Glenn urged that persons who wish to know more about the project be present for the meeting.

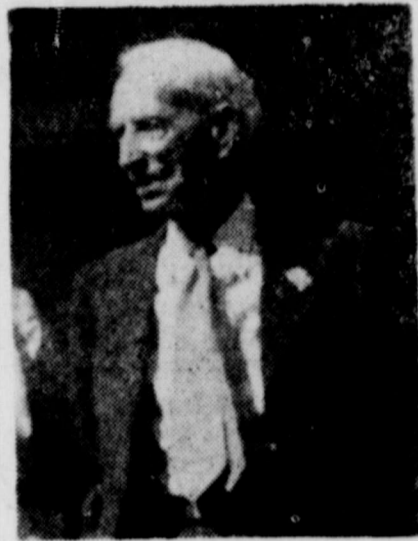
He and Sheppard said that if the people of the Bronte community want the project, they should start making plans right away.

Rites Held For Will Walton, 91, Bronte Pioneer

Last rites for W. C. (Will) Walton were read Sunday, Oct. 7th, at 3:30 p.m. from the Bronte First Baptist Church. Officiating were the Rev. Reuben Blake, former pastor here and now of Southland, and the pastor, the Rev. Douglas Brown. Burial followed in Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Will Walton was born in Keetsville, Mo., the son of the late W. T. and Nancy Ruth Walton. He died Oct. 6, 1956, in a Big Spring hospital on his 91st birthday.

A retired carpenter, Mr. Walton had been a resident of Bronte since 1896 and had been a member of the Bronte Baptist Church for the past 60 years. He was an active deacon for 56 years. He was also a charter member of the Bronte WOW Lodge.

He married the former Mary Etta Collett in the home of the bride's parents at Pottsville, Texas, on Nov. 23, 1890.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Ronald Walton of Bronte, Windsor, Edwin and Delbert Walton of Tyler; six daughters, Mrs. Taylor Emerson, Mrs. Ruby Davenport, Mrs. W. D. McDonald, all of Bronte, Mrs. J. A. Caldwell and Mrs. D. B. Kiker of San Angelo, and Mrs. H. W. Sayner of Snyder; 13 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

He is also survived by two brothers, R. S. Walton, Cleburne, and J. G. Walton of San Angelo; and a sister, Mrs. W. J. Cumbie of Robert Lee, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Longhorns Take on Hermleigh

Bronte's Longhorns face their first district 6-B opponent tonight, a tough Cardinal squad in Hermleigh. Bronte goes into the game undefeated and untied, and rated No. 3 in area grid rating by the Abilene Reporter-News.

Hermleigh, defeated by Rochester, is rated fourth while Rochester is in first place in this area. The game will also open district play for the Cardinals.

A large group of Bronte fans is expected to follow the Longhorns to Hermleigh tonight.

Trent took the 6-B lead last week with a 30-6 triumph over Loraine, in the only district game played so far this season. Winner of the Bronte-Hermleigh game will tie the Gorillas for the lead. Another tough district 6-B team is Robert Lee. The Steers have not been defeated, but have been tied by a couple of Class A opponents.

Coke County's new Court House will be formally dedicated next Saturday, Oct. 13.

The dedication program starts at 3 p.m. in the district court room, following a flag raising ceremony outside. Loud speakers will carry the program down stairs and out on the court house lawn. Less than 200 can be seated in the court room.

Open house will be observed from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. when people will have an opportunity to inspect the beautiful building from top to bottom. County officials and their employees will be on hand to conduct visitors around. Previously a group of interested citizens from Bronte and Robert Lee had requested the Court to start things moving for a much needed new county building.

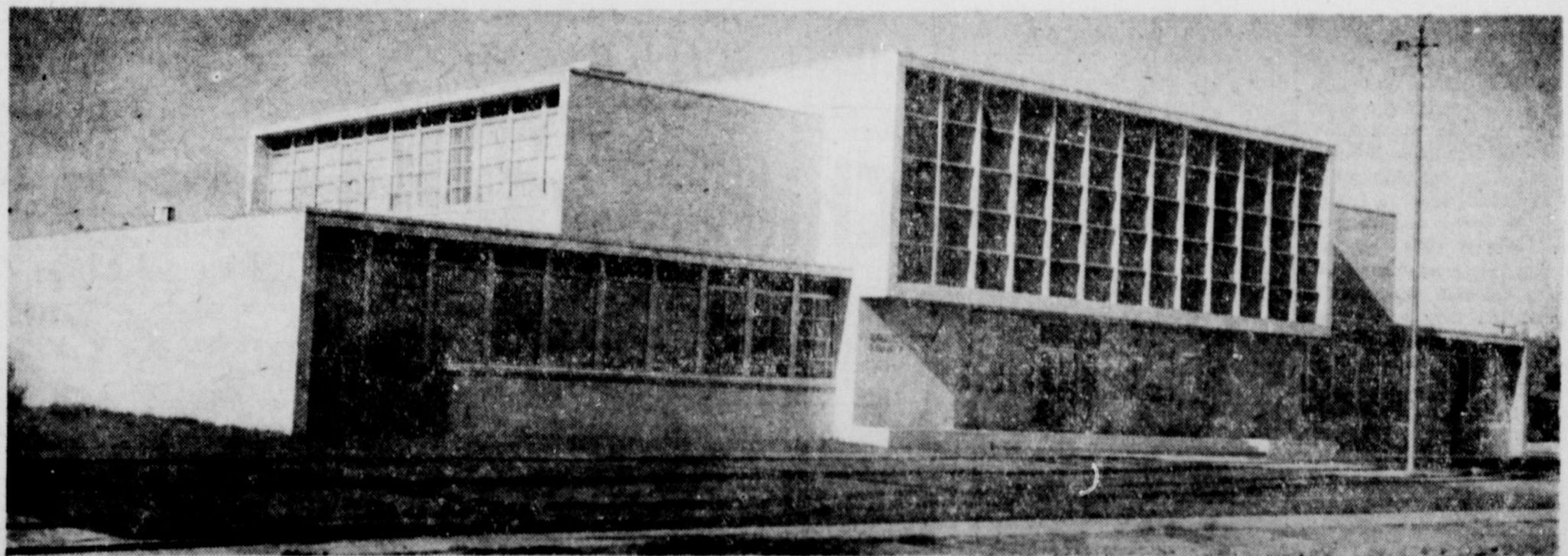
A bond issue of \$300,000 was voted Oct. 30, 1954, and preliminary plans were immediately approved.

A contract was let Feb. 2, 1955, to Suggs Construction Co. of Big Spring who submitted the low bid of \$272,185.00. Eleven bids were received, ranging up to \$345,000.00. The building was completed and occupied in June of this year. It provides space for all the agencies which previously were housed in a barracks across the street.

The Court House is a fireproof building, with a frame of steel and concrete. Exterior curtain walls are finished with cast stone and brick. The windows are aluminum with the end of the court room glazed with glass blocks set in aluminum frames. Aluminum grid work on the outside of the glass blocks shields the blocks from direct rays of the sun.

The court room as well as the exterior of the building is contemporary modern architecture. All of the corridors and stairs have a marble wainscote, with the floors in the corridors of terrazzo. Court room floors are of rubber tile and the office floors of asphalt tile.

The court room and all offices have acoustical ceilings, and lighting throughout is fluorescent. The entire building is summer and winter air conditioned.

With all the moving that has taken place for me this week, I felt that it would be a little difficult for me to get any thing back for the paper, so I left this letter that I received recently from my daughter and I feel that you will enjoy it. Due to my being so busy in the process of this moving deal and the length of the letter, I am going to omit the recipe for this once. I hope that I will be able to get you some real good ones and you will be hearing from me from week to week.

The letter:

I shall give a little expose on driving in Germany. To begin with, the death rate here is higher than any other country for automobile accidents, and after being here about a week, it is quite easy to see why.

Never have I seen anything to compare with it, and I hope I never do again. The Base constantly gives safety talks to the men on driving defensively, because that is your only chance to survive. There are several causes for the high accident rate: to begin with, since the war there have been more automobiles here than ever before, so, many of the drivers are new at the business, and secondly, a national character trait called "hard-headedness" is a big factor. That is not just my opinion or my own word, but several books that we have checked out from the library written by Germans on understanding the German people have mentioned that characteristic.

All I can do is give examples to try to give you a picture of the situation; but I will mention that judge distance at all, the way they don't seem to be able to cut so sharply in front of one another. Also, the numerous bicycles and motorcycles (not to mention the pedestrians and horses and wagons) add to the hazard. The pedestrians are something to behold, because they automatically think they have the right-of-way, because I guess they think they came before the automobile, and if they want to walk in the middle of the road, that's what they do, and they never move nor flinch at the screeching of brakes or sudden stops because of them. I don't know how they have the nerve.

In the States, the truck drivers are usually known for courtesy, but here they don't know the meaning of the word and usually go to the other extreme, and several friends of ours have been literally pushed off the highway by them. We have several friends with Pan American and they all have the foreign car, as they have to pay the German taxes, so they have German licenses, so you cannot tell they are Americans. One of the women that lives by me, told me one day she was behind a truck, and he waved her on to pass, and when she pulled out, another car was coming right at her. So she pulled back, and she said the truck driver waved her on 3 more times, and each time another vehicle was coming.

On the Autobahns, which are 4 lane highways, they all try to

drive on the left side, as they seem to be afraid someone will get ahead of them, even if they're only driving 40 miles an hour. One day on the way to the Base, we saw a car behind us trying to pass another car and the other car would not move to the right lane, so the passing car decided to pass on the right side; and when he did, the other car speeded up and when the passing car tried to pull to the left lane he hit the other car and knocked it over to the 4th lane. I learned a good lesson from that, and if they don't want me to pass, I just wait.

Billy's Commanding Officer was on his way to work, and another car began to pass a big line of cars, and the CO said another car was coming and anyone would have known it was impossible to get around all the cars before meeting the other one. He decided to pull back into the line as he got along side the CO and pushed him into the ditch to prevent a crash.

One man in Billy's squadron had had 3 accidents—and one was a man in the left lane that decided to turn and turned into him.

There is a German word called "Machts Nichts" which sounds like Max Nix. On the German cars they have a little lighted stick that comes from the right or left side of the car to indicate turns. Machts nichts means "makes no difference" and the Americans call these sticks "Max Nix sticks" and when one goes out, it makes no difference what you are doing or fixing to do, they are going to turn or pull out. The name is really quite appropriate.

I could go one and on about incidents that have been told us or that we've seen, but that would take hours, but maybe this will give you an idea of the driving conditions here. Be thankful for the courtesy you have in the States, and the ability of most of your drivers. They don't use horns much; in fact, they ignore them; but they flash their lights to pass. In the States we use the lights for emergency, but here they don't move if they don't want to; so I often wonder what a person would do if they had to get to a hospital or something in a hurry!

Ike Can't Make It Rain, But He's Still Best Man

The other day I asked a farmer if it was dry out his way. He said it sure was. "Looks like we just can't get any rain," he said. "Why, when Noah had his 40-day flood, we didn't get over half an inch."

There's no mistake about it, Texas is having itself a real drouth. Some of the farmers and ranchers in our county are in such bad shape that they may vote for Stevenson.

Old Man Jones, from across the river, said he wasn't going to go to any such extreme. He said he needed rain as bad as anybody else. He claimed water was so scarce in his community that the preacher was baptizing new members with a wet handkerchief. But he was holding out awhile longer, anyway.

"I may be stubborn," said Old Man Jones, "but I just ain't been convinced that President Eisenhower is keeping it from raining."

He said he knew that Stevenson and Kefauver acted like they thought so, and they had a right to their opinion. Lyndon Johnson, he figured, knew better, but he was sticking with Adlai and Estes for the sake of unity. He said he didn't figure Mr. Sam Rayburn had known whether it was raining or not for the last 25 years.

"I hate not to go along with such a widely known crowd of weather observers," Old Man Jones said. "If there's anybody

who keeps up with which way the wind is blowing, generally speaking, it's Stevenson, Kefauver and Johnson."

Then he went on to say that he realized the national farm program hadn't pleased everybody—including him. If he was in the White House, he would do things different, at least in our county. He allowed that the \$61,000,000 spent by the Eisenhower administration for drought relief in Texas could have been doubled and still not made all the farmers happy and prosperous.

"But," said Old Man Jones, "I keep remembering that the main reason for our troubles, besides the drouth, is the fact that we are not at war. Now, if Adlai and Estes really want to jump on President Eisenhower, there is a real issue. They've sure got the goods on Ike in that respect. If he hadn't stopped that Korean War, farm prices would be higher, no doubt. I wonder why they never mention that."

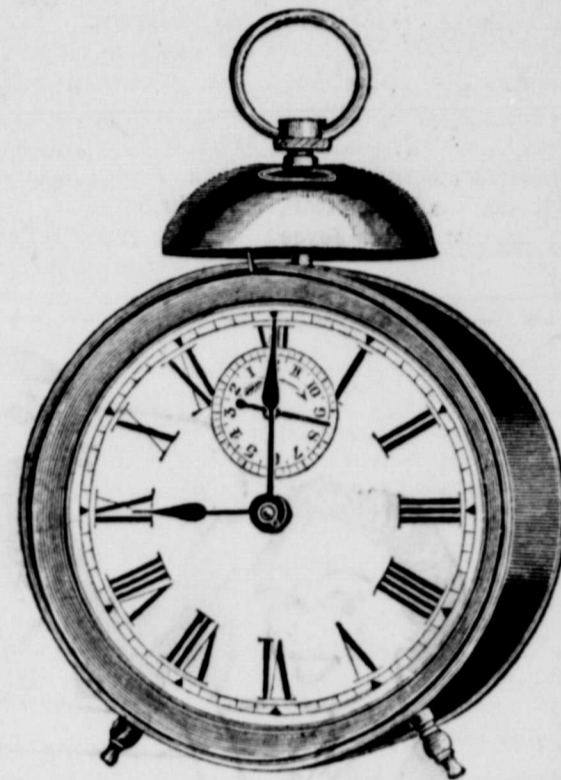

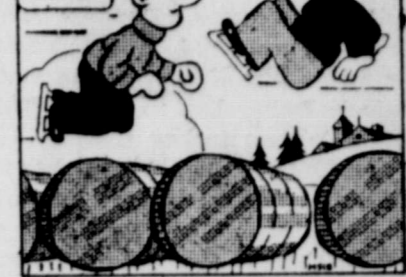

Mary Corley and Tommy Latham had swept the turkey show at the West Texas Fair in Abilene the last week in September which is ample evidence of the quality of the birds shown this year.

Annie Gartman of Robert Lee placed 12th with her steer at the Heart O' Texas Fair in Waco September 29. There were approximately 40 steers in the class with excellent quality from top to bottom. The steer was bred here in the county by her brother, Douglas Gartman, of Silver. Annie will exhibit her steer at the State Fair in Dallas on Oct. 17.

When School Bus Stops, Motorist Must Stop Also

Texas school superintendents, news editors and other citizens have been requested to give statewide emphasis and interpretation to the oft-neglected Texas law which requires all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children. Three state agencies, The Texas Education Agency, Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety joined in making the appeal.

Texas school buses were involved in 379 accidents in rural areas (outside city limits) during 1955. Three children and two adults were killed in these accidents.

"Even one preventable accident, as we all know, is one too many," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "A study of the various replies which have been made to the question of what drivers of other vehicles should do when they approach a school bus which is loading or unloading children reveals a startling lack of understanding and a great deal of misunderstanding concerning what the statutes require."

The law says, in effect, that up

on meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver shall stop immediately before passing, then proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highway with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is part of or adjacent to a controlled access highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

Edgar said motorists can identify a school bus easily because "SCHOOL BUS" appears in large letters across the front and rear of each bus. "All public school buses are painted in a uniform yellow color and trimmed in black," he pointed out. "School buses are equipped with flasher lights front and rear and usually mounted high on the bus. Flashers are used only when the bus is in the process of stopping or is stopped to receive or discharge children."

He studied under several local and San Angelo teachers and received his bachelor and master's degrees in music from NTSC at Denton. He later taught music at Sul Ross State College and gave several piano concerts in San Angelo. He became well known as an accompanist, working with several well-known singers. During early depression days he played with the famous Crazy Hotel orchestra at Mineral Wells.

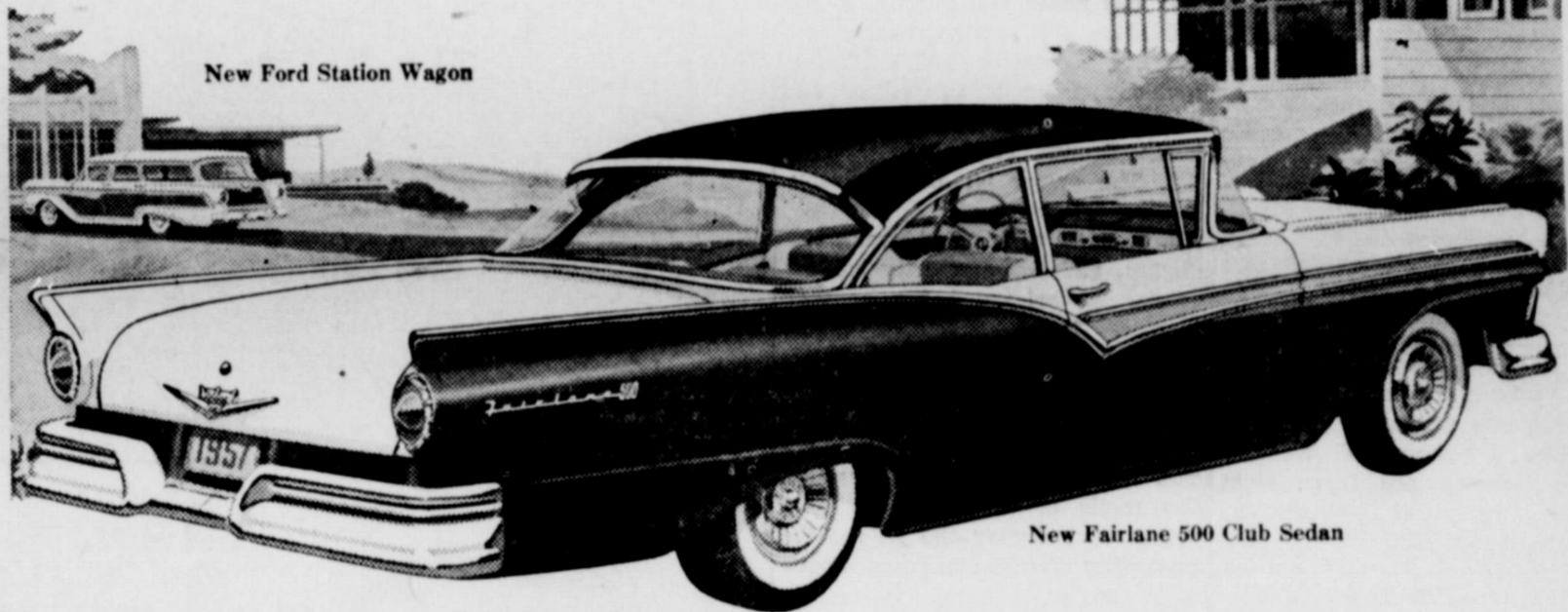

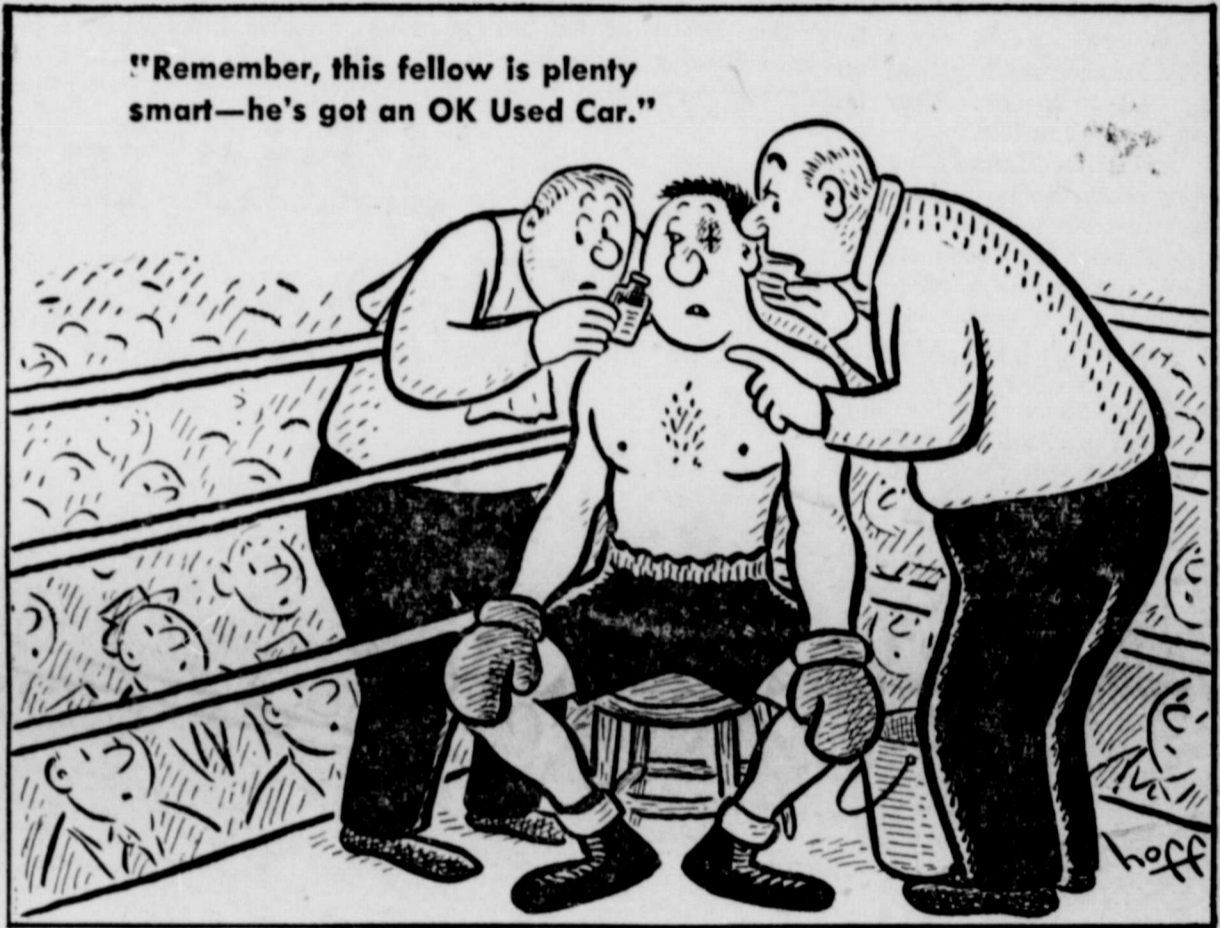
