Mrs. Hollis Stevens Named P. M.; Stephenson Retiring

E. E. English, postal inspector of San Angelo, announced Tuesday that Mrs. Hollis Stevens will become acting postmaster for Bronte March 31. She will succeed J. A. "Jap" Stephenson, who has been serving as postmaster since Jan. 1, 1955.

Mr. Stephenson is completing 30 years of service with the post office department, having served more than 28 years as carrier for route 2 out of Bronte. He said he was not retiring because of his health, but that he is looking forward to resting awhile and enjoying life.

Mrs. Stevens is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. R. McQueen and has lived in Bronte all of her life, except for three years. She is

married to Hollis Stevens, who is in charge of the Texas Highway Department here. They have a daughter, Barbara, aged 6. Mrs. Stevens graduated from Bronte High School in 1945.

Mr. and Mrs. Stephenson, the former Ola Mills, live near the Bronte School. They have a daughter, Mrs. E. G. Collins, of Bronte. They also had two sons, one of whom died when he was four years old. The other son, Elbert, has been missing in action since World War II. Elbert Stephenson Field, local football stadium, is named in his honor.

Mr. Stephenson can tell of many interesting experiences during his 28 years of carrying the mail on route 2. He started out in 1926 driving a Chevrolet touring car — one of those with curtains on the side. He said he has waited as much as three hours for creeks to run down so he could cross them. Sometimes he was as late as midnight getting back from his run, but he failed to complete it only one time during the entire 28 years.

Mr. "Jap" said the people on his route as well as those here in Bronte have "sure been good to me during the last 39 years." In view of the bad condition of roads when he first started carrying the mail, Mr. Stephenson said he would never have made it lots of times if people hadn't been ready and willing to pull him out of mud holes.

During his period of serving as a rural carrier, he has carried everything from chickens to horned frogs. He has also licked a few thousand stamps.

In addition to his work for the post office, Mr. Stephenson has been active in civic work. He has served as president of the Lions Club and has been active in Masonic Lodge work. He served several years as Coke County representative on the draft board which serves Tom Green, Coke, and Irion counties. He resigned from that post when he became postmaster.

Much new equipment has been received at the local post office since Stephenson took over. The office became second class shortly before he took over, during the time Mrs. Carrie G. Williams was postmaster.

Mrs. Stevens has been serving as clerk since September, 1955. She served as special clerk during the Christmas rush in 1954.

Four Names Filed For City Council

No new names have been filed for the city offices which are to be voted on Tuesday, April 3. Deadline for filing was last Saturday. Mayor Ernest Ivey is up for re-election, as are Aldermen Charlie Boecking and Ben Oglesby. The other candidate for alderman is Bill Thomas, who is running for the place vacated by Joe George Wilkins, who is not seeking re-election.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge and balloting will take place at the city hall.

5 Names Filed for School Trustee Jobs

Five names have been filed as candidates for trustees of Bronte Independent School District. Two vacancies are to be filled in an election Saturday, April 7.

A ticket filed by the present school board contained the names of Foy L. Moore and Hurlin Lee. Another petition was filed with Edward Cumbie's name on it, and still another was presented to County Judge Jeff Dean containing the names of Vernon Glenn and A. S. Whatley.

Deadline for filing candidates' names is five days before the election. A person may file his own name with Supt. Garland Black or Judge Dean, or a petition containing at least five names may request that a candidate's name be placed on the ticket.

The trustee election will be held with two voting boxes, one at the Bronte City Hall and another at Green's store in Tennyson. D. K. Glenn will be presiding judge, with Mrs. Otis Smith judge of the Bronte box and Tom Green judge of the Tennyson box.

Bronte Places 2nd In Plateau Relays

Bronte Longhorn track teams took second place last weekend in the first annual Plateau Relays at Eldorado. Bronte, with 23 points, was topped by Sonora with 43 points. The Longhorns gained all their points in individual events.

Menard Yellow Jackets won third place in the meet with 18 points and Richland Springs had 17 points for Richland Springs.

For Bronte, Martin Lee placed third in 120 yd. high hurdles; Pinky Gentry first in 100 yard dash; Billy Charles Wrinkle, 2nd, Discus throw; Gene Walker, tie for 1st in High Jump; Gentry, 3rd, 180 yd. low hurdles; Grady Coulter, 2nd, pole vault; M. Lee, 3rd, 880 yd. run.

BLACKWELL CITY ELECTION APRIL 3

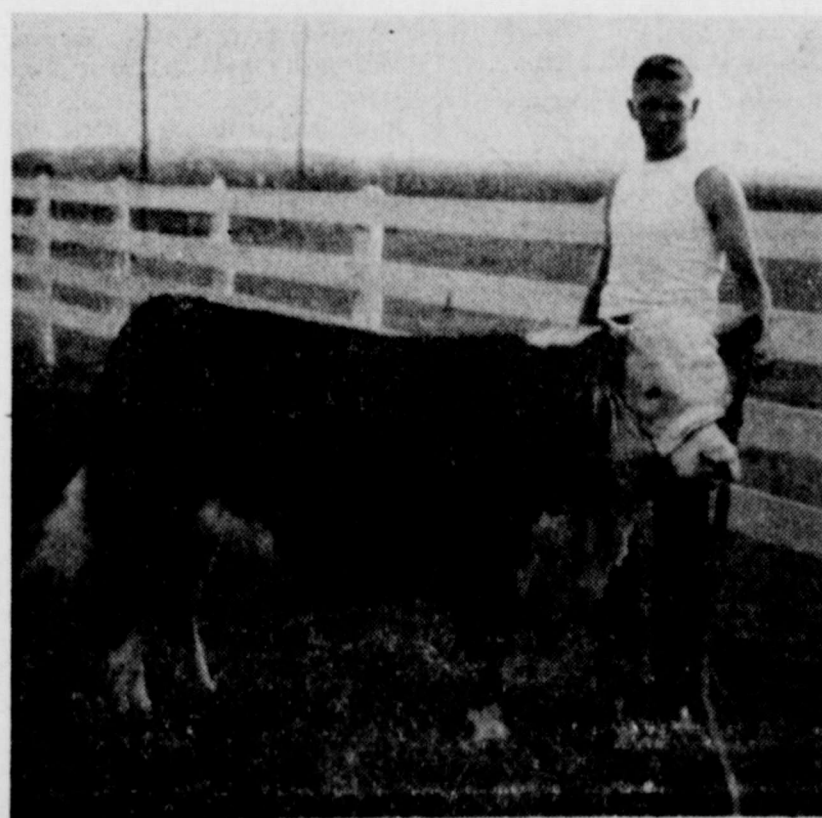

Bing Cherry Salad

2 Coca Colas
½ cup pecans

Drain fruit from juices and if not 2 cups, add enough water to make the amount. Heat and pour over jello. Stir until dissolved and then add the Cokes, fruit and nuts and chill.

If you do not prefer the Cokes, they may be omitted and add 2 more cups of liquid.

This recipe may also be cut down to 1 pkg. jello and add small cans of fruit. A variation to this is to add one pkg. of Philadelphia Cream Cheese to the recipe.
