SEED IS READY TO DISTRIBUTE

KAFIR, MILO AND HEGARI SEED READY FOR DISTRIBUTION BY CO. AGENT

Forty thousand pounds of Kafir, Milo and Hegari seed has been received from the Soil Conservation Service at Dalhart and is now available for distribution through the County Agent's Office. The seed will be dispensed at the rate of 1 1-2 pounds per acre on agreement to plant the seed in alternate rows or in strips at the first favorable opportunity and to leave an effective cover of stalks on the land. Elmer Caudle has been appointed as warehouseman to dispense the seed which are stored at the Dimmitt Wheat Growers' Elevator.

NEW GRAIN RATE IS EXPLAINED

ERNEST O. THOMPSON EXPLAINS NEW GRAIN RATE FROM DIMMITT

In a letter to Judge Percy Estes and the Castro County Commissioners Court the fore part of the week from Col. Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas full explanation of the recent order which eliminated the one-cent grain differential which has burdened Dimmitt since the advent of the railroad to this locality, is given and explains in detail the benefits which may be expected from the ruling.

The letter:

"On July 3rd, this Commission issued Order in its Docket No. 2237 1-2-Re-opened, prescribing rates on grain and grain products for application intrastate in Texas, to be effective on five days notice, but not later than July 24th. In this order, Dimmitt was placed in common point territory so far as grain rates are concerned, and, therefore, the differential has been removed on grain and grain products shipped from Dimmitt and the maximum rate from Dimmitt to common points is, on wheat, 33c, and on coarse grain, 29 1-2 cents, the same as applies from Hart, Plainview, Tulia, and other points in that vicinity.

Under the order of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the interstate tariff, Texas to Texas, provides for a 1c differential from Dimmitt. Therefore, on shipments of grain originating at Dimmitt and having interstate application, which would include shipments transited at points in Texas and re-shipped as inter-state traffic, a 1-cent differential will be applicable. TEXAS WHEAT CROP IS SHORT

TEXAS WILL CONSUME MORE WHEAT THAN SHE WILL RAISE THIS YEAR

Texas' wheat crop is predicted to yield approximately 7,000,000 bushels this year. There are better than 4,000,000 people in the state and it is asserted that a person consumes about a barrel of flour each year. It takes five bushels of wheat to make a barrel.

On that basis, then, Texans will consume something like 20,000,000 bushels of wheat in a year's time. Where will the 13,000,000 bushels of wheat come from to take care of Texas' consumption?

That question was propounded by a local wheat buyer Saturday, and the answer can only be this, it will have to be imported.

CHALLENGE TO SWISHER COUNTY

SURFACING OF HIGHWAY 86 IN NEAR FUTURE IS SEEN AS PROBABILITY

With the completion of the several miles of grading and finishing of the road bed on Highway 86, Castro County is prepared to assist in any way to co-operate in gaining an early approval from the Texas Highway Department for a surfacing project for the route, according to a member of the Castro Commissioners Court.

It appears that Swisher county has at last become interested in the project and is bending every effort to clear their skirts of any question which would hinder the early action of the highway department. The right-of-way in Swisher County has been secured and the project to reset the fences on the new right-of-way has been approved and will receive attention in the immediate future.

A letter from the Highway Department to the Swisher county commissioners court states that the new route is listed in the minutes for the next meeting of the Commission and urges a complete set of papers covering all the new route for consideration. This is another indication of the willingness of the State Department to co-operate and include this route in its program for the Texas Centennial.

The local court states they are a bit peeved at the attitude of the Swisher county officials for their apparent belief that the Castro people are not doing their part. They point out that the Castro court has a clear title to all the right-of-way through the county and the project now in progress will complete the roadbed and place it ready for topping, whereas it appears the neighboring county is still quite a bit tardy in its own right.

To Messrs. C. O. Byrnes, Pete Whitlow, T. A. Singer and Edgar Ramey belongs the plaudits of an appreciative citizenship. These gentlemen have fought a grand battle against overwhelming odds to give this point a grain rate equal to any other in the Panhandle. Their task has been hard and therefrom comes greater and sweeter rewards of success and satisfaction of a job well done.

Appreciation is also due General Hulen and Mr. Edmonds together with the late Mr. Hogsett, all of the Fort Worth & Denver Railway Co. staff for their kind and considerate attention to the local delegations at all times.

To Ernest O. Thompson, chairman and Messrs. Lon Smith and C. R. McNamee of the Railroad Commission we carry the expressed thanks of an appreciative citizenship for their consideration and fair dealing with a delicate situation, such as were they faced with in the local controversy. Their judgment will long linger in the minds of Castro citizens.

RIDING A GOOD HORSE TO DEATH?

Recently we noticed that the State Tax Commissioner thinks he has found a means of putting more taxation on the already over-burdened and over-taxed and almost insolvent railroads. As a matter of law the railroads have to file annually a sworn statement of their assets with the Railroad Commission of Texas. Because of this reason all of their intangible property is easily discovered and it appears that in preference to hunting other property the tax commissioner just desires to tax again that which is already over-taxed.

Curious to know what the Fort Worth & Denver City Railroad paid in taxes in Castro County last year and noted that in 1934, \$5,470.36 was paid. Of this amount, \$1,514.20 went to schools, \$240.00 to the City of Dimmitt and the balance went to State, County and Road taxes, the latter item of which is \$667.63 and with which the Railroad helped to build roads for the general public. The records show also that these taxes were paid on time, when many of us could not pay our taxes, thus helping in a material way to keep our schools and other institutions functioning.

It seems that the railroads are paying sufficient taxes as against other corporations and individuals whose assets are less easily discovered and who are escaping. These United States are not through with the railroads. They have played as large a part in making the American nation what it is as any other industry or individual, therefore we deem it inadvisable and impracticable to tax them out of existence.

THE PUBLIC FRIEND

We have heard much of late about the Public Enemies. The United States Government is pursuing certain conspicuous characters whom it declares to be Public Enemies, and it has disposed of several conspicuous figures in that class. There is a whole army of Public Enemies with whom the county has to contend, and many of them have never been inside of any prison.

Meanwhile we should recognize that we also have a great many Public Friends, as well as Public Enemies, and warm tributes should be paid them, and people should be encouraged to qualify for this class. What are the characteristics of the Public Friend?

The Public Friend believes he must take some share of the labors of carrying on community work in his home town. If he is asked to take some office in some good community organization, he does not say, "Oh, no, I could not possibly do anything like that." You find him taking up tasks that are more or less distasteful. You will probably see him at your door some night, offering you an opportunity to give money to some good home town cause.

The Public Friend is interested in everything that promises progress for his home town. He attends meetings and gatherings considered to discuss local problems. He offers suggestions when he can see things that should be done.

The Public Friend always speaks good words for his home town. He does not think it smart or funny to take a superior attitude and point out its defects, but he always speaks of its kindly and friendly spirit, and the public institutions built up over years of labor. We have many of these Public Friends in Royal Oak.—Tribune, Royal Oak, Michigan.
