

With sheep breeder south of Bronte, went into the chicken business Jan. 5 when she received the 4,083 obicks.

Mrs. Ratliff has a brand new house for the chicks. It was compieted Dec. 28 and is 24 by 170 feet, which gives her a floor space of 4,080 feet. The building is of sturdy construction, being built of left her 40 to lose and still have heavy framework and sheet iron her 4,000 to market. covering. Plenty of windows were placed on the south side of the biulding to allow sunshine and fresh air to come through.

Mrs. Ratliff's chicks are a cross, especially bred for broiler production. They are part White Rock and Cornish game. The chicks had been debeaked and sexed when Mrs. Ratliff received them. The cockerels and pullets are kept separate because the cockerells are usually ready for market about a week before the pullets. The chicks cost 1634 cents each when they were a day old.
