Butane Loading Rack Shut Down

The hum of activity at the butane loading rack on the Santa Fe right-of-way has stopped the past several days. Cause of the shut-down here is the fact that the Railroad Commission has reduced producing days in the Jameson (Strawn sand) Fields at Silver to five. As a result of the curtailment of production the big Texas Gasoline Corporation's plant has had to shut down and there is no butane being produced.

The field was shut down because of the excessive amount of dry gas which was being flared. El Paso Natural Gas Co. is laying a line to Silver and will take the gas as soon as the line is completed. It is presumed that normal production will go back into effect at that time.

And, the good part about it is that they have a whole week yet before the time comes for St. Nick to visit here. They all were of the opinion that next week will be the best they have had his season and that it will push their sales above what they are accustomed to during the Christmas buying spree.

VOTE FOR COTTON CONTROL

Coke County farmers voted 64 to 14 in favor of acreage controls in Monday's referendum. The nation-wide vote showed 91 per cent of the cotton farmers wanting to continue the allotments and price guarantee for 1956.

"You can say in the paper that we are more than satisfied with our Christmas business and that sales are far above last year.

Deposits in the First National Bank indicate that folks around here are spending their money, as they are down considerably from this time last year. However bank employees said they felt that accounts of individuals were as high as last year. They thought the drop in deposits was due to the bank's having several thousand dollars in bond money at this time last year. The bond money included that voted for Coke County's new court house as well as the new Bronte School. In addition to the bond money decreasing, Coke County's deposit in the local bank is down considerably, as the Commissioners Court voted early last year to divide the county account with the Robert Lee State bank.

The good Christmas business can be accounted for to some extent by the fact that farmers in this area made a better crop than in several years. B. D. Snead, cashier of the bank here, said that he has handled approximately \$120,000 in cotton sales. Bronte Gin reported Wednesday that they have processed 730 bales so far this year as compared with about 300 bales last year.
