## Longhorns Tangle With Tough Class A Wylie Team Tonight

The Bronte Longhorns will come back to the local stadium Friday night to tangle with another Class A school. This time the Longhorns will take on a tough team from Wylie.

Wylie is in District 10-A, with Eastland, Albany, Clyde and Throckmorton. The club has a season record of five wins, two losses and one tie. They have scored 144 points to their opponents' 61.

The Longhorns got a taste of Class A competition when they met Santa Anna last week, and Wylie has a better season record than do the Mountaineers.

Other games last week in the 6-B loop found Hermleigh smearing Loraine, 60-7, and Robert Lee slipped by Trent, 14-12.

This week's schedule gives Hermleigh a good chance to wrap up the title. The Cardinals play Trent Saturday night, and if they should lose, the district championship could end up in a three-way tie. However, Hermleigh is heavily favored to put the pennant on ice this weekend.

## Longhorns Lose To Santa Anna Eleven, 20-13

The Longhorn eleven fumbled away another ball game Saturday night. Four lost miscues were too much for the local lads. Taking advantage of two of the fumbles, Santa Anna avenged their defeat of last year year by taking a 20-13 victory. The victory climaxed homecoming activities for Santa Anna fans.

In going down to defeat, the Longhorns managed to pick up only six first downs and gained 169 yards rushing, while the Mountaineers rolled up ten first downs and 202 yards rushing.

The Longhorns drew first blood midway in the first period after driving 54 yards. Bill Wrinkle crossed the double-stripe from 15 yards out to put the Longhorns out front. Jimmy Lee ran the extra point and the Longhorns led 7-0.

Taking advantage of a Longhorn fumble, the Mountaineers scored from the eight yard line. Donald Ray scored with Larry Donham converting to knot the score at 7-7.

Again in the second period, Santa Anna scored to go ahead at half time. The last play of the first half saw White hit Gilbert with a 26-yard pass and the score. White converted and Santa Anna held a 14-7 lead at the end of the first half.

Late in the third stanza, Santa Anna iced the game with their final touchdown. Gilbert went into the end zone on a 37 yard scamper. The try for EP was missed, leaving the score 20-7.

Bronte's final tally came with only two minutes remaining in the game. Jimmy Lee carried from the 12 yard line to bring all scoring to an end. The try for point after was missed and the Longhorns came home on the short end of a 20-13 score.

## May Postpone Murder Trial Of Bronte Man

The murder trial for Vernon Glenn of Bronte is not likely to be held next week, when it had been set to come up in Tom Green County District Court on a change of venue from Coke County.

Judge Joe L. Mays said in Robert Lee Wednesday that defense attorneys, Runge & Hardeman, had requested a postponement since they are scheduled to be in Austin next week on the Harry Washburn case.

Washburn has been granted a new trial from his conviction of the murder of Mrs. Helen Weaver. A re-hearing on the matter will come up before the Criminal Court of Appeals on Wednesday.

Glenn is charged with the fatal shooting of Hollis Stevens in Bronte last summer.

## Demos Carry Coke County; Ike Leads in State and Nation

### The Winner . . .

Coke County went Democratic again this year, while the state as a whole gave a majority of its votes to the Republican party in the presidential balloting. The election was held throughout the nation Tuesday, Nov. 6. Coke gave Stevenson 630 votes, while Eisenhower received 548.

The turnout in Coke was not quite as good as four years ago. This year a total of 1178 votes were counted, while four years ago the total was 1312.

Coke County went along with the rest of the state in the other race-giving all the Democratic nominees substantial margins and passing all eight of the constitutional amendments.

W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel's campaign for governor as a written candidate fell flat. He received 149 votes in the county and 57 in the Bronte box.

Amendment 4 received the largest vote in the Bronte box. This constitutional change, sponsored by Texas teachers, received 210 votes, while only 53 Bronte voters were against it.

D. K. Glenn, election judge for the Bronte box, reported that 345 votes were cast in this box.

### ANOTHER SHOWER

## Bronte to Observe Holiday Monday

Monday will be a holiday in Bronte. Nov. 11 is Veterans Day and falls on Sunday this year. Consequently, Monday will be taken as a holiday.

Formerly known as Armistice Day, the event marks the end of World War I. However, its name has been changed to Veterans Day in order to honor veterans of all wars in which the United States has been involved.

No special observance has been planned for Bronte, other than the closing of most business houses and offices. Persons in this trade territory are asked to bear the holiday in mind, and do their shopping ahead of time, so they will not be inconvenienced.

The Bronte post office, city hall and First National Bank, as well as most retail establishments, will be closed. Some firms on the highway will remain open to take care of local and transient needs. Bronte Schools will also be dismissed for the day.

## Special Election Next Tuesday

Because of a legislative foul-up in setting dates, one more amendment remains to be voted on next Tuesday, Nov. 13, in a special election.

The amendment coming up next Tuesday proposes financial aid to needy disabled persons between the ages of 18 and 65 and authorizes an annual appropriation of not more than 1 1/4 million dollars.

Balloting will take place in the regular voting boxes of Coke County.

## City Council For Crack-Down on Traffic Violators

Members of the Bronte city council agreed with a committee from the Sorosis Study Club which met with council members last Friday night, that something needs to be done about traffic violations in the city limits.

The committee met with the council to urge action and see if there was anything the club could do to assist in providing law enforcement. Committee members were particularly interested in some kind of enforcement near the Bronte school.

Council members said they agreed with the ladies that traffic laws enforcement is badly needed here now and that something should be done about it.

It was suggested that a study and investigation of possible moves be made. The ladies agreed that their club would assist in investigating the possibilities and the council agreed to see what the city would be able to do.

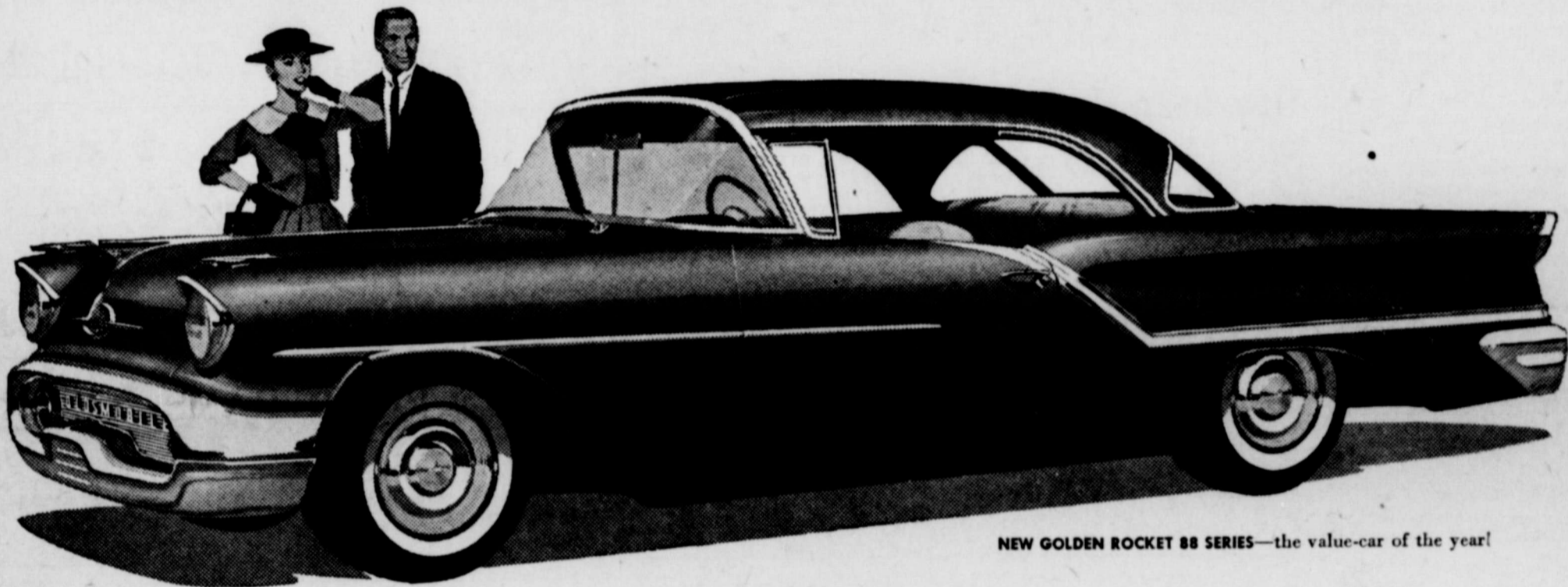

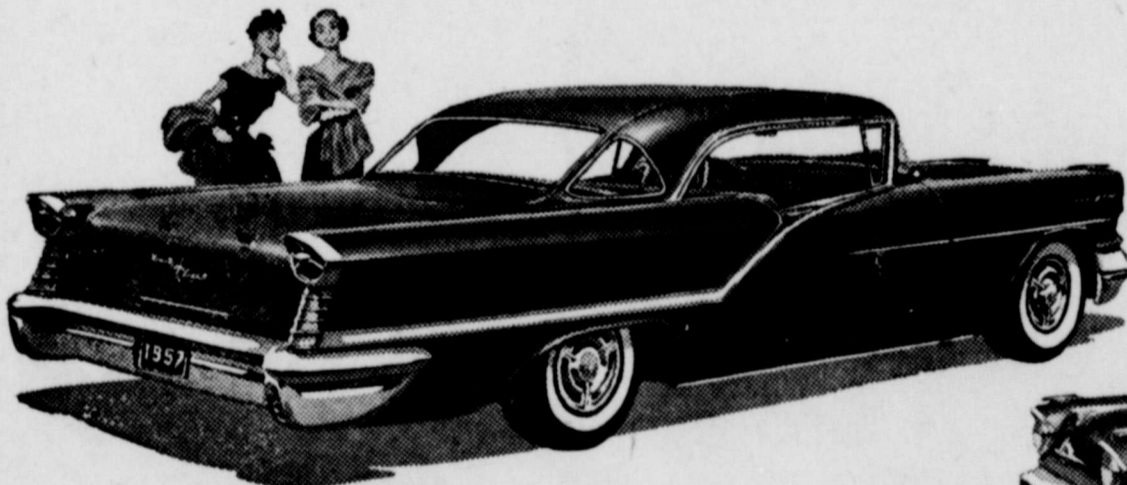

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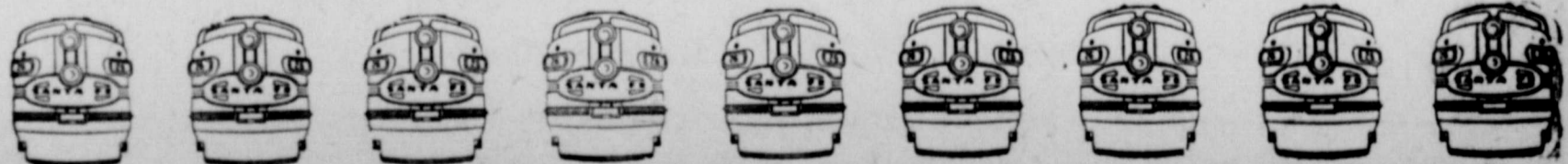
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## Wildlife Group Votes for Open Season on Deer

An open season on deer in Coke County is in prospect since farmers and ranchers have expressed themselves against continuing the closed season after 1956. This decision was reached at the Coke County Wildlife Management Ass'n meeting here Monday night.

At the same time it was voted to request a continuance of the closed season on wild turkey and quail for two more years.

More than 150 farmers and ranchmen attended the barbecue which each year precedes the Wildlife group meeting. S. E. (Skinny) Adams and his wife were hosts at the excellent feed which included barbecued beef, goat and sausage and all the trimmings. Dr. Perry J. C. Byars, a neighbor of Mr. Adams in San Angelo, helped cook the meat.

Assisting in preparation and serving the food were Sheriff Paul Good and Auditor Weldon Fikes and their wives. The program was held in the district court room.

Bert Blaylock, association president, was in charge of the meeting and a number of older citizens of the county were introduced by A. V. Sheppard. Game Warden Jim White spoke to the

group and colored movies were shown of wild game in the Hill Country.

Mr. White said he was happy the deer season was to be opened up in Coke after five years. It was his opinion that legalized hunting of quail and turkey should also be provided, since these birds move so much from one area to another. White pointed out that ranch owners and operators who do not want hunters on their premises are protected by a strict trespassing law.

Joe Rawlings of Bronte was elevated from vice-president to president for the next year. The new vice-president is Gerald Allen of Robert Lee, and J. E. Quisenberry of Robert Lee was re-elected secretary.

C. E. Arrott invited the group to meet at his place south of Bronte next year.

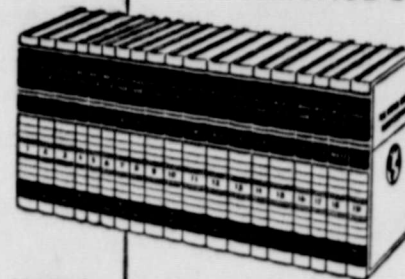
