Dimes Drive Ends Tonight With Dance at Joe Rose Bldg.

Final event for the March of Dimes planned to date in Bronte is the annual March of Dimes dance tonight. It will begin at 8 p.m. in the Joe Rose warehouse. Plenty of parking space is available and the building is large enough to accommodate a large crowd. Billy Madrey and his orchestra will be out from San Angelo to provide music for dancers. The public is invited.

Total collected to date for the annual dimes drive is \$663.06. Events during the past few days and the amounts raised include the school cards, \$72.50; tamale sale, \$52.90 and the Mothers'

March, \$139.00. It is hoped that the dance Friday night will push the Bronte total over the \$1,000 mark.

Robert Lee wound up their March of Dimes campaign this week, reporting a total of \$1,035. Silver still has several events scheduled before the county total can be obtained.

Red Chain Feed To Move Into Joe Rose Bldg.

J. W. Teague announced this week that he is moving his Red Chain Feed Store from its location in the Bridges building on Main street to the building which formerly housed the Joe Rose Construction Co. The move will be made this weekend.

Teague has leased the Rose property and will also move his family into the Rose house on the highway. They have been living in the J. A. Percifull rent house.

Red Chain Feed Store handles a complete line of Red Chain and Power feeds, as well as field and grass seeds and other farm and ranch supplies.

Teague opened the store several months ago and has grown into a very successful business, handling a large volume of feeds for farmers and ranchmen of this area.

Teague is active in civic affairs of the town and only recently was named to the Bronte School board.

CHEST X-RAY SURVEY

Livestock Show Saturday Was "Very Successful" Event

Champ Steer Brings \$384; \$160 for Lamb

Following the Coke County Livestock Show at Bronte last Saturday, one steer, eight lambs and eight barrows were sold at auction. The champion steer brought 46 cents a pound, or \$384.10. The top lamb brought \$1.00 a pound, or \$160, and champion barrow sold at 70 cents a pound and brought its owner \$156.10.

Nathan Donsky of San Angelo helped make the auction a success, and was as busy as a fieldman in the ring with Auctioneer Edward Cumbie.

"A very successful show" was the verdict connected with the Coke County Livestock Show which was held here last Saturday. The show had been scheduled for the previous Monday, but was postponed because of bad weather.

A record number of 45 hogs were entered in the show, while 50 head of sheep, eight head of baby beeves, eight breeding sheep and four breeding cattle competed for the prize money.

Young exhibitors from Robert Lee copped all the top honors in the fat classes, having the grand champion fat lamb, fat barrow and baby beef.

A number of the top animals are in the Abilene Show this week and some of the stock will go on

to Houston.

Grand champion steer was an 845-pound Hereford shown by Kenneth Wink, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wink of Robert Lee.

Freddie McDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McDonald, Jr. of Robert Lee, won the grand championship in the fat lamb show with his crossbred entry which tipped the scales at 160 pounds.

Terry Frank Bryan showed the grand champion fat barrow with his 223-pound Duroc. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Bryan of Robert Lee and has been showing top hogs for several years.

Kenneth Wink and his sister, Kay, dominated the light weight steer show, their entries being obtained from the herd owned by their brother-in-law, Douglas Gartman.

Herman Carter of the Midwest Feed Yards in San Angelo, was the judge.

Showmanship awards went to Annice Gartman in the baby beef class, while Freddie McDonald took both the lamb and hog showmanship trophies.

Breeders trophies went to Joe Rawlings, lamb; Terry Frank Bryan, swine; Douglas Gartman, steer. These trophies were purchased by the Robert Lee BCD, the Bronte Lions Club and the Coke Livestock Association.

Nathan's Jewelers presented a trophy to the exhibitor of the champion lamb and a revolving trophy which must be won three years.

Cash prizes went to all exhibitors. The prize money comes from an annual appropriation of \$1,000 made by the Commissioners Court.

MORE RAIN AND CLOUDS BLANKET AREA

About a half inch of rain fell over this area last Friday night. The moisture fell slowly and was ideal for winter grain. Evidently, the rain pretty well covered the entire county, as it was reported as far west as Edith community.

COUNTY OFFICIAL PAY INCREASE GIVES EVERYONE \$300-\$400 MORE

A pay increase for county and precinct elective officers, as well as all court house and road employee, was adopted at Monday's session of Coke County Commissioners Court.

No objections were heard concerning the proposed salary raise which had been officially advertised to come up Feb. 4.

It means \$400 more per year for county elective officials and \$300 per year for elective precinct officers (Justices of the Peace and Constables) as well as all deputies and clerks. Road hands were given a pay hike of 25 cents an hour, with a 50 cent increase for one road foreman in each of the four road precincts.

The new scale will be in effect from Jan. 1, 1957.

Commissioners gave final approval of hiring caretakers for the new county parks and swimming pools at Robert Lee and Bronte, at wages of \$250 per month. Aubrey Denman will be in charge of the Bronte project and R. C. (Buzz) Sawyer is the Robert Lee custodian.

Scherz Nursery of San Angelo was given a contract for landscaping and planting trees and shrubs around the new court house at a cost of \$600. All the plantings are guaranteed to live.

Robert Lee State Bank and First

National Bank of Bronte were re-appointed as depositories for county funds, continuing the plan in effect the past two years in which the county money is divided between the two local banking institutions.

County Judge Jeff Dean was present and presided over the court session. Also on hand for a part of the day was Commissioner Claude Ditmore of Precinct 4, who is making a good recovery from a heart ailment.

Commissioners on Tuesday inspected the new park projects with Engineer E. E. Greif. Final approval was given Don Williams on his contract for constructing the caretakers house at Bronte, the community building at Robert Lee and the bath houses at both pools. Acceptance of the pools was delayed pending some minor adjustments and cleanup, upon the advice of Mr. Greif.

BANKS TO CLOSE

Coke County's two banks, the First National in Bronte and the Robert Lee State, will be closed Tuesday, Feb. 12, in observance of Lincoln's birthday. Customers are asked to keep this date in mind and arrange their business so they will not be inconvenienced by the holiday.

Other business firms in Bronte will not observe the holiday.

What's What by Whatley

We made it through Bronte last Sunday and it was just wonderful to see so many of our friends. There was only one thing wrong—time was too short.

I received a very interesting letter from the daughter in Germany and I want to share part of it with you. Due to the length of the letter I will omit the recipe for this week. The daughter says:

I went to the luncheon I mentioned in my last letter, and the speech was very interesting. It was given by a lady doctor of philosophy who teaches at the University of Frankfurt and the University of Maryland and who spent two years in the U. S. Because of her time spent in the States and her work with women's groups, she could compare the German customs with ours, and then after her talk we had a question period, so we got the answers to several of our questions.

First of all I'll give a run down on a few of their holidays. I have already told you about Christmas. The main ones beside Christmas are Easter and Fasching. Easter is observed very much the same as ours with eggs, et cetera; and Fasching is a lot like our Mardi Gras. It is actually a huge carnival, and it stems from the Catholic Church. It begins on the 11th minute of the 11th hour of the 11th of November and lasts until 6 weeks before Easter. It won't be long until it really gets into swing and I may have more information later; but everyone really looks forward to this, and they have dances and all kinds of entertainment. At this time, it seems to be the custom for husbands and wives to go out separately and have their yearly fling. I have talked to two girls and suggested that we would have to get together as couples, of course, and they both said they didn't want to go with their husbands. Guess I'm just dull or not Europeanized. On one particular day they have more celebration than at any other times and I understand the parades in the large Catholic communities are really something to see. Also, in the German language "Sie" means you, and also "Du" means you, but the "Du" is used only on very, very close friends, family, relatives and children. However, on this particular day, everyone can call everyone else "Du", but that stops at 12 o'clock sharp.

Concerning the family life of the Germans — it is not really close, than ours, but the man is definitely the head of the family. Everyone must ask his permission for everything, and a wife must have his permission to work, and he can give notice of her resignation at any time. The women do have a vote here; however, in Switzerland, they do not even have that. Another odd thing, they have 33 women in Parliament here, whereas we only have 13 in our House of Representatives. Shaking hands is quite a custom here, it is done constantly — whenever you meet, depart, et cetera. However, the man must always offer his hand first — a woman would never consider taking the initiative or speaking first. Men always walk on the right side of the women, and they are the one that offers the "Du" address!

go to the church and have their formal affair. One rather odd thing is that the groom takes the bride down the aisle and not the father. It's rather funny, that in the States, with all our independence, our father gives us away at the time of marriage, but here he does not, after ruling the family so much more firmly. Also, they have no best man, but they have several bridesmaids, and they all have escorts. They don't have showers as we do, but send gifts to the home, and it would be rude to write a note of thank-you if the giver lived at all near, but a personal call is made. Another thing — you never see a pregnant woman — they retire after five months, and do not appear in public any more. I think we're rather shocking to them.

A short note on funerals. They are not considered terrible at all, and they do not embalm. The family fixes the body, and there is a three day wait before burial. One custom that is fading a little — but in years past only the men attended funerals — even if a mother died, only the men members of the family went to the funeral.

The German School system is quite different from ours, and co-educational schools are practically non-existent. They take languages quite early in school, because they are naturally more needed than in the States, and they have many "trade" schools.

The women are just now beginning a few clubs; but it seems they have much less time than the American woman, because naturally they have much less in the way of conveniences, and then there are no school lunchrooms, so they always have their children home at noon. There used to be a German-American Woman's Club in Frankfurt, but it fell apart because the German women didn't have the time.

There are so many differences in our customs (they are so much more formal) on such things as calling people by first names, borrowing from neighbors, dropping in to call, and even holding our knives and forks. Naturally, the Americans are influencing them in many things, and they accept many things from us, that would otherwise be considered very rude, because we are Americans. It really is quite an experience to see all these things, and I think it would be wonderful if every American had the chance to live in Europe for a time; because they'll never fully appreciate what we have without it!

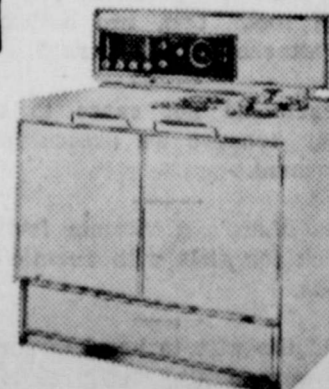

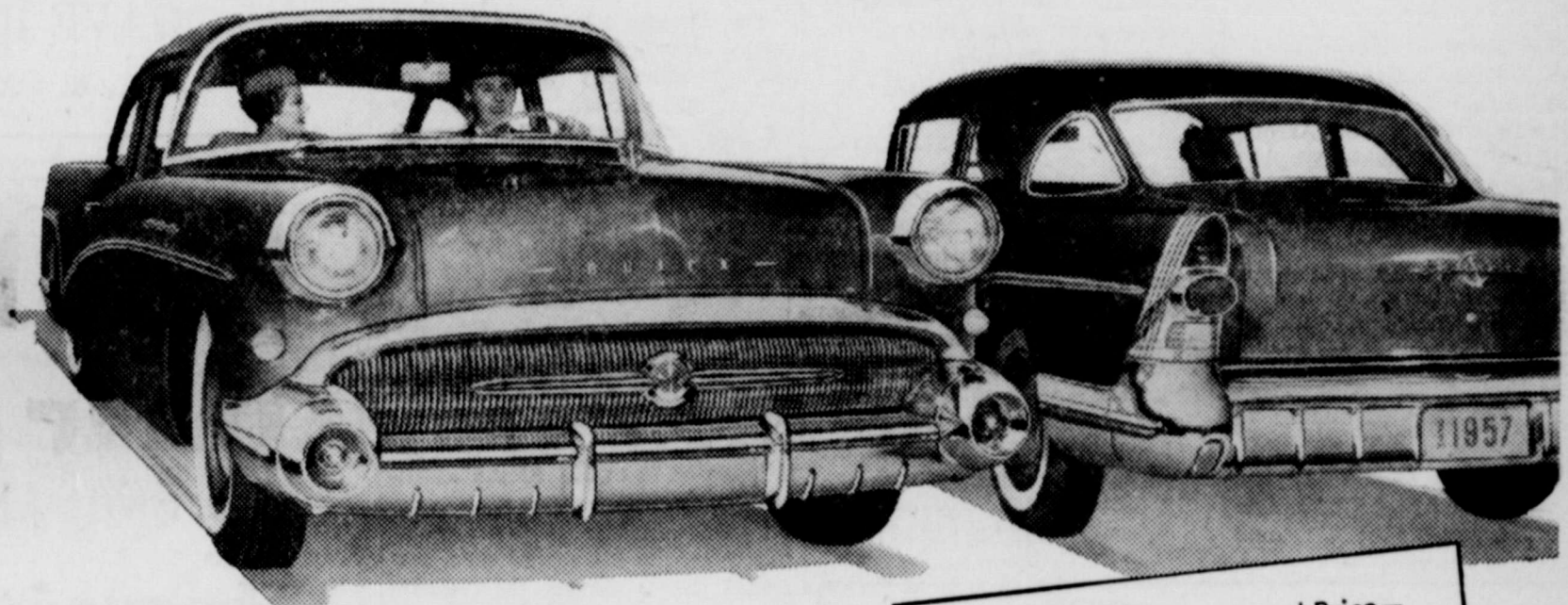
ton's 600,000 citizens about \$40,000 a year. Wherever there is oil, there will be oil men to take it from the ground for the benefit of the American public.

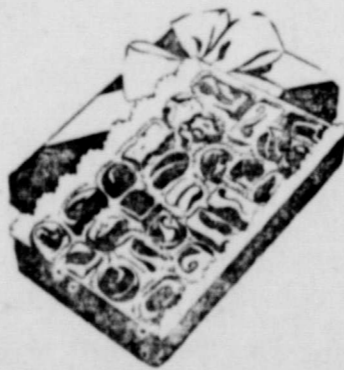

Richest Men Live in Texas

"The Oil Folks at Home," a witty study of Texas oil families appears in the February issue of Holiday magazine. The text, by Cleveland Amory, and the pictures, by Slim Aarons, present a colorful view of many of the state's leading citizens.

The author asserts that of the ten richest men in the country, at least five of them are Texans, and if people with inherited wealth are excluded, the proportion is even higher.

The article includes many anecdotes and sketches of men like Haroldson Lafayette Hunt and Clint Murchison of Dallas, Hugh Roy Cullen, of Houston, and Sid Richardson of Fort Worth. These men, according to Amory, are the big four in Texas Oligarchy. Amory describes Glenn McCarthy as a man whose life would make an ideal movie script and claims that D. Harold Byrd, of Dallas, once issued a dinner invitation to all those within hearing distance at the Cotton Bowl Game.

"Though the emphasis in Texas is on the male," he continues, "many of the women do not know they are downtrodden." He mentions Mrs. Al Meadows as wearing the largest diamond in the state, and Mrs. Robert L. Gerry, Jr., of Dallas, as stating that "money is IT in Texas Society."

Amory contrasts the comparatively simple life of Houston and Dallas with Amarillo, "the spendiest town", and Midland, which he describes as "the richest."

The article concludes with a tribute to Everette Lee DeGolyer, of Dallas, the father of petroleum geology. "He is," the author writes, "a man of remarkable humility, open-mindedness, humor and naturalness."

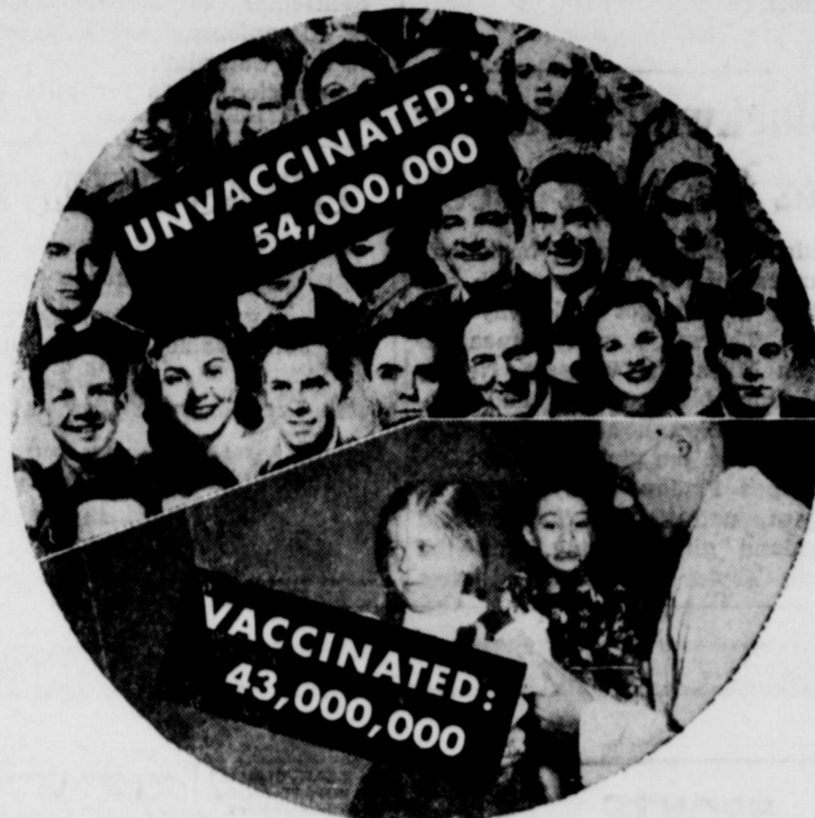
