IVEY FAMILY ENJOYS REUNION; HONOR FATHER'S 90TH BIRTHDAY

A belated birthday celebration honored Mr. O. C. Ivey last Sunday, April 22, at the American Legion Hall. Mr. Ivey was 90 years old on April 17 but all his nine children were present Sunday for the occasion. It was the first time the entire group had been together in four years.

Moving to Bronte in 1903, Mr. and Mrs. Ivey lived on a farm north of town until 1943 when he retired from farm work and moved to town. Mrs. Ivey died in 1951 and the past four years he has lived alone at his home here.

He is a member of the Baptist church and was very active until recent years. Although he recently spent a few days in the hospital, in general, Mr. Ivey enjoys good health.

Besides farm work, Mr. Ivey studied and was engaged in the veterinary profession here for many years, although he never actually received a diploma. His friends tell of the many calls he made, day or night, to care for sick animals, and with several different modes of transportation.

Politics have also played a part in his career, for he served from 1918 to 1922 as a deputy sheriff under Hawley Allen, then Coke County sheriff.

His greatest hobby is raising flowers and fruit and it was said that he has raised as much fruit as anyone in Coke County. His yard now shows that he has a "green thumb" and that he spends many hours working at it.

His family consists of eight sons and one daughter, three of whom live in Bronte. They are Mrs. Ollie Eubanks, Mayor Ernest Ivey and W. W. "Tootsie" Ivey.

His other sons are Paul of San Miguel, Calif.; Bryan of Long Beach, Calif.; Jeff of Walsenburg, Colo.; Buck of Kerrville; Roy of Mertzon and Cumbie of Robert Lee.

He has 26 grandchildren and 38 great-grandchildren.

The barbecue dinner Sunday was served to about 85 people, including Mr. Ivey and all of his children.

Edward Cumbie was high man in the race and has already assumed his duties on the board. Two places were to be filled and Whatley and Lee tied for second place.

Cleanup Drive Set For Next Week

Bronte's city council has designated the week of April 30 through May 5 as Cleanup Week in the city.

Everyone is urged to clean up around their premises and stack their trash and other debris at the alleys behind their property. A truck will be provided to haul off the trash.

Mayor Ernest Ivey, speaking for the council, said that with summer coming on, it was believed that a thorough cleanup would go a long way toward keeping down flies and mosquitos. These insects, he added, are credited with spreading polio and other diseases.

Another consideration, of course, is the appearance of the city. A cleanup will do a great deal to make Bronte more attractive to local residents as well as those passing through, the mayor said.

Cancer Crusade Will Be Emphasized Here Next Week

The Cancer Crusade in Coke County is getting off to a good start and a concerted effort will get underway the first of next week, according to Mrs. J. B. Mackey, chairman of the drive on the east side.

Members of the Sorosis and Diversity Clubs have agreed to canvass the residential section of Bronte Monday night, April 30. They are going to use the same system used in the Mother's March, stopping only at places where porch lights are on. They have asked that everyone who wishes to contribute turn on his porch light and someone will stop and pick up the contribution.

I. C. Oden is in charge of two benefit baseball games which will be played early in May.

A. J. Kirkpatrick, chairman of the Cancer Crusade for Coke County, said Wednesday that \$262 has been turned in at Robert Lee. He

said active campaigns are being made at Silver, Edith and in the southwest part of Coke County.

The Cancer Crusade's slogan for this year is "Fight Cancer with a Checkup and a Check." At the same time you are asked to contribute money to the drive you will be asked to have a physical checkup.

The dread disease is taking 250,000 lives each year in this country and the American Cancer Society believes if it can influence people to have periodic checkups, it will go a long way toward wiping out the disease. A great number of cancers are curable, the society points out, if found early enough.

At the same time, the campaign this year is trying to raise funds for use in educating people of this country to the dangers of cancer and, even more important, to increase research activities trying to find a cure for the disease.

DEMO PRECINCT CONVENTIONS TO OPEN JOHNSON-SHIVERS DUEL

For the first time in many years the Democrats of Texas are showing interest in approaching precinct, county and state conventions.

Cause of it all is the battle between Gov. Allan Shivers and U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson, who are opposing each other for the distinction of heading the state's delegation to the national convention.

Dates of the conventions: Precinct, May 5. County, May 8. State, May 22, in Dallas. National, Aug. 13, in Chicago. County Democratic Chairman R. B. Allen has issued a call for both the precinct and county conventions in Coke County. Precinct conventions are set for 2 p.m. Saturday, May 5. At the precinct gatherings delegates will be selected to attend the county convention in Robert Lee the following Tuesday, May 8.

Opening of New Hospital Wing Set for May 6

Dr. John R. Harris has announced that the formal opening of the new wing on the Bronte Hospital will be held Sunday, May 6. Work on the new addition has been completed and the new rooms are now in use.

Six new patient rooms were added to the hospital, along with a new operating room, nurses and employees' lounge and much new equipment has been added.

Committees To Help With New Park Projects

Coke County Commissioners voted Monday to set up an Advisory Committee to assist them in constructing and operating the two new park projects which were authorized at a recent bond election. A resolution further provides that the \$130,000 park fund shall be divided equally between the projects to be constructed at Bronte and Robert Lee.

Precincts 1 and 2 will each have five members on the parks board, while Precincts 3 and 4 get two each.

Commissioners were to be in session again Thursday afternoon of this week, when the newly appointed advisory committee was to be called in for discussion of matters pertaining to the new parks and pools.

Engineer W. W. Greif was present at the meeting Monday, and it was announced that he would accompany county officials and park committee members to McCamey next Tuesday to inspect pools which have been built there.

Mr. Greif pointed out that there will be a sizeable saving in construction costs if the two pools are identical and are let in a single contract.

It seems a long time since I said anything of my own but I did have so many to tell me how they enjoyed reading of what my daughter says about Germany. In a recent letter that I received I feel that you will also enjoy part of it. This may get boring, for after all she plans to be there for three years and three years may be a long time for you to hear nothing from week to week but about Germany.

She said: "We went to a little place in Frankfurt to eat that was over 100 years old and we were the only Americans there. And did everyone stare at us, but they were very friendly, and several of the people spoke a little English. We ate what was called ribschn. It was the largest piece of pork that I ever saw and was really delicious. It was about two inches thick and nearly covered our plate. I don't exactly know what they did to it but it was very good and was served with sauerkraut and very hot mustard and cost only 55c. Amazing, isn't it?"

"Oh, yes, I want to tell you about our gates. We told you that we have a fence, well almost all the houses do, and the gates don't open from the outside without a key. There is a bell out there, and the people who come ring the bell, and I can look out the window, and if I want them to come in, I push a buzzer at my door and then they push on the gate when I push the buzzer and it comes open. I like this.

I told you our living room has no windows, but it's just as well, because all I'd see is the next house anyway. All of the houses are very close together, and they all have pointed roofs. I am still impressed with the cleanliness of the streets and highways. It is so pretty, never cluttered, and driving out is so pretty because everything is so neat and green.

From what everyone tells me, we use coal almost all year with the exception of about two months.

 Mix above ingredients and form into balls. Bring to a boil in pressure cooker, the tomato sauce and 2 cans of water. Place the meat balls into this and cook 20 minutes at 10 lbs. pressure.

Mrs. Charles Knierim wrote and read the following poem in tribute to Miss Thomas:

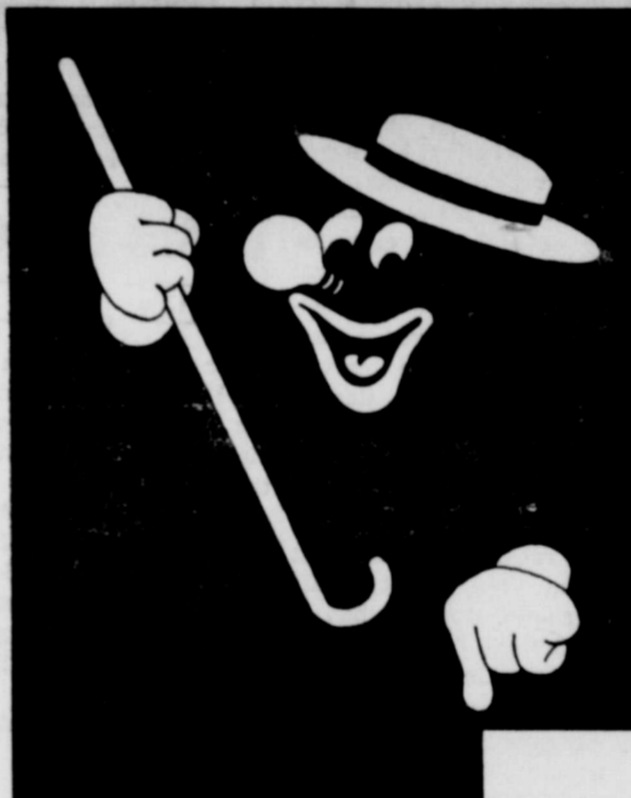

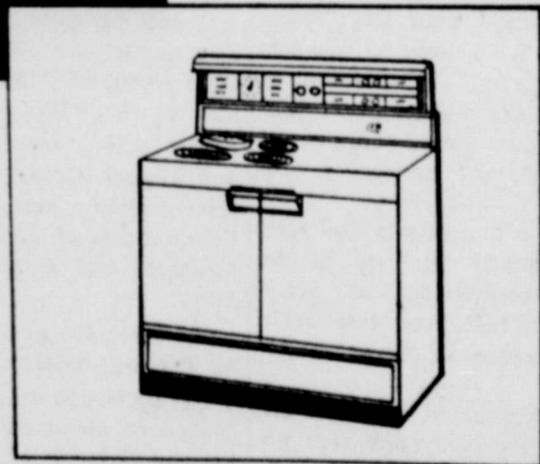

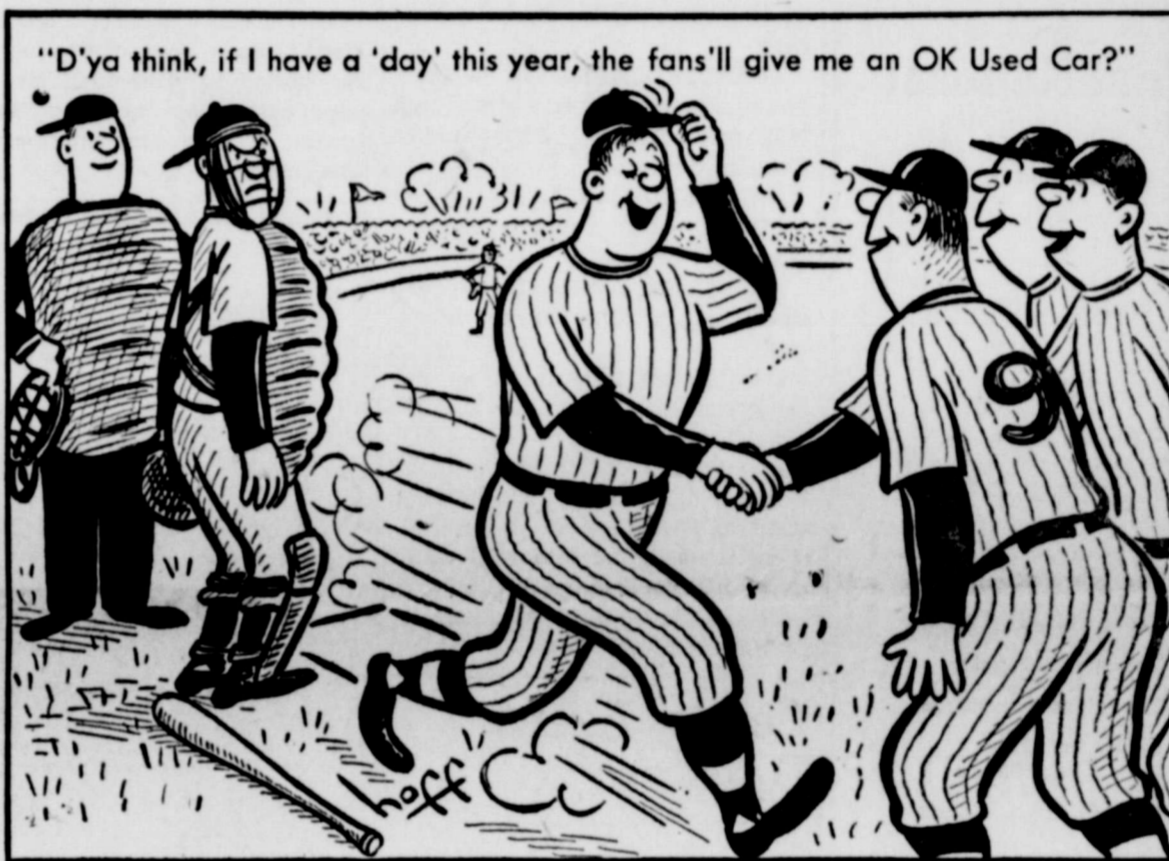

County Agent Discusses Farm Topics
By JACK B. WAIDE
County Agent

No doubt many of you have read of serious outbreaks of rabies in several West Texas Counties recently. People have been confronted with this disease for over 2300 years and to date we have no control for rabies. The disease always results in death. Rabies can be effectively controlled by a vaccination program.

Many dogs in this county no doubt have already been vaccinated, but in order to obtain adequate protection, all dogs should be vaccinated and we should dispose of stray dogs. It would be a simple matter to get a veterinarian over here for a half day if enough of you are interested.

I had to take the shots about 10 years ago and believe me you will be much happier when the dogs get the shots.

Those who want me to get a veterinarian to come to Robert Lee leave your name at my office. Call the Red Chain Feed Store in Bronte if you live in Bronte. If enough of you are interested, I will make the necessary arrangements and notify you when to bring your dogs in.

With planting time just around the corner it seems timely to mention the new hybrid grain sorghum varieties. These new grain sorghums are on the market for the first time this year. The price is high and the supply is limited, but if results are in line with field tests and tests conducted at experiment stations, they the worth the effort and expense involved in planting. Results on experiment Station va-

riety tests show a 30% to 40% increase in yield over standard varieties. Key Feed Store in Robert Lee, Red Chain Feed Store in Bronte, and Hurlin Lee in Bronte are handling the seed.

A lot has been written about new developments in cotton insect control. Poisons have been developed which are absorbed into the plant and then kill any insect which feeds on the plant. Certainly, this approach to insect control offers great promise, but its use at this time is limited. Seed is treated before planting. Advertisements claim protection until the plants are 7 to 8 weeks old. Treatment has been used on acid delinted seed and mechanically delinted seed.

Experiment Station results show that the poison is effective only on mechanically delinted seed, and that protection lasts only from 5 to 6 weeks. Some of the disadvantages at this time are cost, and limitations on use. The cost is approximately \$3.00 per acre. If you don't get a stand, the treatment would cost the same for the next planting. The fact that treatment can be made only on seed eliminates the possible use in this area.

Our insect season normally doesn't start until after July 10. The period of protection has long since passed by the time insects appear in damaging numbers in this county.

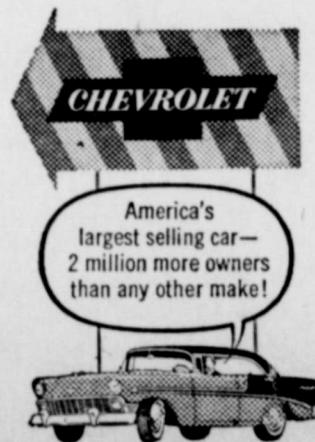

Mrs. Brock is the former Odesa Bennett.

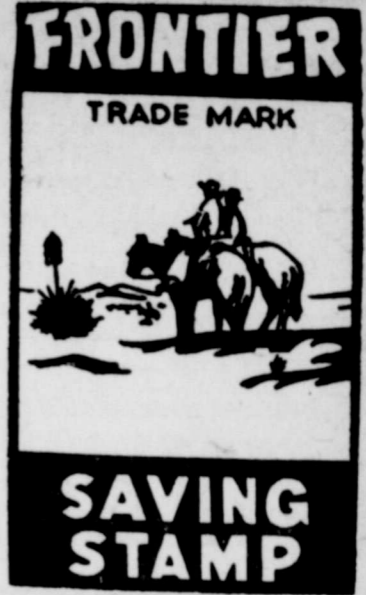
