

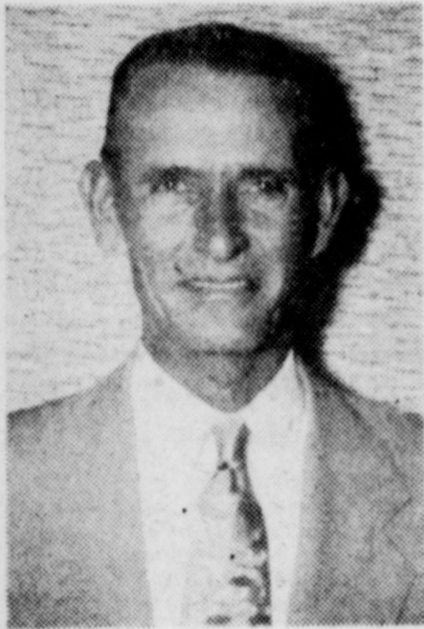

## Weldon Fikes Named Auditor; Tinkler Is New County Clerk



J. L. TINKLER, new County Clerk, had served as deputy sheriff under Paul Good since Jan. 12, 1951. In addition to other official duties he was in charge of tax assessing. His friends call him "Chilly."



WELDON FIKES, new Coke County Auditor, was elected County Clerk in 1950 and took over the office Jan. 1, 1951. He has been re-elected twice without opposition.

An important change took place among county officials this week when Weldon Fikes resigned as County and District Clerk to accept an appointment as County Auditor.

Deputy Sheriff J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler was appointed to succeed Mr. Fikes as County Clerk. The appointments became effective Thursday of this week when official bonds were approved and both men took over their new duties.

Coke County has not had an auditor in the past, but a new state law provides that a county with more than \$15,000,000 assessed valuation or with a population of 35,000 must have an auditor. Coke's valuation is nearly 30 million.

The law also specifies that county auditors are to be appointed by the district judge for two-year terms. Judge Joe L. Mays selected Mr. Fikes from among several likely applicants. The appointment also had the approval of the Commissioners Court and the salary was fixed at \$5,400 per year, the same as the clerk's office pays.

Mr. Fikes will start from scratch in setting up his new office with its system of records pertaining to county finances. He expects to have everything running smoothly to start out the first of 1956.

Mr. Tinkler's appointment was made by the Commissioners Court which held a brief session Tuesday in a room at Coke County Memorial Hospital where Judge Jeff Dean is a patient. All members of the court were present.

After the Fikes resignation had been accepted, Commissioner Howard Brock of Bronte nominated W. D. (Pete) McDonald for clerk. His motion did not receive a second and died. Commissioner J. W. Service of Robert Lee then put up the name of Mrs. Frank (Golda) Smith. There was no second. Commissioner Ed Hickman of Edith then nominated Mr. Tinkler. He received the appointment upon aye votes from Hickman, Service and Claude Ditmore of Precinct 4. Brock did not vote.

Mr. Tinkler was receiving \$275 a month salary and \$30 monthly auto expense as deputy sheriff. He will get \$5400 a year as clerk. He plans to retain Mrs. Barton Waldrop and Mrs. Bill Havins as deputies in the office.

## Boy Scout Fund Drive Opens Tuesday with Kickoff Breakfast

The Boy Scout movement in Concho will need \$83,000 to maintain its present facilities and take care of anticipated expansion in 1956. That statement was made by D. K. Glenn, finance chairman for this area.

All over the state, except in United Fund and Community Chest areas, the Boy Scouts are conducting an intensive one-day drive for funds on Tuesday, October 25. The drive will start with a Kickoff Breakfast at the First Baptist Church here, at 7 a. m. that day. All volunteer workers are urged to attend.

"Last year 50 local youngsters enjoyed the adventure and benefits of Scouting. We are looking forward to a record year in 1956" Glenn added.

"We want to be able to offer Scouting to any boy desiring to join the movement next year. In order to do this, we must help the local scout executives and the churches and organizations sponsoring units. It is good to always

remember that these youngsters learning physical fitness, skill, self reliance and respect for others will someday be grown up Texans. And these youngsters in the Scouting movement are from all races, religions and economic backgrounds" Glenn said.

A portion of the funds from the \$83,000 drive will go towards maintaining Camp Sol Meyer, Camp Louis Farr and Camp Fawcett, where hundreds of area youngsters spend summers getting the thrills of their lives. Last summer more than 39 camper weeks were spent there by Bronte Boy Scouts.

The camps are well developed and have facilities to take care of most outdoor activities. At the camp, youngsters can enjoy swimming, boating, canoeing, handcraft and camping, all under the guidance of experts and their scoutmasters. Present plans call for each scout to spend at least 10 days camping next year.

Other funds will be used to supply things that no boy, leader, or institution can supply. The money will help maintain the basic Scout program, training for leaders, program material, a service station for supplies and records, advancement standards and awards, and professional leadership and guidance.

All who will help with the Scout drive for funds are urged to be present for the Kickoff breakfast next Tuesday.

### "Winter Special Dish"

1 10½-ounce can tomatoes with green chillies.

Heat these together until boiling.

Line the bottom of a casserole with fritoes (15 cent package). Cut a large onion and sprinkle over this. Put the chili mixture on this and heat thoroughly in the oven. Cheese may be added which adds to the taste. This makes a very good dish to eat with beans.

Head of the Bronte Homemaking Department is Mrs. Royce Fancher who has begun her 10th year of teaching in the local school. Back in 1931 when the little brown haired girl started in the first grade at Bronte, little did anyone think that she would soon be teaching in the same school.

Billie Jean Duncan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Duncan, graduated from Bronte High School and went to Denton where she attended Texas State College for Women and received her B. S. Degree.

While she was home from college for the Christmas holidays in 1946, the Bronte superintendent, Jeff Dean, now Coke County Judge, ask her if she would be interested in finishing out the term of the homemaking teacher, who had resigned. This she decided to do and has been a member of the faculty since that time.

She was married in August, 1947 to Royce Fancher, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Fancher, who had been her classmate through the Bronte School.

Mrs. Fancher teaches three classes daily with an enrollment of 13 freshmen, 10 sophomores and

four seniors. One semester is given to the study of clothing and the next semester the girls study hom-making.

A number of phases of work are included in these courses including care and guidance of children, family and social relations, health, society, home care of the sick, home improvement, home management, personal care and improvement, food planning and many others.

The Home Making kitchen is equipped with two Frigidaire Electric ranges and a Florence gas range. For the sewing department, the school board recently purchased four new Elna sewing machines. The department was already equipped with 5 treadle and one electric Singer machine.

When the new elementary building is finished the Home Economics Department will move into what are now first and second grade rooms. Tentative plans call for 2 complete U shaped kitchens, a small dining area and a small living room. The sewing room will take up the entire room now occupied by the first grade.

## Supt. Black Notes Teacher Shortage In Texas Schools

Supt. Garland Black attended the Regional Superintendents meeting recently at Sitton's Cafeteria in San Angelo. This region includes 10 counties in this area and the meetings are held semi annually.

Purpose of the meeting is to try to improve instruction in the Texas Public Schools. It is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency and Texas Administrators.

Last year, each school participating made a general survey of instruction and courses offered by these schools. This program was set up as a four year program and beginning this year, each school expects to take one of the various weaknesses and see what can be done to improve it.

The outstanding weakness, found in all schools was the problem of new teachers and the lack of students training to become teachers.

The school administrators discussed the need for new, young teachers in future years. The new teachers will be urgently needed to take care of the expected increase in scholastics in most of the schools. Figures in connection with this need for new teachers were studied by the school men.

A total of 38,000 new teachers will be necessary in the State of Texas within the next five years, and 76,000 new teachers will be needed in this state in the next ten years.

These teachers will be needed to take care of enrollment increases and to replace present teachers who either retire or leave the profession.

In the United States, a total of 2,005,539 new teachers will be necessary by the end of 1965, ten years hence and 1,047,419 of that number will be urgently needed in the next five years.

School officials discussed the fact that this problem is being made even more difficult since fewer young persons are training for the teaching profession each year.

Ranchers in Coke County Soil Conservation District are invited to attend a Range Tour at C. N. Webb's ranch Thursday, Oct. 27, at 1:30 p.m. The ranch is located 7 miles northeast of Hylton. The group will meet at Mr. Webb's west gate and observe range grasses growing that made this country the famous livestock country that our forefathers found when they trailed cattle in this country in the 1880's.

On this tour ranchers will be able to see Side Oats Grama, Little Bluestem, Sand Bluestem, Green Sprangletop, Meadow and Tall Dropseed from knee to belt high, A. V. Sheppard, local conservationist, said. "When ranchers are growing the above listed grasses, they are making maximum use of the rainfall that they receive. Such grasses growing on the soils we operate controls erosion during rainfall," Sheppard pointed out.

"Following a 2 to 3 inch rain about three weeks ago the runoff flowing down the creek was running clear," Webb said. "It has been a long time since I saw water flowing down a creek that was not carrying a heavy load of silt," Webb continued. "Clear runoff water has never caused any damage," he said.

The best route to travel is to go to the signal light at the intersection on the Wingate and Abilene highway. Turn left and follow the signs. The road will be marker from there on to the Webb Ranch.

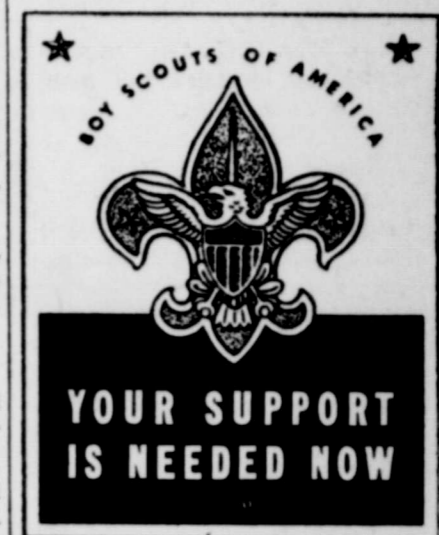
