#### Person Who Hit River Bridge Sought by State Highway Department

Hollis Stevens, who is in charge of the Texas Highway Department here, said Wednesday that the department is trying to find the driver of the truck which hit the bridge on Highway 277 at the Colorado River. The accident occurred sometime about noon on Tuesday, Oct. 25.

Damage to the structure was heavy and it was not reported by the driver, Stevens said. He emphasized that not reporting such an accident is extremely dangerous and said that if a heavily loaded truck had come along before the damage was discovered, the entire bridge probably would have collapsed.

Anyone having any information as to the identity of the driver is requested to report it to the Highway Department here or at Ballinger.

Repairs on the bridge are being made now.

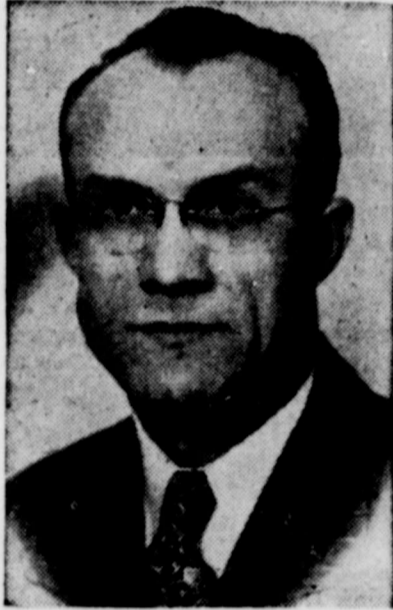

At present he is serving as clerk of the Association and is a member of the Executive Board of District 16.

Rogers came to Bronte from Edinburg in December, 1952.

Rev. Rogers, Mrs. Rogers and their daughters, Faith, Grace and Joy have been active in church, school and civic affairs while living here. Faith, who is a member of the senior class and who is employed at the local bank, will remain here until school is out. The rest of the family will move to Miles as soon as Rev. Rogers is released from the local hospital. He was admitted Tuesday for medical treatment.

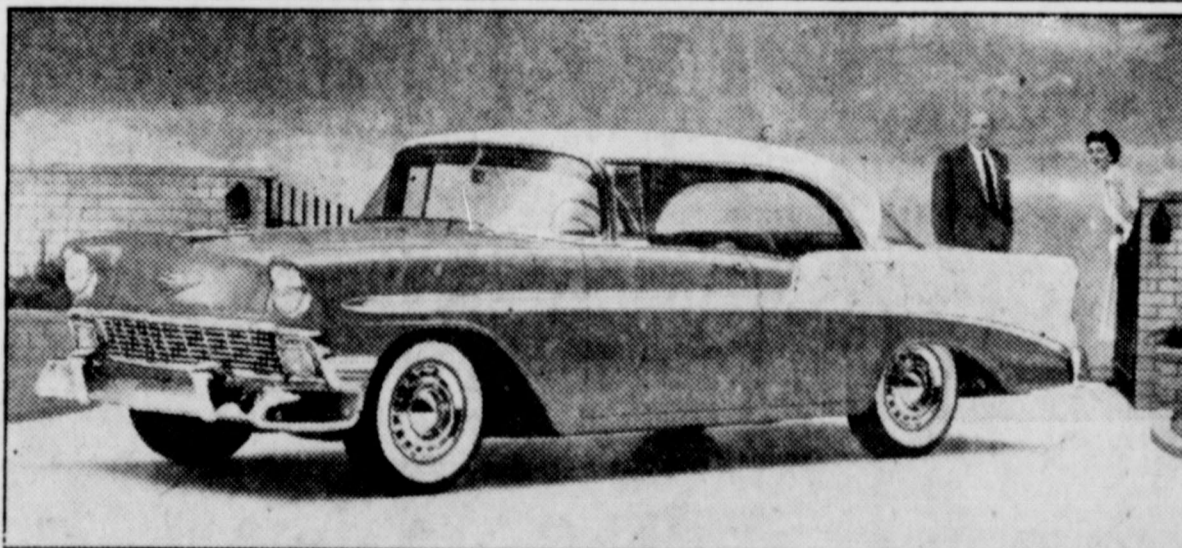
