## UCRA OKAYS FARM MEETING TO DISCUSS YELLOW WOLF DAM

BRONTE, Jan. 17 —Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority, meeting in annual session here, this afternoon waded through a heavy agenda during which they: Re-elected officers.

Heard a report that the construction of a dam on Yellow Wolf Creek for irrigation purposes would cost more than \$400,000;

Authorized a meeting with farmers in the proposed irrigation area covering 800 or more acres to give detailed engineering estimates to them and ascertain their willingness to pay for the water at a rate aggregating \$35 or thereabouts per annum per acre;

Decided to ascertain from Abilene business men about their continued interest in the proposed 500,000 acre-foot project on the Colorado River;

### RESOLUTION PLANNED

And instructed Carl Runge, attorney to draw up a resolution preliminary of UCRA officers making a presentation to the State Board of Water Engineers renewing permits for the Colorado rights.

Officers renamed were L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker, chairman; Porter Henderson, San Angelo implement dealer, vice-chairman; and Gerald Allen, Robert Lee banker and ranchman, secretary-treasurer.

The report of Forrest and Cotton, Dallas on the Yellow Wolf project, initiated last year, indicated a drainage area of about 50.7 square miles.

## AD-LIB-BEN

We certainly had a nice visit with Mr. and Mrs. Ed Ratliff last Friday and enjoyed seeing their fine new broiler house and the baby chicks. The place was swarming with them, but there was some empty space. Mrs. Ratliff said that just before the chicks reach marketing size they are supposed to completely fill the house. "They told us we couldn't get another chicken in here then," she said.

Sure doesn't pay to be late at our joint — can't ever tell what's going on. We were 20 minutes late getting back at noon Wednesday. Do you think Eddie and What's What had spent that 20 minutes working for the Enterprise? They had not. Aided and abetted by the Pruitts down the street (we suspect) they had spent their time making snow ball ammunition with which to chunk us when we finally got here!

When the city put up the new stop signs they sure didn't know that one of their own would be the first to get caught. City Secretary Helen Kirkland paid a \$16.50 fine Thursday for not obeying the sign. She didn't mind however, since the accident which occurred didn't injure anyone. The front of Mrs. Kirkland's car hit an auto driven by Lee Carry Alexander of Abilene at the intersection of Franklin St. and the Abilene highway. He is a geologist. Damage to both cars was heavy but Mrs. Kirkland and Alexander only received minor cuts and bruises.

Helen said one thing she hated was that she had started to do the washing and, after the accident, of course, didn't make it!

Top storage at 2,052 feet elevation would provide for 11,660 acre feet of water. Approximately 800 acres would be included in the irrigable area.

Henderson, who had conferred with a member of the engineering firm this week said he thought such a project would add greatly to the economy of Robert Lee. Board members voted for Allen, Cumbie Ivey and Youngblood to arrange for a meeting with the farmers at a time when one of the engineers could be present.

Th report said the average annual irrigation demand would be 2.35 acre feet per acre.

Directors discussed advisability of inviting county commissioners to spend their portion of the 30 cent advalorem tax return, which may be spent only on water conservation and lateral roads, to share with the authority in subsidizing such a project. They want to make sure there would be enough revenue to pay out the project.

This would require extending by vote the time for remission of the levy for water conservation projects. If this were done the Kickapoo project near Bronte would have a better chance of being developed.

Directors indicated Abilene is still interested, but that it has taken temporary measures now to provide a quick supply of water on the theory the city can't wait indefinitely for completion of the proposed Colorado dam. Original estimates were that 1,050,000 acre feet would be impounded there. But part of the drainage area is now devoted to other projects, Lake J. B. Thomas in particular, and the proposal has been cut approximately in half.

## \$700 Damage to Butane Service in Fire This Week

An estimated \$700 damage was done to the building and contents of Butane Service Co. Tuesday evening about 7:30 o'clock. The firm, owned by Robert H. Sims, had damage to the building due to the fact that firemen had to break in, as well as from the fire itself.

The fire started in an air conditioner sitting in the middle of the floor in the rear of the building. Bill Thomas, fire chief, said that a mouse must have ignited a match in the air conditioner as no other means could be found. Several items of merchandise sitting with the air-conditioner were also damaged.

## AREA GETS 3 INCHES OF SNOW

This area has been in the grip of some cold weather this week. An estimated three inches of snow fell Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. Sunshine Wednesday afternoon melted some of the snow although temperatures didn't rise much above freezing during the day. A hard freeze Wednesday night sent the mercury plummeting to a chilly 15 degrees here.

Ranchmen and farmers in this area were encouraged by the moisture and were hoping for more. Possibly a half to three-quarters of an inch of moisture was realized from the snow and light drizzle which preceded it.

A low of 12 degrees was forecast by the San Angelo weather station for Thursday night.

## COKE COUNTY STOCK SHOW NEXT MONDAY

## Last Rites Held Here Tuesday For A. L. Carlile

Last rites for Aeln L. Carlile, 77, longtime resident of Bronte, were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday from First Methodist Church here. The Rev. W. C. Craig, pastor, officiated. Burial in the Fairview cemetery followed with Clift Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. His grandsons were pall bearers.

A retired farmer, Mr. Carlisle had been ill for a long time. He was born Oct. 31, 1878 in Burnet County and attended school in the Tolar community.

He married the former Ella Florence White Sept. 3, 1901 in Floydada. He lived in the old Fort Chadbourne community near here before coming to Bronte soon after 1913.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Vernon (Nettie Mae) Lammers of Seadrift, Mrs. M. C. (Ella Lanora) Buford of Monahans and Mrs. Louie Eldora Hicks of San Francisco and one son, Thomas Allen Carlile of Crossville, Alabama.

Robbie Wilson, four-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Wilson, was painfully burned last Monday night when he accidentally knocked over a bottle of Pine Sol which poured cut into his eyes. It was at first feared that his sight might be impaired but he is undergoing medical treatment and it is believed that his injuries are only surface burns.

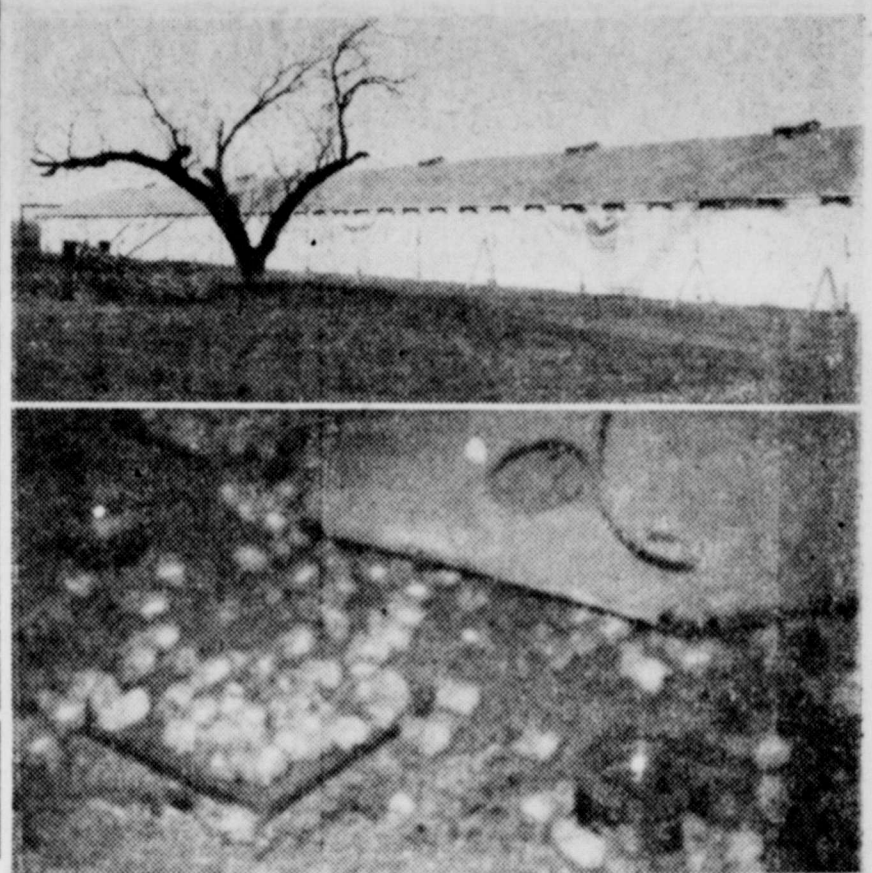

### Mrs. Ed Ratliff Feeding Out 4,000 Chicks for Broilers

Four thousand babies is a lot, even if they are chicks. That's what Mrs. Ed Ratliff has on her hands. Mrs. Ratliff, whose husband is a well known Rambouillet sheep breeder south of Bronte, went into the chicken business Jan. 5 when she received the 4,083 chicks.

Mrs. Ratliff has a brand new house for the chicks. It was completed Dec. 28 and is 24 by 170 feet, which gives her a floor space of 4,080 feet. The building is of sturdy construction, being built of heavy framework and sheet iron covering. Plenty of windows were placed on the south side of the building to allow sunshine and fresh air to come through.

Mrs. Ratliff's chicks are a cross, especially bred for broiler production. They are part White Rock and Cornish game. The chicks had been debeaked and sexed when Mrs. Ratliff received them. The cockerels and pullets are kept separate because the cockerels are usually ready for market about a week before the pullets. The chicks cost 16 1/4 cents each when they were a day old.

Mrs. Ratliff is feeding her chicks Red Chain feed and said last weekend they were eating about 100 pounds per day. J. W. Teague, local Red Chain dealer, estimates the 4,000 chicks will eat a car load of feed before they reach the proper size for market.

From 7 1/2 to 8 1/2 weeks is required for the chicks to reach the 2 1/4 pound size for marketing. With the time for each batch of chickens set at 8 1/2 weeks, Mrs. Ratliff expects to raise five bunches per year. This will allow two weeks between each group for cleaning up and disinfecting.

Only 43 of the babies had died last weekend when Mrs. Ratliff was interviewed. She said that left her 40 to lose and still have her 4,000 to market.

Mrs. Ratliff said this chicken business is strictly her project, but she has been able to get Mr. Ratliff to put out the feed for her a few times. For an old sheep man, he appeared pretty interested in it when your reporter was out there.

When the chickens have reached broiler size, they will be weighed locally and marketed through the local Red Chain Feed Store.

Onions, cabbage, English peas, mustard greens and asparagus can be planted from now until late spring. Maybe you could get your soil ready and buy your seeds so you can plant soon. You who have water surely should raise some vegetables even if only a few for salad use. A new garden bulletin can be obtained by calling or writing your Extension Service Office. This bulletin gives va-

rieties, cultivation and care of vegetables.

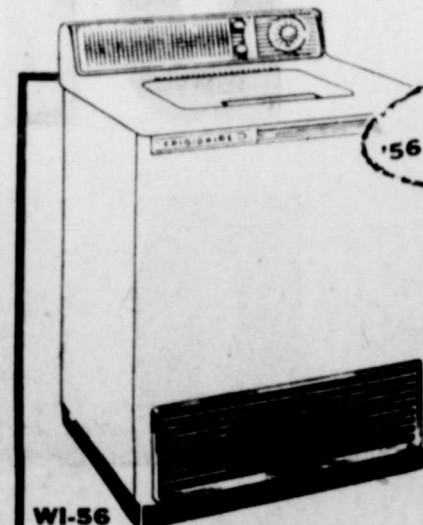

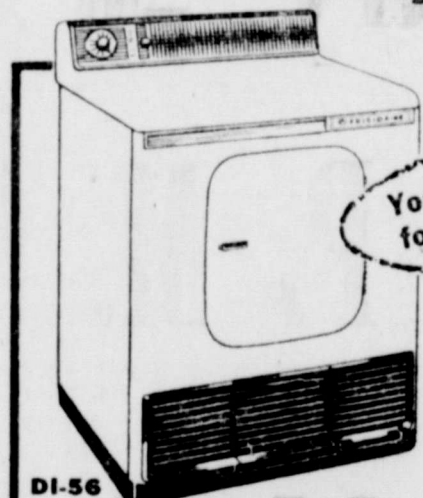

### Buttermilk Pies

2 cups sugar  
2 eggs  
½ cup melted butter  
1 cup buttermilk  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon vanilla or lemon extract and a little nutmeg.

Pour into an unbaked crust and cook slowly for 60 minutes.

A variation of this recipe is an old one that my mother always used and is very good. It is the meringue type. It goes as follows:

1 cup sugar  
1 cup buttermilk  
3 eggs (saving the whites for the meringue)  
½ cup butter

Grated rind and juice of one lemon  
Mix together and pour into unbaked crust and when finished baking, add the meringue as to any other pie.

San Angelo, two daughters, Mrs. H. F. James and Mrs. Harville James, both of Andrews, 18 grandchildren and 24 great grandchild-

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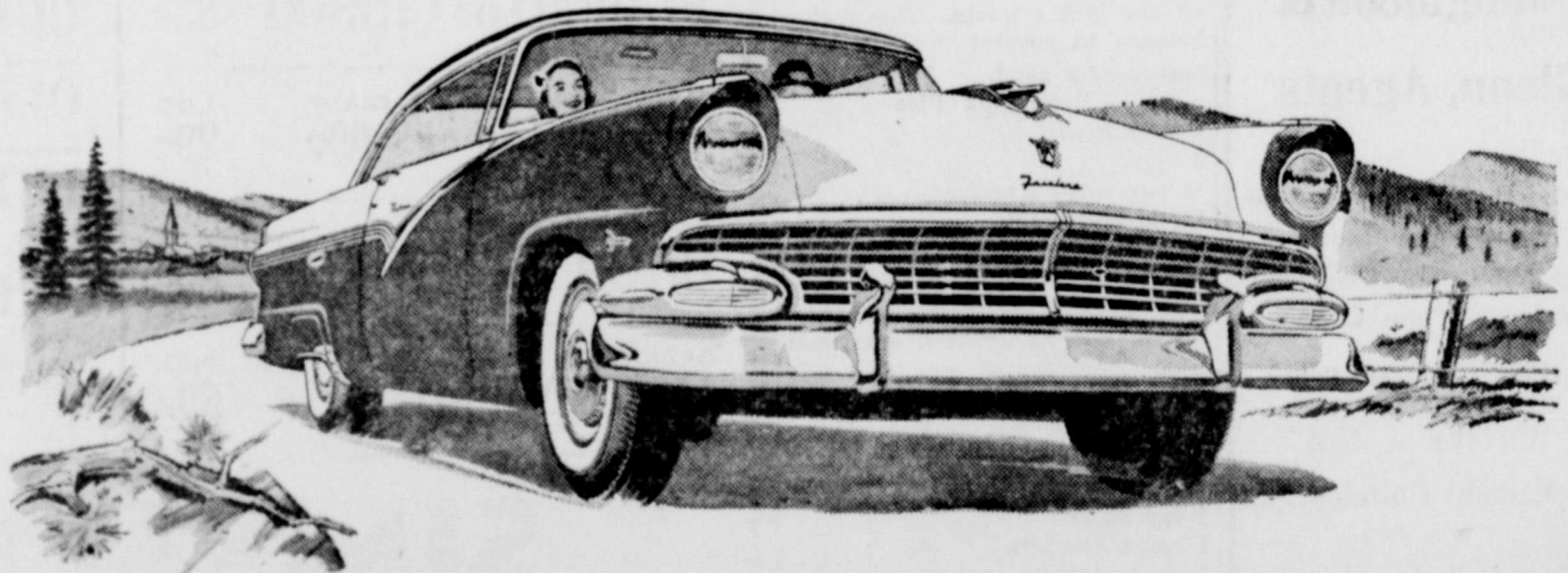
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
