Last Rites Held Wednesday for George R. Thomas

Hundreds of friends and relatives gathered at the First Methodist Church Wednesday morning to pay last respects to George Ray Thomas, 52. Mr. Thomas died Monday at 2 p.m., about two hours after suffering a heart attack.

The Rev. W. C. Craig, pastor of the church, was in charge of the services. He was assisted by the Rev. C. Raginald Hardy, pastor of Los Angeles Heights Methodist Church, San Antonio, and the Rev. Ben H. Bahmfolk, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Church, Corpus Christi. Both are former pastors here.

Mr. Thomas was born in the Marie community March 24, 1904. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. U. G. Thomas. He was married to Vera Baldwin April 22, 1928.

A Bronte area resident all of his life, Mr. Thomas was in the farming and ranching business. He had been a steward in the Methodist Church here for the past 25 years and was also a trustee of the church. Only recently he was elected president of his Sunday school class.

He served at one time on the Bronte city council and two terms on the Farm Home Administration board for this county. He was a member of the Bronte Masonic Lodge. In addition to his farm and ranch work, Mr. Thomas worked many hours at his hobby of gardening and yard work.

Survivors include his wife; a brother, W. G. Thomas of Amarillo; six sisters, Mrs. W. H. Bland of Riesel, Mrs. Frank Grimes of Ballinger, Mrs. Clara Gregg of San Angelo, Mrs. T. A. Mitchell of Norwalk, Calif., Mrs. Margaret McDonald of Marathon and Mrs. Homer Waters of Rocksprings.

Coke Farmers and Ranchmen Sold Products Valued at \$1,852,971 in 1954

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 419 farms in Coke County was \$1,852,971, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold was \$170,437 and included \$168,584 for field crops, \$1,517 for vegetables, and \$336 for fruit and nuts.

Coke County remained primarily a livestock country, with most of

City Council Votes To Build Dog Pound

Bronte's city council voted in its regular meeting last Friday night to pass an ordinance to set up a pound, do away with stray dogs and set up some kind of licensing system and regulations for keeping dogs in town.

No definite program was worked out, but plans are to have some recommendations ready by the next meeting night. D. K. Glenn and I. M. Cumbie appeared before the council and requested that some action be taken on the "dog matter" in the interest of sheepmen of the area. Mr. Cumbie lost several ewes last week to sheep-killing dogs which are roaming the community.

Council members discussed the seriousness of the situation and

decided that some sort of action is necessary to protect sheepmen, as well as to protect dogs which owners care about.

A sample ordinance regulating peddling and soliciting of funds was presented to the council but was not passed. Members were of the opinion that the sample ordinance was too elaborate and a simpler one could be worked out which would take care of the situation in Bronte. Further action is expected on this matter at the next meeting.

Barrett Mackey, water superintendent, had a report on amount of water pumped during the month of May. A total of 4,800,000 gallons was pumped, giving a daily average consumption of 154,839 gallons. Highest amount pumped on one day was May 19, when 229,000 gallons were brought into Bronte. Lowest amount was on May 3, with 65,000 gallons.

Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, reported the following amounts of money in the various city funds, after current bills were deducted:

Water works, \$1,739.59; general fund, \$3,001.14; fire dept., \$395.35; street and alley, \$819.91; police dept., \$1,096.19; and sinking fund, \$225.97.

These amounts make a total of \$7,278.15 in all the city funds.

New Seats Being Erected at Bronte Football Field

An estimated 1,100 persons can be seated this fall at Bronte's home football games. The expanded seating capacity has been brought about by moving the south side of the Lake View stadium to Bronte. The local school board purchased the seats some six weeks ago after Lake View residents voted bonds to build a new stadium.

R. W. Sims has been in charge of moving the bleachers and most of them are now up and ready for use. The press box at Lake View was also purchased, but has not yet been moved.

Part of the new seats have been erected on the south side of the football field for use of visiting fans, while another section has been put up on the north side for use of local fans. The addition will give Bronte one of the largest stadiums in this area for a school this size.

Members of the local board got a bargain when they purchased the Lake View bleachers, paying \$550 for the entire south side and press box.

Supt. Garland Black said this week that one section of seats which has been moved has not been erected, and possibly will not be this summer, due to the urgency of other work which needs to be done. Mr. Black added that he felt sure this section would not be needed this fall, particularly in view of the fact that the big game of the year between Bronte and Robert Lee will be played at Robert Lee this year.

A great deal of volunteer help has been used in re-assembling the seats.

Each of the girls attending were charged a fee of \$1.00. The camp was built with money derived from sale of Girl Scout cookies.

Mrs. Rees said there are many girls in Bronte who would like to join Girl Scouts, but it is impossible to take them in, due to the lack of leaders. She said, "We sincerely hope that several ladies will feel interested enough in their girls or in somebody else's girls to volunteer to act as leaders."

Eight 4-H boys from Coke County attended the District 4-H Camp at Junction May 30 to June 1. Activities at the camp included rifle shooting, swimming, and lectures on boat safety, rifle safety and Indian relics. The game department demonstrated the use of an airplane in enforcement of game laws and members of the Wildlife Service gave lectures on wildlife. The boys saw films on wildlife and a collection of comedies each night.

Other recreation activities filled in between the lectures. Scores were kept on the rifle shooting and Coke County boys did some respectable shooting. Kenneth Wink of Robert Lee placed 2nd in the Senior division and Jacky Corley placed 1st in the Junior Division. All boys over 12 were in the senior division. A representative of the Remington Arms Co. gave a very interesting and entertaining shooting exhibition.

The dog vaccination program was partially successful. Dr. Koberg vaccinated about 45 dogs in Bronte and the same in Robert Lee. No doubt a good many of the dogs in both towns had already been vaccinated. We still have a good many strays in town, but at least we have partial protection.

All of you no doubt have heard that Congress passed and the president approved a bill giving farmers and ranchers a tax refund on gasoline used on the farm.
