Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday from the Bronte Methodist Church, with the Rev. W. C. Craig, pastor, and Rev. M. R. Rogers, pastor of the Miles Baptist Church and former pastor here, in charge.

Interment followed in the Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

The couple has one daughter, Betty Jo Glenn, of Austin, Texas. He served in World War I, 13 months in France with the 33rd Engineers.

Surviving are his wife and daughter, two brothers, James Glenn of Winters and Herman Glenn of Crane and three sisters, Mrs. F. G. Guittard, Waco, Mrs. Carrie Williams and Mrs. J. T. Gray, both of Abilene, and a number of nieces and nephews.

## Ellenburger Oil Recovered at Wildcat Test North Bronte

An Ellenburger discovery has been indicated in Coke County 2½ miles southwest of Ft. Chadbourne.

The indicated strike, Jake L. Hamon of Dallas and Wes-Tex Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, in 351-JA-H&TC, unloaded oil on a drillstem test between 6,345-55 feet.

On the two-hour test, gas surfaced in seven minutes. When 11 stands of drillpipe had been pulled, the project started unloading.

All district teams were represented on the honorable mention list. Bronte players named were guard Bobby Hester, back Johnny Smith, fullback Bill Wrinkle and center Leslie Caperton.

Robert Lee placed guard Sam Skipworth, while Hermleigh put on Jack Roemisch, a back, guard Leonard Groves, tackle T. J. Hillis, and Loraine added back Rop Epperson, fullback Bill Blair and guard Charles Reed. Trent's only mention was back Jerry Horton.

The Longhorns wound up the season in a three-way tie for the championship with Hermleigh and Robert Lee. Robert Lee won the honor of representing the district and was scheduled to meet Rankin Red Devils last night at Rankin for bi-district.

## FIRE DESTROYS MORROW HOME

The ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Morrow was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday night. The Morrrows were not at home at the time of the blaze. The first was reported at 11 o'clock by Lyndon Waldrop and Marion McCutchen who spotted it from Highway 277. The house was located 7 miles northeast of Bronte, about 1½ miles off the highway.

Waldrop and McCutchen were driving along the highway, saw the fire and turned off to investigate it. When they saw what it was, they went to the home of Jacob Bruce Morrow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morrow, who lives a half mile or so from the house. He was already asleep and did not know the house was afire. He called the Bronte Fire Department.

Fire Chief Billy Gene Thomas said that the house had already collapsed when the firemen arrived. Their efforts were successful in trying to keep the fire from spreading to other buildings.

It is surmised that the fire was started from the gas heating system or the hot water heater. Mr. and Mrs. Morrow had been visiting in Corpus Christi for about a week.

The two-story eight-room structure was somewhat of a landmark in this area. It originally belonged to Mrs. Morrow's father, William Clift. Mr. Clift's carpenter to build the house was Mr. Morrow's father, Lewis Morrow. It had been the family home since it was constructed in 1906.

Our cooking is always quite different for the winter months and this week I am going to bring you a very good cold weather cake. It is a recipe of Mrs. D. K. Glenn and she has been using it since her school days, as this was in one of her school cook books. It is an old fashioned —

### Apple Sauce Cake

2 cups sugar  
1 cup butter  
1 cup nuts  
1 cup raisins  
2 cups cold unsweetened apple sauce  
4 cups flour  
2 teaspoons soda  
2 teaspoons cinnamon  
1 teaspoon cloves

Cream butter and add sugar gradually. Add soda to the apple sauce and add to sugar mixture. Last add the dry ingredients and bake in a greased and floured pan, 350 degrees for 1½ hours, or until done. Mrs. Glenn says you may add candied fruits and dates to this if you would like to dress it up a little.
