Cotton Acreage In Coke County Gets 1956 Cut

Coke County cotton farmers this week received notices of their individual share of the 7,659 acres allotted to the county for 1956.

Along with the notice of allotments, the ASC office also announced the marketing quota referendum on the 1956 crop would be held next Tuesday, Dec. 13.

Coke's cotton acreage for next year was cut to 7,659 from a total of 8,236 in 1955. The reduction has affected all West Texas counties.

J. E. Quisenberry, secretary of the ASC office here, says the Coke list of eligible cotton farmers is now 233, a decrease of more than 20 per cent. Most of the farms considered ineligible to participate in the cotton program have failed to file a cotton history.

It is also pointed out that effective in the future 15 acres will be considered as the minimum cotton allotment, in case that many acres has been planted during the last three years.

New Wing to Be Built on Hospital

Dr. John R. Harris announced this week that work will begin this week on a new wing of the Bronte Hospital. The wing will be built on the east side of the present building, making it E-shaped.

Dr. Harris said that the new addition will consist of six or seven

patient rooms, a new operating room, nurses and employees lounge and laundry. It will be completely air conditioned. The patient rooms will have new furniture, the operating room will have a new autoclave and will be tiled throughout.

The addition will bring the total number of beds in the local hospital to 21. In an emergency, Dr. Harris said, the number can be increased to 25.

Roy Taylor of Robert Lee has the contract to build the addition. He was scheduled to begin work this week. Dr. Harris said that new employees which will be needed have already been hired, so that the additional room can be put to immediate use when construction is completed.

The present operating room of the hospital will be converted into an emergency room with an outside entrance.

Cotton Quota Vote Set For Next Tuesday

The outcome of the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the Nation's cotton-growing area on December 13, will determine whether quota penalties will apply and also the level of price support for 1956 cotton crop.

The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says Raymond Schooler, Chairman of the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the voters cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, price support will be available for the

1956 crop of upland cotton at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity, and quota penalties will apply on any excess cotton. If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties but the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 percent of parity.

Chairman Schooler explains that acreage allotments will be in effect even though quotas are disapproved; compliance with such

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cotton allotments will be required for eligibility for price support, no matter what the level of support.

Chairman Schooler points out that the decision will have far-reaching effects, and that the question deserves the serious study and the carefully considered vote of all who grow cotton.

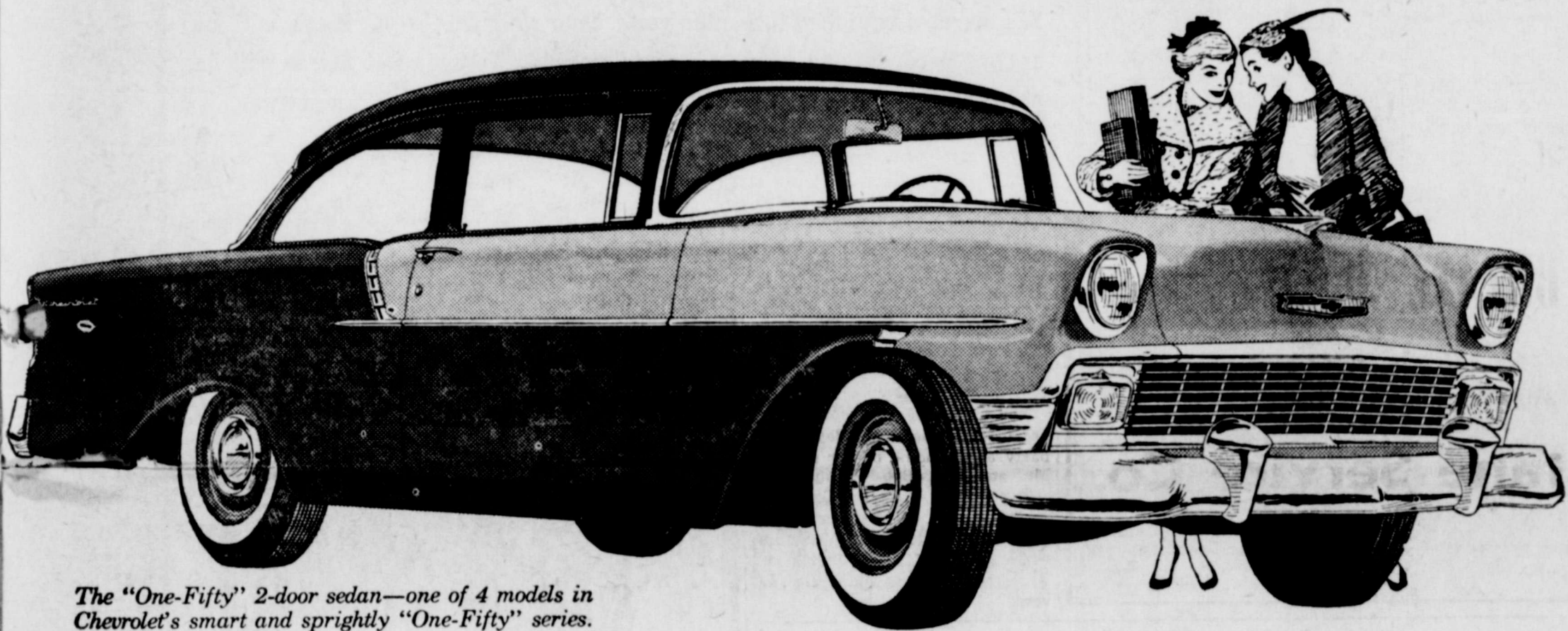

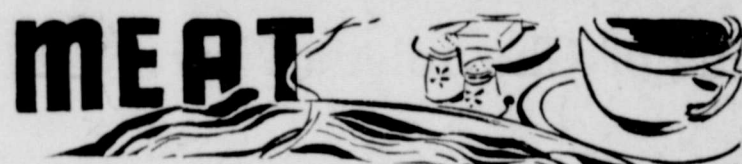

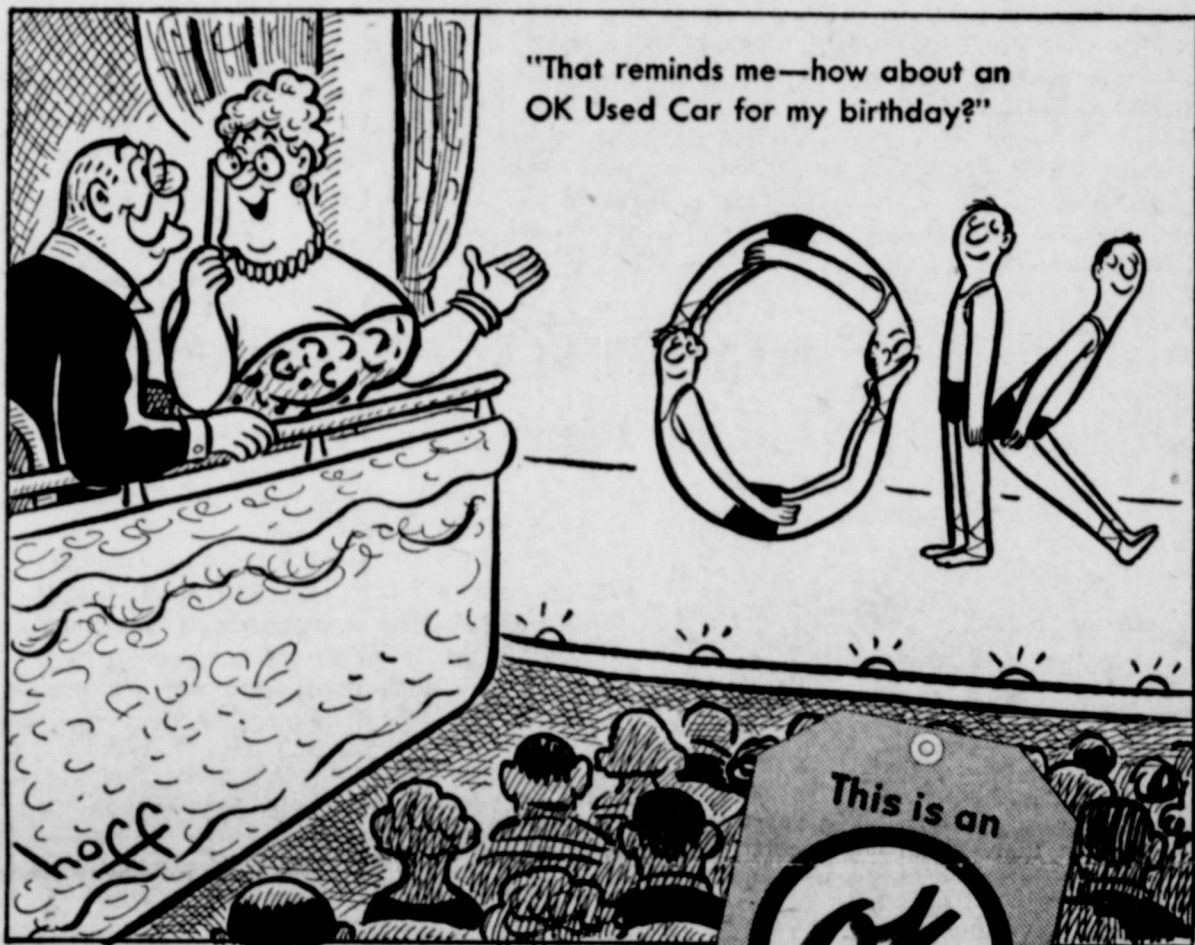
