An auto collision on the east-west highway through Robert Lee Thursday morning of last week resulted in serious injuries to Mrs. A. M. Hoots, 79 year old Bronte woman.

Lesser injuries were suffered by her daughter, Mrs. E. T. Lowrance, who was driving the car.

The mishap occurred at the corner west of the Froggie Hamburger stand. Mrs. Lowrance is reported to have pulled onto the highway and was hit by a car driven by Mrs. Betty Glass Lewallen of Colorado City.

Mrs. Hoots was knocked out of the car and received four broken ribs and numerous bruises. Mrs. Lowrance sustained multiple contusions. Both have been in Coke Memorial Hospital here where are making good recoveries.

Mrs. Lewallen was accompanied by her husband and they were pulling a trailer and horse. Neither was injured.

Bronte Virtually Assured of State Highway Patrolman

Capt. Ray Butler, who heads the San Angelo district of the Texas Department of Public Safety, practically assured a group of local citizens Thursday morning that a highway patrolman will be stationed here, just as soon as possible.

A movement to secure a state policeman for this area was begun several weeks ago by the Sorosis Study Club. Members of that organization have secured backing from practically every other group in town.

A petition bearing the names of a large number of local persons was given to Capt. Butler and Lt. Howell, who accompanied him.

The captain said that members of his organization had been discussing the need for a patrolman at Bronte for some time. It was pointed out that Bronte is quite a highway junction and carried lots of traffic. Capt. Butler said the amount of traffic would increase

greatly when the repair job on the highway to Abilene is completed and when the bridge across Oak Creek on the Winters Highway is finished.

When present construction is through, Bronte will have highways coming in from San Angelo, Ballinger, Winters, Abilene, Sweetwater and Robert Lee. The Robert Lee highway brings traffic through here from Midland and Colorado City.

Capt. Butler said that he would recommend to the State Highway Patrol that a patrolman be stationed here, adding that "we hope to have two men stationed in Bronte in the future."

Capt. Butler explained that it will take some time to get the assignment made to Bronte, but that he felt sure it could be done before too long. He said the shortage of men in the department is the big problem when it comes to assigning men to new stations.

Christmas in the Air Over Bronte Area

City Council Meets, And Discusses Sims' Successor

Bronte's city council met in regular session last Friday night at the city hall. Main topic of discussion was concerned with the night watchman's job here. T. F. Sims, Sr. indicated to Mayor Ernest Ivey several weeks ago that he would like to resign his position, effective Dec. 15.

The matter became more urgent, however, early last week when Mr. Sims became ill and was hospitalized. Deputy Sheriff Frank Kee-see filled in on the job until Wednesday night of this week when Rome Richards was temporarily named to fill the post.

Mr. Kee-see met with the council and pointed out the importance of caution in selecting a new night-watchman. "This is an important job and you want to get the right man," the deputy said.

Mr. Sims has been nightwatchman in Bronte for the past 22 years. During that time he has had many eventful experiences and has played a big part in law enforcement in the east side of Coke County. He is also constable of this precinct, a position he was re-elected to last summer for a four-year term.

Other business included paying of bills against the city.

Anyway, the whole thing was a bit exciting, as long as they did not want me for something.

We can surely talk about the weather this week as we have had some of it. In fact it kept us from making a weekend trip to Crane to see the daughter and we had planned to come back through Bronte for a few hours. After the freezing rain started, we decided that we would be much safer at home.

Our landlord gave a face lifting to my den by papering the walls and painting the woodwork. The husband said that we never get into the painting business or marry off a daughter unless it rains. All I can say, after the drouth we have been through, is that we did not do enough painting or have enough daughters to marry off.

Each week brings us a little closer to Christmas and I am sure by the time of this writing, you are doing some of your baking for the holidays. I am going to give you another good cookie recipe that is not only good for this time of year but just any time that you have time to make them. I know they will be eaten. I have eaten them a number of times at Mrs. Jim Rasco's house and had told her that I wanted her recipe but just forgot to get it. But, in going through my files, I found one just like it and have tried them on my family and they are very fond of them. They are called Snickerdoodles. Don't let the name scare you off as they are very easy to make.

Snickerdoodles

Mix together thoroughly:
1 cup soft shortening
1½ cups sugar
2 eggs
Sift together and stir in:
2 ¾ cups flour
2 teasp. cream of tartar
1 teasp. soda
½ teasp. salt

The recipe says to chill the dough but if you get in the hurry that I always do, you can go right ahead. But it does make the balls easier to roll out. Roll the dough into small balls about the size of a marble. Roll into a mixture of 2 tablespoons sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Place about 2 inches apart on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake until lightly browned. These cookies puff up at first and then flatten out with crinkled tops. Temperature is 400 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes.

This is supposed to be a very old recipe and I bet that most of the older women who read this can remember having this recipe many years ago.

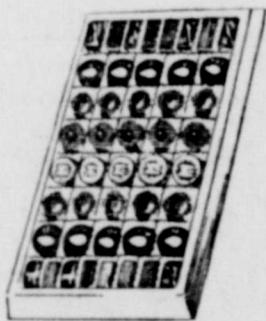

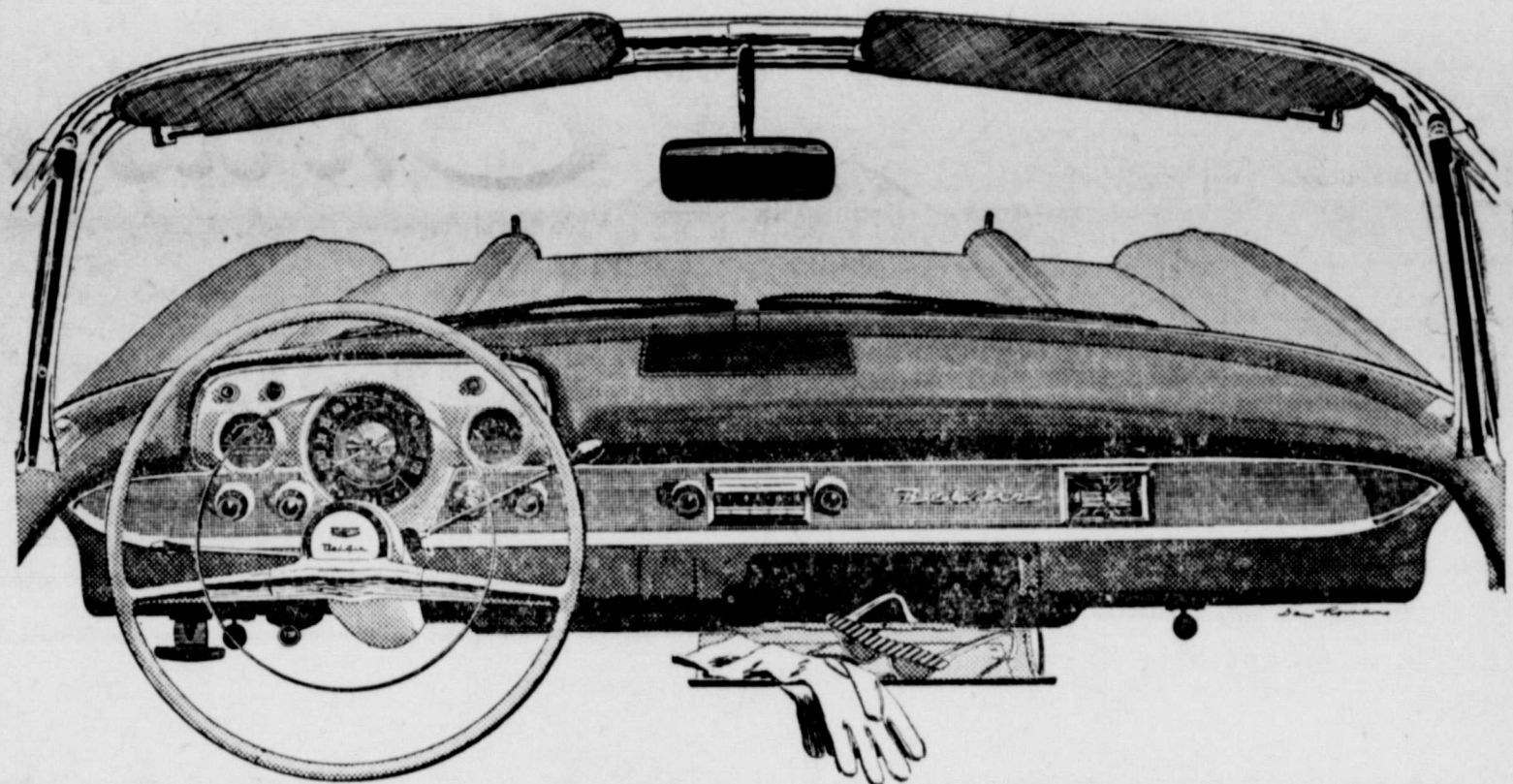

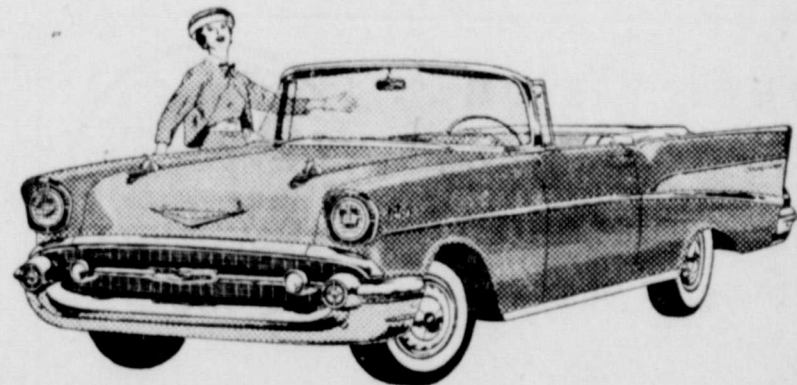

open 210 minutes, surfaced gas in
29 minutes and recovered 210 feet
of free oil and 120 feet of very
heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Flow-
ing pressure ranged from 30 to 130
pounds, and shut-in pressure in 45
minutes was 1,740 pounds.

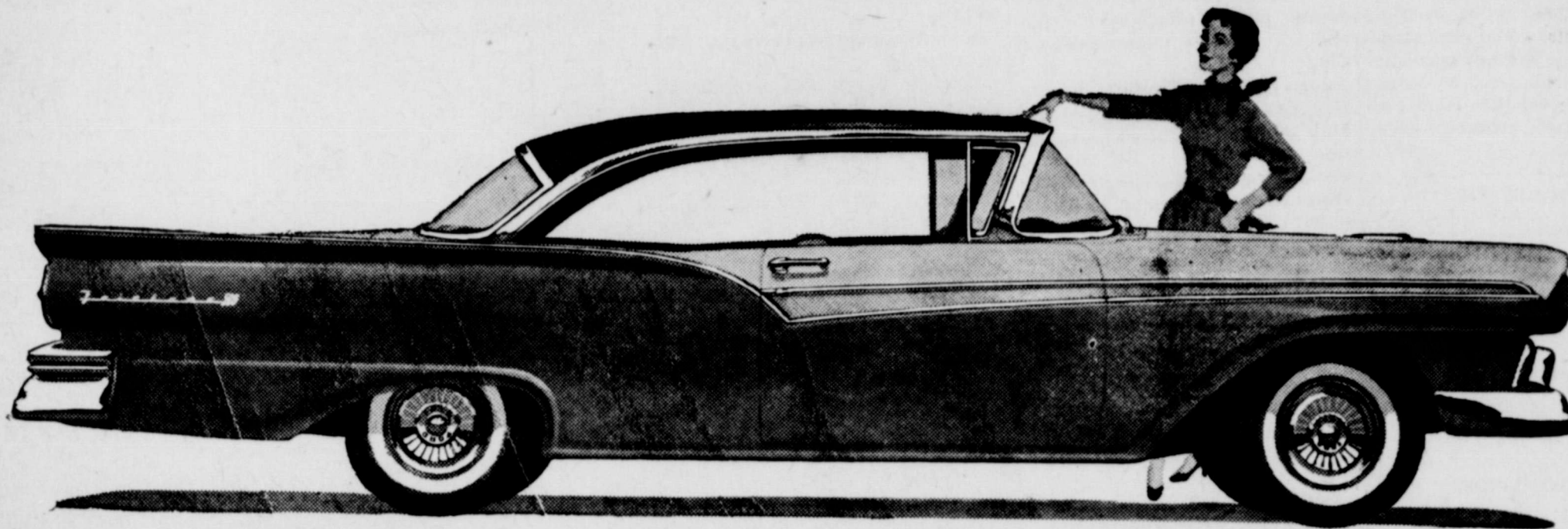
Hog prices should be higher the first six months of 1957. The reduction in hog numbers for 1956 could mean that hogs will make

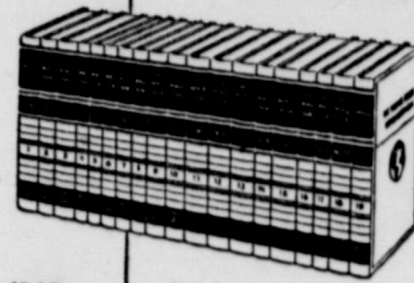

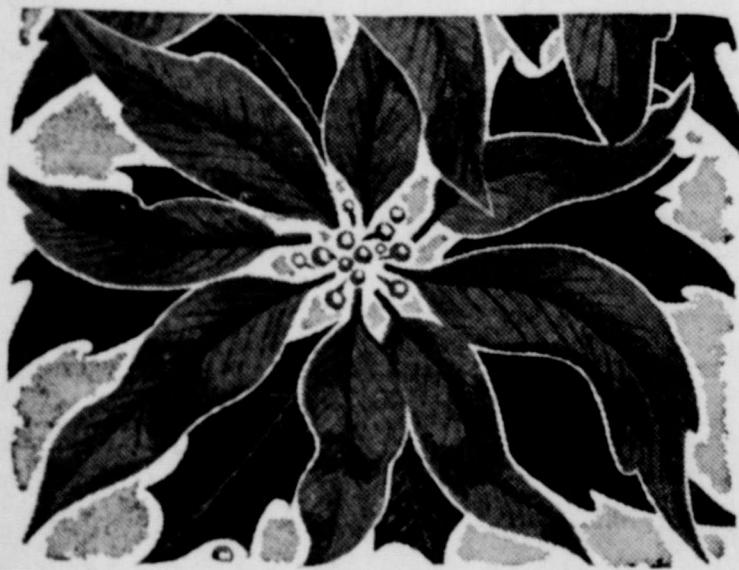

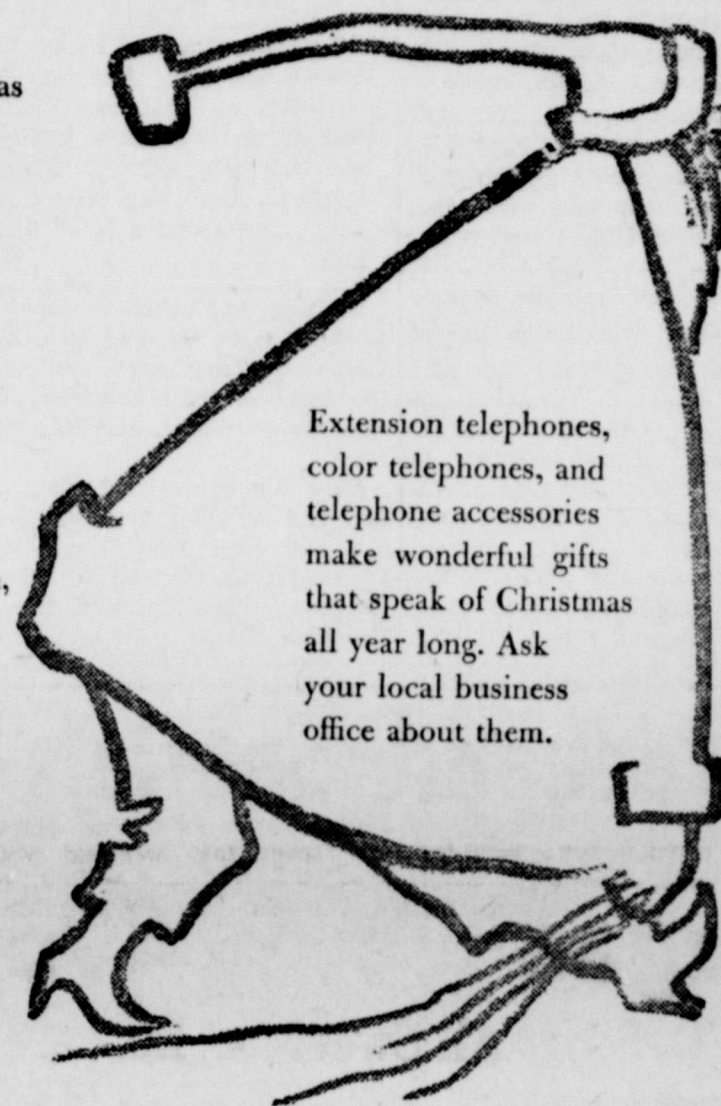

presents an inspiring sight for all who want to keep the true spirit of Christmas intact.

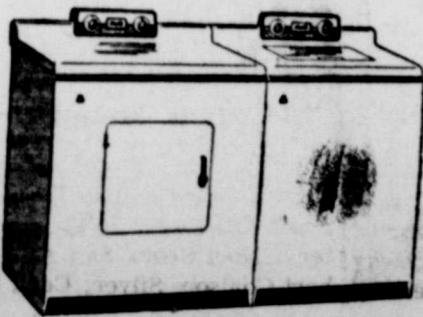
