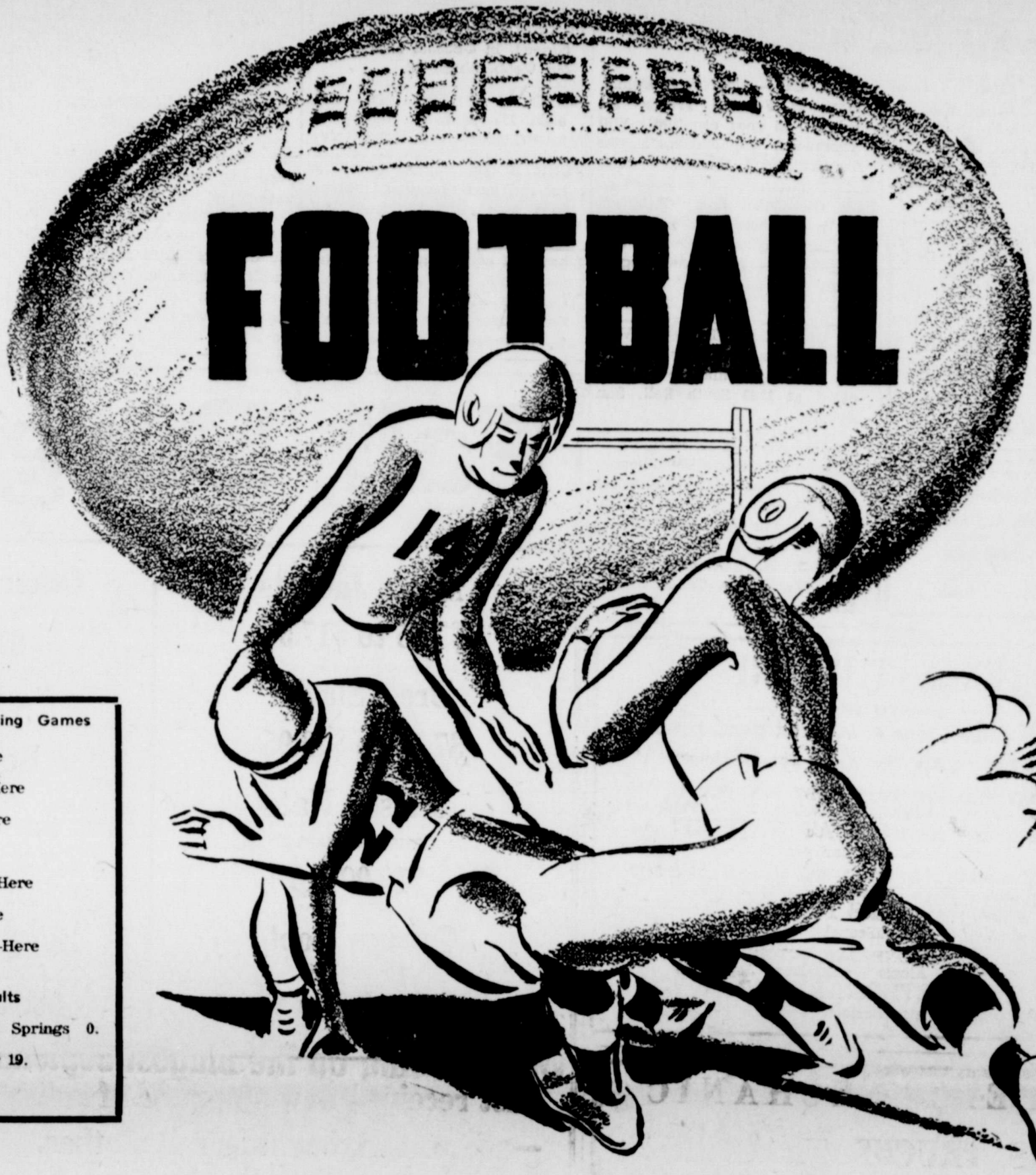
