Local schools will be dismissed Wednesday, Nov. 23 for the holiday and will resume classes on Monday morning.

He and his wife, the former Jean Wroten of Abilene, have two sons, David, 4, and Don, 1. They are active members of the Methodist church.

Rankin Red Devils will oppose the winner of District 6-B in the bi-district game. They are winners of District 5-B and have a season record of 6 victories and 4 defeats.

In the event the game tonight should cause a first place tie, a committee from the conference presumably would select the team to represent the conference.

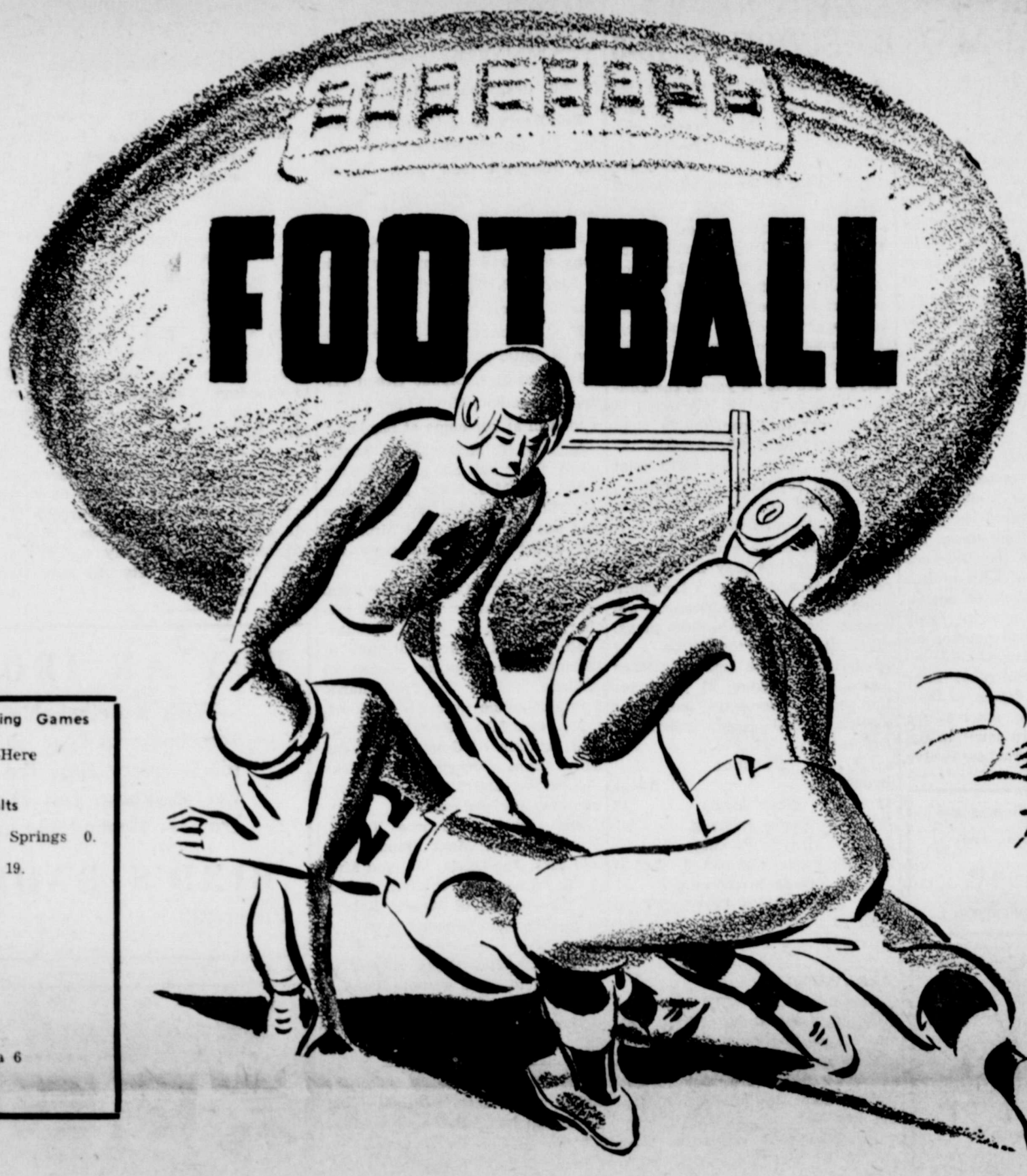
