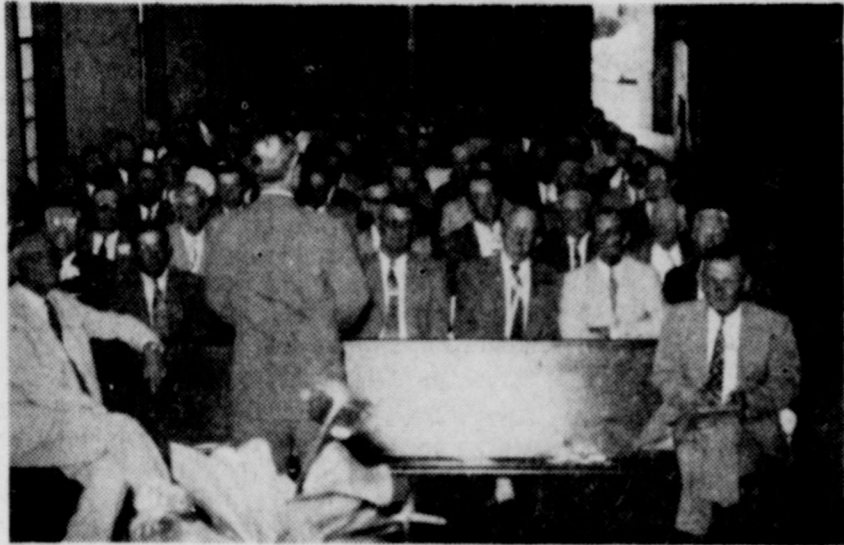

Ivey Returned As Mayor; 3 Elected To City Council

Voting in Bronte's city election Tuesday was small, but was more than was expected. A total of 82 ballots were cast, Mayor Ernest Ivey was returned to his office with 76 votes.

The three candidates for alderman were also elected. Bill Thomas received 72 votes, Charlie Boecking got 76, and Ben Oglesby received 77. Boecking and Oglesby have both served one term on the city council and were up for re-election. Thomas was the only new candidate.

A small write-in vote resulted in the following persons receiving votes for office: Joe Carter received four votes and H. O. Whitt got one vote for the mayor's office, and J. A. Stephenson received two votes for alderman.

The only change in the city council will be Thomas, replacing Joe George Wilkins, who did not run for re-election.

The Men's Sunday School Class at the First Baptist Church reached an all-time high in attendance last Sunday when 67 men were present. The large class was made up of 57 members and ten visitors. Joe Carter, president of the class said class workers are going to try to have 75 present on Mother's Day.

L. T. Youngblood, teacher of the class, said he was highly pleased with the turnout. Mr. Youngblood has been teacher of this class since 1933. Prior to that time he had taught other classes at the local church.

Oldest member of the class present was Will Walton, who is 92. Mr. Walton is also the oldest deacon in the local Baptist church.

Other officers of the class include Jack Lee, vice president, and Clint Duncan, Secretary.

Four Candidates For Two Places On Board of Trustees

Two trustees will be elected Saturday, April 7, to serve on the Bronte School board. Four candidates have their names on the ballot.

Petitions were filed last week, petitioning the names of Mrs. J. M. Rippetoe and Mrs. D. K. Glenn on the ticket. However, both of the ladies asked that their names not be placed on the ballot. They said their other duties would make it impossible for them to serve if they were elected.

Edward Cumbie, Hurlin Lee, A. S. Whatley and Foy L. Moore are candidates for the two positions. Moore is the only candidate who is presently serving on the board.

Voting boxes will be open at Bronte City Hall and at the W. T. Green store in Tennyson. D. K. Glenn will be presiding judge for the election, with Mrs. Otis Smith serving as judge at Bronte and W. T. Green at Tennyson.

Holdover members of the Bronte board of trustees are Osmo Black, Marvin Corley, J. B. Mackey, Jacob Bruce Morrow and T. F. Sims, Jr. the other member whose term is expiring is M. G. Stephenson, who has moved out of the district.

Park Bond Vote to Be Saturday

Voting on the \$130,000 park bond issue will be held Saturday. Residents, when they vote on the bond issue, will decide whether or not the commissioners' court will be authorized to issue bonds to obtain funds for building parks in Bronte and Robert Lee.

The proposal is to spend \$65,000 in Bronte and \$65,000 in Robert Lee. One of the main features of the program would be construction

of swimming pools in each of the parks. The remainder of the money would be spent in building other park facilities such as a caretaker's house, tennis courts, picnic tables, barbecue pits, etc., and for landscaping the park area.

Plans call for the pools to be sufficiently large to meet junior AAU specifications, thereby making them large enough to be used for swimming meets. The schools in

the two towns would be encouraged to use the pools in connection with their athletic programs.

Bronte's park would be located east of town below the old city lake, while Robert Lee proposes to

locate its park at the site now occupied by the barns of Coke County Livestock Association.

Tentative plans call for the construction of a caretaker's house to be built at the Bronte site. Other plans include building tables water fountains, barbecue pits, foot bridges, and spending a good bit of money on trees, grass, flowers, etc.

This election is county wide, and voting boxes will be set up at Robert Lee, Bronte, Fort Chadbourne, Tennyson, Divide, Sanco, Silver, Edith, Wildcat, Olga, Ainsley Turner Ranch, Lometa, Hayrick and Juniper.

Funds to retire the bonds will be taken from the permanent improvement fund. County officials say there is sufficient money in the fund each year to retire the bonds, without any additional taxation. The fund presently has about \$90,000 in it. The commissioners' court is authorized by state law to set aside 5 cents out of this fund for a recreation and park program.

The campaign for building the parks was started and has been backed by the Robert Lee BCD and by the city council in Bronte. Tentative surveys of both sites have been made by W. W. Grief & Associates, engineering firm, and much work has been done in order to bring the program to a vote of the people Saturday.

Funeral Held Here For Mrs. Rusk

Funeral services for Mrs. A. E. Rusk, 50, were held from the First Baptist Church in Bronte Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. N. T. Gault, pastor of the Baptist Church at Maverick, was in charge of the last rites.

Mrs. Rusk died Monday in a San Angelo hospital. She had lived with her family in the Maverick community for a number of years prior to moving to Bronte a few years ago. Mr. Rusk is employed by the State Highway department.

Survivors include her husband; three sons, Leo Rusk of Houston, Earl Rusk of Lubbock, and John Rusk of Bronte; two daughters, Mrs. Wallace Martin of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Glenn Hurt of El Paso.

Burial was in Memorial Gardens Cemetery at San Angelo under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Virgil Cole, Leland Carlton, Arnold Hurt, William Fletcher, J. B. Arrott and Jack Dismore.

Bronte Area Gets Good Rain

Otis Smith Resigns Water Supt. Job

Water Supt. Otis Smith resigned his position at a called meeting of the Bronte city council Monday afternoon. He has accepted a position with the water department at Big Spring and left Wednesday morning to assume his new duties.

Barrett Mackey has accepted the position vacated by Mr. Smith. Mr. Mackey is an experienced water man, having worked at Fort Stockton and other West Texas towns, as well as Bronte.

Mr. Smith has been water superintendent here for about three years, having taken the job at the time Bronte was tied into the Oak Creek Lake supply.

IT'S OURS, IF WE'LL TAKE IT

(An Editorial)

A very important decision is to be made Saturday in Coke County. Qualified voters will decide if the commissioners' court will be authorized to issue \$130,000 in bonds for the purpose of building parks, swimming pools and other recreational facilities for the people of Coke County. Sixty-five thousand dollars would be made available to each of the towns.

What Is The Proposal?

It is proposed by those backing this project to construct a park in Bronte and another in Robert Lee. Each would contain a swimming pool, picnic tables, rest rooms and other facilities which could be used by residents of this area. Cost of the pools would be around \$28,000 each. This would leave \$37,000 for building other facilities and beautifying the parks. Proposals have been heard to spend part of this money for constructing a caretaker's house; leaving the remainder for such things as tennis courts and a community center to be used as a meeting place for clubs, families and other groups who want to get together. Just exactly what the remaining money would be spent for would be left up to the people of each town's area.

How About The Need?

Evidently legislators of the State of Texas feel that there is a need for every county to provide recreational facilities for its people. Else why would they have passed a law authorizing commissioners' courts of each county to set aside five cents out of the permanent improvement fund (courthouse and jail) for this purpose? Not only is the necessity for such facilities seen by our own lawmakers; authorities on juvenile delinquency and other problems of young people, almost without exception, back the theory that if "you'll give them something wholesome to do, they'll stay out of trouble." We feel that every resident of this area can see that our young people here need something to do with their leisure time. If you will watch them playing "chase-em" and other dangerous games with automobiles, you can see it.

Then there's the matter of citizens of this town and county having to drive to Ballinger or San Angelo to take the kids swimming or to find a place to have a picnic. We have always felt that the salvation of small towns is in getting its citizens to trade at home, and that goes for a loaf of bread or taking a swim. It will help our towns and our country if we provide these facilities right here. It will bring business into our town.

This program is not just for the youth and children of the county, even though their welfare is a paramount consideration. There are

Raisin Meringue Pie

- 1 heaping tablespoon flour
- ½ cup butter
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon allspice
- 3 egg yolks
- ¾ cup sugar.

Add sugar to beaten egg yolks and melted butter. Then add the dry ingredients. Last put in the cooked raisins and cook in uncooked crust at 350 degree temperature until firm in the center.

Take the whites and fix the meringue as for any other pie and place in the stove and brown.

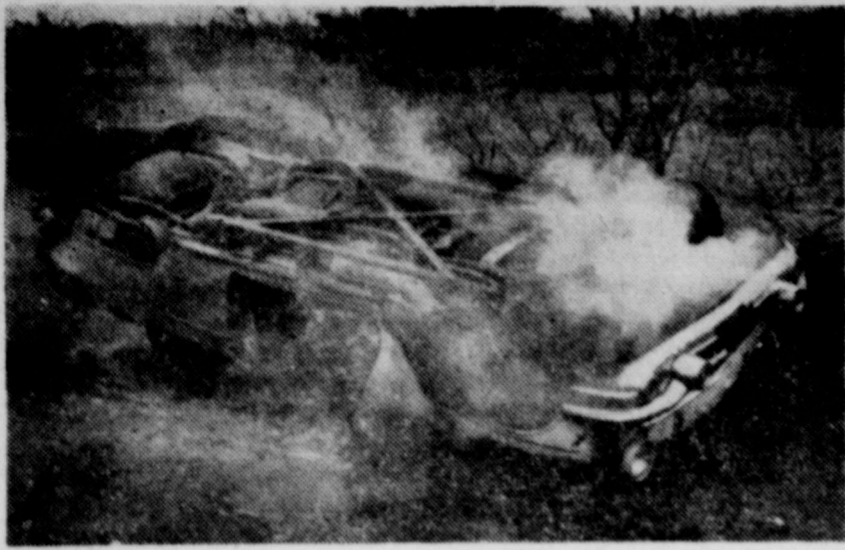

Abilene Man Dies In Auto Crash North Of Bronte

Harold Joe Curry, 31, of Abilene was killed Saturday shortly after noon in an automobile accident northeast of Bronte, just across the county line in Runnels County. Funeral services for Mr. Curry were held at St. Paul Methodist Church in Abilene Monday.

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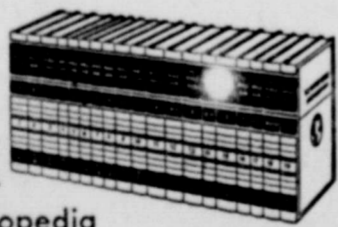

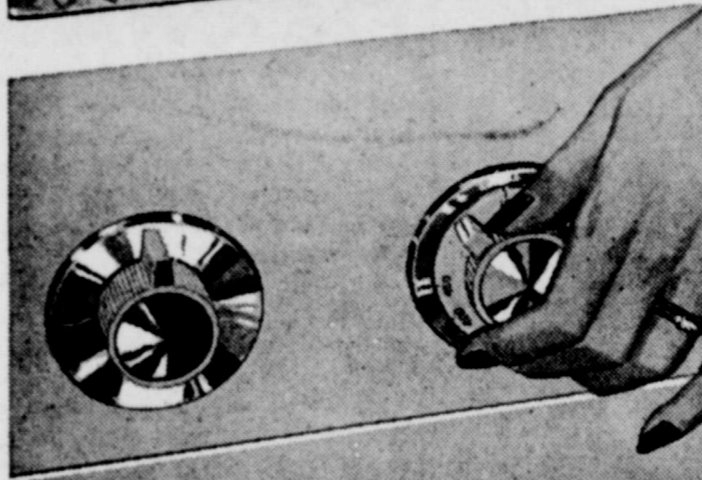

grown people here who like to go swimming and have other recreation.

Can We Afford It?

In our opinion we can't afford not to have these improvements. Coke County now has a valuation of nearly \$30,000,000. This compares favorably with many of the large counties of the state. For example, Tom Green has about \$60,000,000. Runnels, \$34,000,000; Taylor, \$41,000,000; Mitchell, \$15,000,000. Coke County has been extremely fortunate in having the oil development it has the last few years, and oil companies are now paying between 80 and 90 per cent of our taxes.

We are also fortunate in having a low tax rate. Only about 30 counties in this state have a lower tax rate than we have and they go up to more than three times as much as ours. Even with this low rate, and even with payments coming out of our courthouse and jail fund to pay for the new courthouse and for the Coke County Memorial Hospital, a surplus is building up. Right now there is better than \$90,000 in the fund. County officials and others who have investigated this issue have assured us that this bond can be paid off with no tax increase.

Our county officials and other we have talked with who have had experience with tax matters have told us that unless something is done to do away with this surplus, we will be forced to cut our tax rate. Opponents of this park bond may say that it would be fine for us to enjoy a tax cut. But for every dollar we cut our taxes (those of us who live here) we will have to cut the taxes of the oil companies \$8 or \$9. That just doesn't make sense, when we can use this money for the good of our citizens. Figuring that oil will pay 85 per cent of this bond, they will pay more than \$110,000 of the \$130,000, leaving this program to cost us less than \$20,000.

Then there are other opponents who say, "What if the oil plays out?" Of course, this would be a catastrophe—whether or not we vote this bond Saturday. It certainly seems a foolish assumption that this will happen any time soon, however, do you think that those gasoline corporations would have spent millions of dollars constructing plants at Silver and Fort Chadbourne if there had been any possibility of the oil's playing out any time soon. Do you think Santa Fe Railway Co. would have spent some more millions building a railroad to Silver if they had not had a great deal of assurance that the oil would last?

If man never did anything until he had a lead pipe cinch of making it pay, our progress would certainly be greatly hampered. Indeed, if people, cities, counties and even countries had had no faith in the future during the past few centuries; if they had sat and waited until ALL element of chance was gone before they ventured to do anything, we wouldn't be voting on this bond issue Saturday. We wouldn't even know what a swimming pool is.
